NOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales will, by command of The Queen, hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Friday, the 26th instant, at two o'clock.

It is the Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at this Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

This Levee will be the last held during the present Season.

### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to

The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

**W**HEREAS by the fourth section of the Act of the sixth year of the reign of King George the Fourth, chapter eighty-seven, intituled "An Act to regulate the payment of salaries and allowances to British Consuls at foreign ports, and the disbursements at such ports for certain public purposes," it is amongst other things enacted: "That it shall and may be lawful for all Consuls-General and Consuls appointed by His Majesty and resident within the dominions of any Sovereign or any foreign State or Power in amity with His Majesty, to accept, take, and receive the several fees particularly mentioned in the tables to the said Act annexed, for and in respect or on account of the several matters and things, and official acts and deeds, particularly mentioned in the said schedules: and that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders to be by him made, by and with the advice of His Privy Council from time to time, as occasion may require, to increase or diminish, or wholly to abolish, all or any of the fees aforesaid, and to establish and authorize the payment of any greater or smaller, or new or additional, fees or fee for or in respect of the several matters and things mentioned in the said schedules, or in any of them, or for or in respect of any other matters or things, or matter or thing, to be by any such Consul-General or Consul done or performed in the execution of such his office:"

And whereas by an Order in Council made on the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, it was ordered that certain fees mentioned in the table thereunto annexed should be taken; and whereas it is expedient to abolish those fees so far as regards fees to be levied by Her Majesty's Consular Officers in China and Japan, and to establish and authorize the payment of other fees in lieu thereof: Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act, and in execution of the powers in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested by the said Act, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the several fees mentioned in the table annexed to the Order in Council of the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, shall be abolished as regards fees to be

levied by Her Majesty's Consular Officers in China and Japan; and that the several fees mentioned in the table hereunto annexed, for the several matters mentioned therein, shall be substituted for the fees so abolished, and shall and may be taken by Her Majesty's Consular Officers in China and Japan.

And the Right Honourable Lord Stanley, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Oughtibridge, in the particular district of Wadsley, sometime part of the parish of Ecclesfield, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church situate at Oughtibridge as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that all that part of the said particular district of Wadsley, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church situate at Oughtibridge as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Oughtibridge.'

"And, with the like consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and

burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing  
Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Oughtibridge,  
being:—

"All that part of the particular district of Wadsley, sometime part of the parish of Ecclesfield, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, which is situate to the north-west of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district from the parochial chapelry of Bradfield, in the same county and diocese, at the junction of Myer's-lane with Worrall-lane; and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of thirty-six chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to a boundary stone, inscribed 'O. D. C. 1868, No. 1,' and placed on the eastern side of the same lane; and extending thence, first eastward to the said boundary stone, and then north-eastward, and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-two chains, or thereabouts, to the point in the village of Worrall, near Worrall Bridge, where the road leading from Wadsley to Worrall joins the lane which leads to the National School, and is called Lingard-lane; and extending thence in a direction rather more eastward, that is to say, nearly due north-eastward, and in a straight line for a distance of fifty-three chains, or thereabouts, crossing Mowson-lane, and the Wadsley and Sheffield turnpike road, and the River Don, to the mile post on the eastern side of the line of the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway, which indicates a distance of thirty-seven miles from Manchester; and continuing thence in the lastly-mentioned direction, and still in a straight line for a distance of fifty-five chains, or thereabouts (crossing Great Hollins Wood and Wilson Spring Wood), to a boundary stone inscribed 'O. D. C. 1868, No. 2,' and placed on or near to the boundary which divides the said particular district of Wadsley from the parish of Ecclesfield aforesaid at the point where Oughtibridge-lane joins Stubbing House-lane."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate in the parish of Saint Heliers aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Heliers which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of All Saints, situate in the parish of Saint Heliers as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Jersey.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Philip Filleul, the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Heliers, shall continue to be such rector or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of the solemnization or performance of the said offices in the church of All Saints as aforesaid, shall be paid by the said minister thereof to the said Philip Filleul; And provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or

approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Jersey, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Saint Heliers, in the Island of Jersey, and in the diocese of Winchester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the south-west by the sea, on the west and part of the north-west by the parish of Saint Lawrence, on the remaining part of the north-west and on the north by the parish of Saint John, on part of the east by the parish of Trinity, and on all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the east, and on the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point on the eastern side of Saint John's-road, where the boundary dividing the said parish of Trinity from the parish of Saint Heliers aforesaid, diverges eastward from the same road, such point being distant ninety five yards, or thereabouts, to the south of the eastern end of Maupatruis; and extending thence, first southward, then eastward, and then again southward, for a distance of one and a half miles, or thereabouts, to and along the middle of the said Saint John's-road, to its junction with Roussel-street; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, and along the middle of Great Union-road, to the junction of the last-named road with Aquila-road; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-named road and along the middle of Hue-street, to the junction of the last named street, with Dumaresq-street; and extending thence, westward along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with York-street; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street, and along the middle of the streets called or known as Parade-place West and Cheapside respectively, to the junction of the last-named street, with the street called or known as Rue du Parc; and extending thence, south-westward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with the road called or known as the Esplanade; and continuing thence still south-westward and in a straight line across the said Esplanade to and along the middle of a certain slip, situate at the north-western end of the same Esplanade, to the sea aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Chad, situate at Far Headingley, in the parochial chapelry of Headingley, within the original limits of the parish of Leeds, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parochial chapelry of Headingley, and of the new parish of Meanwood, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such cures respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parochial chapelry of Headingley, and of the said new parish of Meanwood, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Chad, situate at Far Headingley as aforesaid.

of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, Edmund Denison, of Doncaster, in the said county of York, Esquire, and Edmund Beckett Denison, of No. 33, Queen Anne-street, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, one of your Majesty's Counsel, jointly during their joint lives, and from and after the death of either of them, then by the survivor of them, his heirs, and assigns for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"And whereas such grant of two hundred pounds per annum will be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Byker, hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas by a certain deed bearing date on or about the seventh day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, made under the authority of the “New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856,” or some or one of them, and being under the hand and seal of Dame Sarah Caroline James, the Wife of Sir Walter Charles James, of Betteshanger, in the county of Kent, Baronet, and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners (which deed is intended to be enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery at Westminster), the said Dame Sarah Caroline James did direct, limit, and appoint that all and every the tithes or rentscharge in lieu of tithes, amounting to the sum of one hundred and nineteen pounds two shillings and one penny yearly, arising and issuing out of or from lands in the several townships or districts of Hedworth and Heworth, in the parish of Jarrow, in the county of Durham, and in the said diocese of Durham, and in the several townships or districts of Fulwell, Monkwearmouth, and Southwick, in the parish of Monkwearmouth, in the county of Durham, and diocese of Durham aforesaid, which said tithes or rentscharge in lieu of tithes are more particularly specified in the schedule which forms part of and is referred to in the said deed, should go, remain, and be unto us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and our successors, as and for an endowment for the said intended district.

“And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in the said Sir Walter Charles James, the Reverend Henry Byne Carr, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Wickham, in the said county of Durham, and John Clayton, of the town and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Esquire, their heirs and assigns for ever, upon and for such trusts, intents, and purposes as the said Dame Sarah Caroline James, whether covert or sole, shall by deed or will appoint, and for default of, and subject to, and until such appointment in trust for the said Dame Sarah Caroline James, her heirs and assigns for ever, to and for her own separate use and benefit, independently of any husband.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

**The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.**

“The District of Saint Anthony, Byker, being:—

“All that part of the new parish of Byker, in the county of the town of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and in the diocese of Durham, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary dividing the new parish of Saint Anne, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, in the same county and diocese, from the said new parish of Byker, in the centre of Glasshouse Bridge; and extending thence, first eastward along the middle of the same bridge, and then north-eastward diagonally across the road leading from York-street to Saint Lawrence, to a boundary stone inscribed

‘B., St. A. "Whereas, on the vacancy of the said bishoprick, which occurred on or about the twenty-third day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, by the decease of the Right Reverend Renn Dickson, the late Bishop of Hereford, all the lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments then belonging to the said bishoprick (except rights of patronage and the episcopal house of residence), became absolutely vested in us for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments aforesaid consist, to a considerable extent, of reversions expectant upon grants and leases for lives and years, and produce during the subsistence of such grants and leases

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Eynesford, in the county of Kent, and now vested in us.

"Whereas on the vacancy of the said rectory, which occurred on or about the eighteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, by the resignation of the Reverend Robert Moore, the then sinecure rector, all the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, theretofore belonging to the said sinecure rectory (except rights of patronage) became, by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, absolutely vested in us, for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time, and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly, that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest in such lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments, in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the holder or holders thereof (if any), to be testified by his, her, or their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said lands,

tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, heretofore belonging to the said sinecure rectory, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Canterbury.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Jarrow, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Jarrow, hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas by a certain deed, bearing date on or about the thirty-first day of July, in the

year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, made under the authority of the ‘New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856,’ or some or one of them, and being under the hand and seal of Dame Sarah Caroline James, the wife of Sir Walter Charles James, of Betteshanger, in the county of Kent, Baronet, and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners (which deed is intended to be enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery at Westminster), the said Dame Sarah Caroline James did direct, limit, and appoint that all and every the tithes or rentscharge in lieu of tithes, amounting to the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, nineteen shillings, and four pence yearly, arising and issuing out of or from lands in the township of Hedworth, in the said parish of Jarrow, which said tithes or rentscharge in lieu of tithes are more particularly specified in the schedule which forms part of and is referred to in the said deed, should go, remain, and be unto us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and our successors, as and for an endowment for the said intended district.

