REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

GENERAL ORDER BY THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

Simla, the 7th November, 1868.
No. 1046 of 1868.

HIS Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the accompanying letter from the Quartermaster-General, dated the 5th instant, forwarding, by direction of his Excellency the Commander-in-chief, copies of despatches from Major-General A. T. Wilde, C.B., C.S.I., commanding the Hazara Field Force, detailing the recent operations of the force under his command.

The Governor-General in Council cordially concurs with the Commander-in-chief in highly appreciating the services that have been performed, and desires to thank his Excellency for his able and energetic direction of the military resources of the Government on this occasion.

His Excellency in Council wishes also to acknowledge the great exertions of his Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab, who promptly caused reinforcements to be moved into Hazara on the serious nature of the outbreak becoming apparent, and who throughout has most actively aided the force by all the means at his command.

To Major-General Wilde the Government of India is much indebted for his great care in superintending the proper equipment of his force, owing to which it was enabled to operate successfully in most difficult and rugged mountains. His great experience of hill warfare and excellent judgment

have caused the duty entrusted to him to be carried out without accident, and in a manner which, beyond its present and immediate effect, will doubtless convince the border tribes that they cannot inflict annoyance on our frontier without rendering themselves liable to punishment, despite the almost inaccessible situation of their villages.

It is gratifying to the Governor-General in Council to be able to offer his hearty thanks to Major-General Wilde for his conduct in his recent command.

The valuable and untiring exertions of Major Pollock, the Commissioner, and the services of those under his orders, will be acknowledged in the proper department of the Government; but his Excellency in Council desires here to express his satisfaction at the cordiality and good-will with which Major-General Wilde and Major Pollock acted together prior to and throughout the operations.

Brigadier-General Bright, and Brigadier-General Vaughan, C.B., have earned the approval of the Government by the manner in which they commanded their respective brigades, and all the commanding officers named in Major-General Wilde's Reports deserve the thanks of Government.

Lieutenant-Colonel Rothney, commanding the 5th Goorkha Regiment, has already received the commendation of the Governor-General in Council, for his prompt movement to Oogie in July last, and for his resolute conduct in maintaining his position until reinforcements enabled him to drive the enemy from his immediate vicinity.

The staff of the force and officers of departments are reported to be deserving of approval for a correct and intelligent performance of their duty, and are therefore entitled to the thanks of the Governor-General in Council; but the very important services from the first movement of troops of the principal Commissariat Officer, Lieutenant-Colonel Dickens, upon whose exertions the success of the expedition so much depended, demand special recognition which the Governor-General in Council is happy to accord.

The troops employed, British and Native, have exhibited some of the best qualities of soldiers by their discipline, their cheerfulness, and their active and willing exertions under all circumstances. The opportunity of serious encounter with the enemy was denied to them; but there can be no doubt from their whole conduct, and from their anxious desire for such opportunity, that had the enemy ventured to make a serious stand, the force would have distinguished itself, and inflicted signal punishment on its adversaries.

As it is, the troops have rendered admirable service in a most difficult country, when deprived of tents and many of their usual comforts; and his Excellency in Council offers the best thanks of the Government of India to each of the corps engaged.

Nor does the Governor-General in Council forget that various troops, European and Native, moved with great rapidity from distant stations, some of whom were necessarily kept in reserve, and not actively engaged. These troops underwent great fatigue at a most unfavourable season, but pressed forward with ardour in the hope that they might be of use. To all of these, and to the departmental and civil officers by whose exertions they were enabled to quit their stations with promptitude, the Governor-General in Council tenders the thanks of the Government.

His Excellency in Council desires to express his appreciation of the prompt and gallant aid rendered by the Nawab of Umb and his retainers, and of the useful service of the Hazara Levies and Police, some of whom distinguished themselves; and his Excellency would finally acknowledge the assistance rendered by troops of his Highness the

Maharajah of Cashmere, placed temporarily at the disposal of the British Government, and usefully employed by Major-General Wilde.

BY desire of the Commander-in-chief in India, I have the honour to forward despatches, as per margin,* from Major-General Wilde, C.B., C.S.I., commanding Hazara Field Force.

2. It is unnecessary for his Excellency to advert to the policy of Government which caused the assembly of the force; but in justice to the troops actually engaged in the field, to others placed in reserve, and to the administrative departments under Government, Sir William Mansfield deems it right to trouble the Right Honourable the Viceroy in Council with a brief narrative of events antecedent to the matter treated of by the Major-General.

3. It will not have escaped the recollection of Government that in the month of July the most urgent telegraphic notices came from the Punjab, indicating serious disturbance in British Hazara, the same being due partly to domestic insurrection and partly to complicity; indeed it may be said, invasion by the independent tribes of the border.

4. The warning was so urgent, and the call for assistance so imperative (certain detachments of our troops being in fact beleaguered by the insurgents), that the Government of India lost no time in requesting the Commander-in-chief to exercise his authority, and to tender such recommendations as might be fitting to meet a state of war.

5. At the same time his Excellency was made aware that the position of affairs, as respects British interests, was doubtful in the country of the Akhoond, the inference being that it might not be possible to localize the petty war in independent Hazara.

6. Accordingly, a military policy was now pursued, with the full sanction of Government, as his Excellency believes, for the first time.

7. Thus instead of weakening the garrison of Peshawur, or drawing troops from the posts along the border, according to the first recommendations which came from Major General Wilde, it was determined to supply the force for operation from the rear stations in the Punjab and from the North-Western Provinces; whilst the whole front of the border stations which is held by the regular troops in Peshawur, and by the Punjab force along the border was preserved intact.

8. The consequence was that for the time being, the force in the neighbourhood of the frontier was almost doubled.

9. His Excellency had another object in view, in which he believes he has the happiness to be in complete accord with his Excellency the Viceroy

and his Honour the Lieutenant Governor of the Punjab.

10. This object was to show such an overwhelming body of troops in the disturbed districts as not only to render opposition unavailing, but to convince the tribes by the first demonstration that to offer further opposition in arms would be an act of madness.

11. His Excellency believes that this is the only manner in which the Government of India should condescend to execute offensive operations against the border tribes. And as a matter of fact, it is only in such a mode that protracted hill campaigns can be avoided, with their consequences of extreme risk to small bodies of troops; of useless bloodshed amongst ourselves and the uncivilized enemy; and finally, of loss of prestige along the border, the preservation of which is a matter of the greatest importance and State economy.

12. Accordingly, reasoning in this sense, all the troops stationed in Rawul Pindee (as per margin)* were at once transferred to Hazara, Abbottabad, the head-quarters of that district, being about 65 miles from Rawul Pindee. The 20th Native Infantry marched a distance of 232 miles from Lahore to Abbottabad in ten days in the month of August. The 38th Foot moved in like manner from Sealkote, and finally reached Derbund, in Hazara. The 1st and 4th Goorkhas coming from the distant hill stations of Bukloh and Dhurmsalla emulated the exertions of the above corps, and joined General Wilde in a wonderfully short space of time, considering the distance traversed. The 31st Native Infantry having left Umballa was also able to take part in the campaign, in its occupation of Derbund with the 38th Foot, having marched a distance of 422 miles. Two Companies of the Sappers and Miners actually covered nearly 600 miles by forced marches in twenty-nine days in August and September, and were ready to take part in the advanced guard of General Wilde's force.

13. Other regiments (as per margin),† left their several stations of Cawnpore, Allyghur, Umritsur, Lahore, and Campbellpoor, and took post at Rawul Pindee as they arrived; and formed the immediate reserve to meet any eventuality as alluded to above, the 9th Cavalry having joined the brigade at Derbund.

14. In like manner troops were held in readiness at Peshawur and Nowshera to support the Guide Corps at Hote Murdan, which is opposite to the country of the Akhoond.

15. When it is recollected that all the necessary movements for these extensive strategic precautions were carried through in the deadly heats of August and September, there not having been a note of war until nearly the end of July, it is impossible, his Excellency thinks, to exaggerate in terms the alacrity of the officers and soldiers in carrying out the orders for their concentration, or the efficiency of the Commissariat Department, aided by the civil officers, by which that concentration was rendered possible.

16. In correspondence with General Wilde, it was determined that the operating force, consisting of between 6,000 and 7,000 men immediately under his command, should be equipped in such a light manner as to insure absolute mobility over the highest mountains in Hazara, and the absence, with the exception of the commissariat and ordnance trains, of all baggage. This measure was carried out, as reported by General Wilde, with great success.

17. The spectacle has been seen of British troops, European and native, operating over and among mountains 10,000 feet high, in bivouac for three weeks, the General in command himself being without a tent.

18. It is placed on record that the English regiments moved as easily and with as little incumbrance as the native; this fact even extending to the commissariat arrangement for rations. It is further shown that the health of neither English nor native troops suffered in any significant degree.

19. The political consequences of this experience are, his Excellency ventures to observe, at least as important as the military ones.

20. His Excellency thinks that a great lesson has been learnt in mountain warfare which should never be lost sight of in future hill campaigns in India; it being certain that in all such operations the presence of heavy trains and comparative useless baggage is more fatal to the initiate of the General in immediate command, than any positive resistance it may be in the power of the enemy to offer.

21. His Excellency would now leave General Wildé to complete the narrative.

22. His movements for the taking of the passes and the occupation of the Muchaie Peak were characterized by great skill and decision, the results of the submission of the tribes having quickly followed on the demonstration as had been originally anticipated.

23. After taking of the Muchaie Peak, the troops remained, as shown in the despatches, for a fortnight in the independent territory without molestation, except that of a very petty kind, for which the heads of tribes were made immediately responsible.

24. Although, in a spirit of humanity, as little devastation as possible was committed against those who had offended so deeply, heavy punishment was nevertheless inflicted on the particular leaders, viz., the Pyraree Syuds, who had shown marked inveteracy.

