The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty,

dated the third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by your Majesty's Order in Council, dated the sixteenth of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, a scale of establishment and salaries is fixed for the Officers and others in your Majesty's Naval Hospital at Greenwich, which does not include the appointment of a Visitor and Governor; we humbly beg leave to represent to your Majesty that in consequence of the recent death of Admiral of the Fleet Sir James Alexander Gordon, G.C.B., who long held the office of Governor, we are of opinion that it is desirable to select an Officer of your Majesty's Navy of rank not lower than that of Vice-Admiral to be 'Visitor and Governor' of the Hospital, to whom we may from time to time assign such duties as may be thought fit.

"We further beg leave to submit that the salary attached to this office should be £1,200 per annum to an Admiral, and £1,000 per annum to a Vice-Admiral.

The Lords Commissioners of your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence with this proposal."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the 6th and 7th years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to remove doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers countries and places out of Her Majesty's dominions, and to render the same more effectual," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it is and shall be lawful for Her Majesty to hold, exercise, and enjoy any power or jurisdiction which Her Majesty now hath, or may at any time hereafter have, within any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions, in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had acquired such power or jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory:

And whereas Her Majesty hath power and jurisdiction in the dominions of Her Majesty the Queen of Madagascar:

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the due and effectual exercise of such power and jurisdiction:

1. Now, therefore, in pursuance and by virtue of the said recited Act of Parliament, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Her Majesty's Consuls appointed to reside in the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar shall have full power and authority to carry into effect,

and to enforce by the means and in the manner hereinafter mentioned and provided, the observance of the stipulations of the Treaty of June 27, 1865, or of any regulations appended to that Treaty, or any which may hereafter be made between Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, and the Queen of Madagascar, her heirs and successors; and to make and to enforce by fine or imprisonment, or both, Rules and Regulations for the observance of the stipulations of any such Treaty, and for the peace, order, and good government of Her Majesty's subjects being within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, her heirs and successors.

2. And it is further ordered, that a copy of all such Rules and Regulations made by the said Consul shall forthwith be affixed, and kept affixed and exhibited in some conspicuous place in the public office of the said Consul, and that printed copies of the said Rules and Regulations shall, as soon as possible, be provided by the said Consul, and sold at a price not exceeding one dollar for each copy; and for the purpose of convicting any person offending against the said Rules and Regulations, and for all other purposes of law whatsoever, a printed copy of the said Rules and Regulations certified under the hand of the said Consul to be a true copy thereof, shall be taken as conclusive evidence of such Rules and Regulations and all things therein respectively contained, and no penalty shall be incurred or shall be enforced for the breach of any such Rules and Regulations to be hereafter made, until the same shall have been so affixed and exhibited for one calendar month in the public office of the Consul: Provided always, that any such Rule or Regulation made by Her Majesty's Consul, and to be enforced by a penalty, shall before the first day on which the same shall be so affixed or exhibited, be transmitted to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs for allowance or disallowance; and if any such Rule or Regulation shall be disallowed by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the same shall cease to have effect from the receipt by the Consul of such disallowance, nevertheless, the Consul shall not be liable to be proceeded against in any of Her Majesty's Courts in regard to any act done by him under such Rule or Regulation previously to the receipt of its disallowance by such Consul.

3. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul as aforesaid, upon information or upon the complaint of any person that a British subject has violated any of the stipulations of any Treaty, or of any Regulations appended to any Treaty, between Her Majesty and the Queen of Madagascar, or has disregarded or infringed any of the Rules or Regulations for the observance of the stipulations of any such Treaty affixed and exhibited according to the provisions of the next preceding Article of this Order, to summon before him the accused person and to receive evidence, and to examine witnesses on oath, as to the guilt or innocence of such person in regard to the offence laid to his charge; and to award such penalty of fine or imprisonment against any person convicted of an offence against any such Treaty or appended Regulations, or against the said Rules and Regulations, as may be specified therein respectively; and any charge against a British subject for a breach of any such Treaty or appended Regulations, or for a breach of such Rules and Regulations for the observance of any such Treaty, shall be heard and determined by the Consul without Assessors: Provided always, that in no case shall the penalty to be incurred by a breach of such Rules and

Regulations exceed 500 dollars, or three calendar months' imprisonment.

4. And it is further ordered, that any charge against a British subject for a breach of Rules and Regulations other than those relating to the observance of Treaties shall, in like manner, be heard and determined by Her Majesty's Consul, and in all cases in which the penalty shall not exceed 200 dollars, or one calendar month's imprisonment, the Consul shall hear and determine the charge summarily without the aid of Assessors; but where a penalty attached to a breach of the Rules and Regulations other than those relating to the observance of Treaties shall amount to more than 200 dollars, or to imprisonment for more than one calendar month, the Consul, before he shall proceed to hear the charge, shall summon two disinterested British subjects of good repute to sit with him as Assessors, which Assessors, however, shall have no authority to decide on the innocence or guilt of the person charged, or on the amount of fine or imprisonment to be awarded to him on conviction, but it shall rest with the Consul to decide on the guilt or innocence of the person charged, and on the amount of fine or imprisonment to be awarded to him: Provided always, that in no case shall the penalty to be attached to a breach of Rules and Regulations other than those for the observance of Treaties exceed 500 dollars, or three calendar months' imprisonment; and provided further, that in the event of the said Assessors, or either of them, dissenting from the conviction of the party charged, or from the penalty of fine or imprisonment awarded to him by the Consul, the Consul shall take a note of such dissent, with the grounds thereof, and shall require good and sufficient security for the appearance of the person convicted at a future time, in order to undergo his sentence or receive his discharge; and in default of such security being given, it shall be lawful for the Consul to cause the person to be detained in custody until such security is given.

