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*Her Majesty's Most Gracious Speech, delivered by the Lords Commissioners, to both Houses of Parliament, on Friday, July 31, 1868.*

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

I AM happy to be enabled to release you from your labours, and to offer you my acknowledgments for the diligence with which you have applied yourselves to your Parliamentary duties.

My relations with foreign Powers remain friendly and satisfactory. I have no reason to apprehend that Europe will be exposed to the calamity of war, and my policy will continue to be directed to secure the blessings of peace.

I announced to you at the beginning of this session that I had directed an expedition to be sent to Abyssinia, to liberate my Envoy and others of my subjects detained by the Ruler of that country in an unjust captivity.

I feel sure that you will share in my satisfaction at the complete success which, has attended that expedition. After a march of 400 miles, through a difficult and unexplored country, my troops took the strong place of Magdala, freed the captives, and vindicated the honour of my Crown: and by their immediate return, without one act of oppression or needless violence, proved that the expedition had been undertaken only in obedience to the claims of humanity, and in fulfilment of the highest duties of my Sovereignty.

The cessation of the long-continued efforts to promote rebellion in Ireland has for some time rendered unnecessary the exercise by the executive of exceptional powers. I rejoice to learn that no person is now detained under the provisions of the Act for the suspension of the Habeas Corpus, and that no prisoner awaits trial in Ireland for an offence connected with the Fenian conspiracy.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I have to thank you for the liberal supplies which you have voted for the public service.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

I have had much satisfaction in giving my assent to a series of measures completing the great work of the Amendment of the Representation of the People in Parliament, which has engaged your attention for two Sessions.

I have seen with satisfaction that the time necessarily occupied by this comprehensive subject has not prevented you dealing with other questions of great public interest, and I have gladly given my sanction to Bills for the better government of Public Schools, the regulation of railways, the amendment of the Law relating to British Sea Fisheries, and for the acquisition and maintenance of Electric Telegraphs by the Postmaster-General; and to several important measures having for their object the improvement of the Law, and of the Civil and Criminal Procedures in Scotland.

By the appointment of a Comptroller-in-Chief in the War Office a considerable reform in army administration has been commenced, which, by combining at home and abroad the various departments of military supply under one authority, will conduce to greater economy and efficiency both in peace and war.

It is my intention to dissolve the present Parliament at the earliest day that will enable my people to reap the benefit of the extended system of representation which the wisdom of Parliament has provided for them. I look with entire confidence to their proving themselves worthy of the high privilege with which they have thus been invested; and I trust that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, the expression of their opinion on those great questions of public policy which have occupied the attention of Parliament and remain undecided, may tend to maintain unimpaired that civil and religious freedom which has been secured to all my subjects by the institutions and settlement of my realm.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read; after which the Lord-Chancellor said:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

By virtue of Her Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, and now read, we do, in Her Majesty's name, and in obedience to Her Commands, prorogue this Parliament to Thursday, the eighth day of October next, to be then and there holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday, the eighth day of October next.

And whereas the places which in the schedule to the said Act annexed marked (N 2) are mentioned in conjunction with the name of the said borough of Cricklade are Cricklade, Brinkworth, and Swindon:

And whereas by another Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His said late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it was enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time thereafter, on Petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales in Quarter Sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division was insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said Petition might be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places was or were situate; to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said Petition should be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division, and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some special Sessions assembled as in the said Act mentioned should conformably to the said Act divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas by another Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth years of the reign of Her said present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to Polling Places in the boroughs of New Shoreham, Cricklade, Aylesbury, and East Retford," it was enacted that for the purposes of any alteration or addition to the polling places or polling districts in the several boroughs of New Shoreham, Cricklade, Aylesbury, and East Retford, each of such boroughs should be deemed to be a county separately returning a Member or Members of Parliament, and that the Justices of the Quarter Sessions of the counties or divisions of counties in which the said boroughs