25. In the meantime the tribes of independent Hazara have learnt that British regular forces, with trains of ordnance, can, and on occasion will, penetrate the most difficult fastnesses, and carry fire and sword through glens which have hitherto been deemed inaccessible, and were never approached by the native predecessors of the British Government.

26. It will surely be understood, his Excellency believes, along the entire border stretching from Peshawur to Scinde, that hostility on the part of border tribes will hereafter be met and curbed in like manner, and, therefore, it may be hoped that the Hazara Expedition may prove to have had a lasting effect.

27. His Excellency would now invite the special notice of Government to the excellent services rendered by Major-General Wilde and the Political Commissioner, Major Pollock. The two authorities have acted throughout in consultation together, and in the most praiseworthy spirit of harmony. Major-General Wilde's care and self-sacrifice have been unremitting, and he has shown himself to be able to stand by his own judgment, when a weaker man might have grasped at personal opportunities

of display, to the disregard of humanity and the wishes of his Government. It must be most satisfactory to him and to Major Pollock to have already learnt that they have earned the cordial approval of the Lieutenant-Governor.

28. His Excellency also requests the favourable notice of Government of the manner in which Major-General Wilde records his opinion of the services performed by Brigadier-General R. O. Bright, Brigadier-General J. A. Vaughan, C.B., and the several Commanding Officers* of regiments.

29. Although not engaged in the active operations, Colonel F. A. Willis, C. B., 38th Foot, commanding at Derbund, and the Commanding Officers† under his orders, have done good service.

30. Sir William Mansfield would also beg to convey his own most favourable impression of the performance of their duty by Major C. C. Johnson, Assistant Quartermaster-General, Major J. Morland, Assistant Adjutant-General, Lieutenant-Colonel H. C. Johnstone, in charge of the Survey, and of the several Staff Officers named by the Brigadiers-General. Sir William Mansfield would add to these the name of Captain W. K. Elles, 38th Foot, Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General of the Army, who, on account of his regiment being in the field, was sent to join the staff of the force under General Wilde, from head-quarters. Although this officer's name does not appear in the official report of recommendations, the omission has been corrected in a letter received by his Excellency from Major-General Wilde.

31. His Excellency most specially recommends to the notice of Government Lieutenant-Colonel O. E. Rothney, commanding 5th Goorkha Regiment of the Punjab force, who stood at bay for some time against the insurgents until he could be reinforced: he having moved out by a forced march of forty miles on his own responsibility on the first intelligence of the insurrection in Agrore reaching him. Lieutenant-Colonel Rothney then fought an action of his own, the execution and result of which were greatly to his credit and of the troops engaged. When the force advanced under Major-General Wilde, Lieutenant-Colonel Rothney was specially selected by him, on account of his experience and intelligence, to command the base at Oogie, which comprehended the direction of a portion of the levies and Kashmeer troops.

32. Colonel E. Atlay, commanding the Royal Artillery, is well known to Government as a very experienced and able officer. On this occasion his talent for organization was expressed with great advantage to the State, and both in this matter and in the field operations he was admirably seconded by the several officers‡ commanding batteries. Major T. Hughes, who lately vacated the command of the

Peshawur Mountain Battery, and had been wounded in Colonel Rothney's affair, has also made himself conspicuous by his exertions.

33. His Excellency would record, for the information of Government, the admirable success of the Commissariat arrangements, which are entirely due to Lieutenant-Colonel A. D. Dickens. His Excellency had the satisfaction of serving with this officer many years ago in Lord Clyde's campaigns. The Commander-in-chief was convinced that when he was able to recommend Lieutenant-Colonel Dickens for the charge of the Commissariat, owing to his being at Rawul Pindee, the Government might rest assured that the troops would be well cared for in this most important particular. As reported by General Wilde, his Excellency's conviction has been more than justified.

34. It is most pleasing to Sir William Mansfield to remark on the alacrity and good humour of the British soldiers and native sepoy in their long and forced marches to the scene of action, in the worst of weather, and in encountering the privation and exposure during their protracted bivouac. Their ardour to meet the enemy was, of course, to be expected; but it is most satisfactory to note that the bearing of the troops caused general admiration; and that their discipline stood the test, of all others the most difficult, of petty galling attacks, and of restraining their temper when ordered to do so by the General in districts lately hostile.

35. Government will observe General Wilde's satisfactory report of the arrangements of the Medical Department under Deputy Inspector-General of Hospitals, G. E. Morton. The activity displayed on all occasions by Lieutenant W. B. Holmes, R.E., is also prominently brought to notice with the conduct of the Officers Commanding and attached to the Sappers and Miners. Here, also, I am to attract attention to the intelligent and devoted assistance rendered to General Wilde by his Aide-de-Camp, Major W. H. Paget, 5th Punjab Cavalry.

36. His Excellency observes that, whether as regards the Regiments of the Line, the Cavalry, Sappers, Artillery, or the Military Departments, the army seems to be as ready for active service, after long years of peace, as if it were just emerging from a general campaign. In short, the only characteristic of a peace establishment may be said to lie in the numerical weakness of individual corps. That numerical weakness is a matter of Government economy; but for the efficiency otherwise preserved, the Commander-in-Chief is sure that his Excellency the Viceroy in Council will agree with him in thinking that the acknowledgments of Government are due to the Commanding Officers in their several degrees and the heads of Administrative Departments.

37. It is almost beyond his Excellency's province, but Sir William Mansfield cannot close this despatch without recording his high opinion of the services rendered by the regiments of the Maharajah of Cashmeer, by the very chivalrous Khan of Umb, and the courageous perseverance displayed by the Hazara District Levies before the reinforcements of troops arrived. In short, prior to this, a very active, though small, campaign fell to the lot of the Khan of Umb, the levies, and the troops under Colonel Rothney.

Head-quarters, Hazara Field Force,
SIR, Camp Oogie, 24th October, 1868.

IN the letters marginally noted,* I had the honour to report, for the information of his Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab, the disturbances that had occurred in the Valley of Agrore, District Hazara, and in the above communications the military precautions taken by me to preserve the peace of the border were fully explained.

2. Subsequently I received orders to report direct to Army Head-quarters, as his Excellency the Commander-in-chief had assumed the direction of the military movements in this Province. My reports to the Quartermaster-General marginally quoted,† continue the history of events up to the time when the Hazara Field Force entered the hills on the 3rd of October, 1868.

3. On the 30th July, a party of some 500 men of the hill tribes attacked the Police Station in the Agrore Valley. Through the fidelity and courage, however, of the police they were driven off with the loss of six men killed and several wounded. Lieutenant-Colonel O. E. Rothney, Commanding at Abbottabad, immediately moved out the troops marginally noted‡ to the assistance of the Police. From the date of the arrival of these troops in the Agrore Valley till the 12th August, when a reinforcement of one Infantry Regiment and a Squadron of Cavalry enabled Lieutenant-Colonel O. E. Rothney to act on the offensive, the small garrison was beleaguered and annoyed by the assemblage of the tribes to the number of 4,000 or 5,000 men on the surrounding hills. At one time the position of the troops was the cause of much just anxiety, as in addition to the fact that the hill men were gradually working round and threatening the line of communication, the greater part of the inhabitants of the Agrore Valley itself had proved themselves to be inimical.

4. After the repulse of the enemy on the 12th August, and until the final assembling of the Hazara Field Force at the end of September, nothing of any importance occurred, as the troops thrown into the district under the orders of his Excellency the Commander-in-chief effectually disarmed all resistance within British territory, and checked the hill men beyond.

5. I beg to record my admiration of the excellent service performed by the Nawab of Umb and by the Hazara levies. The loss inflicted in August upon the enemy was considerable, and the nature

Head-quarters, Hazara Field Force,
SIR, Camp Oogie, 25th October, 1868.

IN my Report No. 1 I had the honour to recapitulate, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-chief, the occurrences which led to the formation of the Hazara Field Force in the Agrore Valley of the Hazara District.

2. Under the instructions conveyed in the despatches marginally noted,* the force, consisting of the troops as detailed in Appendix A, by the end of September assembled at Camp Oogie, and three days were now devoted to the inspection and test of an equipment to which I had given long and careful attention, as my experience in hill warfare convinced me that on the efficiency of the equipment and the mobility of the force success would mainly depend.

3. Previous to the departure into the hills of the Hazara Field Force, two Dograh Regiments of His Highness the Maharajah of Cashmeer moved into the Valley of Agrore. These troops held the following posts during the expedition, and I beg to express my gratitude for the way in which they performed the duty, viz., the "Jalgully Pass," the "Kuttaie Pass," the "Soosul Pass," and the camp of "Oogie."

4. At daybreak on the morning of the 3rd of October the force marched out from the camp at "Oogie," in good heart and spirits, to take the field against the hill tribes. The troops had one day's cooked rations in their haversacks, and seven days' supplies for the whole force were carried on mules.

5. The object of the first day's operations was to occupy the "Jalgully Pass," leading from the Valley of Agrore into those of "Tikaree" and "Nundechar," belonging to the independent Swatees, so as to secure, through the Koongullee Village, a secure line of communication with "Oogie." The Village of Koongullee is situated a short distance up a spur of that name, by which I intended one of my columns should ascend the Black Mountain. To effect these objects, it was obligatory to carry the hills on both sides of the Pass. Moreover, a movement of this nature would at once test the sincerity of the professions of neutrality which had lately been made by the Swatees "Tikaree" and "Nundechar," as, since the commencement of disturbances in the Valley of Agrore, the enemy had always defiantly shown themselves on these hills. By 9 A.M. the heights on the left of the pass had been taken, and the Village of Koongullee occupied by the troops of the 1st Brigade noted in the margin.† Only an

advanced picket of the enemy showed at "Koon-gullee," which retired up the spur as our troops advanced.

