## A PROCLAMATION,

*For Dissolving the present Parliament and Declaring the calling of another.*

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November instant, We do for that end publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November instant; and We, being desirous and resolved as soon as may be, to meet Our people, and to have their advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving subjects Our Royal will and and pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, that, with the advice of Our Privy Council, We have given order that Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and Our Chancellor of Ireland, do, respectively, upon notice thereof, forthwith issue out writs in due form, and according to law, for calling a new Parliament: and We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require writs forthwith to be issued accordingly by Our said Chancellors respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament,

to be duly returned to, and give their attendance in, Our said Parliament; which writs are to be returnable on Thursday, the tenth day of December next.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor*, this eleventh day of *November*, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and in the thirty-second year of Our reign.

#### - A PROCLAMATION,

*In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.*

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on Thursday, the tenth day of December next ensuing the date hereof; in order, therefore, to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, in Edinburgh, on Thursday, the third day of December next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open election, and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing, duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law), and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the names of the sixteen Peers so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said city, to take especial care to preserve the peace thereof, during the time of the said election, and to prevent all manner of riots, tumults, disorders, and violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days, at least, before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such election.

THIS day, Sir Augustus William Frederick Spencer Loftus, G.C.B. (commonly called Lord Augustus Loftus), the Right Honourable Sir Joseph Napier, Bart., and Sir James Fergusson, Bart., were, by Her Majesty's command, sworn of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their places at the Board accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the ninth of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by your Majesty's Order in Council, dated the sixteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is provided that Officers who accept the Greenwich Hospital Pension shall be allowed to retain it notwithstanding promotion. And whereas we are of opinion that it would be expedient to place these pensions in all respects on the same footing as naval pensions, which are forfeited on promotion. We do, therefore, beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be graciously pleased by your Order in Council to cancel the provision in question, and to direct that in future Greenwich Hospital Pensions, as well as naval pensions, be forfeited on promotion, except in the case of the Ten Greenwich Hospital Pensions for Flag Officers."

Her Majesty having taken the said memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth



and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy ; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five ; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke the Evangelist, situate in the Humberstone-road, within the limits of the district parish of Saint George, Leicester, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said district parish of Saint George, Leicester, and of the district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such district parish and district chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said district parish of Saint George, Leicester, and of the said district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke the Evangelist, situate in the Humberstone-road as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his See of the perpetual curacy of the said district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester, and with the consent of the Reverend Sir John Hobart Culme-Seymour, Baronet, Clerk, Prebendary of the prebend of Saint Margaret, Leicester, in the cathedral church of Lincoln, and as such prebendary, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said district parish of Saint George, Leicester (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said district parish of Saint George, Leicester, and of the said district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Luke the Evangelist, situate in the Humberstone-road as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Leicester,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Francis, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Leicester, being : -

"All that portion of the district parish of Saint George, Leicester, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough, and also all that

contiguous portion of the district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester, in the said county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded externally by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint George, Leicester, from the particular district of Christ Church, Leicester, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at the point where Wharf-street is joined by Erskine-street ; and extending thence, eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with Humberstone-road ; and extending thence, south-westward, along the middle of the said road, to its junction with Nichols-street ; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with Southampton-street ; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, to a point at the south-eastern end of the same street, in the middle of the wall or fence forming the north-western boundary of the Midland Railway Goods Station ; and extending thence, generally north-eastward, along the said wall or fence, to its junction with the wall or fence forming the north-eastern boundary of the same goods' station ; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the last described wall or fence, to a point in the middle of the line of the said Midland Railway ; and extending thence, north-eastward, for a distance of twenty-five chains and a-half, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said line of railway, to the boundary in the centre of the bridge over Humberstone-road aforesaid, which divides the said district parish of Saint George, Leicester, from the district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester aforesaid ; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the said Humberstone-road (thereby following the last described boundary) to the junction of the same road with Stanley-street ; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the last-named street (thereby leaving the said lastly described boundary), to the junction of such street with Arnold-street ; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with Curzon-street ; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with Dysart-street ; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the last-named street, across Brunswick-street, and along the middle of Benford-street, to the junction of the last-named street with Christow-street ; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with the street called Providence-place ; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the last-named street, and along the middle of Eaton-street, to the boundary at the junction of the last-named street with Wharf-street aforesaid, which divides the said district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Leicester, from the particular district of Christ Church, Leicester aforesaid ; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of Wharf-street aforesaid (thereby following the last described boundary, and also the boundary dividing the district parish of Saint George, Leicester, from the particular district of Christ Church, Leicester as aforesaid), to the first described point where Wharf-street is joined by Erskine-street as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual

in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Folkestone, in the eastern part of the parish of Folkestone, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Peter, situate at Folkestone as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Folkestone, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Peter, situate at Folkestone as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Folkestone.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Matthew Woodward, the present vicar or incum-

bent of the vicarage of the said parish of Folkestone, shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Peter as aforesaid, shall be paid by the minister thereof to the said Matthew Woodward: and provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Folkestone, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Folkestone, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury, which is bounded on the south and east by the English Channel, on the north-east by the parish or chapelry of Capel-le-Ferne, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and on the remaining sides, that is to say, on the north-west and west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Folkestone, from the parish or chapelry of Capel-le-Ferne aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the line of the South-Eastern Railway; and extending thence, south-westward, for a distance of three quarters of a mile, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said line of railway to its junction, at the Folkestone Railway Station, with the line of the Folkestone Harbour Branch of the said South-Eastern Railway; and continuing thence, still south-westward for a distance of half a mile, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said branch line of railway to a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of London-street; and extending thence, westward, across a certain private road, commonly called or known as the Tram-road, to and along the middle of London-street aforesaid, to its junction with Dover-street; and extending thence, first southward, and then south-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with Seagate-street; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with the private road commonly called or known as the Tram-road aforesaid; and extending thence, eastward and in a straight line across the last-named road to a point in the middle of the line of the Harbour Branch Railway aforesaid; and extending thence, southward, for a distance of four chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the same line of railway, to a point opposite to the north-eastern end of the quay on the northern side of the Inner Harbour; and extending thence, south-westward, to and along the edge of the said quay, to its junction with the quay on the western side of the said Inner Harbour; and extending thence, southward, along the edge of the last-described quay, to its southern extremity; and continuing thence, still southward and in a straight line, across the approach to the Harbour Railway station, and across the sea beach, to the southern boundary of the said parish of Folkestone, on the shore of the English Channel aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now,

therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said George Anthony Denison (testified by his having signed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that immediately upon the Gazetting of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly Gazetted Order, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever belonging to the said Archdeaconry of Taunton (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), and all the estate, right, title, and interest of the said George Anthony Denison and his successors, Archdeacons of Taunton, in the same lands, tithes, and hereditaments, shall become and be absolutely vested in us and our successors for the purposes of the said Acts, subject, nevertheless, to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof, but freed and discharged from any liability in respect of tenths or first fruits, and that we shall upon such gazetting as aforesaid be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, as from the twenty-fifth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall be paid by us to the said George Anthony Denison immediately upon such gazetting as aforesaid the sum of seven hundred and twenty pounds, in respect of the fines which he might now derive by full stating the leases for lives, by which the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments are demised, and that in further consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall also be paid by us to the said George Anthony Denison, and his successors Archdeacons of Taunton, the annual sum of three hundred and thirty pounds, by equal half yearly payments, on the twenty-

fourth day of June and the twenty-fifth day of December in every year, provided always, that no renewal of any lease nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments or of any part thereof was or shall since the said twenty-fifth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, have been or shall be granted or made by the said George Anthony Denison.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the said Act or with any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the persons having the care of the undermentioned vault, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vault from becoming or continuing dangerous to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that such persons as may have the care of the undermentioned vault, do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz. :—

That the coffins in the vault beneath the late Danish Church, in Well Close-square, in the parish of Saint Paul's, Whitechapel, be embedded in fresh earth mixed with one sixth part of charcoal and covered with the soil one foot thick; also, that the entrance of the vault be securely closed by brickwork properly cemented, and the ventilating opening from the vault filled up with charcoal not less than six inches thick, the works to be executed under the general supervision of the Officer of Health of the district.

Article 1. *Declaration.*

THE Governments of Great Britain, of Belgium, of France, and of the Netherlands, having delegated Commissioners to find out the means of removing the difficulties which have arisen from the application of the second paragraph of Article XIII of the Convention of the 8th of November, 1864, relating to the sugar system; and those Commissioners having recognized, in Conferences held at the Hague, the impossibility, for France, of establishing an absolutely exact relation between the bases of the tax and the duty applicable to refined sugars, so long as there does not exist in that country a precise correlation between the duties to be levied on raw sugars and the yields fixed by the Declaration of the 20th of November, 1866: the undersigned, duly authorized to that effect, after having taken cognizance of the final Protocol of the Conferences above mentioned, dated the 21st of August of the present year, have agreed upon the following arrangements :—

Article 1. Until the 31st of December, 1869, the duty on the importation into France of refined sugars coming from the other Contracting States is fixed at forty-eight francs eighty-five centimes (48 francs 85 centimes), an amount in relation with the average duty on raw sugars and a yield of 88 per cent.

Art. 2. The present arrangement, concluded provisionally, shall come into execution in eight days from the date of its promulgation.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Hamburg, reporting that a Zollverein Custom House has been established in that city.

At this new Custom House, all goods as well as passengers' luggage destined for the States of the Zollverein may be entered for import duties and cleared, or may be passed free if not subject to duties; and all goods destined for exportation may be entered outwards, and pay the export duties when due.

The officers of the Custom House are likewise authorised to make special arrangements for the visitation and clearance of all goods and effects passing by the ports and railways, and to grant all requisite certificates and documents.

Several villages and places to the north as well as the south of Hamburg, and likewise the Bailiwick of Ritzebuttel at the mouth of the Elbe have, since the 1st November, been annexed to the Zollverein.

The city and port of Hamburg, however, with its suburbs of St. George and St. Paul (as well as the outer harbour of Cuxhaven), still remains a free port, so that neither the Zollverein Custom House nor the extension of the Customs' Frontier imposes any restriction upon the freedom which foreign commerce has hitherto enjoyed in that city, or upon the liberty of warehousing and of forwarding goods in transit.

Art. 4. The said list cannot be modified or altered during the execution of the works, except by again going through the official steps expressed in the previous Article.

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## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 102.)—UNITED STATES—RHODE ISLAND.

*Fixed Light at Connimicut Point.*

THE United States Government has given notice, that from the 5th day of November, 1868, a light would be exhibited from the granite day-beacon which has heretofore marked the shoal extending from Connimicut point, Providence River, Rhode Island.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 50 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order.

In foggy or thick weather a fog bell will be sounded.

And that from the same date, the light now exhibited at Nayat point (opposite Connimicut point) would be discontinued.

*Alteration in position of Block Island Light.*

Also, that from the 15th day of September, the light on Block Island, off the eastern entrance of Long Island sound, would be exhibited from the new dwelling of the keeper (grey granite), situated 400 yards south of its former position.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 75 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 12 miles.

3. To authorize the removal to the said new churches of the font, communion table, and plate, used for the purposes of the Holy Communion, and the stained glass windows, respectively belonging to the church of Allhallows Staining.

4. To vest in the Grocers' Company the sole patronage of the new benefices to be created by the scheme or under the powers of the said Bill.

5.
