THE following Addresses of congratulation to the Queen, in reference to the atrocious attempt upon the life of His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for presentation, have accordingly been presented by him to Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

An humble and dutiful Address of Sympathy and Congratulation from the Presbytery of Stirling to Her Majesty the QUEEN.

WE, your Majesty's loving and faithful subjects, Ministers of the Church of Scotland and Members of the Presbytery of Stirling, beg to have the privilege of expressing our deep feelings of loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's Person, Throne, and Government.

We have heard with indignation and pain of the late attempt made upon the life of your beloved Son, His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh, and desire with all your Majesty's attached subjects to express our heartfelt sympathy with your Majesty in the distress and anxiety which that cruel outrage must have occasioned you.

We join together in thanksgiving to our merciful Father in Heaven, who so graciously shielded and delivered the precious life that was threatened, and in prayers that His Royal Highness may be long spared to his family and to the nation.

Our earnest prayer to God is that it would please Him to make your Majesty's reign, which has conferred so many blessings upon the country, long and prosperous.

AT the Court at Windsor, the 7th day of July, 1868.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at High Orchard, in the extra-parochial place called or known as South Hamlet, in the suburbs of the city of Gloucester, in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said extra-parochial place called or known as South Hamlet, of the parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, of the parish of Hempstead, of the parish of Upton Saint Leonard, of the parish of Saint Michael, of the extra-parochial place called or known as Wotton Ville, and of the extra-parochial place called or known as North Hamlet, situate partly in the city and county of the city of Gloucester and partly in the county of Gloucester, and wholly in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said extra-parochial place called or known as South Hamlet, of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, of the said parish of Hempstead, of the said parish of

Upton Saint Leonard, of the said parish of Saint Michael, of the said extra-parochial place called or known as Wotton Ville, and of the said extra-parochial place called or known as North Hamlet, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke, situate at High Orchard, as aforesaid.

"And whereas it appears that the right of presentation and appointment to the said church of Saint Luke, situate at High Orchard aforesaid, at present belongs to the Reverend Samuel Lysons, of Rodmarton, in the said county of Gloucester, Clerk—

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the rectory of the said parish of Upton Saint Leonard, with the consent of the Right Honourable Hugh MacCalmont Baron Cairns, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, as patron on behalf of your Majesty, in right of the Crown, of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Michael, and with the consent of Higford Burr, of Aldermaston Hall, in the county of Berks, Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Hempstead (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation) and with the consents of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Indivisible Trinity, in Gloucester, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode (in testimony whereof they have hereunto set their common or capitular seal) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said extra-parochial place called or known as South Hamlet, of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, of the said parish of Hempstead, of the said parish of Upton Saint Leonard, of the said parish of Saint Michael, of the said extra-parochial place called or known as Wotton Ville, and of the said extra-parochial place called or known as North Hamlet, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry, for the said church of Saint Luke, situate at High Orchard, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Gloucester.'

"And with the like consents (testified as aforesaid) and also with the consent of the said Samuel Lysons (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Luke, Gloucester, should belong to and be exercised by the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of Saint Luke, Gloucester, being:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the