6. Simultaneously with this movement the troops of the 2nd Brigade, as mentioned in the margin,* ascended the Kiarkote ridge—a spur of the "Kubbul Mountain," dominating the right of the pass. A very small number of the enemy were seen on the heights, and retired, firing a few shots as our troops advanced. The absence of any opposition on the right of the pass convinced me that the independent Swatees were not then minded to oppose my advance. Accepting the success of diplomacy with the Swatees, therefore, as a fact, I was enabled to bring all my strength to bear on my contemplated operations against the Patan tribes of the Black Mountain. And accordingly I at once directed Brigadier-General Vaughan, C.B., to leave the "Kiarkote" ridge, and, passing from the right to the left of my position to occupy and bivouac at the Village of "Kilagaie," to which place I had already detached from the reserve two regiments of Native Infantry and half the Mortar Battery belonging to No. 2 Brigade. This village is situated between the "Shahtool" and "Burchur" spurs at the base of the "Black Mountain." With Brigadier-General Vaughan's brigade I had placed 800 of the Hazara Levies in view to their ascending the "Burchur" spur the following morning, simultaneously with the advance of the 1st and 2nd Brigades up the "Koongullee" and "Sumbulboot" spurs respectively.

7. While these dispositions were being carried out, Brigadier-General Bright, commanding the 1st Brigade, had found it necessary to drive off and follow up small parties of the enemy which were showing above the "Koongullee" village, and by evening his advanced troops had gained a very commanding position, called "Munna-ka-Dunna." Although this was a point higher up the "Koon-gullee" spur than it had been my intention or wish to occupy the first day, it was too valuable a position to be abandoned, and I therefore determined to hold it for the night.

8. My original intention was to ascend to the crest of the mountain in three columns. No. 1 Brigade advancing up the "Koongullee" spur, while No. 2 Brigade and the levies moved up the "Sumbulboot" and "Burchur" spurs respectively, as a diversion. No. 1 Brigade having, however, gained the very advanced position of "Munna-ka-Dunna" on the first day, the necessity for carrying out this operation in its entirety passed away. Moreover, I found that a comparatively easy mountain road might be made up to "Munna-ka-Dunna," and, furthermore, I considered that "Munna-ka-Dunna" itself afforded an excellent temporary base for operations against the "Chittabut" and "Muchaie" peaks—the latter being undoubtedly the key-position of the Black Mountain. Under these circumstances I ordered No. 2 Brigade to abandon the line of advance up the "Sumbulboot" spur, and to support No. 1 Brigade on the "Koongullee" spur, leaving the Levies to carry out their part in the original plan of moving up the "Burchur" spur, a duty they fulfilled during the following day with much fidelity and spirit, sustaining a loss of two killed and six wounded.

9. As the 1st Brigade pressed on to "Munna-ka-Dunna," the reserve moved forward and occupied the village of "Koongullee" with the 5th Ghoorka Regiment posted in advance to maintain the com-

munication with Brigadier-General Bright. As part, also of this movement, 400 Infantry and some wall pieces of His Highness the Maharajah of Cashmeer moved out from "Oogie" and held the "Jalgully" Pass.

10. As is usually the case in mountain warfare, the bivouac of the 1st Brigade at "Munna-ka-Dunna" did not remain unmolested during that night. As soon as the pursuit by our troops ceased, and they were preparing to occupy the ground for the night, the enemy took advantage of the surrounding cover, and their numbers hourly increasing as night closed in, the attack on our piquet became bold, continuous, and harassing. At times the enemy, under cover of the brushwood and standing crops which surrounded the position, came close up to the piquets, and placing their matchlocks on the rough breastworks our men had hastily thrown up, fired upon the defenders inside; but the gallant defence made by the 20th Punjab Infantry, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel C. H. Brownlow, C. B., who held the most forward post, assisted by an occasional fire from the Hazara Mountain Battery, and supported by the 1-19th Foot, and 1st Ghoorka Light Infantry, as often repulsed the attacks. During the night, at Brigadier-General Bright's request, the 5th Goorkha Regiment was moved up to his support, the 2nd Punjab Infantry being thrown forward from the village of "Koongullee" to take its place; at the same time 200 of the Cashmeer troops conformed to the general movement and marched into the village of "Koongullee."

11. As the day dawned, the enemy were obliged to draw off from Brigadier-General Bright's position. Our casualties up to this time being two sepoy killed and six wounded. The bulk of the enemy who had made these attacks consisted of men of the Chuggerzaies and Akazaies, led on by the Syuds of "Paryaree," and I at once saw that unless an immediate advance were made, and the enemy driven from the position to which they had retired, the attacks of the previous night were but a slight prelude to what would follow.

12. Accordingly, on the morning of the 4th of October, I made the necessary dispositions for immediately attacking the enemy's position. This position was an unusually well selected one—about 800 yards in front of the plateau our troops had so obstinately defended during the night, a high grassy knoll, the top of which could be seen through the intervening fir forest; on this knoll the enemy had erected an abattis with small stone breastwork below. The approach to this knoll was along a narrow ridge connecting it with the Munna plateau, and below this ridge, to the right as well as around the knoll, was a dense forest of firs.

13. The D Battery, F Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery, which had come up on elephants, now opened an excellently directed and long sustained shell fire. For some time the hill men remained defiant, showing their flags and waving their swords; but as each successive shot took effect, they commenced evacuating their defences. Under cover of this fire, Brigadier-General Bright, with the 1st Brigade, moved out in the order noted marginally.* After advancing for some distance the Mountain Batteries came into action on the ridge, and a heavy artillery fire being thus directed, on the enemy's position, as the 1st and 5th Goorkha

Regiments ascended the knoll and entered the abattis, but few of its defenders had remained to contest it. Owing to the dense forest in our front, it was impossible to discover the enemy's strength; but had the position been resolutely held by the enemy, or had our troops advanced to the attack before the enemy had been shaken by our artillery, the conflict must have been most severe. Brigadier General Bright, pursuant to my instructions closely pressing the enemy, effectually prevented their again making any attempt to stand, and successfully forcing his way through the heavy forest, occupied for the night the "Chittabut Peak," on the crest of the Black Mountain. He was here joined by the Hazara Levies, who had ascended by the "Burchur" spur. In the *interim* the 2nd Brigade had reached "Munna-ka-Dunna," and the 2nd Goorkha and 3rd Sikh Regiments were thrown forward to occupy the breastworks from which the enemy had been driven in the morning, and to keep open communication with the 1st Brigade.

14. On the morning of the 5th, I ordered the advance of the 1st Brigade from Chittabut along the crest of the mountain for the capture of the "Muchaie Peak"—five miles distant. I have never in the border hills seen such a naturally strong and defensible position as the "Muchaie Peak," the hereditary stronghold of the wild tribes of the Black Mountain, and well might the hill men consider it as the inaccessible home of their independence. The approaches to the foot of the final ascent are densely wooded, and the ascent itself is very long and steep. The grassy slopes are broken up by huge rocks and boulders affording excellent cover for defenders, and on one side they are flanked by a deep fir forest. Anticipating that the resistance might be a protracted one, and relying on the effect produced by artillery on all mountaineers, I had sent both Mountain Batteries with the 1st Brigade, and I this day reinforced the brigade with the 2nd Goorkha Regiment under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel H. MacPherson, V.C.

15. Nothing could have exceeded the regularity of the advance of the 1st Brigade through the forest of "Dodha" (a hill on the crest), and up the heights of the Muchaie Peak. The Mountain Batteries kept up a dropping fire in line with the reserves of the brigade, as the storming column scaled the heights,—

The 20th Punjab Infantry in advance,

The 1st and 5th Goorkha Regiments in support,

The 1-19th in reserve;

both these batteries which had come into action at the foot of the ascent, covered the advance by a most accurate and effective fire. As our troops advanced, the scattered bands of the enemy retreated, till at length, as the summit of the peak was crowned, they were seen flying down the spurs into the valley bordering the Indus. Our casualties amounted to eight wounded.

16. On the night of the 5th October the Hazara Field Force was echeloned as follows:—

On the Muchaie Peak..	}	1st Brigade and Peshawur Mountain Battery belonging to No. 2 Brigade.

The night passed off with but little annoyance from the enemy. Rain fell during the night,

which, though adding to the discomfort of the troops, prevented the enemy from using their matchlocks much against the piquets. The following morning was passed in searching for water, making roads, and moving up supplies.

17. As the occupation of the "Muchaie Peak", 10,200 feet above the level of the sea, had been my primary object, and I had now successfully accomplished it, I will, with his Excellency's permission, close this despatch with the following general observations:—

I.—The resistance having been less than might have been expected, is, in my opinion, attributable to these circumstances:—

1st.—The tribes never believed, and in this idea the Commissioner concurs, that our soldiers would attempt an ascent like that of the "Black Mountain," where no roads existed, and the troops would have to force their way by paths through dense forests and over slopes broken up by huge masses of rock, or intersected by deep ravines.

2nd.—These tribes had never met artillery, and were ignorant of the power of that arm so potent against the bravest of mountaineers.

3rd.—That, knowing the Swatees of "Tikaree" and "Nundehear" were the original offenders, and seeing the ease and facility with which those valleys could be overrun with troops, the Patan tribes of the "Black Mountain" up to the last moment believed our operations would be directed, in the first instance, if not entirely, against those valleys, and not against themselves. Another cause of the speedy success of our arms was that no check or halt occurred between the time the first brigade scaled the heights of "Koongullee" on the 3rd October to the final occupation of the "Muchaie Peak" on the 5th; one day's halt or any hesitation in our advance on the morning of the 4th would have rallied many thousands of the enemy round their standards in defence of their homes.

SIR,
WITH reference to my previous despatches, Nos. 1 and 2 respectively, dated 24th and 25th October, 1868, I have the honour to continue, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-chief, the relation of the operations of the Hazara Field Force subsequent to the occupation of the Muchaie Peak of the Black Mountain on the 5th October, 1868, until I finally left the Patan country on the 14th October, 1868, and the force encamped at "Chermung, in the "Tikaree" Valley.

