laft he had poffeffed himstelf of in the Neighbourhood of ! Great Waradin. There Letters add. That Prince Abafes was pretty well recovered ; but that he had not yet given Audience to the Envoy from Poland. They write from Scavonia, that the Imperial Troops that are to form the Camp at Effect were most of them arrived there g and that General Caprara was daily expected: And that it was believed the first Action of these Forces would be to make themfelves Mafters of feveral advantageous Poits on the Save, to hinder the Turks from paffing that River, which we hear they are preparing to do. They write which we hear they are preparing to do. from Buda, that the Baron d' Areijaga was come with the Forces under his Command, being about 7000 Men; before Alba Regalis ; but that his Enterprize was like to be rendered more difficult than was expected, by the sein Afflurances an Aga, who was arrived there from Belgrade, had given that Garifon of a fpeedy fuccor; which had greatly encouraged them to defend the place. They confirm from Five Churches the Advantage which the They confirm from Five Churches the Advantage which the Count de Vicchi, Governor of that place, lately obtained againlt the Turks of Sigeth, with the tollowing Particulars: That the Count de Vicchi having taken a Caitle called Tembeck, within a Mile of Sigeth, and left in it a Garilon of 250 Foot, and 150 Herfe (whereby all the Villages of that diffrict were obliged to do Homage to his Imperial Majethy; and an oppor-tunity was given to leveral Families of Ralcians to retire from the Neighbourhood of Sigeth, and to put themfelves under the Protection of the Imperialits, he afterwards reloved to lay a Bridge over the Drave for the eftablishing a Communication between Humeary and Sclavonia: That while he was making between Hungary and Sclavonia : That while he was making Preparations for that purpole, he received advice, that on the rath palt an Aga arrived at Sigeth: with the Notice of a ftrong Convoys being on its march for the relief of that place and Canifa; that thereupon the Baffa had the next day cauled 5 pieces of Cannon to be fired from the Caltle, as a fign of the arrival of Succors; and the better to perfuade the Chultians to the belief offin, had at the fame time tent out a Party of 100 Horfe. That upon this Information, the Count de Vecchi had, the 14th early in the morning, commanded Lieutenant-Colonel Bifchotshaulen. with a Deratchement of 180 Horfe, to go and look after the Enemy. That the faid Lieutenant-Colonel, underftanding in his march that they were gone back to Sigeth, and being unwilling to return without forme Exploit, lay 150 of his Men in Ambuh, and advanced with the refunder the Cannon of Si-geth; that the Turks perceiving them, came out immediately to the number of about 120, to charge our Men, who retiring, yet fo as that they feveral times made head to receive the Enemy, drew them to the place where the reft of their Party ex-petited them: The Turks being here befet on all fides, 53 of them were killed upon the place, the reft feeing no other way to effance, throwing themfelves into a deep Moras, where about 30. perilhed, with their Horles. After which the Imperialifts re-turned to *Five Churches*, with feveral Prifoners, 24 Horles, and the other Booty they had taken; having fince that time heard nothing farther of the Convoy which was faid to be defigned for the relief of Sigeth and Canifa.

Hamburgh, May 11. We have an account from Postdam, that the Elector of Brandenburgh, who has been ill fome time, finding his Diftemper encrealed upon him, and that he could not live long in the condition it had reduced him to, had, on the 6th of this month, called to him the Princes his Sons, and his principal Minifters, and after giving his Bleffing to the former, with Wishes of a happy Government to the Eldeft, the Electoral Prince; and having thanked the later for their Fidelity and good Services, had taken leave of them all ; which was answered on their part with all the marks of a most fenfible affliction. They write from Copenhagen, of the 5th Inftant, that the Fleet of that Crown, composed 'of 24, Men of War, lay there ready to fail under the command of Admiral Spaen: And that 16. Ships more were fitted to far, that if there he occasion they may likewife be at Seain few days; And that the difcourfe of the King's taking a Journey, to Holftein was again renewed.

Higus, May 14. The Elector of Saxony has fince his coming to this place been treated with all the Honors and Respects his refolution of being *incognito* would ad. mit of; It is faid ho will ftay here 7 or 8 days. The States of Holland are again affembled, and have, among other matters, before them that about the Arrears of Sublidies remaining due to the Elector of Brandenburg, which

his Min fter here has demanded the payment of in one entire Sum. The Count de Solmes, Colonel of the Regiment of Guards is returned hither from Germany; and the Count de Naffan, General of the Cavalry, is daily expected. The Rhingrave is going to pais the Campagne in Hungary.

The King has given the Government of Mont-Louis in Alface to the Countide Montal, of prelent Governor of Mabuuge, who is to be fucceeded there by the Count de Gournay; and the Sieur de Bordes is mide Governor of Landaw. There is a difcourte of fortning a Camp on the Saar; and that all the Dragoons have orders to repair thither towards the end of this month. The Prince of Conde is gone to affemble the States of Burgundy, where he will itay about Three Wecks; and prefently after his return the Marriage of the Prince de Conti with Madamoifelle de Bourbon will it's believed be confummated. An Express is arrived here with the News of the Elector of Brand.nburg's being very ill.

Whitehall, May 8. His Majefty went this morning early down the River towards Chatham; and will return on Thursday.