were situate, should respectively as regards each such borough, be deemed to be the Justices of the county within the meaning of the Acts of the sixth and seventh William Fourth, chapter one hundred and two; and of the sixteenth and seventeenth Victoria, chapter sixty-eight, and that all the provisions of the said Acts with respect to alterations in or additions to polling places in counties should extend to the said boroughs accordingly:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Wilts, in Quarter Sessions assembled on the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, have presented a Petition to Her Majesty, representing that under the provisions of the Representation of the People Act, 1867, the number of electors in the said borough of Cricklade will be largely increased, so that the number of existing polling places for the said borough will be insufficient, and that all the steps required by the said Act of the sixth and seventh William Fourth, chapter one hundred and two, preparatory to the making of the said Petition by the said Justices, had been duly taken, and praying that Crudwell, Highworth, and Wootton Bassett may be declared additional places for the said borough of Cricklade:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said Petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Crudwell, Highworth, and Wootton Bassett, shall be polling places for the borough of Cricklade, in addition to the present polling places of Cricklade, Brinkworth, and Swindon, and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county in Quarter Sessions, or some special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, referred to by the said Act of the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth years of Her present Majesty, shall conformably to the said Acts divide such borough into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

The County Court of Devonshire, holden at Totnes, shall be holden within the parish of Churston Ferrers, as well as at Totnes, and shall be holden by the name of "The County Court of Devonshire, holden at Totnes and Churston Ferrers."

Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight:

The parishes of North Newton, Rushall, Upavon, Enford, Netheravon, and Fittleton, now

in the district of the County Court of Wiltshire, holden at Marlborough, shall be in the district of the County Court of Wiltshire, holden at Devizes.

The parish of Witham, now in the district of the County Court of Essex, holden at Maldon, shall be in the district of the County Court of Essex, holden at Braintree.

**W**HEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it was enacted, that on and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, or such later day as might be fixed for the purpose by Order in Council, the Regulations contained in the Table marked C in the Schedule to the said Act should come into operation and be of the same force as if they were enacted in the body of the said Act; but that Her Majesty might from time to time, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by Order in Council, annul or modify any of the said Regulations, or make new Regulations in addition thereto or in substitution therefor; and that any alterations in, or additions to, such Regulations made in manner aforesaid should be of the same force as the Regulations in the said Schedule.

And whereas, by the same Act, it was further provided, that whenever it should be made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any Foreign Country is willing that the regulations for preventing collision contained in Table C in the Schedule to the said Act, or such other Regulations for preventing collision as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty might, by Order in Council, direct that such Regulations shall apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not; and it was further provided by the said Act, that whenever an Order in Council had been issued, applying any regulation made by or in pursuance of the said Act to the ships of any foreign country, such ships should, in all cases arising in any British court, be deemed to be subject to such Regulation, and should, for the purpose of such Regulation, be treated as if they were British ships.

And whereas, by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the said recited Act, and dated the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, Her Majesty was pleased to direct:—First, that the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said Act should be modified by the substitution for such Regulations of certain Regulations appended to the said Order.

Secondly, that the said Regulations appended to the said Order should, on and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, apply to French ships, whether within British jurisdiction or not.

And whereas by several Orders in Council subsequently made, Her Majesty has been pleased to direct that the Regulations appended to the said Order of the ninth of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, shall apply to ships of

And whereas Articles 11 and 13 of the said Regulations appended to the said recited Order of the ninth of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, are as follows; that is to say:—

Article 11. "If two sailing ships are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other."

Article 13. "If two ships under steam are meeting end on or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other."

And whereas there has been doubt or misapprehension concerning the effect of the said two Articles.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have jointly recommended to Her Majesty to make the following additions to the said Regulations, for the purpose of explaining the said recited Articles and of removing the said doubt and misapprehension.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to make the following additions to the said Regulations by way of explanation of the said two recited Articles; that is to say:—

The said two Articles numbered 11 and 13 respectively, only apply to cases where ships are meeting end on, or nearly end on, *in such a manner as to involve risk of collision*. They, consequently, do not apply to two ships which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other.

The only cases in which the said two Articles apply, are, when each of the two ships is end on, or nearly end on, to the other; in other words, to cases in which, *by day*, each ship sees the masts of the other in a line, or nearly in a line, with her

own; and, *by night*, to cases in which each ship is in such a position as to see both the side lights of the other.

The said two Articles do not apply, *by day*, to cases in which a ship sees another *a-head* crossing her own course; or, *by night*, to cases where the red light of one ship is opposed to the red light of the other; or where the green light of one ship is opposed to the green light of the other; or where a red light without a green light, or a green light without a red light, is seen *a-head*; or where both green and red lights are seen anywhere but *a-head*.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, that "whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty, that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships for the time being in force under the principal Act have been adopted by the government of any foreign country, and are in force in that country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct that the ships of such foreign country shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, and thereupon it shall no longer be necessary for such ships to be remeasured in any port or place in Her Majesty's dominions, but such ships shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificates of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships:"

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships now in force under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," have been adopted by the Government of the United States of America, with the exception that no deduction from the gross tonnage of such ships specified in the registers or other national papers thereof, is made for crew space in sailing vessels, and for crew space and engine room in steam vessels, and such rules are now in force in that country having come into operation on the 1st January, 1865.