2. The 6th was passed in the completion of a road up to the crest of the mountain, to enable me to move up the supplies and ammunition of the force. Fortunately a supply of good spring water was found at "Chittabut," also at the hill "Dodah," and subsequently, much to the surprise of all, in the forest, about 300 yards below the "Muchaie Peak" itself. Roads were speedily made down to it by the soldiers of the 1-19th Foot, and all anxiety on this most vital point ceased. Located on the most commanding plateau of the range, with seven days' food and an abundance of water, with my line of communication with Agrore secure, I had every reason to expect that the objects of the Government, viz., "the vindication of the British character and the future security of the frontier from invasion" would shortly be attained.

3. Beyond the mere fact of our prestige among the hill men having been raised considerably by the late achievements, I had in my hands the power of inflicting considerable damage and loss on all the villages of the Patan tribes situated on the slopes near the top of the mountain, and, while the troops held the ridge and the upper spurs, it was easy to let loose the Hazara Levies, men as light-footed as the hill men themselves, for this work of destruction.

4. On the morning of the 7th the enemy had made no sign of submission. In concurrence with the Commissioner I detached the 24th Punjab Infantry, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel G. N. Cave, down the "Bilund Kote" spur from the camp at "Munna-ka-Dunna, covering these movements with the guns of D-F Royal Horse Artillery. The above orders were conveyed to the officer commanding at "Munna-ka-Dunna" by Captain W. K. Elles, Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General. Supported by the above troops, a large body of levies was at this time dispatched from the crest of the mountain, and in a few hours many of the "Puryaree" Syuds' villages were in flames. Little opposition was offered, as the attack came suddenly. Before night the troops and levies were back in camp.

5. On the 7th, also, the 1-6th Foot and the Mortar Battery were moved up and occupied the hill of "Dodah" on the crest. Arrangements were made the same day to carry out still more extensive punitive operations against the "Puryaree" Syuds (the chief offenders in this spot); but owing to the tribes making overtures of peace, the orders for the movement of the troops and levies were countermanded.

6. His Excellency will observe that, during the 6th and 7th, no Patan villages were destroyed. I had, however, determined, in concurrence with the Commissioner, that active and punitive measures should be resumed on the 8th had the tribes not submitted, as they eventually did.

7. The 8th and 9th were passed in negotiations which were most successfully brought to a close on the 10th, and peace was made with the following Patan tribes:—Hussunzaies, Chuggurzaies, and Akazaies, who, in all, can collect 9,000 to 10,000 fighting men.* Terms were also given to the Puryaree Syuds, whose property had already suffered considerably. I would here beg to pay a tribute to the tact, temper, and judgment displayed by the Commissioner, Major F. Pollock, who unceasingly laboured for the Government interests, and who, by his firmness in exacting what was due to the State, at once impressed the deputation with the necessity of an immediate compliance.

8. During the 9th, I moved up the 24th Punjab Infantry to assist in the protection of my park of commissariat stores at "Muchaie Gully"—a vale just below the plateau of the same name:—and on the same day Lieutenant-Colonel E. Atlay, Commanding Royal Artillery, succeeded in bringing up two elephants to the peak, a proof that, had it been necessary, I could have brought my Elephant Battery into action at an altitude of ten thousand feet above the sea.

9. During the progress of negotiations, a few flags belonging to the Swattees of "Tahkote" were visible on a distant point of the mountain, and their presence gave the troops high hopes of a future encounter. The flags, however, disappeared as soon as the Swattees found that, consequent on their powerful allies—the Patans—having concluded terms with us, the chance of opposing our troops with success was destroyed.

10. The 11th and 12th were passed in the withdrawal of the troops and commissariat stores to the camp at Munna-ka-Dunna. This movement was conducted with the strictest precision and regularity; not a shot was fired, nor was any loss incurred as long as the force was moving in Patan lands. The deputation of the tribes accompanied the troops and remained from that time to this, faithful and true to their engagements and honour. On approaching, however, to within a mile of the camp of "Munna-ka Dunna," an attack was made on the rear guard of the 2nd Goorkha Regiment by some of the followers of the "Puryaree" Syuds. The guard under the command of that gallant young soldier, Lieutenant Arthur Battye, turned upon them, and inflicted a loss of two killed and several wounded, without any casualty on our side. Excepting this incident and the cowardly wounding, during the night, a servant of the commissariat in the forest below "Chittabut" by the same miscreants, nothing occurred to interrupt the evacuation of the Black Mountain.

11. On the 13th, the troops remained at "Munna-ka-Dunna," resting, after their late severe work, in piquet and road making, and the Commissioner peremptorily called on the Syuds (a community of divided proprietors and not a tribe) for reparation for the insult and breach of faith offered to the British Government, and for the cowardly assault on the camp follower. The chief offender, Kudrut Shah, sent his son into camp to crave forgiveness. He was summoned to attend himself, and his son was sent to inform him that unless he came in, troops would proceed to exact retribution.

12. On the morning of the 14th, the 1-6th Foot, the 3rd Sikh Infantry, and Peshawur

Mountain Battery, with a body of levies under command of Brigadier-General Vaughan, C.B., occupied a most difficult and rugged spur of the mountain overlooking the offending villages. In a few hours the ascending smoke announced that the work of destruction had been effected. At evening General Vaughan, C.B., withdrew his force, exchanging a few shots with the enemy, to my camp at "Chermung," in "Tikaree," to which place the Head Quarters and rest of the force had marched during the day. In recording the above day's work, I have to thank Brigadier-General Vaughan, C.B., for the skill, knowledge of hill fighting, and shrewd precaution he displayed in effecting a very difficult task, and one in which a false step would have produced disastrous results.

13. Before leaving the camp of "Munna-ka-Dunna," I detached four Native Regiments, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel C. H. Brownlow, C.B., to hold the village of "Koongullee" and the "Jalgully Pass," as I had, by marching to "Chermung," changed my line of communication. I shall have an opportunity of further explaining this in a subsequent report, when I treat of my operations in the valleys of the independent Swatees.

14. In concluding this section of my report, descriptive of the subjugation of the Patan tribes of the Black Mountain, I would allude to a subject which gave the Commissioner and myself many days' anxious thought, I mean the possibility of being able, during our success against the tribes, to inflict a blow on the Hindustanee Wahabee colony, which, since its expulsion from Bonair, had moved north, and was known to be at this time in an unsettled state: for awhile at "Beah," on the right bank of the Indus, and then again at "Judbaie," on this side of the river. Before seeing the country where the colony is at present resting (for it has not as yet obtained a permanent footing there), I had hopes of succeeding in the removal of this standing menace to the peace of the border, but I found that such an enterprise was not feasible. Had the Hindustanees combined with the Patan tribes (as there was a fair chance at one time of their doing) to resist our troops, an opportunity of defeating them would have occurred. They could not, however, come to any agreement with the tribes, and the result was that when the Patans sued for peace, the Hindustanees began to re-cross the river. To have sent a column against them was impossible, owing to the inaccessible nature of the glens near the Indus where they were encamped, and when terms had been given to the tribes to have attempted an attack would have been a breach of our engagement. As it is, these Patans will not give the Hindustanees an asylum, having in fact refused to do so; and to have made their expulsion one of the terms of peace with the Chug-gurzaies would, in the opinion of the Commissioner and myself, have resulted in prolonging the war without any advantage, since we had not the means of cutting off the retreat of these men.

15. I believe that the Colony is near its end, and that by diplomacy it may be got rid of altogether; for the prestige of the Hindustanees is lost among these tribes, since the former refused their assistance against our troops on the Black Mountain.

SIR,

IN my last despatch I had the honour to report, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the close of operations against the Patan tribes of the Black Mountain, and the signal punishment of the Puryaree Syuds. On the 14th of October, the Hazara Field Force was encamped at Chermung, in the Tikaree Valley. Four native regiments,* under Lieutenant-Colonel C. H. Brownlow, C.B., had been detached from the camp at "Munna-ka-Dunna" to occupy the village of "Koongullee," and the "Jalgully Pass." His Highness the Maharajah of Cashmeer's Dograh Regiments being sent back from the Pass to the Camp at "Oogie." On the evening of the 14th, I opened communications with Lieutenant-Colonel C. H. Brownlow, who, under my orders, had commenced improving the rugged path through the Pass. In two days Lieutenant W. Broadfoot, R. E., Assistant Field Engineer, had, with the working parties of the Native Regiments, made a fairly good road.

2. On the 15th, I marched to the village of Tikaree, the most open part of the valley of that name, and during the day two squadrons of the 16th Bengal Cavalry, under the command of Captain R. Topham, joined me from Jalgully. I would here beg to advert to the excellent conduct of the soldiers, both British and Native, of the force, and to which I know the Commissioner will bear ample testimony. On my entering the valleys of the independent Swatees, I announced that the people of these districts were to be treated as friends by the troops; that they had submitted as suppliants to the British Government; that a fine of Rs. 12,000 had been imposed on them for their unprovoked attack upon our detachment in the Agrore Valley; that all supplies of food and forage were to be paid for; and that no plundering could be allowed. As his Excellency is aware, the transition from war to peace in the feelings of native soldiers is no easy process; but I can state in proof of the discipline of this force that not a complaint was made, nor a single man punished from the time the force left the camp at "Oogie" on the 3rd and returned on the 22nd of October.

3. The 16th was spent in making a road from "Tikaree" to a village "Maidan," in the "Nundehear Valley," and during the day the 1st Goorkha Regiment, from the "Jalgully Pass," and a squadron of the 16th Bengal Cavalry from "Tikaree," were posted at the village of "Chermung" to keep open my line of communication when I advanced into the "Nundehear Valley."

4. On the 17th the force marched to "Maidan," the road a very difficult one, running over the "Shubora" spur, which had been made passable under the directions of Lieutenant W. B. Holmes, R. E., Field Engineer.