extra-parochial place called or known as South Hamlet, the parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, the parish of Hempstead, the parish of Upton Saint Leonard, the parish of Saint Michael, the extra-parochial place called or known as Wotton Ville, and the extra-parochial place called or known as North Hamlet, situate partly in the city and county of the city of Gloucester, and partly in the county of Gloucester, and wholly in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the particular district of Saint James, Gloucester, in the said county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid, from the parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode aforesaid, at the point where Barton Lane is intersected by the line of the Dock Branch of the Midland Railway, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said lane, following thereby the boundary dividing the particular district of Saint James, Gloucester, from the parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode as aforesaid, to the junction of the same lane with the Stroud Road, and extending thence first eastward, then south-eastward, and then southward along the middle of the same road (thereby following in part the boundary dividing the same particular district of Saint James, Gloucester, from the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, and from the extra-parochial place called or known as South Hamlet aforesaid, and in part the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode from South Hamlet aforesaid) as far as the junction of the last-described boundary with the boundary dividing the said 'South Hamlet,' from the parish of Hempstead aforesaid, opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 1,' and placed on the western side of the Stroud Road aforesaid at a distance of one chain and a-half or thereabouts to the north of the bridge which carries the main line of the said Midland Railway over the Stroud Road aforesaid, at or near to the south-eastern corner of the close called the Home Ground, and extending thence westward to such boundary stone, and continuing generally in the same direction along the middle of the fences forming the southern boundary of the Sheephouse Farm (thereby following for the most part the boundary dividing the South Hamlet from the parish of Hempstead as aforesaid) to a boundary stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 2,' and placed at the western end of the fence forming the northern boundary of the close numbered 140 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Hempstead and the South Hamlet aforesaid, and upon the map hereunto annexed on the eastern side of the Bristol Road, and continuing thence first westward to a point in the middle of the said road, and then northward for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same road (thereby following the boundary dividing the said South Hamlet and the parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, aforesaid, from the said parish of Hempstead) to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 3,' and placed on the western side of the said Bristol Road, on the boundary dividing the South Hamlet from the parish of Hempstead as aforesaid, at the south-eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 108 upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 236 and 228 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-westward to such boundary-stone, and along the said lastly described boundary (thereby following for the most part the middle of the last-mentioned fence, and crossing the Gloucester and Berkeley

Canal) to the junction of the said boundary with the boundary dividing a certain portion of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode from the parish of Hempstead aforesaid, and extending thence first southward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary, thereby following the middle of the fences dividing the closes numbered respectively 305 and 306 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the said close numbered 228, and from the close numbered 227 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the parish of Hempstead and the South Hamlet, and upon the map hereunto annexed as aforesaid, to the junction of the fence dividing the close numbered 306 from the close numbered 227 as aforesaid, with the fence dividing the close numbered 144 upon the last-mentioned maps from the close numbered 227 as aforesaid, and extending thence first southward and then westward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence (thereby following the boundary dividing the South Hamlet from the parish of Hempstead as aforesaid) to the junction of the same fence with the fence dividing the said close numbered 144 from the close numbered 143 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described fence to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 4,' and placed at the north-western end of the same fence on the south-eastern side of Lanthony Road, and extending thence first westward to a point in the middle of the said road, and then southward along the middle of the same road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 5,' and placed on the western side of the same road at the eastern end of the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 146 upon the last-mentioned maps; and extending thence, first westward to such boundary-stone, and continuing thence first westward, then northward, and then generally westward, along the middle of the last-described fence (thereby following, for the most part, the boundary dividing the South Hamlet from the parish of Hempstead as aforesaid; and passing to the east and north of Newark House) to the junction of the said fence with the fence forming the western boundary of the close, numbered 146, as aforesaid; and extending thence, first north-eastward then north-westward, and then again north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence to its junction with the fence forming the western boundary of the close numbered 145 upon the said last-mentioned maps; and continuing thence, still north-eastward, along the middle of the last-described fence to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 6,' and placed at the north-eastern end of the same fence on the southern side of Sudmeadow-road, and near to the bridge which carries the last-named road over Still Brook; and extending thence, first northward to a point in the middle of the said road, and then north-westward for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same road to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 7,' and placed on the northern side of the said road at the south-western end of the fence forming the north-western boundary of the Lanthony Brickworks, and extending thence north-eastward to such boundary-stone and along the middle of the last-described fence to its north-eastern extremity upon the southern bank of the River Severn; and continuing thence still north-eastward, and in a straight line to a point in the middle of the said river and upon the boundary

