The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is provided that the following persons are required to register British ships, and shall be deemed to be Registrars for the purpose of that Act (that is to say) at any port or place approved by the Commissioners of Customs for the registry of ships within the limits of the charter, but not under the government of the East India Company, and at which no Custom-house is established, the Collector of Duties, together with the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other person administering the Government; and whereas by "The Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869," it is provided that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to declare, with respect to the British possession mentioned in the Order, the description of persons who are to be Registrars of British ships in that British possession, and to revoke any Order so made; and that after the date specified in the Order, or if no date is specified, after the date of the proclamation of the Order in the British possession, the Order shall have effect as if it were contained in section thirty of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854:"

And whereas at Singapore, Penang, and Malacca Ports, or places within the Straits Settlements, no Custom House is established; and whereas the Legislative Council of the Straits Settlements have, by an Ordinance (No. 3) of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, provided that the officers for the time being acting as Master Attendant at Singapore, and Harbour Masters at Penang and Malacca, shall be Registrars of Shipping under "The Imperial Merchant Shipping Act, 1854:"

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Acts, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to declare and direct that the officers for the time being acting as Master Attendant at Singapore, and Harbour Masters at Penang and Malacca, shall, from and after the date of the proclamation of this Order in the Straits Settlements, be Registrars of British ships in the Straits Settlements.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate at New Shildon, in the parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, of the parish of Heighington, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the particular district of Shildon, in the same county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of the said respective cures. |

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, of the said parish of Heighington, and of the said particular district of Shildon, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at New Shildon as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of

Durham, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see, both of the incumbency of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, and of the incumbency of the said particular district of Shildon (in testimony whereof the said Bishop has signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Durham, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Heighington (in testimony whereof the said dean and chapter have affixed their common or caputular seal to this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, of the said parish of Heighington, and of the said particular district of Shildon, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, situate at New Shildon as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, New Shildon,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, New Shildon, being:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, of the parish of Heighington, and of the particular district of Shildon, all in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, from the parish of Heighington aforesaid, at a point in the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the line of the Stockton and Darlington Railway over Red House Beck; and extending thence, first south-westward and then westward along the said parish boundary for a distance of two miles or thereabouts, thereby following, for the most part, the course of the said Red House Beck, and of a certain stream which forms the mill race supplying Mid-dridge Grange Mill, to the point where the said mill race is joined by Corner Beck; and extending thence south-westward for a distance of one mile and a half, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named beck to a point near the Red Lion Inn, on the north-eastern side of the turnpike road leading from Darlington to Bishop Auckland, on the boundary which divides the said parish of Heighington from the chapelry of Denton, in the parish of Gainford, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence, first north-westward for a distance of fifty chains, or thereabouts, along the last-described boundary, thereby following, for the most part, the north-

eastern side of the said turnpike road, and then south-westward for a distance of fourteen chains, or thereabouts, along the same boundary to its junction on the western side of the old Roman road with the boundary which divides the said parish of Heighington from the parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Helen, Auckland, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence northward along the last-described boundary for a distance of two miles, or thereabouts, thereby following, for the most part, the course of the old Roman road aforesaid to the point near Burns House, where the same boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Heighington from the parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward for a distance of thirty chains, or thereabouts, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Heighington from the particular district of Shildon aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-eastward for a distance of half a mile, or thereabouts, and then north-eastward for a distance of three-quarters of a mile, or thereabouts, along the last-described boundary to a point near Sebastopol, in the middle of the footpath which leads from Thickley into Stock-lane; and extending thence northward for a distance of sixteen chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said footpath to its junction with Stock-lane aforesaid; and continuing thence, still northward, for a distance of sixteen and a half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named lane to a point at the northern end of the same lane in the middle of the line of the Surtees Railway; and extending thence south-eastward for a distance of three-quarters of a mile, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named line of railway to its junction with the line of the Haggerleases Branch of the Stockton and Darlington Railway; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, for a distance of fifteen chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said branch line of railway to its junction with the line of the Stockton and Darlington Railway aforesaid; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, for a distance of one mile and three-quarters, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named line of railway (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, from the particular district of Shildon aforesaid) to the first-described point in the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the line of the Stockton and Darlington Railway over Red House Beck as aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Andrew, Auckland, from the parish of Heighington aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Blackheath, in the parish of The Quinton, in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of The Quinton, of the parish of Halesowen, in the said county and diocese of Worcester, and of the parish of Rowley Regis, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of the said cures respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of The Quinton, of the said parish of Halesowen, and of the said parish of Rowley Regis, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purpose, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Blackheath as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Venerable Richard Brindley Hone, Archdeacon of Worcester, and rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Halesowen, and as such rector or incumbent, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of The Quinton, with the consent of the Right Honourable George William, Baron Lyttelton, as the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Halesowen, and with the consent of the Right Honourable William Page, Baron Hatherley, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, as the patron on behalf of the crown of the vicarage of the said parish of Rowley Regis (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of The Quinton, of the said parish of Halesowen, and of the said parish of Rowley Regis, which are described in the schedule here-