5. The 17th and 18th were passed in making reconnoissances towards the Takotee country, which Major C. C. Johnson, Assistant Quartermaster-General, conducted as far as the top of the "Dubrai Pass," seven miles from camp. The troops were employed in improving the road up the

mountain, in case I should decide to move troops in that direction—a contingency which engaged the attention of the Commissioner and myself for some time. On the occupation of the "Dubrai" Pass by the troops, Habeeb Gool Sahibzada, of "Paimal," the Akhoond of this part of the border, tendered his allegiance to the Deputy Commissioner, and several of the "Takotee" villages surrendered. No enemy appeared in sight, and all the distant villages seemed to be deserted. It was also reported on reliable authority, that Shaul Khan, of Takotee, had fled across the Indus on the approach of the force towards the Nundehar Valley. The country beyond the "Dubrai" Pass was the most difficult that could be imagined; the lands of the Takotees were poor, their crops scanty, and unlike the districts of "Tikaree" and "Nundehar." No valleys were visible: their principal lands are said to be on the right bank of the Indus. I contemplated at one time a military raid with the object of burning Takotee, a village of two hundred houses on the left bank of the Indus, but a nearer view of the country from the "Dubrai" Pass determined me not to attempt it. Considering the Takotees had fled, taking refuge on the Sukeesar Mountain, beyond the Indus, and to reach them would have involved the extension of my military operations at least ten days, the Commissioner and myself concurred in the opinion that it was neither expedient, necessary, nor advisable to prolong the march of the force to the banks of the Indus. In this decision there were other political considerations at stake, which Major Pollock will no doubt explain in his communications to the Government.

6. The force subsequently made the following marches, and reached camp "Oogie," in Agrore, on the 22nd of October, having been absent from their tents and baggage since the 3rd:—

7. In connection with this military demonstration through the countries* of the independent Swatee tribes, I would record that the conduct of the inhabitants was uniformly good, and that the Swatee deputations remained faithful to their agreements. Supplies were not brought into camp readily, owing to most of the people having left their homes through fear: confidence was, however, partially restored ere we left the country. One incident, however, occurred, the act of an individual, which it was necessary to notice to prevent the prestige of our proceedings being injured. As the rear guard late on the evening passed along, a shot was fired at or over it. The Commissioner summoned the head men of the village near the spot where the insult was offered, and making prisoners of them, exacted a fine of Rs. 500, or the production of the culprit. The fine has been paid.

8. Having detailed the daily operations performed by the Hazara Field Force, I would venture to point out the political results of the campaign. Three Patan and three Swatee tribes have been brought into submission. The Puryaree Syuds have been signally punished, and Guffoor Khan, of Tikaree, one of the foremost, has been forced to sue for peace. The independent Swatees have been

made to pay Rs. 12,000 to the British Government for their misconduct, and Hubeeb Gool, the Sahibzada of Paimal—a man held in great veneration—has paid his respects to the Commissioner, a very significant fact, showing that the people felt that they could no longer resist our arms.

9. The force traversed eighty miles of hill country, through which it had to make its own roads and carry its own supplies; and on each occasion that a shot was fired, or an insult offered, immediate punishment was inflicted on the offenders. By the occupation of the strongholds of the Patan tribes of the Black Mountain, and the passage of our troops through the valleys of the independent Swatee tribes, the British Government has shown its ability and power to vindicate its honour; and I believe that late events will leave a lasting impression, not only on the Patans Cis-Indus, but also on their clansmen residing on the Eusufzaie border.

10. One other circumstance I would note, namely, the mobility displayed on this occasion by our British Regiments, and their capability to partake most efficiently in hill campaigning. Nothing could exceed the high spirit and energy displayed by both the Royal Artillery and British Infantry. With the exception of one blanket carried for each man, they fared as the Native troops did; and their food did not actually require more carriage than that of the Native troops. The men, too, of the Royal Artillery evinced their aptitude to adapt themselves to duties quite novel to them. The horse artillerymen of D Battery, F Brigade, packed and unpacked their guns on elephants, and the gunners of No. 2 Battery, 24th Brigade, led and tended the mules carrying the mortars. From the day I started not a soldier, either British or Native, made a complaint, but cheerfully underwent all the hardships, labour, and exposure incidental to our bivouac.

11. It is impossible to estimate the loss of the enemy, but I feel confidence in stating, and in this opinion the Political Officer agrees with me, that since the commencement of hostilities in August last up to the end of the campaign, their loss has been considerable.

12. In closing these reports of the expedition of 1868 against the Patan tribes of the Black Mountain and the independent Swatee tribes of the valleys of "Tikaree," "Nundehar," and "Darshhee," I beg to bring the names of the following officers to the notice of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief:—

I.—I have first to acknowledge the co-operation and unvaried assistance I have received throughout this hill campaign from Brigadier-Generals R. O. Bright, and J. L. Vaughan, C.B. As the Colonel of that fine regiment, the 19th Foot, Brigadier-General Bright set an example of disinterestedness and indifference to hardship and discomfort that proved most useful to me in the organization of the force. Brigadier-General Vaughan's knowledge and intimate acquaintance with hill warfare made me confident at all times that his brigade would be ably conducted, and his advice was, on several occasions, most useful to me:

II.—The work performed since the formation of the Hazara Field Force by Majors J. Morland and C. C. Johnson, respectively Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, has been very severe, and I can state, for his Excellency's information, that there has not been a single misdirection of orders, or any confusion in the many intricate details these officers have had to control. They have both evinced great zeal, much knowledge, and a peculiar aptitude for the responsible appointments they held.

III.—As his Excellency is aware, the health of the men and consequent safety of a force in a hill campaign, must mainly depend upon the excellence of its carriage and commissariat arrangements. No force ever took the field so well and skilfully provided as this one, and this result was entirely due to the exertions and ability of Lieutenant-Colonel A. D. Dickens, Assistant Commissary-General, whose exertions I beg thus publicly to acknowledge.

IV.—Much of the success of the late expedition is due to the talents and labours of Lieutenant-Colonel H. C. Johnstone, of the Survey Department, whose services were fortunately placed at my disposal. I would refer to the remarkable correctness of the sketch map this officer prepared from native information before we entered the hills. Lieutenant-Colonel Johnstone served in the "Cabul" Kheyl and Mahsood Wuzereee Expeditions, and also at Umbeyla. I trust this occasion may be availed of to reward this most devoted and excellent public servant.

V.—Lieutenant-Colonel E. Atlay commanded the Artillery of the Hazara Field Force, and the manner in which the elephant and mortar batteries were equipped reflects the highest credit on this officer.

VI.—In connection with this campaign, I have to mention the name of Lieutenant-Colonel O. E. Rothney, commanding the 5th Goorkha Regiment. This officer commanded in this valley during the first disturbances in August up to the end of September. He evinced in this difficult position great judgment and discretion, particularly in his attack on the enemy on the 12th August. On the force moving into the hills, I considered it my duty, in the interests of the public service, to leave him in command of the camp at "Oogie," and I trust this will not in any way be allowed to affect his professional prospects.

VII.—I have every reason to be satisfied with the rapidity with which the field telegraph line was constructed and worked by Lieutenant J. A. Armstrong, R.E., Assistant Field Engineer.

VIII.—The arrangements of the Medical Department were efficiently completed by Deputy Inspector-General of Hos-

pitals G. E. Morton, and I have to acknowledge the zeal and activity displayed on all occasions by Captain Holmes, R.E.

IX.—In conclusion of my recommendations in favour of the staff of this force, I beg to bring to his Excellency's notice Major W. Paget, my Aide-de-Camp, who has from the very commencement of hostilities, rendered me great assistance. This officer bears a high character in the Punjab Frontier Force (in which he has served twenty-years), for intelligence and devotion to his duties.

13. I append a list of officers commanding batteries and regiments, with remarks attached significant of their merits, and the opportunity their men have had of doing service during this command.

14. I transmit, for the perusal and consideration of his Excellency, the reports and commendations of Brigadier-Generals Bright and Vaughan, and Lieutenant-Colonel Atlay.

15. From the commencement to the termination of hostilities, I have been in perfect accord with Major Pollock, the Chief Political Officer, and his Deputy, Captain Ommanney, and again I beg to record my thanks to him for his co-operation.

16. I have to acknowledge the support and encouragement I have invariably received at his Excellency's hands during the time I have had the honour to hold my present responsible post.

ANNEXURE IV.

(From Brigadier-General R. O. Bright, Commanding No. 1 Brigade, to the Assistant Adjutant-General, Hazara Field Force.)

Camp Oogie,
22nd October, 1868.

SIR,

IN compliance with the instructions received, I have the honour to submit the following report of the proceedings of the brigade I have the honour to command during the operations against the hill tribes on the Black Mountain from the 3rd to the 14th instant.

At day-break on the morning of the 3rd, I left this camp with force as per margin,* proceeding towards Koongullee village, situated on the spur of that name leading up to the crest of the Black Mountain.

The 2nd Brigade preceded me, and on its diverging from my route on nearing the village of Deboree, I covered the advance with the 20th Punjab Infantry.

I experienced no opposition until the skirmishers reached the village of Koongullee, when the enemy began to collect on a height higher up, and commanding it, showing flags, yelling, and firing matchlocks.

Although I had received no instructions to proceed further, I did not think it prudent, in the face of these hostile demonstrations, to remain inactive. It would, I considered, have given them confidence, or at all events would have afforded them time to have assembled in large numbers, which, up to that time, they had evidently not done. I therefore continued the advance, the enemy retiring before the line of skirmishers, and firing as we advanced, but fortunately without effect.

I continued driving them thus before me until the position of "Munna-ka-Dunna" was reached, where, finding it easily defensible, I determined to remain for the night.