Her Majesty (in pursuance and exercise of the powers hereinbefore mentioned) is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the merchant ships of the said United States of America, the measurement whereof shall, after the said 1st of January, 1865, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such ships, testified by the dates thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers in the same manner, and to the same extent, and for the same purpose in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships, after making therefrom the same deductions in respect of crew space and engine room as would, if such ships were British, be made from their gross tonnage under the laws relating to British ships.

And whereas the Pilotage Board of the port of Newport, Monmouthshire, being the Pilotage Authority for the port of Newport within the meaning of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, have, in exercise of the powers in them vested by that Act, from time to time made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty various Bye Laws and Regulations which have been approved by various Orders in Council, dated respectively the twenty-sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the twenty-eighth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five :

And whereas the said Pilotage Board have made and submitted, for the consent of Her Ma-

jesty, certain alterations of and additions to the existing Bye Laws and Regulations of the Pilotage Board with respect to Pilots, Pilotage, and Pilotage Dues within their district and under their jurisdiction (a copy whereof as altered is set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed) :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said Bye Laws and Regulations, so set forth as aforesaid, are reasonable and proper :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said Bye Laws and Regulations of the said Pilotage Board with respect to Pilotage within their district and under their jurisdiction, in lieu of the existing Bye Laws and Regulations.

2. Any Pilot who may be required to remain on board any Vessel for the convenience of the Master, Owner, or Agent, after he shall have anchored the vessel in Newport Roads, or elsewhere, at the request of the Master or Owner, shall be entitled to be paid Ten Shillings per day for every day he may be employed ; and any Pilot who may be required to move any vessel in the

Docks Harbour, or River, occupying only one tide, shall be entitled to be paid for every vessel, viz. :—

Vessels wind bound in the water of the New-

port District, and retaining the services of a Pilot, shall pay five shillings per diem.

3. Pilots taken on board of any vessel inward bound to the Westward of Ilfracombe, shall be paid the same Pilotage Rates as from Lundy Island; but if West of Nash Point or Minehead and East of Ilfracombe, the same rates as from Ilfracombe; if between Nash Point and the Holmes the same rates as from Nash Point; and if between the Holmes and King Road the same rates as from the Holmes. The limit for boarding or hailing vessels hitherto binding upon pilots shall extend to the distance of Ten Miles west of Lundy Island.

4. Pilots discharged from any Vessel on the outward voyage between any of the stages mentioned in the above scale of rates, shall be paid the same Pilotage rates as if they had been taken to the next stage beyond the place where they were discharged.

5. In case any vessel shall be compelled to bear up and return from the westward from stress of weather or accident, the Pilot in charge shall be entitled to, and shall be paid one-third of the Pilotage charge, according to the distance such vessel may have reached before she shall have put back: but in no case shall such Pilotage exceed one-third of the ordinary distance Pilotage, according to the distance so run. And notwithstanding such putting back, the Pilot in charge shall be entitled to one Pilotage only when such pilotage shall have been fully completed.

6. Every Master, Owner, or Agent of any Vessel employing a Pilot, shall in addition to the foregoing charges, pay a clerk or collector's fee, as follows, viz. :—

7. No person shall be eligible, or shall be appointed to act as a Pilot, unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship to a Pilot of the district for five years, and been at least two years in the coasting or over-sea trade, or shall have been engaged in the coasting trade in the waters of the district for not less than five years, and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-three years or more than forty-five years of age.

Those of the Bristol Channel Pilots who were duly licensed by the Town Council of Bristol, at the passing of the Bristol Channel Pilotage Act, 1861, may however obtain Licenses for the Newport District on passing the necessary examination, provided they make application before the first day of August, 1862.

8. No person shall be licensed to act as a Pilot in the district unless he shall have passed a creditable examination on the following subjects, viz. :—

- 1st. He must be able to give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the Channel.
- 2nd. The rise, velocity, and set of the tides.
- 3rd. The depth and character of the soundings.
- 4th. The best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide.
- 5th. The sand banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers.
- 6th. The land marks, buoys, lights, their different bearings and distance.
- 7th. The appearance of the different headlands.