under written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Blackheath as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Blackheath,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by the said Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Blackheath, being:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the parish of The Quinton, in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester, of the parish of Halesowen, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Rowley Regis, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid, which said portions of such parishes are comprised within, and are bounded by, an imaginary line commencing at a point at Gosty-hill, in the middle of the Halesowen and Oldbury turnpike road, where it is intersected by the line of the Gosty-hill Tunnel of the Birmingham and Dudley Canal, at which point the boundary which divides the said parish of Halesowen from the parish of Rowley Regis aforesaid, meets the boundary dividing the last-named parish from the new parish of Reddal-hill, in the said county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid; and extending thence, first north-westward and then northward, along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fifty-eight chains, or thereabouts, thereby following the course of the Birmingham and Dudley Canal aforesaid, to a point in the centre of Wright's Bridge, which carries a certain foot-road leading from Cherry Orchard to Powke-lane over the same canal; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said foot-road to its junction with Powke-lane aforesaid, at or near to which point of junction a boundary stone, inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 1,' has been placed; and extending thence south-eastward, along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with High-street, and continuing thence, still south-eastward, for a distance of three chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said street to a point opposite to a boundary stone, inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 2,' and placed on the northern side of the same street, over the middle of a certain watercourse, which flows from High-street aforesaid, past Shepherd's Fold, to the Halesowen and Oldbury turnpike-road aforesaid; and extending thence northward to such boundary stone; and extending thence, first northward, for a distance of three chains, or thereabouts, then generally north-eastward, for a distance of fifty-one chains, or thereabouts, and then south-eastward, for a distance of two and-a-half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said watercourse to a boundary stone, inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 3,' and placed over the middle of the same watercourse on

the north-western side of the said turnpike-road ; and extending thence first south-eastward to, and then north-eastward for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same turnpike-road to the boundary, at Whiteheath, which divides the said parish of Rowley Regis, from the new parish of Langley, in the said county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid ; and extending first south-eastward and then south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby passing in rear of certain houses situate on the south-eastern side of the turnpike-road aforesaid) to the junction of the same boundary with the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the parish of The Quinton aforesaid ; and extending thence, generally south-eastward for a distance of sixty-six chains or thereabouts along the last-described boundary, to a point in the middle of a certain footway, which leads from Langley Hall across Bristnall Fields into the road leading from Rowley Regis to Warley Hall ; and extending thence, southward along the middle of the last-described footway to its junction with the road leading from Rowley Regis to Warley Hall aforesaid, at or near to which point of junction a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 4,' has been placed ; and extending thence, south-eastward for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-described road to the point where it is intersected by the road, which leads from Warley Bank past Brand Hall towards The Quinton ; and extending thence, generally south-westward for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-described road to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 5,' and placed on the western side of the same road on the boundary which divides the township of Cakemore, in the parish of The Quinton aforesaid, from that detached portion of the hamlet of Warley Wighorn, in the same parish in which Brand Hall aforesaid is situate ; and extending thence westward to such boundary stone ; and extending thence first generally north-westward for the most part along the last-described boundary and then generally south-westward and westward along the same boundary to the point where it strikes the eastern side of the road which leads from Hurst-green into the Birmingham and Halesowen turnpike road, nearly opposite to the junction of the last-described road with the road leading into Long-lane, at which point a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 6,' has been placed ; and extending thence westward to and along the middle of the last-described road to its junction with Long-lane aforesaid ; and extending thence northward for a distance of three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said Long-lane to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 7,' and placed on the western side of the same lane, at or near to its junction with a certain foot-road leading from Long-lane aforesaid into the road which leads from Olive-hill Farm to Blackheath ; and extending thence first westward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-described foot-road to its junction at or near Olive-hill Farm aforesaid with the last-mentioned road, at or near to which point of junction a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 8,' has been placed ; and continuing thence still north-westward for a distance of six chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said last-mentioned road to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. P. C. C., 1869, No. 9,' and placed on the south-western side of the same road, at or near to