dividing the South Hamlet aforesaid from the parish of Saint Nicholas, situate partly in the said county of Gloucester and partly in the said city and county of the city of Gloucester, and wholly in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said river, thereby following in part the last-described boundary and in part the boundary dividing the said extra-parochial place called North Hamlet from the parish of Saint Nicholas aforesaid, to a point opposite to the northern end of the locks forming the entrance to the basin of the Gloucester and Berkeley Canal aforesaid, and extending thence, first eastward to, and then southward along, the middle of the said locks to a point upon the boundary dividing the said North Hamlet from the parish of Saint Owen, in the said city and county of the city of Gloucester, and in the diocese aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the said boundary to its junction, in the middle of the graving dock of the said Gloucester and Berkeley Canal, with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Owen from the South Hamlet aforesaid; and extending thence eastward along the last-mentioned boundary as far as a point in the middle of East Quay; and extending thence southward along the middle of the said quay to a point upon the southern side of the road leading from the said East Quay to the street called or known as Littleworth; and extending thence eastward for a distance of six chains or thereabouts along the southern side of the said road to a point upon the boundary dividing the extra-parochial place called or known as Littleworth, in the last-mentioned county and diocese, from the South Hamlet aforesaid; and extending thence alternately southward and eastward along the last-described boundary as far as a point in the middle of the street called Littleworth, as aforesaid, near to the Nelson Inn; and extending thence southward along the middle of the said street to its junction with Great Norfolk-street; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street to a point at its eastern extremity in the middle of the wall or fence which divides the house and premises called or known as 'Belle Vue House' from the 'Spa Gardens;' and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said wall or fence to its south-eastern extremity; and extending thence eastward and in a straight line for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the first-described point where Barton-lane is intersected by the line of the Dock Branch of the Midland Railway as aforesaid where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the two several registries of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, at Gloucester and at Bristol.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate at Ugthorpe, in the parish of Lythe, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church, called Christ Church, situate at Ugthorpe as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that all that part of the said parish of Lythe, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church, called Christ Church, situate at Ugthorpe as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Ugthorpe.'

"And, with the like consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"Whereas the Provost and Scholars of Queen's College in the University of Oxford (hereinafter called "The said provost and scholars"), are seized to them and their successors of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Brough under Stainmore, and the church thereof.

"And whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, is seized in fee in right of his see of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Harlaxton, and the church thereof.

"And whereas the Honorable and Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the diocese of Carlisle, is seized in fee in right of his see of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Horncastle, and the church thereof.

"And whereas the said Provost and Scholars and the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, and the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said three benefices, and of the churches thereof respectively may be re-arranged by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Provost and Scholars, with the consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, and with the consent of the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle (in testimony whereof to this scheme the said Provost and Scholars have hereunto affixed their common seal, and the said John, Bishop of the diocese of Lincoln, and the said Samuel, Bishop of the diocese of Carlisle, have respectively affixed their signatures and episcopal seals), we humbly recommend and propose that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or

assurance in the law other than such duly Gazetted Order, the following tripartite arrangement by way of exchange shall take effect; that is to say:—First, that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Brough under Stainmore, and the church thereof, shall be assigned and transferred from the said provost and scholars, and from their successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may at all times be exercised by the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever. And secondly, that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Harlaxton, and the church thereof, shall in like manner be assigned and transferred from the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, in whom, as such Bishop, the same is now vested as aforesaid, and from his successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may at all times be exercised by, the said Provost and Scholars, and their successors, for ever. And thirdly, that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Horncastle, and the church thereof, shall in like manner be assigned and transferred from the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, in whom, as such Bishop, the same is now vested as aforesaid, and from his successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may at all times be exercised by the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-ground or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued, subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that, from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions, or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before such representation is so considered; provided always, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk of the parish hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued forthwith wholly in South Hackney Church, and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, each coffin buried in which shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed in an air-tight manner, and except in now existing family earthen graves, burials in which shall be limited to the burials of the members of the families of their owners, no such grave to be opened unless it be free from coffins or remains,

and no coffin to be buried at a less depth than four feet below the surface of the ground ;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fourteenth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the first day of July instant, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the above recited Act :

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require ; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representa-

tion, one month before such representation is so considered ; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish :

And whereas the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes herein-after mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them with the modifications hereinafter specified :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fourteenth day of May last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows ; viz. :—

MANCETTER.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Mancetter, and forthwith in the old churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and except for the burial of those widowers and widows for whom graves have already been prepared, and for the burial of those previously resident in the township of Mancetter, or the hamlet of Oldbury ; and that interment in the new churchyard of Mancetter be discontinued on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, with like exceptions, and except also for the burial of the widowers, widows, parents, and unmarried children of those already interred therein.

DIDDLEBURY, SALOP.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Diddlebury ; and also in the churchyard, except in vaults or walled graves which can be opened without the disturbance of coffins or bones, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed by being enclosed by brick or stonework properly cemented ; and except in earthen graves not less than four feet deep, which are free from water, and which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of undecayed bones.

