#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's appro-

bation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 11th March, 1868, in the words following; viz.:—

"Whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased by two Orders in Council, dated the 5th day of December, 1865, to establish certain regulations for carrying out the purposes of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, and the Naval Agency and Distribution Act, 1864; and whereas by the first and second paragraphs of the sixth clause of the said Orders in Council, it is provided, that 'for the purposes of the provisions of this Order respecting allotments and remittances of pay by seamen and marines, and other 'remittances, the proper certifying authority, where the Allottee, or Payee resides in England,

'Wales, Scotland, the Isle of Man, or the Channel 'Islands,' shall be 'the Minister and Churchwardens, or Elders of the Parish, or District 'Parish wherein the Allottee or Payee resides.' And 'where the Allottee or Payee resides in Ire-'land, the Inspector or Sub-Inspector of Con-'stabulary for the County, and a Churchwarden for the Parish wherein the Allottee or Payee ' resides,' shall be the proper certifying authority. And whereas we are of opinion that it would be expedient to cancel the said clauses, and to make all Ministers of Religion and Magistrates the proper certifying authority. We do, therefore, beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be graciously pleased by your Order in Council to cancel the said clauses, and to direct that the signatures of all Ministers of Religion and Magistrates may be admitted in Great Britain and Ireland as the proper certifying authority, in such cases in future.'

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Saviour, situate in Herne-hillroad as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said particular district of Saint Matthew, Denmark-hill, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Saviour, situate in Herne-hill-road as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Herne-hill-road.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

# The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Herne Hill-road, being:—

"All that part of the particular district of Saint Matthew, Denmark-hill, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, which is situate to the west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the district parish of Emmanuel, Camberwell, in the said county and diocese from the particular district of Saint Matthew, Denmark-hill aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the north-western end of Lilfordroad; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said road to its junction with Cold Harbour-lane; and extending thence southwestward for a distance of three and a half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said lane, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of the fence on the eastern side of Vaughan-road; and extending thence south-eastward for a distance of six chains, or thereabouts, to and along the middle of the said fence to a boundary stone, inscribed 'H. H. R. St. S. D. C., 1868, No. 1,' and placed in the angle formed by the said Vaughan-road bending south-westward; and continuing thence, still south-eastward and in a straight line for a distance of twenty chains, or thereabouts, to another boundary stone, inscribed 'H. H. R. St. S. D. C., 1868, No. 2,' and placed upon the boundary dividing the said particular district of Saint Matthew, Denmark-hill, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Herne-hill, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a distance of twenty-nine chains and seventy-five links, or thereabouts, from the point where such boundary meets the north-eastern side of Poplar-walk."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, banns and of the solemnization or performance of therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of the said offices should be paid and belong to the

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Salisbury.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the sixth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, and duly published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-first day of December in the same year, a portion of the parish of Warminster, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a particular district to

the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate within the limits of the said parish, and such district was named 'The Christ Church District.'

"And whereas the said Christ Church district has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, since become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, should be altered as hereinafter men-

tioned.

Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Warminster, with the consent of the Reverend James Erasmus Philipps, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Warminster, as such vicar or incumbent, and also as the patron in right thereof of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, and with the consent of the Reverend William Hickman, the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the new parish of Christ Church, Warminster (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, should be altered so as to annex to such new parish all that portion of the said parish of Warminster which is described in the First Schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and is thereon coloured green; and that from and after the day of the date of the publication of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this representation, the said portion of the parish of Warminster should be annexed to and should be included within and form part of the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster.