its junction with a certain foot-road which leads towards the Birmingham and Dudley Canal aforesaid ; and continuing thence south-westward along the middle of the last described foot-road as far as the point where it strikes the bank of the said canal ; and extending thence first westward to and then north-westward for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same canal to the south-eastern end of the Gosty-hill Tunnel aforesaid ; and continuing thence still north-westward and in a direct line (thereby following the course of the said tunnel) to the first-described point in the middle of the Halesowen and Oldbury turnpike road aforesaid, where the boundary which divides the said parish of Halesowen from the parish of Rowley Regis aforesaid meets the boundary dividing the last-named parish from the new parish of Reddall-hill as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen ; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say ;

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen ; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish of Saint Mary, West Brompton, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and out of the new parish of Saint Paul, Onslow-square, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion

that the particular portions of the said new parish of Saint Mary, West Brompton, and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Onslow-square, which are hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their aggregate limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted into one separate district by the title of 'Saint Augustine, South Kensington,' in the manner hereinafter recommended and set forth.

"And whereas a sum of three thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence, three pounds per centum reduced bank annuities has been contributed and transferred into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, by certain persons in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and of the maintenance of the incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed with the persons from whom we received the same and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, in each and every year to such incumbent as aforesaid, when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and to his successors, the yearly sum of one hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence, three pounds per centum reduced bank annuities has been so contributed and transferred as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient), the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have also determined to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act to the incumbent for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted when duly licensed as aforesaid, the yearly sum of fifty pounds, the payment whereof will be secured by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose, that all those portions of the said new parish of Saint Mary, West Brompton, and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Onslow-square, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted into one separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Augustine, South Kensington.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and when such district shall have become a new parish under the secondly and thirdly hereinbefore mentioned Acts,

then of such new parish and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by, John Archibald Shaw Stewart, of No. 13, Queen's-gate, Kensington, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, Edward Ehret Dyson, of No. 18, Elvaston-place, South Kensington, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, John Gellibrand Hubbard, of No. 24, Princes-gate, Hyde-park, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, the Reverend William Josiah Irons, of No. 12, Saint Michael's-grove, Brompton, in the said county of Middlesex, Doctor in Divinity, and Henry Edward Pellew, of No. 22, Boltons, West Brompton, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, and their heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Augustine, South Kensington, being:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate within the limits of the parish or parochial chapelry of Burnley, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate within the limits of the parish or parochial chapelry of Burnley aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the

Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Burnley, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Burnley.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Burnley, being:—

"All that part of the parish or parochial chapelry of Burnley, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish or parochial chapelry now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-west by the extra-parochial territory called or known as Reedley Hallows, in the county and diocese aforesaid, on the east by the new parish of Saint James, Briercliffe, in the same county and diocese; and on all other sides, that is to say, on the south and on the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James, Briercliffe, from the parish or parochial chapelry of Burnley aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the River Brun, at its junction with the stream called or known as Walshaw Clough Brook; and extending thence, south-westward, for a distance of twenty chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said river, to the centre of Sandy Holmes Aqueduct, which carries the Leeds and Liverpool canal over the said river; and extending thence, first north-westward, then south-westward, and then again north-westward, for a distance of one mile and a quarter, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said canal, thereby passing under the line of the East Lancashire Branch of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, to the boundary which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Burnley, from the extra-parochial territory called or known as Reedley Hallows aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, there-

fore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial ground or places of burial should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials

should be discontinued therein, with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the thirteenth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz. —

PAIGNTON.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Paignton, and also in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves which can be used without the disturbance of soil that has been buried in, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and except in earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet, without the exposure of coffins, or the disturbance of entire bones.

SKEFFINGTON.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Skeffington, in the county of Leicester, and also in the churchyard.