CHADKIRK, PARISH OF STOCKPORT.—Forthwith wholly in the old church of Chadkirk, in the parish of Stockport.

WEDNESBURY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Wednesbury ; and in the churchyard on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, except in

vaults and walled graves existing on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the proprietors of the undermentioned burial-grounds, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said burial-grounds from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the undermentioned burial-grounds do adopt, or cause to be adopted the following measures, viz. :—

All such parts of the Peel Grove Cemetery, Cambridge Heath, in the parish of Bethnal Green, and of the Globe-road Burial-ground, in the hamlet of Mile End, in the parish of Stepney, as are not covered by existing buildings, monuments, grave-stones, or paths, to be covered with a living vegetation.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard and burial-grounds be postponed as follows, viz. :

In the burial-grounds of Caer, Salem, and Zoar Chapels, in Ystalyfera, of the parish of Llanguick, Neath, to the twenty-fifth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.

In the churchyard of South Petherton to the tenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-first day of August next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-first day of August.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at St. Petersburg, inclosing an extract from the "Journal de St. Pétersbourg," of the 4th ultimo, relative to the alterations in the Customs' laws respecting the production of bills of lading at Cronstadt and St. Petersburg, of which the following is a translation :—

1. The production of bills of lading has been suppressed at the Custom-house of St. Petersburg, together with the formalities attending it.

2. Instead of the bills of lading at present demanded from masters of vessels on arriving in

harbour, they will only be required to produce their manifests, made out in their own country and their own language, and these shall serve as the basis for drawing up the detailed account of their freight.

3. Under exceptional circumstances, however, when the vessel shall not be provided with a manifest, the regulations at present in force with regard to the production of bills of lading shall be applicable.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from the British Commissioner of the European Commission of the Danube, inclosing the subjoined translations of :—

(1.) The Police Regulations to be observed in the interest of the Works of Improvement on the Lower Danube.

(2.) The New Provisions relative to Pilotage on the Lower Danube.

And (3.) The New Provisions concerning the Lighter Service.

EUROPEAN COMMISSION OF THE DANUBE.

POLICE REGULATIONS to be observed in the interest of the Works of Improvement on the Lower Danube.

THE European Commission of the Danube,

Considering that frequent damage is caused to its works and to its plant by vessels navigating between Isaktcha and Sulina, especially by steam vessels, the circulation of which becomes more and more active;

And considering Article 112 of the Regulation of Police and Navigation annexed to the Public Act signed at Galatz on the 2nd of November, 1865,

Enacts the following provisions :—

Art. 1.

The precautionary rules prescribed by Article 25 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police, under date of 2nd of November, 1865, to the captains or masters of the vessels, floats of timber, or rafts, navigating or stationary on the Lower Danube, below Isaktcha, apply specially to the floating plant employed on the works of improvement of the river and of its mouths, as well as to the works of every kind, such as piers, jetties, groynes, quays, constructed or to be constructed by the European Commission, and to the buoys and other signals placed by it on the river or on its banks.

Art. 2.

The captains or masters of vessels, floats of timber, or rafts, are equally bound to take the precautions necessary for impeding as little as possible the works in course of execution, especially the dredging operations, and the construction of the works undertaken or to be undertaken in the Sulina branch, and at its mouth.

To this end, the captains of all steam vessels are bound to slacken their speed, as much as they can do so without danger to their own vessels, or to the vessels towed by them, when they are

traversing a section of the river on which dredging or other works are in course of execution, and that, as long as they are between the signal posts placed on the banks, above and below the site of the works.

Art. 3.

When the steam dredgers are employed in the Sulina Branch, or at the Tchatal of St. George during the night, the passage of the channel, where the dredging operations and discharge of stuff dredged are being carried on, is forbidden, except in the case hereinafter mentioned, to all sailing, and steam vessels, rafts, or floats of timber, from seven o'clock in the evening till five o'clock in the morning.

This prohibition does not extend to packet-boats making periodical voyages, and engaged in the Mail Service, except, however, in the case of special necessity, when passage by night can be forbidden absolutely, by a simple notice which the Commission will cause to be published to this effect.

Art. 4.