“And whereas upon and from the time when a church shall have been approved by us and consecrated as the church of the said intended district, after that the same district shall have been constituted as is hereinafter recommended and proposed, the said tithes or rentscharge in lieu of tithes will by operation of the hereinbefore thirdly mentioned Act become and be absolutely vested in the incumbent of such church and his successors for ever, and be held and enjoyed by him and them in right of such incumbency.

“And whereas the said tithes or rentscharge in lieu of tithes have been so limited and appointed as aforesaid, upon the understanding that we should make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act, to the incumbent of the said district, so soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and to his successors, a grant of fifty pounds per annum, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid, by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Jarrow which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Jarrow Grange.’

“And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon



and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in the said Sir Walter Charles James, the Reverend Henry Byne Carr, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Whickham, in the said county of Durham, and John Clayton of the town and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Esquire, their heirs and assigns for ever, upon and for such trusts, intents, and purposes as the said Dame Sarah Caroline James, whether covert or sole, shall by deed or will appoint, and for default of, and subject to, and until such appointment, in trust for the said Dame Sarah Caroline James, her heirs and assigns for ever, to and for her own separate use and benefit, independently of any husband.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The district of Jarrow Grange, being:—

“All that part of the parish of Jarrow, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the county of Northumberland from the said county of Durham at a point in the middle of the River Tyne, opposite to the southern landing-stage of the steam-boat ferry between Willington Quay and West Quay, and extending thence southward and in a straight line to a point in the said landing-stage at or near to the middle of the north-eastern end of the footpath which leads past the eastern end of Palmer's Iron and Shipbuilding Works to the street called Dunkirk Place, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said footpath to its junction with Dunkirk Place aforesaid, and extending thence westward along the middle of the said street called Dunkirk Place, to its junction with the street called Drewett Place, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Walter Street, and continuing thence southward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Grange Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of the said road to its junction with Ellison Road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with the road leading from Jarrow to Nether Heworth, and continuing thence still south-eastward across the last-mentioned road to a boundary stone inscribed ‘J. G. D., 1868, No. 1,’ and placed at a point in or near to the fence which forms the eastern boundary of the Jarrow Grange Estate, belonging to Dame Sarah Caroline James, wife of Sir Walter Charles James, Baronet, and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the said estate boundary to a point in the middle of the watercourse called Bede's Burn, and extending thence south-westward for a distance of about a quarter of a mile along the course of the said burn, continuing thereby along the said estate boundary, to a boundary stone inscribed ‘J. G. D., 1868, No. 2,’ and placed at the southern extremity of the fence forming the western boundary of the Jarrow Grange Estate aforesaid, near the western end of the culvert which carries

the line of the Pontop and Jarrow Railway over Bede's Burn aforesaid, and extending thence generally northward along the said estate boundary, passing thereby to the west of Road Cottage and Springwell Cottages to a boundary stone inscribed ‘J. G. D., 1868, No. 3,’ and placed near the said Springwell Cottages, upon the southern bank of the River Tyne aforesaid, and extending thence due northward and in a straight line to the boundary in the middle of the said River Tyne which divides the county of Northumberland from the county of Durham as aforesaid, and extending thence eastward along the said county boundary to the first-described point opposite to the southern landing-place of the steam-boat ferry between Willington Quay and West Quay as aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced.”

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbent of the parish of Jarrow, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas upwards of one calendar month has elapsed since drafts of the said scheme were transmitted as aforesaid.

And whereas the Incumbent aforesaid has assented to the said scheme, and all the patrons aforesaid, save one, have likewise assented, and that one patron has offered and taken certain observations and objections to the said scheme which together with such scheme have been laid before Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas notwithstanding such observations and objections, the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz. :—

**MANCHESTER.**—Forthwith wholly in St. Mary's church and churchyard, in the city of Manchester.

**STOCKTON-ON-TEES.**—Forthwith wholly in the old parish churchyard of St. Thomas, Stockton-on-Tees, except in existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in an air-tight manner.