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the incumbent

and churchwardens of the parish of Barnstaple, in the county of Devon, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the churchyard of Barnstaple from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens of the parish of Barnstaple, do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz. :—

That the churchyard of Barnstaple, Devon, be put into proper order, and levelled, as far as that can be done without carrying away the soil.

In the burial ground of St. John's, Pembroke Dock; to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to "amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

WILLESDEN.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish ; and also in the old churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented ; and except in family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains or of foul soil ;—to be used only for the burial of the members of the families of those already interred therein.

BINGLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Bingley, Yorkshire ; and also, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the churchyard, and in the burial-grounds of the Independent and Baptist Chapels of Bingley.

SHIFNAL.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Shifnal, Salop ; and also in the old part of the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves existing on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented, and in other graves, except for the burial of the widows and widowers of those already interred therein.

SCALBY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Scalby, Yorkshire ; and also in the old part of the churchyard, except in graves in which the coffins have been and shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork, and except in other graves for the burial of the widows or widowers of those already buried in the old part of the churchyard, and except for the burial of infants not more than a year old.

CHEADLE.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Cheadle, Cheshire, and in the part of the churchyard which is to the south of the church ; and also in the rest of the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, except in family graves or vaults, for the burial only of the members of the families interred therein ; every coffin buried in a vault or walled grave to be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and no coffin buried in an earthen grave to be less than five feet below the surface ; no previously buried coffin to be exposed, or buried remains disturbed.

BEVERLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish burial-ground or additional churchyard of Saint Mary's, Beverley, in the county of York, except in now existing family vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-third day of August next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said twenty-third day of August.

No. 1.

PROVISIONS

MODIFYING the Dues for River Pilotage.

(Translation.)

The European Commission of the Danube—Considering Article 112 of the Regulations of Navigation and Police applicable to the Lower Danube, dated November 2, 1865; also the new Provisions relative to Pilotage, dated 16th April, 1868, modifying Article 78 of the aforesaid Regulations of Navigation and Police;

Whereas experience has shown the inconvenience of the mode of taxation in proportion to tonnage established by the new Article 78 for the remuneration of pilots of the river service;

Whereas this proportional due, the application of which is justified for vessels of considerable tonnage, produces but insufficient remuneration for the pilots charged to conduct small vessels;

Whereas the choice of pilot being left in most cases to the captain of the piloted vessel, it is impossible to divide the task among the pilots in a manner to ensure to all about an equal income;

Enacts the following provisions:—

ARTICLE 1.

Article 78 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police, annexed to the Public Act relating to the navigation of the mouths of the Danube, dated November 2, 1865, as modified by the new provisions of the 16 April, 1868, is repealed, excepting the first paragraph, which shall remain in force in its present tenor, and is replaced by the following provisions:

With regard to the compulsory pilotage of the voyage down the stream, its dues is fixed as follows:

Sailing vessels of more than sixty tons, and not exceeding one hundred and fifty tons, will pay:—

For the passage from Galatz, or from a port situated above this point to Sulina, one hundred and ten francs;

For the passage from Reni or Ismail to Sulina, ninety francs; and,

For the passage from Toultscha to Sulina, sixty francs.

Sailing vessels of more than one hundred and fifty tons and not exceeding two hundred and fifty tons, will pay—

For the passage from Galatz, or from a port situated above this point, to Sulina, one hundred and twenty-five francs;

For the passage from Reni or from Ismail to Sulina, one hundred francs; and,

For the passage from Toultscha to Sulina, seventy-five francs.

Sailing vessels of more than two hundred and fifty tons will pay:

For the passage from Galatz, or from a port situated above this point, to Sulina, fifty centimes per register ton;

For the passage from Reni or from Ismail to Sulina, forty centimes per ton; and,

For the passage from Toultscha to Sulina, thirty centimes per ton.

Steam vessels will only pay the half of these dues, and those which perform their voyages between the ports of the Danube and the ports of the Black Sea or of the Bosphorus, may be exempted, provided that the pilot on board be furnished with a licence as a river pilot.