Munna-ka-Dunna is a shoulder of the Koon-gullee spur, rising to a point in the centre, from which the ground descends to a small plateau, and then dips again at a steep angle until it joins a narrow and nearly level ledge connecting it with the continuation of the ascent. The right of the ridge was very steep and broken, and thickly wooded. The high point in the centre was occupied by the 20th Punjab Native Infantry under Lieutenant-Colonel Brownlow, C.B., and the small plateau beneath was held by strong piquets from that regiment. The Hazara Mountain Battery was on the ridge in rear, facing the village of Shah-toot, on the right rear of the peak the Billankote spur joins the Koongullee spur. This approach was held by the 1st Goorkhas under Major Rawlins, with Her Majesty's 1-19th in support of them and of the guns.

We reached Munna-ka-Dunna about mid-day, and had not halted there long before the enemy began to fire on the advanced piquets from the wooded and broken ground on the right flank. To assist in dislodging them, I sent some marksmen of the 19th under Lieutenant Bennet, Musketry Instructor. The superior range of the Enfields, and the good practice of the men, had a good effect.

As dusk approached the enemy again commenced firing, and a little before night-fall made a really

determined attack on the advanced piquets, the steep descent of the ground from that point favouring them. The attack was gallantly repulsed. From the increasing boldness of the enemy I was led to suppose that, now having ascertained our line of approach, they were collecting in numbers, and really intended to dispute our advance in earnest. I therefore informed the Major-General of the state of affairs, and requested that one of the two regiments belonging to No. 1 Brigade, which had hitherto been held in reserve, might be sent to join me. The 5th Goorkhas, under Major Ciose, accordingly reached me about midnight. In the meantime I reinforced Colonel Brownlow by sending two guns of the Mountain Battery to the point held by his regiment, supported by four Companies of the 19th. The guns did good service, as, by shelling the ridge in front of the piquet, the enemy were prevented from forming in force; and although some demonstrations of a renewed attack were made, none of a really determined character took place. They probably had suffered severely in their first attempt, but from their invariable custom of carrying off their dead it is extremely difficult to form any idea of what their loss actually was.

Our loss was two killed and six wounded. On the following morning,* on the arrival of the Major-General, arrangements were made for continuing the advance. The remaining Regiment of the Brigade, the 2nd Punjab Native Infantry, joined, and I was further reinforced by the Peshawur Mountain Battery. Two guns of the D Battery, F Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery, were placed in the post occupied by the advanced piquets. The enemy were at this time collected, apparently in considerable numbers, behind a knoll some little distance from where the ground in front began, as already described, again to ascend. They appeared to have erected a "sungah" there. There was another knoll nearer to us unoccupied, from which they had been driven the previous day by the Enfields' aid, and on which, during my advance, I purposed placing my mountain guns.

The Major-General having directed a heavy fire on the enemy's position, I commenced my advance under cover of it.

The 1st Goorkhas were on this occasion in front, followed by the two Batteries of Mountain Guns, the 20th and the 19th, in the order named, the remaining two regiments in reserve. Had the position held by the enemy been really a strong one, my intention was, in the first instance, to have opened a fire from the nearer knoll, leaving the 20th in support, and to have attacked with the 19th. No such necessity, however, arose. After one or two rounds the Goorkhas advanced, and the enemy precipitately retired from their position, which was merely a breastwork of fallen trees, by no means of a formidable description. They continued firing as they retired, but were eventually driven off in the direction of the Muchaie Peak. The roads to Chittabut and the Muchaie Peak diverged, and the regiment in advance with the batteries, in pursuit of the enemy, had overshot the junction. I therefore caused the Goorkhas to make a flank movement to their left, and moved the guns across by a small path to reach the road. The 20th covered this movement of the guns, and in the advance up the hill had two men wounded. The 1st Goorkhas had three, and the 5th one man wounded during the day. We reached the top of Chittabut about 3.30 P.M. The last part of the road was nearly impracticable, and I

regret to say two of the fine mules belonging to the Mountain Batteries were killed by falling down the precipice.

The ground on the summit of Chittabut Peak is surrounded by thickly-wooded ravines, and fully expecting that the enemy would not allow such a favourable opportunity of annoying us to escape, I made every preparation by throwing up breast-works, &c., to resist an attack. In this work two Companies of Sappers, who had been sent with us in the morning, afforded material assistance. The night, however, passed in quietness.

On the following morning* I received instructions from the Major-General, at about 10 A.M., to continue the advance and to occupy the crest of the Muchaie Mountain, the highest peak of the range. There had been great difficulty in procuring water, and the rations had been delayed in consequence of the badness of the roads, so, until the men could get their breakfast, I sent the 20th Punjab and the 5th Goorkhas to take possession of a hill which intervened between Chittabut and Muchaie, called "Doda," and from which the enemy had fired upon us the preceding evening. At noon I marched off the remainder of the force, and joined these two regiments, and proceeded towards Muchaie.

From Doda the road descends to the Muchaie Gully, flanked on each side by ravines, wooded and broken ground. After descending about a mile it opens out into a small level space divided by a low rocky ridge from the base of the Muchaie Mountain. The ravines and broken ground about the descent and plateau were held in considerable force by the enemy who, upon our appearing, opened a fire upon us. The fire of the mountain guns, however, which came into action by alternate batteries as we advanced, and the determined rush of the 20th, supported by the 5th Goorkhas, drove them off.

On reaching the rocky ridge at the end of the plateau, the 20th were halted with the 5th Goorkhas under cover, while I proceeded to make my arrangements for carrying the peak, in doing which I fully expected to meet strong opposition.

The ascent of the mountain is steep and rugged in the extreme. It could only be ascended with a narrow front, as the ground on the left is precipitous, and on the right thickly wooded. It altogether formed a most favourable position for defence.

Placing the batteries in rear of the rocky ridge, where the two leading regiments were halted, I commenced a fire on the peak and the wood on the right. I placed the 5th Goorkhas in immediate support of the 20th, and ordered the 1st Goorkhas to follow about one hundred yards in rear. The 19th I held in reserve, having left the 2nd Punjab Infantry at Doda for the protection of the baggage.

Such careful preparations I found to have been scarcely necessary, as the enemy continued his former tactics, retiring as we approached. With but few casualties the troops occupied the summit.

In the meantime the enemy, whom we had dislodged from the Gully, crept round the ravines in our rear, and commenced firing into a company of the 5th Goorkhas, whom in the advance I had kept back for the protection of the guns. One man was killed. I reinforced them with four Companies of the 19th, who soon drove them off.

I left a wing of Europeans with the Peshawur Mountain Battery, to hold the plateau, with orders to the former, on the arrival of the 2nd Punjab

Infantry, to follow up the hill. The right wing and the Hazara Mountain Battery I took up to re-form the rest of the force, who by this time had reached the crest.

I made the following disposition of the troops for the night:—The 20th Punjab Infantry and the 1st Goorkhas, with the Hazara Mountain Battery in the centre, on the peak itself; the 5th Goorkhas holding a more advanced and somewhat lower position; the 19th on a shoulder of the hill about 100 yards in rear of the peak.

The whole troops were employed while daylight lasted in improving the defences.

Our loss during the day had been 1 Goorkha killed and 2 wounded; of the 20th Punjab Infantry, 5 wounded.

The night was bitterly cold with snow and rain; for the troops who were without tents it was one of great discomfort. The enemy made no attack during the night beyond firing occasionally at the piquets.

My first object on the following morning was to search for water. On the preceding evening only a scanty supply had been found, and as I knew holding our present position was of great importance, I felt considerable anxiety on the point. The parties sent out were, fortunately, successful; a good spring was found on the eastern slope of the mountain beneath the shoulder occupied by the 19th. The supply was increased by opening fresh springs at the same spot, and by forming tanks, and eventually an ample supply for the whole force was obtained. Water was also found, but in small quantities, near the ground occupied by the 5th Goorkhas.

I reinforced the position held by that regiments in the morning by moving down the 1st Goorkha to them.

From this date until the 12th the force remained in the positions I have described undisturbed by the enemy, except by small parties of two or three creeping up under cover and firing at the pickets and sentries at night. The position of the 2nd Punjab Infantry on the plateau below the hill, from the nature of the ground, was most exposed to these attacks, and scarcely a night passed on which they had not a man killed or wounded. During the time the brigade occupied the position the troops were engaged in improving the defences and roads from one camp to the other, and in hutting themselves. The experience gained by the 19th in making hill roads during the summer months here came into play, and large parties were employed in making a practicable road for the mules to the watering place, until relieved from that duty by the Sappers. The way in which they huted themselves gave a further proof of the benefit they had derived by being employed on the working parties. In a single day they threw up shelter which would only have required little more labour to have afforded them protection from any kind of weather.

On the 12th, peace having been declared, the brigade moved back to Munna-ka-Dunna, and all active operations ceased.

It is now my pleasing duty to bring to the notice of the Major-General commanding, the extreme good conduct of the troops under my command during this expedition. I had never had an opportunity of seeing Native troops on active service before, and was much surprised at their extreme expertness in hill warfare.

The 20th Punjab Infantry, in all the operations, have exhibited a dash and gallantry most credit-

able to them, The intelligent skirmishing of the Goorkhas was especially remarked, and showed how highly useful these regiments are in a campaign over a rough and rugged country, such as that in which our operations have been carried on.

The 2nd Punjab Native Infantry I had no opportunity (owing to the shortness of the campaign) of giving a chance of showing to the front. They were employed, during the occupation of the peak, in incessant and most laborious escort duties on stores, &c. These they performed with the best possible spirit. Of the 19th Regiment, I can merely say I have every reason to be satisfied with them. Exposed to great variations of climate, a hot sun by day, and hard frosts at night, they stood the ordeal capitably, bearing the exposure without sickness, and the discomfort without a grumble. There can be no doubt of its high state of efficiency.

I would beg to bring prominently to the Major-General's notice the Commanding Officers of the Regiments and Batteries composing the brigade under my command.