8th. The management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor, unmoor, and get under weigh, and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

9. Each Pilot shall provide himself with a good and efficient Skiff or Boat, which shall be registered and licensed by the Pilotage Board for the Port to which he may belong, which Skiff or Boat shall be kept in good repair, and subject to periodical examination by the Pilotage Board, only it may be permitted that two or not more than three Pilots may sail in the same Boat and act in conjunction at the discretion of the Board, and that there shall be one indentured Apprentice to each Boat.

10. Each Pilot Skiff or Boat shall have on the stern, the name of the owner thereof, and the name of the Port to which she belongs, painted in white letters, at least one inch broad and three inches long, on each bow the number of the license of such Boat or Skiff, and shall have the first letter of her Port mark in black paint, of not less than three feet in length, in her mainsail; and shall by Day carry at her masthead a flag of not less than four feet by three feet, of two Colours, the upper horizontal half, White, and the lower horizontal half, Red; and at Night a White Light only, at the masthead, and shall exhibit a flare up Light every fifteen minutes, under a penalty not exceeding £20 for non-compliance.

11. Any Pilot who shall refuse or neglect to proceed to sea when ordered by the Clerk or other person duly appointed by the Board, unless prevented by illness or unavoidable circumstances, or who shall be guilty of drunkenness when in the discharge of his duty, or of insolent and unwarrantable conduct towards any Master, Owner, or Agent of Vessel for which he may be engaged, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding five pounds for the first offence, and for the second or any subsequent offence, to a like penalty, or the loss of his License.

12. Any Pilot who shall absent himself from duty, or who may go overland to take charge of any vessel, or who shall seek employment otherwise than in his own Boat without the written consent of the Board, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than £5 nor exceeding £10.

13. Any Pilot having charge of a Vessel inward bound, except to a Port to which he is not licensed, shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the Dock Lock, or Harbour of the Port; but if in charge of a Vessel bound to a Port to which he is not licensed, he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is anchored in the nearest roadstead to the Port to which she is bound, and if outward bound, to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any Pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding £10, or the loss of his license.

14. That every Pilot shall from time to time conform himself strictly to all directions which shall be given to him by the Harbour or Dock Masters touching the mooring, unmooring, placing, or removing of any vessel under his charge, as long as such vessel shall be lying and situate within the limits of the authority of such Harbour or Dock Masters.

15. Every Master, Owner, or Agent of any vessel navigating the Bristol Channel within the limits of this Pilotage, who shall employ any unlicensed person to act as, or perform the duty of Pilot, unless proved that no licensed Pilot could be obtained, or who shall retain such unlicensed

pilot on board to act as a pilot, after a licensed pilot shall have offered his services, shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding fifty pounds for every such offence.

16. If any vessel, whilst in charge of a Pilot, does or receives damage, the circumstances of the accident will be investigated by the Board, and the Board may, if it see fit, require the license of the Pilot to be given up to the Board, until the case has been disposed of.

17. The licenses of the Pilots shall be renewed annually, or otherwise, at the discretion of the Board, in the first week in January, and a fee of two pounds and two shillings shall be paid by each pilot to the Board upon receiving his license, and one guinea upon each renewal of it, and each pilot shall pay to the Board an annual sum of two shillings and sixpence for registering his Boat.

18. Each Pilot shall within twenty-four hours from his return from a cruise, report himself to the Clerk to the Board, and make a full and proper return (according to a form which shall be provided by the Board) of all vessels he may have piloted, moneys received during the cruise, date of sailing, &c. Penalty not exceeding £5 for the first offence, and the loss of his License for any subsequent one.

19. The Pilots are permitted to collect their own inward Pilotage rates, or they may be collected by a person who may be appointed for the purpose by the Board; and every Pilot is required to make a monthly return to the Board of the Pilotage earned by him, whether in piloting vessels to or from the Port of Newport or elsewhere, the name and tonnage of the vessel piloted—where belonging, where from, and where bound—the cargo and the distance piloted, paying over at the same time a poundage of one shilling in the pound on the amount earned to the person appointed by the Board to receive it. The pilots shall also state in such return all cases where vessels bound to or from Newport have been piloted over any and what portion of the district by a Pilot not licensed for the port. Pilots making a false return shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding ten pounds, and may, at the discretion of the Board, forfeit their licenses.