The chief pilot of the river service deducts from the amount of the due paid by each sailing vessel a sum determined as follows:

Three francs for vessels of more than sixty tons and not exceeding one hundred and fifty tons:

Four francs for vessels of more than one hundred fifty tons, and not exceeding two hundred and fifty tons;

And two centimes per ton for vessels of more than two hundred and fifty tons.

This deduction is only one-half upon the pilotage due paid by steam vessels, but it is effected also for those of this class of vessels of which the pilots are permanently engaged, and which are exempted from the payment of the said due.

The surplus of the dues belongs to the pilots.

These dues are paid into the hands of the Director of the Navigation Cash Office at Sulina,

who alone can give a valid receipt for them. It is allowable, nevertheless, for the captain of a piloted vessel, to pay the half of the due to his pilot directly, as an advance.

The calculation of tonnage for the payment of the river pilotage due is made for vessels of more than two hundred and fifty tons, according to the rules laid down by the Tariff of Navigation Dues of the 2nd November, 1865.

ARTICLE 2.

The preceding provisions shall come into force on the 15th May, 1869.

THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION OF THE DANUBE.

(Translation.)

ADDITIONAL REGULATION concerning Towage between Isaktcha, and the Sulina Mouth.

The European Commission of the Danube, considering Article 112 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police applicable to the Lower Danube, dated 2nd November, 1865, also the Regulation enacted the 2nd November, 1867, concerning local towage in the port and at the mouth of the Sulina;

Whereas experience has shown the utility of Regulations of Police specially applicable to tug steamers, as also the necessity of extending their effect to the navigation of the River;

Enacts the following provisions:

ARTICLE 1.

Every vessel habitually employed in towing operations on the Lower Danube below Isaktcha, shall be subject to the accomplishment of the formalities prescribed by Articles 1 and 2 of the Regulation concerning towage enacted by the European Commission of the Danube, for the port and mouth of Sulina, on the 2nd November, 1867.

Is considered as habitually engaged in towage operations between Isaktcha and the Sulina mouth every vessel which performs in this part of the river more than three such operations in the space of forty days, unless in a position to prove by the endorsements upon its papers, that in the interval of these operations it has made a sea-voyage, or a voyage above Ibraila.

ARTICLE 2.

Is subject in every case to the accomplishment of the formalities prescribed by Articles 1 and 2 of the Regulation of 2nd November, 1867, every tug steamer performing more than three operations in the space of one month between Isaktcha and Sulina.

ARTICLE 3.

Whenever vessels or transports under towage, moor or cast anchor in a port, or at any other point of the Lower Danube situated below Isaktcha, the tug boats shall not cast off the tow ropes before the vessels or transports towed shall have swung to the current and be securely made fast.

ARTICLE 4.

In case of the grounding of a vessel or a transport under towage, below Isaktcha, the captain

of the tug steamer in continuing his voyage is bound to give information of the accident to the first boat belonging to the General Inspectorate of Navigation which he shall meet.

If the grounding is imputable to the fault of the tug steamer, the same cannot continue its voyage before it be made evident that the force of its engines is insufficient to bring the grounded vessel or transport afloat again.

ARTICLE 5.

Whenever the captain of a tug steamer undertakes to tow, below Isaktcha, one or more vessels or transports, for which the force of his vessel is insufficient, he is civilly responsible for all damages which may result therefrom.

ARTICLE 6.

Articles 3, 4, and 5 of the present regulation, as also the penalties in their enforcement are applicable to all vessels employed below Isaktcha to tow others, whether habitually or occasionally.

ARTICLE 7.

All tug steamers provided with the licence prescribed by Article 1 of the Regulation of 2nd November, 1867, and by Articles 1 and 2 of the present regulation, are bound to bear the number of their licence painted in white figures of one foot in height on a conspicuous part of the outside of their port and starboard bulwarks.

ARTICLE 8.

Every offence against one of the provisions of Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5 of the present regulation is punished by a fine of twenty-four francs at least, and of one hundred and twenty francs at most.

Every offence against Article 7 of the same regulation is punished by a fine of twelve francs at least, and of thirty-six francs at most.

ARTICLE 9.

The application of these penalties is pronounced by the Captain of the Port at Sulina, or by the Inspector-General of the Navigation, for offences committed or proved within their respective limits of jurisdiction.

It is regulated, and notably in what concerns repetitions of offences and appeal, by the provisions of Chapter II of Part 4 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police of the 2nd November, 1865.

