Warfage, March 6. The Council affembled at Grodno continues to deliberate about effablifaing a Fond to pay the Army, and make the necessary Recruits, but as yet mothing has been resolved on. We receive daily very difinal accounts of the late Incursion of the Tartais into the Provinces of Volhinia and Ruffia: They have burnt a great many Bourgs and Villages; but what it most terrible is, that we are assured they have massacred or carried into Slavery above an Hundred thougand Perfoat; among the later were Three Women of Quality; pue of which being newly brought to Bed, died in the Wagon, where they thad thrown her with her child. The Tartars had with them several Companies of Ja-hisaries, who forced the Redoubts where the Company People had been used to fave themselves in the like occafions, the Tartars very rarely diffrounting to attack thele fort of Retrenchments. The Court is expected here about the middle of the next month.

Danizick, March 10. The Letters from Gradie of the Seth of the last Month inform us, That the Council was broken up. after having referred. was broken up, after having resolved, That another Diec hould be call'd at Warfaw in December next: And that in the mean time the Contributions of the Palatinates for the carrying on the War, that he continued on the fame foot they were paid the last year. And that the King had declared again he will Command his Forces in Replon this Campagna, Sultan Nuradin, who made the late fruntien dentinued with his Tropps un der the Cannon of Commission where he expected Sultain Galgan who was drawing oil the Forces his sould toge ther, to make another Invation into the Polish Territo join the Ottoman Army, according to the Orders he had received from himilant. We cannot expect any great Exploits from the Mostovites this year, by reason of the Diffention of the Collacks, who pretend to chuse their own General, and demand other things which the Czar will by no means gonlent to.

Venice, April 17: We have an account from Dalemployed some Persons to infinuate to the People of Cuzzi Clement: Piperi and others of the Mountains of Albania; that the time was come; in which they might by tone figual Action, approve the Fidelity they had profest to the Republick : They did, in Januaary last, fend to him 30 of their chief Men, to affure him of their resolution to join with the Forces of this State, whenever a fit occasion was offered them; and to defire, in the mean time, a supply of Ammunition. These Deputies, who likewite promised to seize the Town of Medyn; and to fet up there the Standard of St. Mark, were very kindly received by the General, and returned home extreamly fatisfied. Soliman Baffa of Albania, being informed of their Journey, and apprehending the Confe quences of it, lent very consteous Letters, with Money and a Prefent of Cloth, to divert them from entring into any Engagements with the Republick, and to invite them to join with him in an Incursion he intended to make into the Venetian Territories: But his Endeavours failing, and being provoked by the ill fuccess of them, he retolved their ruin; and, having drawn together 8000 Turks, and, calling to his Affiftance the Sangiacs of Terra Nova, Pech, Obrida, Sc. who are under his Obedience, he marched with these Forces from Podgorizza the 19th of the last Month. The People of Euger and Pipers, upon Notice of it, feat to General Corniara for Succor; who immediately ofdered a confiderable Body of Men to march to their Adilitance. In the mean time they had affembled together, and, advancing to Medun, had furprized that places. This haftened the march of Soliman Balla, who, coming near the Mountains, burnt feveral Villages and wafted the Country; which to incensed those People, that without flaying for the Venetian Succors, they fell upon the Tarks, and after an obstinate and bloody Fight, entirely routed them, of the Enemy 1600 werd flain upon the place; among which were (everal Officers of Principal Note, and many Prifoners were taken, with 19 Colours the Baffa's Tent and

Baggage, and a great quantity of Provisions, which the Turks had brought together for this Expedition; the Basta himselt, with a tew Spahi's, fled to Podgorizea, where he stay'd not long, fearing the People, who, upon the News of this defeat, began to be very disorderly. The Balfa of Arcepowina had likewife aftembled fome Troops, and advanced towards the Mountains to join with Soliman Bassa, but hearing of the Missortune that had befallen him, he retired with great Precipitation. Another Convoy will part from hence the next week for the Morea, with 1100 Men of the Regiment of Wardeners, and 1000 Suiffers: And at the same time 800 Men will be sept to Dalmatia. On Sunday last an Earthquake happened here, which burit the Vault of the Church of Santa Maria Formofa, and flook feveral Boulevi But the damage it did at Ravenna, Faenza, Imela, and other places in Romagnia, was much greater, having thrown down leveral Buildings, and quite debroyed the Village of Riffinito, barying many of the Inhabitanti under their Ruins.

General Caraffa continues his Vienna, April 15. -march with 2600 Horse, 5000 Foot, 7 pieces of Cannon, and two Mortars, to attack Lippa and forthe other places on the River Moras; by the taking of which, the Communication will be cut of between Great Waradin, Giula; Temeswaer, and the bullet Turkish Garisons on that fider . The faid General? before he began his march, had prevailed with the Prince of Trensilvania; to feltingh 30000 Meatures more of Wheat and Oats for the Subststance of the Imperial Troops, in confideration of the good Order they had observed in their Winter-quarters. We are told from Five Churches, That the Turks of the Garison of Sigeth were in a great Consternation, finding themselves quite block to up by the Imperial Troops: that are quartered round them, and without any hopes of relief: And that Major-General Vecchi; who commands the Christian Gariforn of the neighboring places, having, upon the news of it, drawn together 2000 Men, was gone towards Sigerb to Breighten tilem yet more, by feizing on forme advantageous Posts near the place, which would higder them from being Supplied with any Provisions by the Country People. The Imperial Forces that are to form the Flying Campinear Effeck, are most of them arrived in the Plains of Pelt. where their Rendezvous is appointed; the Foot will pals from thence by Water, while the Horse continue The Surprize of the Fortress of their march by Land. Radzkas by the Baron of Tanokel, of which we niade mention in our latt, is confirmed, with thefe farther Pasticulariz He marched the 15th of the last month from Effeck, with 200 Horse and as many Heydukes, to attack a Convoy which the Serasquier had sent from Beigrade to Illock, under the command of the late Bassa of Agrea what understanding that the said Cenvoy was got into the place, he made a halt at Walcowar, to refresh his Men, where he had Notice that the Turks afsembled near Rerza on the other fide of the Save; upon which he resolved to march towards them, to learn what was their defign, but being informed in his way, that the Turks had put a Garison into Radzka, and had laid up there a great quantity of Provisions, he changed his Refolution, and, marching thither with all the diligence he could,, arrived the 17th about two in the moruing before the place, which he immediately affaulted, and, in ashort time, made himself Malter of it; of the Turks 800 were kill'd, manyadrown'd, and 72 made Slayes; and 52 Christians were reflored to their Liberty: The Imperialitis, having plundered the Town, and afterwards fet Fire to it, retti ned the 21th to Effeck; with 5 Colours, 72 Hories, and other Booty to a confiderable

The Envoy from Argirs continues Hill at Amsterdam, where he pretends to have forme private Afrairs.

Brusselfe, April 30. The Elector of Saxony is come to Antherp, and is expected here on Sunday next: In the mean time great Preparations are making by his Excellency-for his Reception and Entertainment. The Letters from Vienna, of the 18th Initiant, give an account, Phat General Caprata Hall formally beflieged Lippa. And that a Body of Imperial Troops, which had been drawn together pear Road, was marching under the Command of the Baron & Micelaga, to Bombard Alba Regalis, the Garifon whereof had again mutinied against the Bassa, who, to appeare them, had been forced to promise. That if the expected Succors did not arrive in three Weeks, he would furrender the place.