5. And it is further ordered, that if any person who shall have committed or been charged with any breach of or offence against the Treaty, or any such Rules and Regulations as aforesaid, shall escape or remove from the Consular District within which the fact was committed, and shall be found within another Consular District, it shall be lawful for the Consul within whose district such person shall be so found, to proceed against him in the same manner as if the fact had been committed within such district.

6. And it is further ordered that all suits, disputes, differences, and causes of litigation of a civil nature arising between British subjects within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, shall be heard and determined by Her Majesty's Consul, who shall be the sole judge and arbiter thereof respectively; subject nevertheless to an appeal against the decision of the Consul therein to the Supreme Court of the Mauritius, in cases where the sum or matter at issue is of the amount or value of 200 dollars or upwards: Provided always, that the party intending so to appeal against the decision of the said Consul shall, within fifteen days after the determination of the case by the Consul, by himself or his agent, give to the Consul notice in writing of his appeal to the said Supreme Court of the Mauritius; whereupon the Consul shall as speedily as possible, transmit to the said Supreme Court all the documents which were produced before him in the case, and none other, together with a statement of the evidence taken before him in the case, and of the grounds on which

his decision was formed, and shall forthwith notify to the several parties the transmission of the said proceedings to the said Supreme Court: Provided also, that it shall be lawful for the Consul to require from any person so appealing to the said Supreme Court reasonable security, to consist in part of one or two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Consul, that such person so applying will duly prosecute his appeal, and will abide by the decision to be given therein by the said Supreme Court, and that in case such appeal shall fail, he will answer and satisfy all costs, loss, and damages sustained by the other party, by reason of such appeal.

7. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to summon not less than two, and not more than four, disinterested British subjects of good repute, to sit with him as Assessors at the hearing of any suit, dispute, difference, or cause of litigation whatever of a civil nature brought before him for decision; and in case the sum sought to be recovered shall exceed 500 dollars, such suit shall not be heard by the Consul without Assessors, if within a reasonable time such Assessors can be procured; but the Assessors aforesaid shall have no authority to decide on the merits of such suit; but in the event of such Assessors, or any of them, dissenting from the decision of the Consul, the Consul shall enter the fact of such dissent and the grounds thereof in the Minutes of the Proceedings, and in case of appeal shall transmit the same to the Supreme Court of the Mauritius, together with the documents relating to the suit.

8. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to enforce his decision in favour of or against a British subject in a civil suit, dispute, difference or cause of litigation, by distress and sale, or imprisonment, in like manner as a decision of the Supreme Court of the Mauritius in a civil suit is enforced within the same.

9. And it is further ordered, that in case of an appeal to the Supreme Court of the Mauritius from the decision of Her Majesty's Consul, it shall be lawful for the said Supreme Court, upon such terms as to costs and otherwise as it shall think proper, to admit any further legal evidence besides that adduced before the Consul, on its being established to the satisfaction of the said Supreme Court, by oath or affidavit, that the party desiring to produce such further evidence was ignorant of the existence of such evidence, or was taken by surprise at the hearing before the Consul, or was unable to produce it before the Consul after due and reasonable diligence and exertion on his part, or where, under the circumstances of the case, it shall appear to the said Supreme Court that further evidence ought to be received.

10. And it is further ordered, that Her Majesty's Consul shall have power in any civil suit, dispute, difference, or cause of litigation to examine on oath, or in such form and with such ceremonies as the witness may declare to be binding on his conscience, any witness who may appear before him, and shall have power, on the application of any party in such suit, to issue a compulsory order for the attendance of any person being a British subject who may be competent to give evidence in such suit: and any British subject who shall have been duly served with any such compulsory order, and with a reasonable notice of the day of hearing of such suit, and upon his expenses of appearing as a witness having been paid or tendered to him by the party at whose application he shall have been ordered to attend, shall, on his wilful default to

appear as a witness at the hearing of such suit, be punished with a fine not exceeding 100 dollars, or with imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days, at the discretion of the said Consul.

11. Every witness, being a British subject, so examined on oath, whether before the Consul or before an officer duly authorized by Her Majesty the Queen of Madagascar to act judicially, who shall in any such examination give wilfully false testimony, may be convicted of and punished for the crime of wilful and corrupt perjury.

12. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to promote the settlement of any civil suit, dispute, difference, or cause of litigation, by amicable agreement between the parties: and with the consent of the several parties, to refer the decision of a suit or contention to one or more Arbitrators, and to take security from the parties that they will be bound by the result of such arbitration; and the award of such Arbitrator or Arbitrators shall be, to all intents and purposes, deemed and taken to be a judgment or sentence of Her Majesty's Consul in such civil suit, dispute, difference, or cause of litigation, and shall be entered and recorded as such, and shall have the like effect and operation, and shall be enforced accordingly, and shall be final and conclusive to all intents and purposes, and shall not be open to appeal, unless the same shall, within a reasonable time, have been ordered by the Consul to be set aside, on the ground that it is not final, or is defective, or that the Arbitrator or Arbitrators have exceeded their authority, or have been guilty of misconduct in the matter.

13. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to cause to be apprehended and brought before him any British subject who may be charged with having committed any crime or offence within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar; and such Consul shall thereupon proceed with all convenient speed to inquire of the same, and for such purpose shall have power to examine on oath, or in such form and with such ceremony as the witness shall declare to be binding on his conscience, any witness who may appear before him to prove the charge, and also shall have power to compel any person, being a British subject, who may be competent to give evidence as to the guilt or innocence of the party so charged, to appear and give evidence, and to punish the wilful default of any such person to appear and give evidence, after reasonable notice of the day of the hearing of such charge, by fine or imprisonment, in like manner as is provided in Article 10 of this Order, and shall examine every such witness in the presence and hearing of the party accused, and shall afford the party accused all reasonable facility for cross-examining such witness, and shall cause the deposition of every such witness to be reduced to writing, and the same to be read over, and, if necessary, explained to the party accused, together with any other evidence that may have been urged against him during the course of the inquiry, and shall require such accused party to defend himself against the charge brought against him, and, if necessary, advise him of the legal effect of any voluntary confession, and shall take the evidence of any witness whom the accused party may tender to be examined in his defence; and every witness, being a British subject, so examined as aforesaid, who shall upon any such occasion give wilfully false testimony, may be convicted of, and punished for, the crime of wilful and corrupt perjury; and, when the case has been fully inquired into, and the innocence or guilt of the person accused has been



established to the satisfaction of the Consul, the Consul, as the case may be, shall either discharge the party accused from custody, if satisfied of his innocence, or proceed to pass sentence on him, if satisfied of his guilt; and it shall be lawful for the Consul, having inquired of, tried, and determined in the manner aforesaid any charge which may be brought before him, to award to the party convicted any amount of punishment not exceeding imprisonment for one calendar month, or a fine of 200 dollars.

14. And it is further ordered, that if the crime or offence whereof any person, being a British subject, may be accused before Her Majesty's Consul as aforesaid, shall appear to such Consul to be of such a nature as, if proved, would not be adequately punished by the infliction of such punishment as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for such Consul to summon not less than two, or not more than four, disinterested British subjects of good repute to sit with him as Assessors for inquiring of, trying, and determining the charges against such person; and the Consul, when he shall try any such charge with the assistance of Assessors as aforesaid shall, if he is himself convinced of the guilt of the party accused, have power to award any amount of punishment not exceeding imprisonment for twelve calendar months, or a fine of 1,000 dollars; and the Assessors aforesaid shall have no authority to decide on the innocence or guilt of the party accused, or on the amount of punishment to be awarded to him on conviction; but, in the event of the said Assessors, or any of them, dissenting from the conviction of, or from the amount of punishment awarded to, the accused party, the Assessors or Assessor so dissenting shall be authorized to record in the minutes of the proceedings the grounds on which they or he may so dissent, and the Consul shall forthwith report to the Supreme Court at the Mauritius the fact of such dissent, and of its having been so recorded in the minutes of the proceedings, and shall, as soon as possible, lay before the said Court copies of the whole of the depositions and proceedings, with the dissent of the Assessor or Assessors recorded therein; and it shall be lawful thereupon for the Court, by warrant under seal addressed to the Consul, to confirm, or vary, or remit altogether, as to the Court may seem fit, the sentence and punishment awarded to the party accused, and such Consul shall give immediate effect to the injunction of any such warrant: Provided always, that in any case in which the Assessor or Assessors shall dissent from the conviction of, or from the amount of punishment awarded to, the accused party, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to take good and sufficient bail from the accused party to appear and undergo the punishment awarded to him, provided the same or any portion thereof be confirmed by the Court, which punishment so confirmed shall commence and take effect from the day on which the decision of the Court shall be notified to the party accused.

15. And in order more effectually to repress crime and offences on the part of British subjects within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, it is further ordered, that it shall and may be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to cause any British subject who shall be found guilty of having openly offended against the laws of Madagascar, or who shall have been twice convicted before him of any crime or offence, and punished for the same, and who, after execution of the sentence of the Consul, shall not be able to find good and sufficient security to the satisfaction of the Consul for his future good behaviour, or who, having been deported under any

sentence, shall during such sentence return, to be sent out of the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar; and to this end the Consul shall have power and authority, as soon as may be practicable after execution of the sentence, to send any such person to the Mauritius, and in the meantime to detain such party in custody until a suitable opportunity for sending him out of the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar shall present itself; and any persons so to be sent out of the said dominions as aforesaid shall be embarked in custody on board of one of Her Majesty's vessels of war, or, if there shall be no such vessel available for such purpose, then on board any British vessel bound to the Mauritius; and it shall be lawful for the Commander of any of Her Majesty's ships of war or of any British vessel bound to the Mauritius, to receive any such person as aforesaid under a warrant from the Consul to him addressed, and thereupon to convey such person in custody to the Mauritius as aforesaid, in the same manner as if he were a distressed British subject, unless he shall be willing and able himself to defray the expenses of his passage.

16. And it is further ordered, that in any case in which any British subject shall be accused before Her Majesty's Consul of the crime of arson, or housebreaking, or cutting and maiming, or stabbing or wounding, or of any assault endangering life, or of wilfully causing any bodily injury dangerous to life, or of wilful or corrupt perjury, or of engaging in or being accessory to the purchase or sale of slaves, or of having slaves illegally in his possession, the proceedings before the Consul shall be carried on with the aid of Assessors convened in the manner aforesaid; and it shall be lawful for the Consul, if to him it shall seem fit, to cause any person convicted before him of any of the crimes aforesaid, over and above any fine or imprisonment which may be awarded to such person, to be sent out of the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar for such time as to him shall seem meet, in the manner pointed out in the next preceding Article of this Order, notwithstanding the crime laid to the charge of such person may be the first of which he has been convicted before the Consul.

17. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consuls within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, upon information laid before him by one or more credible witnesses that there is reasonable ground to apprehend that any British subject is about to commit a breach of the public peace, to cause such British subject to be brought before him, and to require such British subject to give sufficient security to keep the peace; and in the event of any British subject being convicted of, and punished for, a breach of the peace, to cause such British subject, after he shall have undergone the punishment which may have been awarded to him by the Consul, to find security for his good behaviour; and in the event of any British subject, who may be required as aforesaid to give sufficient security to keep the peace, or to find security for his good behaviour, being unable or wilfully omitting to do so, then and in any such case it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to send such British subject out of the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, in the manner pointed out in Article 15 of this Order.

18. And it is further ordered, that in all cases in which a British subject shall have been sent out of the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar as provided in the three next preceding Articles of this Order, the Consul sending him out shall forthwith report such act of deportation, with

the grounds of his decision thereon, to the Supreme Court at the Mauritius.

19. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to cause to be apprehended and brought before him any British subject who may be charged with smuggling or importing into the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar any goods whereon any duty shall be charged or payable to the said Queen, with the intent to evade the payment of such duty, or any goods the importation whereof shall be prohibited; and such Consul shall thereupon proceed with all convenient speed to inquire into the same on oath or solemn affirmation, and to hear the witnesses on both sides, with like powers and in like manner in all respects as is provided by Article 10 of this Order. And it shall be lawful for the Consul, having inquired into and heard the said charge, to determine the same, and if he shall find the party guilty, if the charge against him shall be of importing into the said dominions prohibited goods, then to award him to pay a fine not exceeding treble the value of the said goods at the current price of the day; and if the charge shall be of smuggling or importing goods with intent to evade the payment of duty as aforesaid, then to award him to pay a fine not exceeding treble the amount of duties leviable thereon, and in case of nonpayment of any such fine or fines to award him to be imprisoned for a period not exceeding three months, or it shall be lawful for such Consul, without awarding the payment of any fine, to award that such party shall be imprisoned for a period not exceeding six months in such place as he shall appoint: Provided always, that no British subject charged only with importing prohibited goods shall be apprehended, unless and until he shall have one week's notice to appear and answer the charge, and shall have refused, failed, or omitted so to appear.

20. And it is further ordered, that in cases of common assault it shall be lawful for the Consul before whom the complaint is made, to promote reconciliation between the parties, and to suffer compensation and amends to be made, and the proceedings thereby to be finally stayed.

21. And it is further ordered, that a minute of the proceedings in every case heard and determined before the Consul, in pursuance of this Order, shall be carefully drawn up, and be signed by the Consul, and shall, in cases where the Assessors are present, be open for the inspection of such Assessors and for their signature if they therein shall concur; and every such minute, together with the depositions of the witnesses, shall be preserved in the public office of the said Consul.

22. And it is further ordered, that save and except as regards offences committed by British subjects against the stipulations of any Treaty between Her Majesty and the Queen of Madagascar, or against any Rules and Regulations for the observance of the stipulations of any such Treaty or Convention, duly affixed and exhibited according to the provisions of Article 2 of this Order, or against any Rules and Regulations for the peace, order, and good government of Her Majesty's subjects being within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, no act done by a British subject within the dominions of the said Queen shall by Her Majesty's Consul be deemed and taken to be a crime or misdemeanour, or offence rendering the person committing it amenable to punishment, which, if done within any part of Her Majesty's dominions, would not, by a Court of Justice having criminal jurisdiction in Her Majesty's dominions, have been deemed and taken to be a crime or misdemeanour or

offence rendering the person committing it amenable to punishment; and Her Majesty is pleased to appoint, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, Her Majesty's Colony of the Mauritius as the place where crimes and offences committed by British subjects within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, which it may be expedient shall be inquired of, tried, determined, and punished within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be so inquired of, tried, determined, and punished; and Her Majesty's Consul resident in Madagascar shall have authority to cause any British subject charged with the commission of any crime or offence, the cognizance whereof may at any time appertain to him to be sent for trial at Her Majesty's said Colony of the Mauritius.

23. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to cause any British subject charged with the commission of any crime or offence, the cognizance whereof may at any time appertain to him, to be sent, in any of Her Majesty's ships of war, or in any British vessel, to Her Majesty's Colony of the Mauritius, for trial before the Supreme Court of the said Colony; and it shall be lawful for the Commander of any of Her Majesty's ships of war, or of any British vessel, to receive any such person on board, with a warrant from the said Consul addressed to the magistrate of the District Court of Port Louis sitting on the criminal side; and thereupon to keep and detain in lawful custody, and to convey him in custody to the Mauritius, and on his arrival there to deliver him, with the said warrant, into the custody of the said magistrate, or other officer within the said Colony lawfully acting as such, who, on receipt of the said warrant, and of the party therein named, shall be authorised to commit, and shall commit, such party so sent for trial to the Port Louis prison; and it shall be lawful for the keeper of the said prison to cause such party to be detained in safe and proper custody, and to be produced upon the order of the said Supreme Court, and the Supreme Court at the sessions to be holden next after such committal shall proceed to hear and determine the charge against such party, and to punish him for the same, if found guilty, in the same manner as if the crime with which he may be charged had been committed within Her Majesty's said Colony of the Mauritius.

24. And it is further ordered, that Her Majesty's Consul, on any occasion of sending a prisoner to the Mauritius for trial, shall observe the provisions made with regard to prisoners sent for trial to a British Colony in an Act passed in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to remove Doubts as to the Exercise of Power and Jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers Countries and Places out of Her Majesty's Dominions, and to render the same more effectual."