To Colonel Brownlow, C.B., I am especially indebted. His great experience in hill warfare enabled him to afford me most valuable advice and assistance, of which I freely availed myself. Lieutenant-Colonel Chippindall exhibited, as he always does when work is to be done, the most untiring energy and zeal.

Major Rawlins and Major Close, commanding the 1st and 5th Goorkhas, also afforded me every support.

Captain Tyndall, Commanding 2nd Punjab Native Infantry, carried out the duties that devolved upon him entirely to my satisfaction.

Major DeBude, Commanding the Hazara Mountain Battery, has been so long known in hill warfare as an able Commander of his admirably equipped and useful corps, that any remark is almost superfluous: it is sufficient to say that he handled it in his usual gallant and judicious manner.

Captain Elliot, commanding Peshawur Mountain Battery, was also attached to me during the advance on Chittabut and Muchaie; he convinced me that he is a very smart and intelligent officer.

It gives me much pleasure to be able to report in equally favourable terms of the Staff Officers of the Brigade.

Captain Evans, of the 19th, whom I recommended for the post from my remembrance of the admirable way he had formerly performed the duties of Adjutant, fully answered my expectations.

Lieutenant Buller, of the 91st Regiment, Assistant Quartermaster-General, attached to the brigade, was most zealous in the performance of his duties.

Lieutenant Brind, 19th Regiment, acted as my Orderly Officer, and by his willingness and intelligence afforded material assistance.

ANNEXURE V.

(From Brigadier-General J. L. Vaughan, C.B.,

SIR, *Camp Oogie, 22nd October, 1868.*

IN compliance with the instructions contained in your Memorandum of the 19th instant, I have the honour to make the following report of the proceedings of No. 2 Brigade, consisting of the troops (as per margin)* between the 3rd and 14th October inclusive.

2. On the morning of the 3rd October the following troops from the brigade proceeded under directions received from the Major-General Commanding to attack the heights to the right of the Koongullee Pass:—

Peshawur Mountain Battery.
1-6th Royal Regiment.
2nd Goorkha Regiment, Sirmoor Rifles,
3rd Sikh Infantry.

3. The column advanced by the direct road from Oogie as far as the village of Bagrian, situated at the foot of one of the spurs of the Kubbul Mountain. At this village I deemed it expedient to halt the 1-6th Royal Regiment and the Peshawur Mountain Battery, the former in case it might be advisable to aid the direct attack on the heights by a flank movement along the crest of the Kubbul, the latter until I should see whether the resistance made to the direct attack made it necessary to take the guns into the very difficult ground which lay between Bagrian and the foot of the heights. The remaining two Infantry Regiments were then advanced to the lower slopes of the Kiarkote Mountain, the 2nd Goorkha Regiment leading in skirmishing order, supported by the 3rd Sikhs. When the requisite dispositions were completed, these two regiments received the orders to advance up the hill, which they did with the greatest spirit. The advance met with no opposition further than a few shots at long range from the enemy, which were not returned, and crowned the Kiarkote Mountain by 11-30 A.M. The ground over which the troops passed was extremely rough and steep, and the mountain was far higher and more formidable than previous accounts and a distant view had led me to suppose. From the top of the Kiarkote the Valley of Tikaree lay exposed to view, and the Jalgully Pass into Tikaree was completely commanded.

4. According to previous arrangement the Kiarkote Mountain was occupied in the course of the afternoon by the levies, and the troops then descended from Kiarkote and from the Bagrian spur respectively, and bivouacked for the night at the village of Kilagaie, preparatory to the ascent of the Black Mountain the following day, by way of the Sumbulboot spur.

At Kilagaie the remainder of the brigade as per margin joined,† and the remaining daylight was occupied in deciding on, and reconnoitering the road between Kilagaie and the foot of the Sumbul-

boot spur. This duty was most ably and resolutely performed by Lieutenant Lockhart, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General attached to the brigade, who at much personal risk reconnoitered for some distance beyond the village of Belian up the spur, and brought me most important information. The road was prepared, when the moon rose, by Lieutenant Rowcroft, R.E., and a party of the Sappers and Miners, whose exertions were very creditable.

5. At 2 A.M. on the morning of the 4th instant, I received orders from the Major-General Commanding, countermanding the orders for the advance of the brigade by the Sumbulboot spur to the crest of the mountain, and directing it to proceed at once to join him at Koongullee, in view to act in support of No. 1 Brigade. The two leading regiments and Peshawur Mountain Battery accordingly reached Koongullee at day-light, and were immediately advanced to Munna-ka-Dunna, where the whole brigade was collected by 2 P.M. On the subsequent advance of No. 1 Brigade from Munna-ka-Dunna to the Chittabut Peak, the Peshawur Mountain Battery was temporarily attached to it, and withdrawn from my command; the 2nd Goorkha Regiment and 3rd Sikh were pushed forward about a mile to a position afterwards known as the "Knolls," in view to keep open the communication between Chittabut and Munna-ka-Dunna, and the remainder of the brigade with Brigade Head-Quarters was established at Munna-ka-Dunna.

6. On the 5th, the 2nd Goorkhas was advanced to the Chittabut Peak to keep open the communications with the 1st Brigade which had occupied the Muchaie Peak and plateau, and the regiment continued to occupy this important post on the crest of the mountain until the troops were finally withdrawn.

7. On the morning of the 7th of October, Brigade Head-Quarters with 2-24th Royal Artillery (Mortar Battery), and the 1-6th Royal Regiment were advanced from Munna-ka-Dunna to the Doda Peak—an intermediate peak between those of Chittabut and Muchaie. The disposition of the brigade was there as follows:—

At Doda Peak, Brigade Head-Quarters
2-24th Royal Artillery, and 1-6th Royal
Regiments.

At Chittabut, 2nd Goorkha Regiment.

At the Knolls, 3rd Sikh Infantry.

At the Munna-ka-Dunna, 4th Goorkha
Regiment.

At Munna-ka-Dunna, 24th Regiment,
Punjab Infantry.

8. On the evening of the 8th instant, I received orders to reinforce temporarily the troops of the 1st Brigade at Muchaie plateau with two Companies of the 1-6th Royal Regiment, and to call up the 24th Punjab Infantry from Munna-ka-Dunna to the plateau the following morning. No further change was made in the disposition of the brigade until the 12th instant, when the withdrawal of the force from the crest of the mountain commenced.

9. The arrangements for the withdrawal as far as regarded No. 2 Brigade, were as follows, and were made under my personal superintendence:—The 1-6th Royal Regiment covered the retirement of the whole force from Doda to the Chittabut Peak, where the duty was taken up by the Peshawur Mountain Battery and 2nd Goorkha Regiment, as far as the Knolls, which continued to be held by the 3rd Sikhs. Nothing could have been steadier or more satisfactory than the way in which the

retirement was effected throughout. A few shots were fired at the rear of the 2nd Goorkha Regiment just before reaching the Knolls, but a small party of the regiment, under Lieutenant Battye, effectually covered the retirement and prevented further annoyance. Late in the afternoon, the 3rd Sikhs were withdrawn from the Knolls, and the whole force (No. 2 Brigade) was then concentrated on the head of the Biluncote spur at the position of Munna-ka-Dunna.

10. On the 14th instant a flying column from the brigade, composed as follows, was detailed for the duty of punishing the Puraree villages on the spur of the Black Mountain of that name, viz.:—

Peshawur Mountain Battery.

1-6th Royal Regiment.

3rd Sikh Infantry.

4th Goorkha Regiment.

The column marched at 6 A.M. for the village of Biluncote, about one mile from the camp at Munna-ka-Dunna, and on arrival the following arrangements were made:—the advance was composed of the 4th Goorkha Regiment and Peshawur Mountain Battery, supported by two Companies of the 1-6th Royal Regiment, and the 3rd Sikh Infantry. The remainder of the 1-6th Royal Regiment was left in position below Biluncote, together with the Hazara Mountain Battery (which was placed under my orders for the day); in view to cover the advanced troops during the descent into the deep intervening ravine, and the ascent of the steep face of the opposite (Puraree) spur as well as their eventual withdrawal over the same ground when the object in view should have been effected. The crest of the Puraree spur was gained without opposition after a very laborious ascent, and, at the request of Captain Ommaney, the Deputy Commissioner of Hazara, who accompanied the force as Political Officer, I then placed the two howitzers of the Peshawur Mountain Battery in a position to cover and command the Puraree village of Gurhee and adjoining hamlets, whilst the Police and Levies should burn them, the main body of the troops in the meantime holding the crest of the spur. The burning of the village was effected with very slight opposition, and the proceedings of Captain Ommaney were completely protected by the howitzers, and by the intelligent co-operation of Captain Chambers, 3rd Sikh Infantry, with two Companies of that regiment. When all that Captain Ommaney desired had been effected, the troops were leisurely withdrawn to the camp at Chermung by the ravine which divides the Puraree and Biluncote spurs from the great Gidghoree spur of the Black Mountain. A few men watched the march of the column from the summit of the Gidghoree spur, but the movement was completely covered by the able disposition of a Company of the 1-6th Royal Regiment detached by my orders from the reserve at Biluncote under Captain C. Wilson of that regiment, and the enemy did not attempt to oppose us. This completes the record of the proceedings of No. 2 Brigade up to the 14th instant.

11. Although the 2nd Brigade has from circumstances been little engaged with the enemy, I feel sure that the arduous duties it performed between the 3rd and 14th instant will not be overlooked by the Major-General Commanding. The best spirit has animated all ranks, whether European or Native. The troops have borne the coldness of the nights, and the severe piquet and other duties not merely with patience, but with the utmost cheerfulness. The only impatience they have displayed has been to engage the enemy.

I cannot speak too highly of their conduct and exertions.