20. Any Master, Owner, or Agent, of any vessel bound to sea, who may require a Pilot, shall, at or before clearing at the Custom House, inform the Clerk of the Pilotage Board of the vessel's tonnage, draft of water, and give such further information as may be required, and pay the dues outwards to the district for which the Master or Owner may require the services of the Pilot. The Pilot who brought the vessel into port being first entitled to her outwards, unless the Master or Owner may make and sustain a charge against the said Pilot of incompetency or irregular conduct.

21. In case a vessel is brought by a Pilot up the River Usk for admission into the Newport Docks, and is by any misadventure unable to enter the Docks, if the pilot is required to take the vessel again to an anchorage in deep water, or to lay her on any of the Mud Banks in or at the Mouth of the River, he shall be entitled to the full distance of Pilotage for taking the vessels back in addition to the inward pilotage; but if a pilot should bring a vessel up for admission to the Docks when the usual Dock Signal is hoisted by day or night in the usual manner for non-entrance into the Docks, and the Vessel is thereby compelled to return to an anchorage or mooring place, the pilot shall not be entitled to any pilotage for bringing the vessel up or for taking her back to her anchorage.

22. Each Pilot shall be furnished with, and keep in his possession, a printed copy of these Bye-Laws and Regulations, and he shall produce the same to the Master of any vessel or other person employing him when required to do so, under a penalty, in case of default, of not exceeding five pounds.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of district chapelries to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Mountsorrel, in the parish of Barrow-upon-Soar, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough, to the consecrated church of Saint Bartholomew, situate at Quorndon, in the same parish, and to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Woodhouse, in the same parish respectively.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to each of the said churches of Saint Peter, Saint Bartholomew, and Saint Mary, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient; firstly, that all that part of the said parish of Barrow-upon-Soar which is described in the first schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered I, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Peter, situate at Mountsorrel as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Mountsorrel;' secondly, that all that other part of the same parish of Barrow-upon-Soar, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered II, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Bartholomew, situate at Quorndon as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Quorndon;' and thirdly, that all that other part of the

same parish of Barrow-upon-Soar, and those two portions of the extra parochial territory called or known as Beau Manor, which are described in the third schedule hereunder written, all which said part and portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered III, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Woodhouse as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Woodhouse'.

"And, with the like consent of the said Francis, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at each of the said churches, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the several ministers of the same churches for the time being respectively: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The First SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Mountsorrel, being:—

"All that part of the ancient chapelry of Mountsorrel which is included within the limits of the parish of Barrow-upon-Soar, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough."

The Second SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Quorndon, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Barrow-upon-Soar, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the ancient chapelry of Quorndon."

The Third SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Woodhouse, being:—

"All that part of the ancient chapelry of Woodhouse, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough, which is not included within the limits of the Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Woodhouse Eaves.

"All which said part of the ancient chapelry of Woodhouse consists of a portion of the parish of Barrow-upon-Soar, and of two portions of the extra-parochial territory called or known as Beau Manor."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the

said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Cowley, in the county of Oxford, and in the diocese of Oxford, out of the parish of Saint Clement, Oxford, in the same county and diocese, and out of the parish of Iffley, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parishes of Cowley, Saint Clement, Oxford, and Iffley, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the Reverend Richard Meux Benson, of Cowley, in the said county of Oxford, Clerk, has given and granted unto the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, and their successors, a clear rentcharge or annual sum of one hundred and twenty pounds, to be issuing out of and charged upon certain lands, hereditaments, and premises situate within the parish of Swansea, in the county of Glamorgan, upon the understanding that the said rentcharge or annual sum shall be applied by the said Governors to the perpetual augmentation of the maintenance of the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted.

"And whereas the said rentcharge or annual sum of one hundred and twenty pounds has been so given and granted as aforesaid, upon the understanding that we should make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinafter mentioned Act, to the minister for the time being

of the said district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, a grant of thirty-three pounds, six shillings, and eightpence per annum, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereto, should be assigned in the manner herein-after mentioned.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eightpence per annum as aforesaid, by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several portions of the said parish of Cowley, of the said parish of Saint Clement, Oxford, and of the said parish of Ifley, which are described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named "The District of Saint John, Cowley."