ARTICLE 10.

The present regulation shall come into force on the 1st of July, 1869.

(Translation.)

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS of Police, concerning Anchorage in the Port of Sulina.

The European Commission of the Danube, considering Article 112 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police applicable to the Lower Danube, dated 2nd November, 1865;

Whereas Article 17 of this Regulation contains no provision specially applicable to vessels which, after having left the port of Sulina to proceed to sea, are obliged to re-enter on account of accident or contrary wind;

Whereas the exportation of petroleum having assumed a certain importance, it has become necessary to assign a special anchorage ground to vessels laden with this commodity which stop at Sulina, in order to guard as much as possible against the danger to which their proximity may expose other vessels;

Enacts the following provisions:

ARTICLE 1.

The captain of every vessel which, after having left the port of Sulina to proceed to sea, is forced to return on account of accident or contrary wind, is bound to present himself within twenty-four hours of having re-entered the said port, at the office of the Captain of the Port, there to make his declaration.

He is bound equally to show to the Director of the Navigation Cash Office, within the same delay, the muster-roll of his crew, which is immediately returned to him.

ARTICLE 2.

If a lighter employed to lighten a vessel leaving the river, return into port on any account whatever, even under circumstances beyond control, before having been able to render the whole of the merchandize which it had taken on board, the captain or master is bound immediately to make a declaration to this effect at the office of the Captain of the Port, and this declaration is forthwith communicated to the Director of the Navigation Cash Office.

ARTICLE 3.

The vessels and lighters which return into the port of Sulina in one or other of the cases provided for by the two preceding Articles are bound to anchor in the lower part of the port, at the point indicated to them by the Bosseman (Agent of Port Police).

They are subject to the special surveillance of the verifying officer attached to the Navigation Cash Office, and upon his requisition any captain or master is bound to open the hold and the cabins of his vessel.

ARTICLE 4.

The captain of every vessel arriving in the port of Sulina with a cargo composed exclusively or in part of petroleum, is bound immediately to make declaration thereof to the Bosseman before letting go his anchor.

ARTICLE 5.

Vessels having petroleum on board can only anchor in the lower part of the port upon the left bank, below all the other vessels, and they are forbidden to cast anchor or to make fast in any other section of the port.

ARTICLE 6.

Every offence against the provisions of Articles 1, 2, and 3 herein above, shall be punished by a fine of twenty francs at least, and of one hundred francs at most.

ARTICLE 7.

Every offence against Article 4 hereinabove shall be punished by a fine of one hundred francs at least, and of three hundred francs at most. For offences committed against the provisions of Article 5 hereinabove, the penalty shall be twenty francs at least, and two hundred francs at most.

ARTICLE 8.

The penalties enacted by the two preceding Articles are applied by the Captain of the Port of

Sulina, who is charged with the execution of the present regulation.

The application of these penalties is regulated in general, and notably in what concerns cases of repetitions of offences and appeal, by the provisions of Articles 104, 105, 106, 107, 108, and 110 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police above cited, dated 2nd November, 1865.

ARTICLE 9.

The present provisions shall come into force on the 1st July, 1869.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(Translation.)

BY an enactment of the European Commission of the Danube, dated 22nd April, 1869, vessels of 150 tons and under, crossing the entry of the Sulina mouth in *ballast* are freed from *compulsory* pilotage by the following clause inserted between the 2nd and 3rd clauses of Article 13 of the Regulation of Navigation and Police applicable to the Lower Danube, dated 2nd November, 1865.

"Vessels not measuring more than one hundred and fifty tons, which cross the Sulina entry in ballast, are also exempted from the obligation to take a licenced pilot.

"This exemption to take effect on and after the 1st July, 1869."

No. 5.

REGULATION

Concerning the Seaman's Hospital at Sulina.

(Translation.)

ARTICLE 1.

THE Hospital established at Sulina by the European Commission of the Danube is specially destined to receive the seamen of merchant-vessels, and persons in subordinate positions attached to the administration of the port.

This Hospital is administered under the immediate direction of the European Commission or of the International Authority which will succeed to its powers, by the Head Surgeon of the establishment, conformably with the special instructions given him for the regulation of this service.