Every offence against the provisions of the preceding Articles is punished by a fine of fifty francs (£2) at least, or of 500 francs (£20) at most.

Art. 5.

When an offence committed against the preceding provisions, or one of the offences provided for and punished by Article 99 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police of the 2nd of November, 1865, above quoted, is accompanied or followed by any injury or damage whatsoever occasioned by the offending vessel, float of timber, or raft, to the works of the European Commission of the Danube, to its floating plant, or to any other of its properties, the fine incurred by the offending party, is of 250 francs (£10) at least, and of 2,500 francs (£100) at most.

6.

The infliction of the penalties enacted by the preceding 4th and 5th Articles, is pronounced by the Captain of the Port of Sulina, or by the Inspector-General of the Navigation.

It is regulated in general, and in particular for what concerns appeals, by the provisions of Chapter II. of Part VI. of the Regulation of Navigation and Police of the 2nd of November, 1865.

Art. 7.

The present provisions shall be immediately published, and shall enter in force on the 15th of May next.

Done at Galatz the 21st of April, 1868.

EUROPEAN COMMISSION OF THE DANUBE.

NEW PROVISIONS relative to pilotage on the Lower Danube.

The European Commission of the Danube,

Considering the 112th Article of the Regulation of Navigation and Police applicable to the Lower Danube, dated the 2nd November, 1865;

Whereas, in consequence of the works executed at the mouth and in the branch of the Sulina, the vessels which ascend the river are, in general, of a larger burden than formerly, and require, for that reason, more care and knowledge on the part of the pilots entrusted with the direction of them;

Whereas, in the assessment of the pilotage dues for the navigation down-stream, the tariff now in

force establishes no distinction between large and small vessels, and that thus the river pilots are no longer remunerated in proportion with the services rendered;

Whereas, on the other hand, the power of obtaining a river pilot's licence implicitly granted by the Regulation of Navigation and Police of the 2nd November, 1865, to the pilots who do not exercise their calling exclusively on the Lower Danube, becomes more inconvenient in proportion as the employment of vessels of considerable size increases the difficulties of pilotage in the narrow channels of the Sulina Branch;

And in order to determine the extent of the responsibility, which falls upon the river pilots, in piloting vessels;

Enacts the following provisions:

Art. 1.

The second paragraph of Article 69 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police annexed to the Public Act relating to the Navigation of the Mouths of the Danube, under date of the 2nd November, 1865, is repealed, and replaced by the following provision:

"The licence of pilot is delivered by the Captain of the port, and must receive his visa every year; it ceases to be valid if the annual visa is wanting."

Art. 2.

Articles 75 and 78 of the said Regulation are also repealed, and replaced by the following provisions:

"Art. 75.—Independently of the corps of pilots charged with piloting vessels in the channel of the Sulina Mouth, and acting under the direction of the Captain of the port, there is a special service of pilots, likewise licensed, for merchant vessels navigating the river between Sulina and Ibraila.

"The corps of river pilots is placed under the authority of the Inspector General of the navigation, by whom the licence of pilot is delivered.

"This licence must each year receive the visa of the Inspector General, and ceases to be valid if the accomplishment of this formality is wanting.

"The pilotage service is directed by a chief pilot who is bound to have three offices, at Galatz, at Ibraila, and at Toultscha, and by a deputy chief pilot residing at Sulina.

"The licensed pilots of the river service alone have authority to pilot vessels during their navigation between Sulina and Ibraila, as well ascending as descending, but they are forbidden, excepting those of the steam packets making periodical voyages, to pilot them in the channel of the Sulina mouth, or in any part of their sea voyage.

"Art. 78.—Captains will arrange with the river pilots the sum to be paid the latter for the pilotage up-stream. In case of dispute, however, on this point, the port authorities will not admit any claim on the part of pilots for a higher rate of wages than six francs a day for the voyage, in addition to subsistence on board, for the pilotage of a sailing vessel. These wages may be raised to a maximum of one hundred francs a day for the pilots of steam vessels.

"With regard to the compulsory pilotage of the voyage down-stream, its dues are fixed as follows, for sailing vessels:

"For the passage from Galatz, or from a port situated above this point, to Sulina, fifty centimes per register ton;

"For the passage from Reni or Ismail to Sulina, forty centimes per ton;

"For the passage from Toultscha to Sulina thirty centimes per ton.