12. Distributed as the brigade has been since the 4th instant in a number of detached posts, almost all Commanding Officers have at one time or other been in exercise of independent commands. Lieutenant-Colonel Cave, Commanding the 24th Regiment, Punjab Infantry, assumed command at the Muchaie plateau at a time when the continued fire brought by the enemy upon the more exposed sentries was beginning to be very harassing. His excellent arrangements soon checked the annoyance, and I cannot let the opportunity pass of expressing my repeated obligations to this officer for the ready way in which he not only met, but often anticipated my wishes throughout the service. Lieutenant-Colonel McPherson, V.C., in command of the 2nd Goorkha Regiment at the post of Chittabut, relieved me of all anxiety on account of that post; whilst the ready and skilful way in which his regiment huted itself attracted the admiration of all who saw it. To Lieutenant-Colonel Osborne, Commanding 1-6th Royal Regiment, the next senior officer to myself in the brigade, I am much indebted for the uniform and ready assistance he rendered on all occasions, and I would ask the Major-General's attention to the remarkable healthy condition of the 1-6th Royal Regiment, which I think is the best proof both of the excellence of Lieutenant-Colonel Osborne's regimental arrangements and of the high spirit by which the men were themselves actuated, and which has prevented them succumbing to hardships of no common nature. On the 14th instant, there were no men of the regiment sick, and but eight men were sent in to Oogie during the twelve days' operations.

13. To Major Mocatta, Commanding 3rd Seikhs, who commanded at the "Knolls" throughout the operations, and to Major Tytler, V.C., Commanding the 4th Goorkha Regiment, my best acknowledgments are also due for the uniformly zealous and efficient support I received from them. Captain Minto Elliot's service at the head of the Peshawur Mountain Battery will be more properly reported upon by the Brigadier-General Commanding No. 1 Brigade, to which the battery was attached from the 4th to the 11th instant; but I must express my admiration of the way in which he carried his battery over the very difficult ground traversed by the column on the 14th instant.

14. Captain Jackson's Mortar Battery (2-24th Royal Artillery) was not brought into prominent use, but though only organized for the present service, it never delayed the march of the column for an instant—no slight proof of the state of efficiency to which the battery has already been brought under great difficulties.

15. My obligations to Captain Cockburn, 1-6th Royal Regiment, Major of Brigade, during and before the period under report have been great, and I trust his name may be brought to the favourable notice of the Commander-in-Chief as a Staff Officer of the highest efficiency.

16. I have already noticed the resolute way in which the road by the Sumbulboot spur was reconnoitered by Lieutenant Lockhart, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, on the evening of the 3rd instant. His services have been equally valuable throughout the period under report, and I hope will be favourably mentioned by the Major-General Commanding.

17. Captain Graham, Deputy Assistant Commissary-General, attached to the brigade, has made excellent arrangements throughout, and his Department has been conducted with as much regularity during the period under report as if the troops had been in quarters.

18. Lieutenant MacPherson, 3rd Punjab Cavalry (on privilege leave from this regiment), has given me every satisfaction as Orderly Officer, and his services have been most useful.

19. Lieutenant Rowcroft, R.E., Assistant Field Engineer, attached to No. 2 Brigade, rendered constant and most valuable service, and directed the labours of the Company of Sappers and Miners (No. 2), under Lieutenant Murphy, R.E., which were most valuable to the brigade.

Camp Oogie, October 22, 1868.*

SIR,
I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of Major General A. Wilde, C.B., C.S.I., the operations of the Royal Artillery of the Hazara Field Force under my command, as marginally noted,* since leaving this camp on the 3rd of October, 1868.

2. At 4 A.M., on the 3rd of October, the whole of the Royal Artillery of the Force was assembled at the village of Munchoora, about one mile from Oogie, and was detailed as follows:—

The Peshawur Mountain Battery, to the 2nd Brigade under Brigadier-General Vaughan, C.B;

The Hazara Mountain Battery, to the 1st Brigade under command of Brigadier General Bright.

D. Battery, F. Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery, with 4 9-pounder guns and 2 24-pounder howitzers on elephants, with the reserve;

A half-battery of 2nd Battery, 24th Brigade, Royal Artillery, with mortars on mules, also with the reserve, under the immediate command of Major-General Wilde, C.B., C.S.I. The other half-battery, 2-24th Royal Artillery, was left near Pumbul Gully, about two

Total 18 pieces of ordnance, with 120 rockets attached to 2nd Battery, 24th Brigade, Royal Artillery.

miles from Munchoora, with two Native Regiments, awaiting the return of the 2nd Brigade, after crowning the heights on the Kubbul spur.

3. The Batteries were not engaged until the night of the 3rd, when the Hazara Mountain Battery was employed in assisting the advance piquets of the 1st Brigade, which had proceeded as far as Munna-ka-Dunna in repelling a night attack of the enemy; and a fire was kept up on the ridge leading to the enemy's breast-work with apparently good effect.

4. On the morning of the 4th October, the 2nd Brigade having re-joined Head-Quarters at the village of Koongullee, the whole of the Artillery of the force was collected at Munna-ka-Dunna by 10 A.M. At 11 A.M. the centre division of D Battery, F Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery, under Lieutenant Higginson, and under the personal superintendence of Lieutenant-Colonel Renny, V.C., commanding the Battery, came into action on a small plateau, on the ground occupied during the night by the advance piquet of the 1st Brigade, to cover the advance of the brigade against Sungas erected on a knoll about 1,000 yards in front of our position. Some excellent practice was made, from the effects of which the enemy were driven out of their defences previous to the arrival of the attacking column. A few rockets were fired from the same position by a detachment of 2nd Battery, 24th Brigade, Royal Artillery, under Lieutenant E. A. Wilson. These being shot rockets were not found of great use on this occasion, and the fire was shortly discontinued.

5. The Peshawur and Hazara Mountain Batteries, under the command of Captain Elliot and Major De Bude, respectively, accompanied the advance to the attack of the Sunga, and covered the column in its further progress to the summit of Chittabut, on the crest of the Black Mountain, where these two batteries bivouacked during the night; D Battery, F Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery, and the Mountain Mortar Battery, remained at Munna-ka-Dunna.

6. On the morning of the 5th, the two Mountain Batteries again proceeded to support the advance from Chittabut to the Muchaie Peak, when both batteries materially assisted by the precision of their fire in dislodging the enemy from pine forests on the flank of the line of march, and finally by clearing the summit of the mountain before the infantry assaulted.

7. The small loss sustained by the attacking column on the 4th and 5th is, I believe, attributable in a great measure, to the accurate and powerful fire of the three batteries above referred to.

8. Since the 5th instant, no battery has been engaged. On the 14th, the Peshawur Mountain Battery was detached with a flying column under Brigadier-General Vaughan, C.B., to cover the burning of the villages of Kudrut Shah.

9. Two elephants of the Elephant Battery were brought up the Muchaie Peak, and no accident occurred to them, though they went over many very dangerous and difficult places.

10. Though the nature of the operations has not admitted of the extensive use of artillery under

my command, I feel myself bound to bring to the Major-General's notice the zeal and intelligence displayed by the Officers in command of D Battery, F Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery and 2nd Battery, 24th Brigade, Royal Artillery. Lieutenant-Colonel Renny, V.C., and Captain Jackson, in bringing their batteries to the front, under many and great disadvantages, a battery of Horse Artillery suddenly converted into an Elephant Battery has much to contend with in the way of hard work, in mounting and dismounting its guns and carriages, and in adapting itself to the necessities of mountain warfare, so opposed to its antecedents; and I consider the greatest credit is due to Lieutenant-Colonel Renny, V.C., and the Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers and men under his command.

11. Captain Jackson arrived at Rawul Pindee with his men only, and having very inferior mules, and men totally new to the work, has managed to keep his battery well to the front over some very difficult country. When it is remembered that less than two months ago the battery possessed neither mortars nor mules, I feel sure the Major-General will consider great credit due to Captain Jackson and his Officers; Non-Commissioned Officers and men.

12. The two Mountain Batteries of the Punjab Frontier Force have now, as they have ever, done most excellent service, and their perfectly workmanlike equipment and accurate practice reflect the greatest credit on Captain De Bude and Captain Elliot, and the Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and men under their command. The general excellencies of these two batteries are better known to the Major-General than they are to me, as they have been so long under his immediate command; but I feel it my duty, as commanding the Artillery of this force to record my highest approval of the effective condition of these two batteries.

13. To Major Hughes, late commanding Peshawur Mountain Battery, under whom the battery attained such excellence, my thanks are especially due for his zealous assistance as my Orderly Officer, and for the help he rendered in organizing the Mountain Mortar Battery.

14. Lieutenant R. M. Stewart, Adjutant of the Royal Artillery, has been from the beginning of the greatest service to me, and is an Officer of great merit and promise.

15. In conclusion I beg to bring to the notice of the Major-General the active exertions of Mr. McDermott, Deputy Assistant Commissary of Ordnance, in charge of the Field Park, and his subordinates. My thanks are also due on this head to Major Simeon, who succeeded me in command of the Royal Artillery at Rawul Pindee, and was mainly instrumental in getting the stores and ammunition pushed on to Abbottabad, when the establishments at Rawul Pindee were much too small for the hard work required of them.

No candidate will be admitted who does not obtain at least two-thirds of the full number of marks in the two first-named subjects, and three-fifths of the full number, either for practical shipbuilding or marine engineering.

The last four subjects, although counting in the competition, will not be considered obligatory.

The candidates who may be selected will be treated, while attached to the school, in all respects as the Admiralty pupils; they will receive wages the same as dockyard apprentices, commencing at 1s. 6d. per day for six days per week for first year, and increasing yearly 3d. per day till it reaches 2s. per day; and in addition a subsistence allowance of 3s. per day for seven days per week while away from their homes, either at the school or in the dockyards.

Seven months of each year—viz., from October till May—will be devoted to study at the school, and the remaining five months to actual work and the acquirement of practical knowledge in the dockyards.

It is to be understood that the Admiralty make no engagements to employ these pupils after the completion of their course of study; and the must rely on their own worth as educated naval architects for obtaining employment in their subsequent career.