25. And it is further ordered, that the Supreme Court of the Mauritius shall have and may exercise, concurrently with Her Majesty's Consul, authority and jurisdiction in regard to all suits of a civil nature between British subjects arising within any part of the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar: Provided always, that the said Supreme Court shall not be bound, unless in a fit case it shall deem it right so to do, by writ of certiorari or otherwise, to debar or prohibit the Consul from hearing and determining, pursuant to the provisions of the several Articles of this Order, any suit of a civil nature between British subjects, or to stay the proceedings of the Consul in such matter.

26. And it is further ordered, that all fines and penalties imposed under this Order may be levied by distress and seizure, and sale of ships, and of goods and chattels; and no bill of sale, mortgage, or transfer of property made by a party accused after his apprehension, or with a view to securing such party against any crime or offence committed or to be committed by him, or against the consequences thereof, shall avail to defeat any of the provisions of this Order.

27. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul, from time to time, to establish rules of practice to be observed in proceedings before him, and to make regulations for defraying the expenses of witnesses in such proceedings, and the cost of criminal prosecutions, and also to establish rates and scales of fees to be taken in regard to civil suits heard and determined before the said Consul; and it shall be lawful for the said Consul to enforce by seizure and sale of goods, or, if there be no sufficient goods, by imprisonment, the payment of such established fees, and of such costs or expenses as may be adjudged against the parties, or any of them: Provided always, that a Table specifying the rates of fees to be so taken shall be affixed and kept exhibited in the public office of the said Consul.

28. And it is further ordered, that all fees, penalties, fines, and forfeitures levied under this Order, save and except such penalties as may by Treaty be payable to the Queen of Madagascar, shall be paid to the public account, and shall be applied in diminution of the public expenditure on account of Her Majesty's Consulate in Madagascar: Provided always, that in the event of any of the Malagasy authorities declining to receive fines payable to the Government of Madagascar as aforesaid, the same shall also be paid to the public account, and applied in the manner last mentioned.

29. And it is further ordered, that Her Majesty's Consul within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, shall, for and within the said dominions, and for vessels and persons coming within those dominions, and in regard to vessels captured on suspicion of being engaged in the Slave Trade within those dominions, have all such jurisdiction as for the time being ordinarily belongs to Courts of Vice-Admiralty in Her Majesty's possessions abroad. And it is further ordered, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Consul to grant probate of will or letters of administration to the intestate estate of any British subject, or any native of a State or place under British protection, who shall die and leave property within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar; and if such probate or letters of administration shall not be applied for within thirty days after the death of the deceased person, it shall be lawful for the Consul to administer to the estate of such person; and for so doing to reserve to himself out of the proceeds of such estate a commission not exceeding two and a half per cent. on the amount thereof.

30. And it is further ordered, that a register shall be kept by Her Majesty's Consul of all British subjects, and of all natives of British-protected States in India who may claim British protection, residing within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar; and that every British subject now residing within such dominions who shall not have been already enrolled in such Consular register, shall, within a reasonable time after the promulgation of this Order, such time to be specified in a notice affixed and publicly exhibited in the Consular Office, apply to the

Consul to be enrolled in such register; and every British subject who may arrive within the said dominions (except British subjects borne on the muster roll of any British ship arriving in any port of Madagascar), shall within a reasonable time after his arrival, such time to be specified as aforesaid, also apply to the Consul to be enrolled in such register; and any British subject who shall refuse or neglect to comply to be so enrolled as hereinbefore mentioned, and who shall not excuse such refusal or neglect to the satisfaction of the Consul, shall not be entitled to be recognised or protected as a British subject in respect to any suit, dispute, or difficulty in which he may have been, or may be engaged or involved within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar, at any time when he shall not have been or shall not be so enrolled.

31. And it is further ordered, that Her Majesty's Consul shall and may exercise all or any of the powers which by any Act or Acts of the Imperial Parliament for the regulation of merchant seamen, or for the regulation of the mercantile marine, may now or at any time hereafter be exercised by any Justice or Justices of the Peace within Her Majesty's dominions.

32. And it is further ordered, that nothing in this Order contained shall be deemed or construed to prevent Her Majesty's Consul within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar from doing or performing any act whatsoever which British Consuls within any other State in amity with Her Majesty are by law, usage, or sufferance entitled or enabled to do or perform.

33. And it is further ordered, that every action or suit brought against Her Majesty's Consul by reason of anything done under the authority of this Order, shall be commenced within six calendar months next after the doing thereof, and not otherwise; and the defendant in every such action or suit shall be entitled to the benefit of the provisions made with respect to defendants in actions or suits in the said hereinbefore recited Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign.

34. And it is further ordered, that the word "Consul" in this Order shall include every person duly authorized to act in the aforesaid capacity, within the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar; and that, in the construction of this Order, words importing the singular number shall, if necessary, be understood to include several persons, matters, or things; and words importing the masculine gender only, shall, if necessary, be understood to import the feminine gender, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction.

35. And it is further ordered, that the provisions of this Order, relating to British subjects, shall extend and apply to all subjects of Her Majesty, whether by birth or by naturalisation, and also to all persons enjoying Her Majesty's protection in the dominions of the Queen of Madagascar. And it is further ordered, that this Order shall take effect on and after this day.

