SANITARY ACT, 1866.

HURSTPIERPOINT, COUNTY OF SUSSEX.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the Sanitary Act, 1866, a Special Drainage District, consisting of the west portion of the town of Hurstpierpoint, in the county of Sussex, has been formed by the vestry of the parish of Hurstpier-

point; and whereas, under the said Act, an appeal has been duly made to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and signed by owners and ratepayers of such parish, praying me to annul the said district, or to modify the boundaries thereof by extending the same over the whole town and land immediately adjoining, as to me might seem just; and whereas, after investigation into the subject matter of the appeal aforesaid held by Arnold Taylor, Esq., the Inspector appointed by me for the purpose, and report thereon made by him, and after full consideration of the said appeal and report:

I do hereby, under the powers conferred on me by the Sanitary Act, 1866, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, direct that from and after the date of this present order, the formation of the said Hurstpierpoint Special Drainage District be annulled, and that a new district, to be styled the Special Drainage District of Hurstpierpoint, be formed in lieu thereof, and that the said new district shall comprise the area comprised within the boundary line on the plan accompanying the aforesaid report, commencing at the point A on the west side of such plan, and on the south side of the turnpike road leading from Hurstpierpoint to Albourne; and, after crossing such road in a northerly direction, passes along the westerly boundary fence of the property numbered 1129 on the tithe map of Hurstpierpoint parish, and proceeds northerly along and including White Horse-lane, to the point B, thence easterly, crossing such road and the road leading from Hurstpierpoint to Cuckfield, and following an old line of fence, to the point C, which is taken to be at 70 yards in a straight line to the east of such last-named road, thence in a straight line southerly to the point D, at the gate leading from Rectory-lane to the Home Field, thence easterly along the southerly boundary fence of the property numbered 1187 on the tithe map of Hurstpierpoint parish to the point E, thence southerly to the south-west corner of the property numbered 1222 on such tithe map to the point F, thence north-easterly along the fence which separates property numbered 1054a from those numbered 1222 and 1221, all on such tithe map, to the point G, thence in a straight line easterly, and crossing property numbered 1220 on such tithe map, to the point H, at the north-west corner of property numbered 1047 on such tithe map, thence easterly along the boundary fence of the garden and grounds of Mr. Charles Smith Hannington, to a gate at the point I, on the west side of Latchett's-lane, thence northerly along and including such lane, and crossing the highway leading from St. John's College to the point K, on the east side of such highway, thence easterly and southerly along and including such highway, and crossing the turnpike-road leading to Lewes, to the point L, on the south side of such last-named road, thence westerly along and including such road, to the point M, at the lane leading to Tott, thence westerly along and including such lane, to the point N, thence southerly and westerly along the southerly boundary fences of the properties numbered 1278, 1277, and 1241a, on the tithe map of Hurstpierpoint parish, to the point O, thence, westerly, along the boundary fence dividing property numbered 54, from that numbered 60, both on such tithe map, to the point P, at the northwest corner of the last-named property, thence, southerly, along the easterly boundary fences of the properties numbered 55, 59, and 61, to the point Q, on the south side of the Washbrook stream, thence, north-westerly, along and including such stream, and crossing the turnpike road,
