

Forster be appointed Vice-President of the Committee of Council on Education; and that the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do prepare a warrant for Her Majesty's Royal signature accordingly, under the provisions of an Act passed in the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the appointment of a Vice-President of the Committee of Council on Education."

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the fourth section of "The Medical Act," one of the persons to constitute "the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom" to be established under or by virtue of the provisions of that Act, was to be a person chosen from time to time by the University of Edinburgh and the two Universities of Aberdeen collectively, and by the fifth section of the said Act, it was provided that if the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen should not be able to agree upon some one person to represent them in the Council, it should be lawful for each one of the said Universities to select one person, and thereupon it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to appoint one of the persons so selected to be a member of the said Council for the said Universities.

And whereas in the year 1858 the said University of Edinburgh and the said two Universities of Aberdeen collectively chose James Syme, Esquire, Professor of Clinical Surgery in the University of Edinburgh, to be their representative in the said General Council for the term of five years; and again, in the year 1863, collectively chose the said James Syme to be their representative in the said General Council for the further term of five years:

And whereas the said two Universities of Aberdeen, in the said Medical Act mentioned, have since the passing thereof been consolidated and united into one University; that is to say, the University of Aberdeen:

And whereas under or by virtue of the provisions of the said Act, the said James Syme, on the 19th October, 1868, ceased by lapse of time to be a member of the said General Council:

And whereas the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen have not been able to agree upon some one person to represent them in the said General Council, and in pursuance of the said fifth section of the said Act, the said University of Edinburgh hath selected the said James Syme, and the said University of Aberdeen hath selected John Macrobine, M.D., Professor of the Practice of Medicine in the University of Aberdeen and Dean of the Medical Faculty, and have submitted the names of the said two persons to Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth, under and by

virtue of the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Medical Act, appoint the said John Macrobine, M.D., to be a member of the said General Council for the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen for the term of five years from the date hereof.

WHEREAS the Assizes and Sessions under the Commissions of Gaol Delivery and other Commissions for the dispatch of Criminal and Civil Business, holden in and for the County of Suffolk, have hitherto, for many years past, been holden in the spring at Bury St. Edmunds, and in the summer at Ipswich, both in the said county:

And whereas it is desirable and convenient that the said assizes and sessions holden in and for the said county, shall from henceforth be held at Ipswich in the spring, and at Bury St Edmunds in the summer:

And whereas by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient places for the holding of Assizes in England, and Wales," it was declared and enacted, that His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, should have power, from time to time, to order and direct at what place or places in any county in England or Wales the assizes and sessions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business should be holden, and to order and direct such assizes and sessions for the dispatch of criminal and civil business to be holden at more than one place in the same county on the same circuit:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in exercise of the power vested in her under or by virtue of the said Act, and of every other power in that behalf, doth hereby order and direct that from henceforth the assizes and sessions under the commissions of gaol delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business which shall be held in and for the county of Suffolk, in the spring of each year, shall be held at Ipswich aforesaid; and that the said assizes and sessions which shall be held in and for the said county in the summer of each year, shall be held at Bury St. Edmunds aforesaid:

And the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