36. And the Most Noble the Duke of Argyll, and the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

**W**HEREAS by the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, it is (among other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council from time to time to do all or any of the following things, namely :—

- (a.) To make regulations for carrying out, enforcing, and giving effect to both the entry and registry of British sea fishing boats, and also Articles four, five, six, seven, and eight of the Convention then recently concluded between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French concerning the Fisheries in the seas adjoining the British Islands and France, and set out in the first schedule to the Act:
- (b.) To adopt in such regulations any existing system of registry or lettering and numbering of boats, and to provide for bringing any such system into conformity with the requirements of the said Convention and the Act and with the said regulations :
- (c.) To define the boats or classes of boats to which such regulations or any of them are to apply, and to provide for the exemption of any boats or classes of boats from such regulations, or any of them, and from the provisions of Part II of the Act with respect to entry or registry and the possession of a certificate of registry and official papers :
- (d.) To apply to the entry and registry respectively of sea fishing boats so defined and to all matters incidental thereto, such (if any) of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British ships, and with such modifications and alterations as may be found desirable :
- (e.) To impose penalties not exceeding twenty pounds for the breach of any regulations made by any Order in Council, for the breach of which a punishment cannot be provided by the application of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British ships :
- (f.) To alter and revoke an Order so made :

And that every such Order shall be of the same force as if it were enacted in the said recited Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to make the regulations which are set forth in the schedule hereto annexed, and to direct that the same shall come into force from the date therein mentioned.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

REGULATIONS for the Lettering, Numbering, and Registering of British Sea Fishing Boats, under Part II. of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868 (31 and 32 Victoria, Chapter 45).

1. The following regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of March, 1869, and shall be in future observed by Owners and Masters of all British boats or vessels, of whatever size and however propelled or navigated, which find any portion of their ordinary employment in sea fishing

or oyster dredging in any of the seas, estuaries, or creeks belonging to or surrounding the British Islands, the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man.

2. Every sea fishing vessel or boat, whether registered under any other Act or not, shall be lettered, numbered, and have a certificate of registry, and shall for that purpose be entered or registered in a Register of Sea Fishing boats to be kept at the principal office of Customs in each collectorship. Application, as hereafter prescribed, for letters, numbers, and certificates of Registry shall, within one month after the time herein-before fixed for these Regulations to come into force, be made by all owners of fishing boats to the Officer of Coast Guard in charge of the Station at or near the place to which the boats belong, except in the cases of boats actually engaged at a distance from their stations, in which case application must be made as soon as they return. In any case where a boat belongs to a place situated at a distance from a Coast Guard Station, such application may be delivered to the principal Officer of Customs at the creek or station at or nearest to the place to which the boat belongs. And such application, upon being received by such Officer of Coast Guard or Customs, shall be forthwith forwarded to the Collector of Customs of the Port in which the place to which the boat belongs is situated, who, upon the receipt of such application, shall cause the boat to be registered and numbered, and grant the certificate of such registry, and forward the same to the Officer of Coast Guard or Customs through whom the application was received, who is to deliver such certificate to the applicant.

3. In Scotland the Officers of the Board of British White Herring Fishery shall assist the Officers of Customs and of Coast Guard in the performance of the duties imposed by these Regulations ; and shall, in places where there are no Coast Guard, themselves discharge the duties hereby imposed upon the Coast Guard.

4. If, in the opinion of the Collector of the Port to which any boats belong, or of the Inspecting Commander of the District, it is desirable, from local circumstances or otherwise, that the mode of application prescribed in the second Article of these Regulations should be partially modified or altered, such Collector or Inspecting Commander shall make a special report to the Board of Trade, setting forth the reasons for and particulars of such modification or alteration.

5. There shall be series of numbers and distinguishing letters for the boats belonging to each collectorship of customs. The following shall be the distinguishing letters :—

6. For purposes of numbering, lettering, and registration, boats shall be divided into three classes, as follows:—

1st class:—Boats of 15 tons burthen and upwards:

2nd class:—Boats of less than 15 tons burthen, navigated otherwise than by oars only:

3rd class:—Boats navigated by oars only.

7. For boats of the above classes the positions and dimensions of the letters and numbers shall be as follows:—

1st class:—For the hulls, 18 inches in height, and  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches in breadth, and for the sails one third larger every way:

2nd class:—For the hulls, 10 inches in height, and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches in breadth, and for the sails one third larger in every way:

3rd class :—Three inches at least in height, and half an inch in breadth.

In boats of the 1st and 3rd class the number will follow, and in those of the second class precede, the distinguishing letter or letters.

8. In sailing boats, and boats navigated by the occasional use of sails, the letters and numbers shall be placed on each bow, three or four inches below the gunwale, and on each side of the mainsail, except for lug-sail boats, in which the letters and numbers are to be placed on the foresail instead of the mainsail. For boats of the third class, the letters and numbers shall be placed on the outside of the stern of the boat immediately under the name. On the hulls all letters and numbers are to be painted in white oil colour on a black ground; and on sails, in black oil colour on white or grey sails, and in white oil colour on tanned or black sails. Except in the case of yachts, herein-after in the tenth Article of these Regulations specially provided for, the letters and numbers of sails shall be painted on each side of the cloth forming the substance of the sail, and not upon any cloth or other thing sewn or otherwise attached to it: and shall be placed on each side of the centre cloth or cloths of the mainsail, clear of and immediately above the close reef, and so as to be at all times conspicuous whether the sail be reefed or not.

9. All boats of whatever class shall have their names, and those of the ports to which they belong, painted in white oil colour on a black ground on the outside of the sterns, in letters which shall be at least three inches in height and half an inch in breadth.

10. In the case of yachts or other vessels only occasionally engaged in fishing, and not usually so employed, the letters and numbers prescribed by these Regulations may be temporarily affixed, by pieces of canvass or board attached to the mainsail and bows, but of the same dimensions as those required in other cases.

11. The letters, numbers, and names placed on boats and on their sails shall not be effaced, covered, or concealed in any manner whatsoever.