The Head Surgeon is nominated by the European Commission of the Danube, and after its dissolution, by the Authority which shall replace it. He is considered as holding an international office, and enjoys in time of war the benefit of the neutrality stipulated by Article 21 of the Public Act relating to the navigation of the mouths of the Danube, signed at Galatz the 2nd November, 1865.

ARTICLE 2.

Are admitted of right and treated entirely gratuitously in the said Hospital:

1. The sailors of merchant vessels of all flags shipped on board sea-going vessels which pay the proportional tonnage dues established by the tariff in force at the Sulina mouth.

2. The pilots in active service, as well of the mouth as of the river, the engineers, firemen and

sailors of the steam launches of the port and pilotage services, as well as of the steamers of the General Inspectorate of Navigation.

3. The workmen employed on the works of improvement undertaken by the European Commission, or by the Authority which shall succeed it.

ARTICLE 3.

Are equally admitted of right into the Hospital:

1. The seamen of ships of war of all flags.
2. Those of lighters, tug-boats, and barges (schlepps), and those of sea-going vessels not paying the proportional tonnage dues, such as vessels of less than thirty register tons measurement, ships anchored in the roadstead of Sulina, and those which enter the port simply for refuge.

The patients included in the two classes determined by the present Article are bound to pay, for each day they are under treatment, a remuneration of two francs, which is paid into the Navigation Cash Office at Sulina.

ARTICLE 4.

Patients suffering from mental alienation cannot be admitted into the Seaman's Hospital.

ARTICLE 5.

The captain or master who demands admission for one of his seamen into the Hospital is bound to present himself with the patient before the Surgeon of the establishment, and to produce, on the enquiry of this latter, the proof that the person for whom admission is demanded belongs to the crew of his vessel.

If gratuitous admission is demanded the captain or master is bound to prove as well that his vessel is subject for the voyage in course of performance, to the payment of the proportional tonnage-due, or that this due has been paid during the course of the year, if it should concern a sea-going vessel temporarily acting as a lighter.

ARTICLE 6.

Patients who have suffered shipwreck are admitted into the Hospital upon the simple demand in writing of the competent Consul or of the Captain of the Port. They are treated gratuitously to whatever class they belong.

ARTICLE 7.

Patients included in the second class determined by Article 2 of the present regulation, are admitted upon the production of a certificate setting forth their calling or trade, delivered by the Captain of the Port of Sulina for persons attached to the service of the port, or of the pilotage at the mouth, and by the Inspector General of Navigation, for men belonging to the steamers of the Inspectorate, and for river pilots.

ARTICLE 8.

Work people employed on the works of improvement are admitted on the production of a certificate signed by the foreman under whose orders they are placed, and bearing the visa of the Engineer of the works.

ARTICLE 9.

Seamen of vessels of war are admitted upon the written demand of the officer in command.

ARTICLE 10.

The Head Surgeon of the Hospital fixes a daily time during which he gives advice gratis to patients belonging to one or other of the classes determined by Articles 2 and 3 of the present regulation, as also to the wives and children of

the individuals coming within the second and third classes determined by Article 2.

ARTICLE 11.

Seamen, upon their recovery, are delivered over to their captain, or if he should have left, to their Consul; in the absence of a Consul they are handed over to the Captain of the Port.

The captain or master of a vessel whose flag is not protected by a Consul resident at Sulina, and who quits this port, leaving one of his seamen in the Hospital, is further bound to designate to the Head Surgeon of the establishment, a person domiciled at the port of Sulina, to whom the said seaman, upon his convalescence, may be confided.

ARTICLE 12.

If the disorder of a patient should become chronic, or it is judged by the Surgeon that its cure is improbable under the influence of the climate of Sulina, the patient is placed at the disposal of the proper authority to be sent home.

ARTICLE 13.

The captain or master of every seaman admitted into the Hospital and belonging to one of the classes determined by Article 3 of the present regulation, is bound, before leaving the port or the roadstead of Sulina, to pay into the Navigation Cash Office the amount of the remuneration due for the patient's treatment.

If in this case the vessel quits the port or the roadstead of Sulina, leaving one of its seamen in the Hospital, the payment of the remuneration is effected up to the day of departure of the vessel, and the administration of the Hospital demands the good officers of the consular or local authorities to effect the recovery of the residue.

ARTICLE 14.