"Steam vessels pay only the half of these dues, and those who make their voyages between the ports of the Danube and the ports of the Black Sea or of the Bosphorus, may be freed from them, provided that the ship's pilot is furnished with a licence as river pilot.

"The chief pilot of the river service deducts two centimes per ton from the amount of the due paid by each sailing vessel, and one centime per ton on the due paid by steam vessels; the rest of the due accrues to the pilot.

"These dues are paid into the hands of the Cashier of the Navigation Chest at Sulina, who alone can give a valid receipt for them; it is allowable, however, to the captain of the vessel piloted to pay directly to his pilot the half of the due, as an advance.

"The calculation of the tonnage for the payment of the pilotage due, is worked out according to the rules laid down by the Tariff of Navigation Dues of the 2nd November, 1865."

Art. 3.

The second paragraph of Article 80 of the above-mentioned regulation of the 2nd November, 1865, is repealed and replaced by the following provision:—

"They are forbidden to have any interest, either directly or indirectly in any operation, or contract connected with Lighters, the object of which is to get afloat a vessel aground, except in the case where the operation has been undertaken by the job for the whole duration of the voyage."

Art. 4.

At the beginning of Article 81 of the same regulation, is inserted an additional provision, thus worded:—

"The Captain who has taken on board a licensed River Pilot does not, even in the case where the Pilotage is compulsory, remain the less responsible for the observance of the Regulations of Navigation and Police in force upon the Lower Danube, and especially of Articles 25 and 37 of the present Regulation.

"The responsibility of the Pilot is limited to the indication of the navigable channels and of the particulars of the River Navigation. Consequently, the Captain, who abandons to his Pilot the direction of his vessel, does so upon his own responsibility."

Art. 5.

Between the second and third paragraphs of Article 101 of the aforesaid Regulation of Navigation and Police, is inserted a new paragraph, thus worded:

"Every Pilot of the River Service who offends against the provisions of the last paragraph of the above Article 75, by piloting a vessel in the Channel of the Sulina mouth, or in the sea, is punished with a fine of 100 francs (£4) at least, or of 500 francs (£20) at most. The same penalty is applicable to the Captain who has his vessel piloted in the Danube, between Sulina and Ibraïla, by a Pilot who does not belong to the Corps of River Pilots."

Art. 6.

Article 12 of the Tariff of Navigation Dues of the 2nd November, 1865, is repealed, inasmuch as it is contrary to the provisions of the new Article 78 herein above.

Art. 7.

The present provisions will enter in force on the 1st of June, 1868.

Done at Galatz, the 16th of April, 1868.

EUROPEAN COMMISSION OF THE DANUBE.

NEW PROVISIONS concerning the Lighter Service.

The European Commission of the Danube,

Whereas, the provisions of Part V, of the Regulation of Navigation and Police, under date of the 2nd November, 1865, which rule at present the Lighter Service, have been drawn up especially in view of the operations which are carried on at the mouth of the river;

Whereas, at the present time, on the contrary, lighters are employed principally for the passage of the shoals of the Sulina Branch, or for the conveyance of cargoes destined for sea-going vessels, which do not ascend the river;

Whereas, moreover, the number of licensed lighters, subject to the disciplinary superintendance of the Inspector-General of the Navigation, has diminished to a considerable extent; and whereas, consequently, sea-going vessels of low tonnage are employed, in greater numbers than formerly, to act temporarily as lighters;

Whereas, these vessels being subject neither to the constraint of being visited and measured every year, nor to that of giving pledges for good conduct, offer less security to commerce than the licensed lighters; and whereas more frequent abuses, committed to the detriment of the lightened cargoes, have been made known to the Commission;

Whereas, it thus appears that the provisions in force concerning the Lighter Service no longer correspond with the exigencies of the Danubian Navigation in so far as they have been modified by the effect of the works executed at the Sulina Mouth;

And considering Article 112 of the above quoted Regulation of Navigation and Police of the 2nd November, 1865;

Enacts the following provisions:

Art. 1.