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Richard Meux Benson, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint John, Cowley, being:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Cowley, in the county of Oxford, and in the diocese of Oxford, of the parish of Saint Clement, Oxford, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Ifley, in the same county and diocese, which are for the most part co-extensive with the territory which is comprised within the several closes numbered 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, part 20, 25, 27, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 36a, 38, 39, 40, 43, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, and 65, respectively upon the map entitled 'The map of the award of the valuer on the inclosure of the open fields of Cowley-the-Marsh, Bullingdon Green, and Elder Stubbs, situate in the parishes of Cowley, Ifley, and Saint Clements, in the county of Oxford,' and upon the map hereunto annexed, and which said closes are awarded to the said parish of Cowley;—within the several closes numbered 4, 10, 21, 22, 23, 26, 28,

29, 44, 45, and 46, respectively upon the said maps, and awarded to the said parish of Saint Clement, Oxford;—and within the several closes numbered 24, 37, 41, 42, 47, 48, 63, and 64, respectively upon the same maps, and awarded to the said parish of Ifley. All which territory so comprised in the above-mentioned closes is delineated and set forth upon the said map hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink, and is contained within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point near Magdalen Bridge; and extending thence, south-eastward, to and along the middle of the road called or known as the Cowley Mileway, to its junction with Pembroke-street; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the said street to its junction with High-street, Saint Clements; and extending thence, eastward, along the southern side of the last-named street, to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. J. D. 1868, No. 1,' and placed on the southern side of the same street, at a distance of fifty yards to the east of Pembroke-street aforesaid, at the northern end of the boundary dividing the said close numbered 17 from the parish of Saint Clement, Oxford aforesaid; and extending thence, generally southward, along the said boundary, and along the boundary dividing the closes numbered respectively 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, and 48, as aforesaid, from the said parish of Saint Clement, Oxford, from the parish of Headington; in the county and diocese aforesaid, and from the chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, in the same county and diocese (thereby passing to the north-east of the Oxford Union Workhouse, and following in part the eastern side of the Cowley Marsh Footway), to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. J. D. 1868, No. 2,' and placed on the western side of the said footway, at the eastern end of the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 48 as aforesaid; and extending thence, westward, to such boundary stone, and along the middle of the last-described fence, to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. J. D. 1868, No. 3,' and placed at the western end of the same fence, on the eastern side of the Oxford and Cowley Road; and continuing thence, still westward, to a point in the middle of the said road; and extending thence, southward, for a distance of twenty-eight chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the same road, to a point in the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the said road over the watercourse which drains Cowley Marsh, and which is distinguished upon the aforesaid maps as a 'Public Watercourse, No. 1,' and extending thence, westward, to and along the middle of the said watercourse, to a point in the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the London and Henley Road over the same watercourse; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of twenty-nine and a-half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road, and along the middle of that portion of the same road which is called or known as the Henley Mileway to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. J. D. 1868, No. 4,' and placed on the western side of the last-named road at the eastern end of the boundary dividing the closes numbered respectively 39 and 37 as aforesaid from the bulk of the said parish of Ifley; and extending thence, generally westward, to such boundary stone, and along the last-mentioned boundary, to the watercourse which divides the closes numbered respectively 37, 36, 36a, and 3, as before mentioned, from Aston Eyott Meadow; and extending thence, generally northward, along the said watercourse, to its junction with the River Cherwell; and con-