And we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with the like consents of the said Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, of the said James Erasmus Philipps, and of the said William Hickman (testified as aforesaid), also represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, should be further altered so as to dissever therefrom all that portion thereof, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink, and that from and after the above-mentioned date of the publication of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this representation as aforesaid all such lastly-mentioned portion of the new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, should be dissevered from such new parish and should be restored to and should again form part of the parish of Warminster aforesaid.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your

Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The First SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, some time part of the parish of Warminster, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Salisbury, being:—

"All that portion of the said parish of Warminster, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a boundary stone inscribed 'W. Ch. Ch., 1868, No. 1,' and placed on the western side of the Sambourn-road, at the eastern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 979 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Warminster, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the closes numbered respectively 980, 990, 994, 999, 2383B, and 2393 upon the same maps; and extending thence, in a direction generally south-westward, along the middle of the said fence, to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 976 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 2393 as aforesaid, 2396, 2418, and 2431 upon the same maps; and extending thence, first westward, and then generally southward, along the middle of the last described fence, to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 975 upon the said maps from a certain occupation road leading from the close numbered 976 as aforesaid to Pound-street, and from the closes numbered respectively 2434, 2446, and 1304 upon the same maps; and continuing thence, first southward, and then eastward, along the middle of the last described fence, to a point upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Warminster from the new parish of Christ Church, Warminster aforesaid opposite to a boundary stone inscribed W. Ch. Ch., 1868, No. 2,' and placed at or near the eastern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 975 from the close numbered 1304 as aforesaid, on the southern side of a certain footpath leading from Pound-street aforesaid, into the said Sambourn-road; and extending thence, generally eastward, for a distance of twenty-five chains, or thereabouts, along the last described boundary (following thereby in part the said footpath and crossing the said Sambourn-road), to a boundary stone inscribed 'W. Ch. Ch., 1868, No. 3,' and placed on the south-western side of a certain other footpath which leads from Weymouthstreet along the south western side of the close numbered 811 upon the said maps, into the Sambourn-road before mentioned; and extending thence, north-westward, for a distance of thirteen chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last described footpath to its junction with the said Sambourn-road; and extending thence, southward, for a distance of two chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said road to a point opposite to the first described boundary stone; and extending thence westward to such boundary stone where the said imaginary line commenced.

The Second SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be dissevered from the new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, sometime part of the parish of Warminster, in the county of Wilts and in the diocese of Salisbury, and to be restored to the said parish of Warminster, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, which comprises the territory commonly known as Boreham, and which is situate to the east and north of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish from the said new parish, at the junction of the Boreham-road with Smallbrook-road; and extending thence, first south-westward,

and then south-eastward, along the middle of the last-described road, to the boundary at Small-brook Mill, which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, from a certain detached portion of the parish of Upton Scudamore, in the county and diocese aforesaid, in the middle of the River Wily; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the last-described boundary, so far as it follows the said river, and then in the same direction along the middle of the same river to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Warminster, from the parish of Bishopstrow, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts: and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Salisbury.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter oue hundred and four, and of the Act of the thirtieth year of Her Majesty, chapter twentysix, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twentieth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirtyseven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the thirtieth year of your Majesty, chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of that portion of the parish of Bishopwearmouth, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls; also for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes partly out of the lastly mentioned portion of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth and partly out of the new parish of Saint Andrew, Deptford, some time part of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth; also for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes partly out of the firstly mentioned portion of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth, and artly out of the new parish of South Hylton, and the new parish of Saint Paul, Ryhope, both some time part of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth; and also for constituting another separate district for spiritual purposes out of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Deptford.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular parts of the above-mentioned cures, which are herein-after mentioned and described (such parts not at present containing within their respective limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship) should be constituted into four separate districts, in the manner herein-after set forth.

"And whereas certain glebe lands, tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, messuages, tenements, and hereditaments, formerly belonging to the rectory of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth, have become vested in us, under the provisions of and for the purposes of the fourthly hereinbefore-

mentioned Act.

of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.
"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, all that part of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth which is described in the first schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan numbered I., and hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Peter, Bishopwearmouth;' that all those parts of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Deptford, which are described in the second schedule hereunder written, all which lastly-mentioned parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan numbered II., and hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mark, Millfield;' that all those parts of the said parish of Bishopwearmouth and of the said new parish of South Hylton, and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Ryhope, which are described in the third schedule hereunder written, all which lastly mentioned parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan numbered l

III., and hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Matthew, Silksworth;' and that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Deptford, which is described in the fourth schedule hereunder witten, all which lastly mentioned part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan numbered IV., and hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Luke, Pallion.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act or Acts of Parliament.