Articles 82 to 93, both inclusive, of the Regulation of Navigation and Police annexed to the Public Act, relating to the Navigation of the Mouths of the Danube, under date of the 2nd November, 1865, forming Chapters 1, 2, and 3 of Part V of the aforesaid Regulation, are repealed and replaced by the following Articles:

"PART V.

"The Lighter Service.

"CHAPTER I.

"General Rules.

"Art. 82.—Lighterage operations are divided into two classes:

"1st. Local lighterage effected by a sea-going vessel, which, in order to cross the Sulina Bar (either on entering or on leaving the river), or a shoal in the interior, discharges the whole or a part of its cargo into a smaller vessel in order to re-ship it after having cleared the obstacle;

"2nd. Coasting lighterage performed by sailing vessels, or by steam vessels and towing lighters which take a cargo in a port of the Danube and consign it to a sea-going vessel anchored in the port or on the roadstead of Sulina.

"Art. 83.—No one can undertake lighterage operations without having previously entered at the Office of the Inspector-General of the Navigation at Toultscha, the vessels intended to act as lighters, or without having provided himself, for each vessel, with a licence delivered by the Inspector-General, and which must always be forthcoming on board.

"Before delivering the licence the Inspector-General causes the vessels, intended to act as lighters, to be visited by a commission which judges whether they are in good condition and ascertains at the same time their capacity in register tons and their burden in imperial quarters.

"The licensed lighters are bound to submit themselves, every year to a fresh visit, the period of which is fixed by the Inspector-General: if the result of the examination is deemed satisfactory, the Inspector-General notes it on the licence of the lighter; in the contrary case, the licence is withdrawn until the necessary repairs have been made.

"Art. 84.—Vessels provided with regular ship's papers can be temporarily employed for lightening other vessels, upon condition that the captains make for each operation a special declaration to the Inspector-General of the Navigation, if the lighterage is to be effected over the shoals of the Sulina Branch, or to the Captain of the Port of Sulina if the lighterage is for the passage of the mouth. This declaration is accompanied by the deposit of all the papers of the vessel intended to act as a lighter, except the muster-roll of the crew.

"If the vessel employed as lighter has entered the river with more than the third of her cargo, the dues owing for entry become demandable immediately after the first lighterage operation.

"No vessel, however, not entered as a lighter, can be employed in this capacity, during more than four consecutive months from the first operation, except after fulfilling the formalities prescribed by Article 83.

"Art. 85.—Every master of a licensed lighter is compelled to deposit 600 francs (£24) which is paid into the Navigation Chest at Sulina. This deposit may be replaced by the liable security of a person well known to be solvent, resident in one of the ports of the Lower Danube.

"The licence cannot be delivered by the Inspector-General before the deposit has been made, or the security accepted.

"The deposit cannot be returned or the security discharged as long as the vessel continues to act as lighter. This deposit may be appropriated to the payment of the pecuniary fines pronounced against the Master of the lighter, and, in this case the licence is withdrawn from the vessel until the deposit has been renewed entirely.

"Art. 86.—Licensed lighters, as well as vessels temporarily employed as lighters, are bound to have the muster-roll of their crews in order, and to present it, whenever required, to the Inspector-General of the Navigation, to the Captain of the Port of Sulina, and to the agents placed under the orders of these latter.

"Licensed lighters are bound, moreover, to bear the number of their licence, and vessels employed temporarily as lighters, the number of the last stamp, affixed to the roll of their crew in execution of Article 17 of the present regulation. These numbers must be marked in white paint on each side of the bows, in Arab figures one foot in height.

"CHAPTER 2.

"Local Lighterage Operations.

"Art. 87.—The superintendance of local lighterage operations, which take place in the river, is exercised by the Inspector-General of the Navigation, or by his agents, and that of the operations which take place at the mouth, by the Captain of the Port of Sulina.

"Art. 88.—When a sea-going vessel discharges the whole or part of her cargo on board of lighters, the captain is bound to place on board of each of them a guard of his own choosing.

"For operations of local lighterage accomplished in the internal course of the river, the lighters must, unless they are towed, navigate in company with the lightened vessels, and may not quit them, except under circumstances beyond their control, before having returned to them the whole of the lightened merchandise.

"On their part, the captains of lightened vessels are bound, before putting to sea, to pay to the masters of their lighters, the freight agreed upon.

