If any cattle are moved or dealt with in contravention of any provision of this Order, the owner thereof and the person directing or permitting such moving thereof, or dealing therewith, and the person in charge thereof, and the Great Northern Railway Company, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

5. The Metropolitan Board of Works shall cause this Order to be published in a newspaper circulating in the Metropolis; and the Commissioners of Police of the Metropolis and the city of London respectively shall cause a copy thereof to be affixed in a conspicuous place at each Police Station.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

From and after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, sheep brought to Great Britain which come from Tønning, Husum, or any port in the provinces of Schleswig or Holstein, or from Hamburg, or have been at any place within either of the said provinces, shall be subject to the provisions of the Orders of the Privy Council respecting foreign cattle for the time being in force.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

NOTIFICATION.

Foreign Office, July 29, 1868.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received a copy of a Despatch, dated the 22nd instant, from Her Majesty's Consul at Carthage, stating that in pursuance of orders received from the Board of Health at Madrid, all vessels proceeding from the United Kingdom, Gibraltar, and Malta to Carthage, are placed under three days quarantine observation; their Lordships have also received a Despatch, also dated the 22nd instant, from Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Malaga, notifying that all vessels arriving at that port from ports in the United Kingdom are henceforth to be treated as suspected, and that such arrivals will, therefore, be dismissed to a lazaret of observation for performance of three days quarantine.