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Oxford.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, as such bishop ; and with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, the patron in right of his see of the perpetual curacies, both of the said district parish of Saint Mark, Kennington, and of the said district parish of Saint Matthew, Brixton (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the district parishes aforesaid, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Stockwell Green as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Stockwell Green ;' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the said Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, and the Reverend John Fentiman Lingham, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said new parish of Upton which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, and for the space of forty years from such date, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by Sir John Kennaway, of Escot, in the said county of Devon, Baronet; by Alexander Fowden Haliburton, of Grafton, Torquay, in the same county, Esquire; by Charles Lavington Pannel, of Torquay, Esquire; by the Reverend Richard Fayle, of Torquay, Clerk; and by the rector for the time being of the rectory of the said new parish of Upton, and their successors, as hereinafter is mentioned, upon trust nevertheless, that they, the said John Kennaway, Alexander Fowden Haliburton, Charles Lavington Pannel, Richard Fayle, and the rector for the time being of the rectory of the new parish of Upton aforesaid, and their successors, shall, upon every legal vacancy in or avoidance of the incumbency of the said district so recommended to be constituted which shall occur during the said space of forty years, exercise such right of patronage and nomination, by nominating to such incumbency some one fit and proper person, being in Holy Orders of the United Church of England and Ireland, to be approved of for the purpose by them, the trustees for the time being of the said right of patronage and nomination, or by a majority of them: Provided always, and we hereby further recommend and propose that, when and so often as, during the said space of forty years, either or any of the four first named trustees, to wit, the said John Kennaway, Alexander Fowden Haliburton, Charles Lavington Pannel, and the said Richard Fayle, or any future trustees or trustee to be in their places, or in either of their places appointed, shall die, resign, or become incapable of acting in the execution of the trust hereby recommended and proposed to be created, or shall desire to retire from the said trust, then and in every such case a new trustee or new trustees of the said right of patronage and nomination shall be appointed for the remaining term of the said space of forty years, in the manner and subject to the several provisions set forth in and provided by the tenth section of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, with respect to new trustees to be appointed under the provisions of such lastly mentioned statute: Provided always, and it is hereby expressly declared, that it shall not be lawful for the said John Kennaway, Alexander Fowden Haliburton, Charles Lavington Pannel, Richard Fayle, and the rector for the time being of the rectory of the new parish of Upton aforesaid, nor for any of them, nor for any future trustees and trustee (whether appointed as hereinbefore is provided or howsoever otherwise), acting in execution of the trust hereby recommended to be created, or having the right of patronage or nomination as aforesaid, at any time to sell or otherwise depart with or dispose of, for any valuable consideration, the said right of patronage or nomination, but that the same right shall at all times hereafter be held and exercised according to the tenour of this scheme, and not otherwise.

"And we further recommend and propose, that,

upon and after the expiration of the said forty years, the whole right of patronage or nomination aforesaid shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Lawrence Palk and Lawrence Hesketh Palk, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme has reference.

"The District of Ellacombe, being :—

tofore belonging to the said sinecure rectory, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns or otherwise as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

TWICKENHAM.—Forthwith in the additional churchyard of Twickenham, except in now existing family vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed, that is, enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented, and except in now existing earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventh day of September next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representations, one month before the said seventh day of September.

- (2.) By the North and South-Western Junction Railway out of the Metropolis : or
- (3.) By the West London Railway to its junction with the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway, at or near Long Hedge, and thence by the last-mentioned railway to Beckenham Junction, and thence by the South-Eastern Railway out of the Metropolis :

On the following conditions, that is to say :—

First. That cattle so moved shall not, while within the Metropolis, be taken out of the wagon in which they are brought into the Metropolis :

Secondly. That if any cattle so moved, accidentally or otherwise, while within the Metropolis, leave or are taken out of the wagon in which they are so moved, they shall not be placed again in the same or any other wagon on any of the said railways within the Metropolis, and shall not be moved alive out of the Metropolis.

4. If any cattle are moved or dealt with in contravention of any provision of this Order, the owner thereof and the person directing or permitting such moving thereof, or dealing therewith, and the person in charge thereof, and the London and North-Western Railway Company, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

## REMOVAL OF SHINGLE PROHIBITED.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the 54 Geo. III., cap. 159, that "in order to prevent damage being done to the shores or banks of the ports, harbours, or havens in this kingdom, no person or persons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks or any portion of the shores or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being shall find it necessary, for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by Order under their hands, or the hands of any three of them, or the hands of his or their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast, upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds:"

And whereas it is further enacted by "The Harbours Transfer Act, 1862" (25 and 26 Victoria, cap. 69), "that from and after the 31st day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, sections fourteen and sixteen, of the Act of the fifty-fourth year of King George the Third (chapter one hundred and fifty-nine), 'for the better regulation of the several ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, bays, and navigable rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, moorings, and stores thereon, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose,' and all provisions in the said Act contained relative thereto, shall be read and construed as if the Board of Trade were named in the said sections instead of the Admiralty:"

And whereas the Board of Trade have found it necessary, for the protection of the harbour or haven of the River Humber, and of the shores and banks thereof, and of the works thereof, to prohibit the taking or removing of any shingle or ballast from the shore or bank hereinafter specified:

Now the Board of Trade do hereby, by this Order under the hand of their Secretary, prohibit all persons from taking or removing any description of shingle or ballast from the shore or banks or from any portion of the shore or banks at Spurn Point, from the Low Lighthouse southward to the extreme of the point at low water, and northward two and a-half statute miles on both sides of the Spurn Point.