"Art. 89.—In the case of lighterage at the mouth of the river by vessels putting to sea, the lighters leave the port at the same time as the lightened vessels; but if a vessel employs several lighters, the Captain of the Port regulates their departure so that the latter have not to remain too long on the roadstead before they can effect the re-loading.

"In no case, whether the vessel to be lightened be leaving the Port, or entering it from the sea, or remaining anchored on the roadstead, can the lighters go out of Sulina harbour without a permit to pass from the Captain of the Port; this permit to pass is presented to the Guard-boat stationed at the mouth, in conformity with Article 16 of the present Regulation.

"Art. 90.—Licensed lighters, and vessels having acted as lighters, which ascend the river, or re-enter the port of Sulina after having lightened a sea-going vessel, may be visited by the agents of the Inspector-General of the Navigation, or of the Captain of the Port of Sulina.

"The masters of lighters are consequently bound to open the hold and the cabins of their vessels, whenever required to do so by the said agents.

"CHAPTER 3,

"Coasting Lighterage Operations.

"Art. 91.—The operations of coasting lighterage may be carried on by all steam-vessels, towing lighters, sailing vessels or lighters provided with regular papers, on condition that the captains or masters procure for each voyage, from the Consular or competent local authorities of the ports in which they take their cargo, a certificate making known the object of the operation, and the quantity of merchandize embarked.

"This certificate must be produced in the course of the voyage, whenever required by the Inspector-General or his agents.

"Art. 92.—Immediately upon the arrival of a vessel, carrying on coasting lighterage, in the port of Sulina, the master is bound to repair to the office of the Captain of the Port, and to pre-

sent there the certificate prescribed by the preceding Article.

"If the vessel discharges the whole of her cargo in the port of Sulina, she moors alongside the sea-going vessel which is to receive the merchandize, and must not quit her, until after having entirely finished discharging.

"If the cargo is to be discharged, wholly or partly, on the roadstead of Sulina, the master of the vessel hands over the certificate prescribed by Article 91 to the Captain of the Port, who delivers to him the permit to pass necessary for going out of the harbour.

"Art. 93.—The preceding Articles 86, 89, and 90, are likewise applicable to vessels which perform the Coasting Lighterage Service.

"However, steam-vessels, and towing lighters are not subject to the constraint of allowing themselves to be visited, conformably with Article 90, unless one of the parties demand it, or in case of suspicion of fraud."

Art. 2.

The period of twelve days fixed by Article 95 of the said Regulation of Navigation and Police, of the 2nd of November, 1865, is reduced to six days.

Art. 3.

Article 97 of the same Regulation of Navigation and Police is repealed, and is replaced by the following provision:—

"If it is proved that a larceny has been committed upon the cargo placed on board of a licensed lighter, the licence of the vessel is withdrawn for three months at least, without prejudice to the application to the Captain or Master of the vessel of the fine appointed by the third paragraph of Article 102 of the present Regulation, or to the criminal proceedings belonging to the competent authorities."

Art. 4.

Article 102 of the aforesaid Regulation is repealed and replaced by the following provision:—

"Offences against the provisions of the first paragraph of Article 83, and against those of the above Articles 84, 90, and 91 are punished with a fine of 100 francs (£4) at least, and of 200 francs (£8) at most.

"Every offence against the provisions of the third paragraph of Article 83, against those of Article 86 and of the first paragraph of Article 88, and against those of Article 89, and of the first paragraph of Article 92, is punished with a fine of 60 francs at least, and of 120 francs at most.

"Every offence against the provisions of the second paragraph of Article 88, and of the second paragraph of Article 92, is punished with a fine of 400 francs (£16) at least, and of 1,200 francs (£48) at most, and the same penalty is applicable to the captain or master of every vessel having acted as lighter, or of every licensed lighter, which, without having been thereto compelled by circumstances beyond control, quits, on the roadstead of Sulina, the lightened vessel, before having restored to her the whole of her cargo.

"The vessel or lighter on board of which the offence is committed, remains especially set apart for the payment of the fine incurred, for the recovering of which she can be sequestered by the Inspector-General of the Navigation, or by the Captain of the Port of Sulina, according to circumstances."

Art. 5.

The present provisions shall enter in force on the 1st of June, 1868.