12. All the buoys, barrels, and principal floats of each net, and all other implements of fishery, shall be marked with the same letters and numbers as the boats to which they belong, and large enough to be easily distinguished. The owners may further distinguish them by any private marks they think proper.—*Exception.*—A relaxation of this regulation is made in the case of boats when employed in the Scotch herring fishery. In this case it will be held sufficient that the nets and buoys be numbered, so as to identify their true owners; but in all cases of doubt it will devolve upon the masters of buoys and nets to satisfy Sea Fishery Officers, (as defined by the 8th section of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868), that the said buoys and nets properly form part of the trains of the boat with which they may be found, or that they belong to the fishermen of other boats temporarily fishing in it.

13. The owner and master of any boat not having all its nets, buoys, and other implements duly marked in the manner herein directed, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

14. A register of sea fishing boats, in the form contained in Table A. hereto annexed, shall be kept by the Collector of Customs at each collectorship, which shall contain the date of registry, name, port, name of owner and master, class, tonnage, length of keel, rig, in what fishing usually employed, and number of crew.

15. Certificates of Registry in the above register shall be issued by the respective Collectors of

Customs, on application being duly made as directed by the second Article of these regulations; and such certificate shall be in the form contained in Table B. hereto annexed, and when necessary shall be transmitted to the Officer of Coast Guard or Customs through whom the application may have been transmitted for delivery by such Officer to the owner. The Certificates of Registry shall contain the name of the collectorship and the distinguishing letters, the name and description of boat, the name of the owner and master, the registered number and class and the date of entry.

16. All applications for letters, numbers, and registration of fishing boats must be in writing, and according to the form contained in Table C. hereto annexed, and in duplicate if they are to be forwarded from a distant station as provided by the second Article of these Regulations; and the duplicate copy is to be retained and filed by the Officer of Coast Guard or Customs at the station to which the boat belongs.

17. Once in every year the owner of every boat shall submit his certificate of Registry for examination, either at the head office in each collectorship or at the station through which it was originally obtained, and the proper officer shall sign his name on the back of the said Certificate, together with the date of examination, as a record of its authenticity and correctness.

18. In the first week of every year each officer of Customs or of Coast Guard shall forward to the Collector of Customs of the district a list showing the numbers and classes of all boats whose Certificates of Registry have been presented for examination and endorsed in the preceding year; and a notation of all inspections of Certificates shall be made in the Register against the name of each boat. On a change of ownership or mastership, or on removal to another collectorship, of any boat registered under these Regulations, a fresh Certificate of Registry must be applied for, and the former Certificate be given up, in order that the same, together with the former Registry, may be cancelled. A failure on the part of the owner of any boat to comply with this Regulation shall subject the owner and master to the same penalties that they would have incurred if the Certificate of Registry had never been applied for.

19. If any boat required to be registered, lettered, and numbered in pursuance of these regulations, and not being so registered, lettered, and numbered, in the manner prescribed, is used as a fishing boat, the owner and the master shall each be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds. Any Sea Fishery officer may seize and detain such boat, and prevent it from going to sea and from sea fishing until it is duly registered, lettered, and numbered, and may for that purpose, if it is at sea, take it back into the nearest or most convenient British port. Such boat shall not be entitled to any of the privileges or advantages of a British Sea Fishing Boat, but all obligations, liabilities, and penalties with reference to such boat shall be the same as if it had been duly registered.

20. The master of every boat registered under these Regulations shall have on board his boat at all times the Certificate of Registry hereby required to be obtained; and any master not having such Certificate shall, in the absence of any reasonable cause for the same (proof whereof shall lie on him), be liable, together with his boat and crew, to be taken by any Sea Fishery officer, without warrant, summons, or other process, into the nearest or most convenient port, and there to be ordered by the Court, on any proceeding in a summary manner, to pay a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Trinity, Walcot, in the county of Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, and out of the parish of Saint James, Bath, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Trinity, Walcot, and of the said parish of Saint James, Bath, which are hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship) should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to our account at the Bank of England, and a sum of one thousand one hundred and eleven pounds two shillings and threepence; Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the same bank by certain persons, in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the maintenance of the minister thereof for the time being; and we have in respect thereof agreed with the said persons so contributing the said sums of two thousand five hundred pounds sterling and of one thousand one hundred and eleven pounds two shillings and threepence, Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities as aforesaid, and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to such minister as aforesaid, when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and to his successors, the yearly sum of one hundred and sixteen pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence.

"And whereas the said sums of two thousand five hundred pounds sterling and of one thousand one hundred and eleven pounds two shillings and threepence, Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, have been so contributed and paid and transferred as aforesaid, upon the understanding that we should also make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly

herein-named Act, to the minister for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when and so soon as such minister shall have been duly licensed as before mentioned, a grant of fifty pounds per annum, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid, by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Robert John, Baron Auckland, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those portions of the said parish of Trinity, Walcot, and of the said parish of Saint James, Bath, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named "The District of Saint Paul, Bath."