The patients are bound, during the whole time of their sojourn in the Hospital, to submit to the internal discipline of the establishment, and to obey all the orders of the Surgeon in what concerns the treatment and the diet they are to follow.

ARTICLE 15.

In case of the death of a patient admitted into the Hospital, the expenses of burial are at the charge of the party in whose service the defunct was engaged.

ARTICLE 16.

Seamen who have deserted from their ships cannot be admitted into the Hospital: the Head Surgeon of the establishment has recourse to this effect, to the lists and assistance of the consular and local authorities.

ARTICLE 17.

The regulation enacted by the European Commission on the 20th February, 1861, is repealed and the present regulation enters into force from this day.

EXPLANATIONS.

I.—NAVIGATION DUES LEVIED AT SULINA IN 1868.

These dues are levied by the European Commission by virtue of Article 16 of the Treaty of Paris of 30th March, 1856, to cover the expenditure devoted to the improvement of the mouths of the Danube.

Their collection is effected on the basis of the tariff annexed to the Public Act signed at Galatz on the 2nd November, 1865, and modified in part by the provisions enacted on the 27th April, 1867, it also includes the dues imposed upon vessels for the local pilotage service, and for the maintenance of the lighthouses at the mouth of the river.

The gross produce of dues levied at Sulina in 1868 amounts to the sum of 1,616,869 francs 07½ centimes, and is composed of the following items:—

II. LIABILITIES OF THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION.

These liabilities include three classes of outstanding debts:—firstly, the amount of bonds at 10 per cent. issued by the Commission, payable at fixed dates; secondly, the amount realized upon the loan concluded by the Commission with the banking firm of Bischoffsheim and Goldschmidt; and thirdly, the amount due to Turkey for the advances made by her to the Commission until 1863:—

1. Bonds at 10 per Cent.

The balance of the Loan of 45,000 ducats, issued in 1866, has been fully paid off in 1868, and on account of the sums realized by the second issue made in 1867 and 1868, amounting to 86,550 ducats, 21,000 ducats have been already repaid in virtue of a special arrangement.

The amount of 10 per cent. Bonds in circulation at the end of 1868 reached the sum of 65,550 ducats, the maturities of which are distributed gradually between the 1st June, 1871, and the 11th February, 1872.

2. Loan of Bischoffsheim and Goldschmidt.

The Loan concluded with this banking firm of London amounts to £135,000 sterling, and is destined to cover the expenses already incurred, and still to be incurred, for permanent works. This Loan was issued at the rate of 96 per cent., and there has been paid a commission of 1 per cent. to the negotiator; the rate of interest is 4 per cent. per annum, payable every six months; the redemption of the capital will commence on the 1st January, 1871, and will be terminated on the 31st December, 1882.

There has been encashed on account of the capital of this Loan in 1868 the sum of £30,000 sterling, forming the first instalment stipulated by the contract for the Loan.

3. Outstanding Debt to the Sublime Porte.

The amount of this debt has been fixed at the sum of 314,247 ducats, or 3,739,540 francs.

On the other hand, the Ottoman Government is indebted to the European Commission, according to the account current balanced on 31st December, 1868, the sum of 7,111 francs 88 centimes, chargeable against the interest which will hereafter accrue in respect of the said debt.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister

at Washington, inclosing the following Proclamation issued by the President of the United States, relative to the reciprocal abolition of discriminating duties between France and the United States:—

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS satisfactory evidence has been received by me that His Majesty the Emperor of

France, through the Count Favernay, his Chargé d'Affaires, that on and after this date the discriminating duties heretofore levied in French ports upon merchandize imported from the country of its origin in vessels of the United States of America are to be discontinued and abolished: Now, therefore, I, U. S. Grant, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by an Act of Congress of the 7th day of January, 1824, and by an Act in addition thereto, of the 24th day of May, 1828, do hereby declare and proclaim, that on and after this date, so long as merchandise imported from the countries of its origin into French ports in vessels belonging to citizens of the United States is admitted into French ports on the terms aforesaid, the discriminating duties heretofore levied on merchandize imported from the countries of its origin into the ports of the United States in French vessels shall be and are hereby discontinued and abolished.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the City of Washington, this 12th day of June, in the year of our Lord 1869, and of the independence of the United States of America the ninety-third.
