**T**HE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, and The Metropolitan Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Licence granted by the Privy Council and dated the twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, for the holding of an Exhibition and Sale of Cattle at the Agricultural Hall, in the parish of Islington, in the county of Middlesex, on the seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, and eleventh days of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, shall, from and after the date of this Order, be read and have effect as if in paragraph Three thereof, David Guilan, of No. 60, Camera-square, Chelsea, had been named instead of John Sibley, of No. 14, Milbank-street, Westminster, and had accordingly been thereby appointed Pass-Master for the Exhibition.