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall, and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the Reverend William Carus, canon residentiary of the cathedral church of Winchester; by the Reverend Edmund Hollond, of No. 33, Hyde-park-gardens, in the county of Middlesex, clerk; by the Reverend Charles Kemble, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, commonly called the Abbey Parish, Bath, in the said county of Somerset; by the Reverend Thomas Dehaney Bernard, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Walcot, in the same county, and by the Reverend James Murray Dixon, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Trinity, Walcot, and their successors, to be appointed as hereinafter is mentioned, upon trust, nevertheless, that they, the said William Carus, Edmund Hollond, Charles Kemble, Thomas Dehaney Bernard, and James Murray Dixon, and their successors, shall, upon every legal vacancy in or avoidance of the ministry of the said district so recommended to be constituted, exercise such right of patronage and nomination, by nominating to such ministry some one fit and proper person, being in holy orders of the United Church of England and Ireland, to be approved of for the purpose by them the trustees for the time being of the said right of patronage and nomination, or by a majority of them: Provided always, and we hereby further recommend and propose, that when and so often as any of them the said William Carus, Edmund Hollond, Charles Kemble, Thomas Dehaney Bernard, and James Murray Dixon, or

any future trustees or trustee, shall die, resign, or become incapable of acting in the execution of the trust hereby recommended and proposed to be created, or shall desire to retire from the said trust, then and in every such case a new trustee or new trustees of the said right of patronage and nomination shall be appointed in the manner, and subject to the several provisions set forth in and provided by the tenth section of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, with respect to new trustees to be appointed under the provisions of such last-mentioned statute; provided always, and it is hereby expressly declared, that it shall not be lawful for the said William Carus, Edmund Hollond, Charles Kemble, Thomas Dehaney Bernard, and James Murray Dixon, nor for any of them, nor for any future trustees or trustee (whether appointed as hereinbefore is provided or howsoever otherwise), acting in execution of the trust hereby recommended to be created, or having the right of patronage or nomination as aforesaid, at any time to sell or otherwise depart with or dispose of, for any valuable consideration, the said right of patronage or nomination, but that the same right shall at all times hereafter be held and exercised according to the tenour of this scheme, and not otherwise.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Paul, Bath, being:—

"All those portions of the parish of Trinity, Walcot, in the county of Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, and of the parish of St. James, Bath, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Trinity, Walcot, from the parish of Saint Swithin, Walcot, in the same county and diocese, at the north-western angle of the garden belonging to and situate in the rear of the house on the western side of Gay-street, which is known as No. 14, and is so numbered on the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence, southward, along the wall which forms the western boundary of the said garden, and continuing in the same direction along the wall which forms the western boundary of the gardens belonging to and situate in the rear of the adjoining houses on the western side of Gay-street aforesaid, to the southern extremity of the last-described wall upon the northern side of the road in front of Queen's Parade-place; and continuing thence, first southward to and then westward along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with the road which leads from the Victoria Park into Queen's-square; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Charlotte-street, at the north-western angle of Queen's-square aforesaid; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of ninety yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of Stable-lane; and extending thence, first southward to and along the middle of the said lane, and then south-westward along the middle of the same lane, to its junction

with the upper road leading from Bristol to Bath; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of the said road and along the middle of Monmouth-street, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Cross-lane; and extending thence, south-eastward, to and along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Kingsmead-street; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street to the north-western angle of Kingsmead-square; and extending thence, south-westward, along the middle of the road which passes in front of the north-western side of such square to the junction of such road with Trinity-street; and continuing thence, still south-westward, along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with James-street; and extending thence, westward, diagonally across the last-named street to the north-eastern end of the street which leads to Kingsmead-terrace; and extending thence, south-westward, along the middle of the last-described street to the northern end of the said terrace; and extending thence, southward, along the western side of the pavement or path in front of the same terrace to the junction of such pavement or path with the towing-path on the bank of the River Avon; and continuing thence, still southward, and in a direct line across the said towing-path to the boundary in the middle of the said river, which divides the said parish of Trinity, Walcot, from the parish of Lyncombe, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the last-mentioned boundary, following thereby the middle of the said river to the junction of such boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint James, Bath, from the parish of Lyncombe aforesaid; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the last-described boundary, still following the middle of the said River Avon, as far as a point nearly opposite to the centre of the Broad Quay, and exactly opposite to the middle of the southern end of the street or road called "Ambury"; and extending thence, northward, to and across the said Broad Quay, and along the middle of Ambury aforesaid to its junction with Cornstreet; and extending thence, eastward, along the middle of the last-named street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the road in front of St. James's-parade; and extending thence, north-westward, to and along the middle of the last-described road, and along the middle of the road which passes in front of Westgate-buildings, to the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint James, Bath, from the parish of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, commonly called the Abbey Parish, Bath, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence, south-westward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the said parish of Trinity, Walcot; and extending thence, northward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Saint Michael, Bath, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and continuing thence, in a direction mainly northward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the parish of Trinity, Walcot, from the parish of Saint Swithin, Walcot, as aforesaid; and extending thence, in a direction mainly north-westward, along the boundary last referred to as far as the first-described point at the north-western angle of the garden of the house known as No. 14, Gay-street aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the parishes of Trinity, Walcot, and Saint James, Bath, out of which parishes it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas upwards of one calendar month has elapsed since drafts of the said scheme were transmitted as aforesaid.

And whereas the patron of the said parish of Trinity, Walcot, has offered and taken observations on and objection to such scheme, and the observations and objection of such last-mentioned patron have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such observations and objection, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

And whereas the Local Board of Health for the district of Tunbridge Wells, in the counties of Kent and Sussex, have, under the provisions of the said recited Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council stating to the effect that the district of the said Local Board is co-extensive with the district for which it is proposed to provide a burial ground or public cemetery; that no burial board has been appointed for the said district, though a small portion of such district (inconsiderable, however, both in extent and in population), being part of the northern extremity

thereof, is at present included in the district of the Burial Board of Tunbridge, and that an Order in Council has been made for closing a burial ground within the said district, and praying that Her Majesty would be pleased to appoint the said Local Board of Health to be the Burial Board of the district over which they have jurisdiction as aforesaid:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order the same to be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, has been duly published as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Local Board of Health for the district of Tunbridge Wells, in the counties of Kent and Sussex, shall be a Burial Board for the district of such Local Board, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign.