"And whereas upon and from the time when a church shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of the said intended district, after that the same district shall have been constituted as is hereinafter recommended and proposed, the said rent charges in lieu of tithes will, by operation of the hereinbefore thirdly mentioned Act, become and be absolutely vested in the incumbent of such church and his successors for ever, and be held and enjoyed by him and them in right of such incumbency.

"And whereas the said rent charges in lieu of tithes have been so given, granted, and appropriated as aforesaid, upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John Thomas, bishop of the said diocese of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Heigham which is mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Philip, Heigham.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said John Thomas, Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

# "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Philip, Heigham, being: -

"All that part of the parish of Heigham, in the city and county of the city of Norwich, and in the diocese of Norwich, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the west by the parish of Earlham, in the same county and diocese, on the south by the new parish of the Most Holy Trinity, Heigham (lately part of the said parish of Heigham), on the east partly by the parish of Saint Giles, Norwich, in the said county and diocese, and partly by the parish of Saint Benedict, Norwich, in the same county and diocese, and on the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Heigham aforesaid, at a point near Saint Benedict's-gates, at the eastern end of the Dereham-road; and extending thence westward, for a distance of one mile and a quarter, or thereabouts, along the middle of the same road, to a point upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Heigham from the parish of Earlham aforesaid."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, transmitted to the patron, and to the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and such rector or incumbent have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Norwich.

In the churchyard of Wath-upon-Dearne, to the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, on condition that no earthen grave be opened for burial within three yards of Wath Hall Garden, and that no soil which is offensive be disturbed.

eighteenth day of May next.

for such purpose, and he has reported to me

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, having taken the said petition and report into consideration, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Local Government Act, 1858, make order as follows:-

1. That from and after the date of this present order, the boundaries hereinafter set forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to in and accompanying the Inspector's report, bearing date the 24th day of March, 1868, form and constitute the boundaries of the district to be called the Newquay District, for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858, and that the parts included in such boundaries so described and delineated shall, for the purposes of such Act, be deemed to be a place having a known and defined boundary, and may adopt the said Act

accordingly.

The aforesaid boundaries commence at the point A, on the aforesaid plan, on Newquay beach, at low-water mark of ordinary spring tides; thence across the said beach in a southerly direction to B, on the north side of the road leading from Newquay to St. Columb; thence crossing the said road and along the east and south sides of fields numbered 452 to C, at Tolcarne-lane; thence southerly along the east side of the said lane, and including it, to D; thence along the south side of field numbered 449, to the Newquay Railway; thence crossing the said railway and along the south side of field numbered 449b to E; theuce along the east and south sides of field numbered 449a to F, on the road leading to Trenance; thence along the east side of the said road, and including it, to G; thence crossing the said road and along the south side of fields numbered 107 and 108 to H; thence southerly along the east side of field numbered 85 to I, on the boundary between the parishes of St. Columb Minor and Crantock; thence westerly along the said parish boundary to K, on the south side of L'Henverlane; thence crossing the said lane and westerly along its north side to L; thence northerly along the east side of Sandy Close lane to M; thence crossing Sandy Close lane and along the west side of field numbered 18 to N; thence westerly along the boundary between the parishes of St. Columb Minor and Crantock to O; thence across Fistral Beach to P, at the low-water mark of ordinary spring tides; thence northerly and easterly along the line of low-water mark and round Towan Head to the starting point at A, thus completing the boundaries of the aforesaid district of Newquay.

That Henry Francis Whitefield, Esq., of St. Columb aforesaid, Solicitor, be Summoning Officer, and take forthwith all such steps as may be necessary under the hereinbefore recited Act, for convening a meeting of the ratepayers of the said district of Newquay, to decide as to the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, within the boundaries of such district as fixed
