#### A PROCLAMATION.

For Declaring Gold Coins made at the Branch Mint, at Melbourne, in Victoria, a Legal Tender within all parts of Her Majesty's Dominions in which Gold Coins issued from Her Majesty's Mint in London are now a Legal Tender.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, bearing date the seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, We have thought fit to order that a Branch of Our Royal Mint should be established at or near Melbourne, in Victoria:

And whereas by the said Order We have thought fit to order that certain pieces of gold money should be coined at the said branch of Our Royal Mint, to be of the same designs, and of the same respective weights, fineness, and values with the sovereigns and half-sovereigns now current within this Our realm:

And whereas pieces of gold money will hereafter be coined at our said branch of the Royal Mint, in pursuance of Orders to be issued:

And whereas by an Act made and passed in the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Our reign, intituled, "An Act to enable Her Majesty to "declare gold coins to be issued from Her Ma-"jesty's Colonial Branch Mints a legal tender for "payments, and for other purposes relating thereto," it is provided that "It shall be lawful "for Her Majesty, from time to time, by Procla-"mation, issued with the advice of Her Privy "Council, to declare that, for such period, and "subject to such conditions as may be speci-"fied in such Proclamation, gold coins made at "any such Colonial Branch Mint, of designs ap-" proved by Her Majesty, and being of the same " weight and fineness as are required by law with " respect to gold coins of the same denominations " made at Her Majesty's Mint in London, are to " be a legal tender for payments within any part " of Her Majesty's dominions, to be specified in " such Proclamation, in which gold coins issued "from Her Majesty's Mint in London shall at "the date of the issue of such Proclamation be a " legal tender; and upon such Proclamation being " issued gold coins made of such designs, and being " of such weight and fineness as aforesaid, shall

" be a legal tender for payments accordingly."

We, therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, have thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and we do ordain, declare, and command, that from and after the date of the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, coins made at the said Branch Mint, of designs approved by Us, at Melbourne aforesaid, and being of the same weight and fineness as are required by law with respect to gold coins of the same denomination, made at Our Mint in London, shall be a legal tender for payments within all parts of Our Dominions in which gold coins issued from Our Mint in London are, at the date of the issue of this Our Proclamation, a legal tender.

Given at Our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, this seventh day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in the thirty-third year of Our Reign.

HEREAS Orders in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, make regulations with respect to the

importation of animals and things into the United Kingdom, for the purpose of preventing the introduction of contagious or infectious diseases, and it is expedient that other regulations for that purpose be made, as far as regards Great Britain, and that those Orders be accordingly revoked as far as they relate to Great Britain:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in Her Majesty under an Act of Parliament passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign (chapter 105), intituled "An "Act to prohibit the importation of sheep, cattle, "or other animals, for the purpose of preventing "the introduction of contagious or infectious disorders," and by virtue and in exercise of every other power enabling Her in this behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1. The said Orders in Council are hereby revoked, as far as they relate to Great Britain, from and after the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.
- 2. Nothing in this Order shall affect the past operation of those Orders, or either of them, or the validity or invalidity of anything done or suffered, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued thereunder before the making of this Order; nor shall this Order interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred under, either of those Orders.

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following; viz.:—

"Whereas by your Majesty's Order in Council of the third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, certain Regulations for the admission of Seamen and Marines into Greenwich Hospital were established under the provisions of the twentieth section of the Greenwich Hospital Act, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five; and whereas by the third section of an Act passed in the thirty-second year of your Majesty's reign, chapter forty-four, intituled 'An Act to make better provision respecting Greenwich Hospital, and the application of the revenues thereof,' it is enacted, that the Admiralty may, under regulations to be from time to time made by them, admit temporarily or permanently, to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital, non-commissioned officers and men of the Royal Navy and Marines, who, although not in receipt of naval pensions, have been, before or after the passing of the said Act, discharged as invalided for disease or wounds contracted or received in or by the service of the Crown, or are infirm and helpless; and whereas by the fourth section of the said Act, it is enacted that the Admiralty may, under regulations to be from time to time made by them, send any non-

commissioned officers and men admitted to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital to a naval hospital or infirmary, to be there maintained at the expense of Greenwich Hospital; and whereas by the sixth section of the said Act, it is enacted, that such regulations shall not have effect unless and until they are approved by your Majesty in Council; We beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, to sanction the following regulations in lieu of those established by your Majesty's Order in Council of the third of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six. The under-menmentioned persons may be considered as eligible for admission to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital.

- "1. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's corps of Royal Marines, who have been granted naval pensions for life, and who may be infirm and helpless.
- "2. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's corps of Royal Marines, who have served with good characters for ten years continuously, or with short intervals, and who may be infirm and helpless.
- "3. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who, having served for less than ten years, have been, within six months, discharged or invalided from your Majesty's Service on account of disease or wounds contracted or received in or by the service of the Crown, and who may be infirm and helpless, or permanently or temporarily unable to maintain themselves.
- "4. Any petty officer and seaman of your Majesty's Navy, and any non-commissioned officer and private of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who, having served for less than ten years, were, at any date, discharged or invalided from your Majesty's Service on account of disease or wounds contracted or received in or by the service of the Crown, and who, from the date of their discharge, have been infirm and helpless, or permanently or temporarily unable to maintain themselves.
- "5. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines whose claims may be considered special and exceptional, not coming within the above mentioned classes.
- "6. All such petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all such non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, whose claims to admission to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital have, after examination, been allowed, may be admitted into Greenwich Hospital, temporarily or permanently, or into a Naval Hospital or Infirmary, temporarily or permanently, or may be transferred from one to the other, or may be granted special Greenwich pensions for life, or for a term as hereinafter provided, at our discretion.
- "7. All or any of such inmates may be discharged from Greenwich Hospital, or from naval hospitals or infirmaries at our discretion.
- "And whereas by the fifth section of the said Act it is enacted that the Admiralty may, under regulations to be from time to time made by them, appoint to non-commissioned officers and men admitted to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital,

in lieu of maintaining them in or at the expense of Greenwich Hospital, special Greenwich Hospital pensions according to the circumstances of each case, and within certain limits; We de beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the establishment of the following regulations:—

"1. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's corps of Royal Marines, whose claims to admission to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital have, after examination, been allowed, may, at our discretion, in lieu of being admitted to Greenwich Hospital or into a naval hospital or infirmary as aforesaid, receive from the funds of Greenwich Hospital, either temporarily or for life, according to circumstances, such monies as would, with their existing pensions, if any, make up an amount not exceeding one shilling and sixpence a-day, or twenty-seven pounds ten shillings a-year; such additional pension to depend, both as regards amount and continuance, upon the degree in which the recipient is able to contribute to his own support.

"And whereas we are of opinion that, in order to reduce the present number of in-pensioners of Greenwich Hospital, and thereby better carry out the purposes of the said Act, it would be expedient to offer the said in-pensioners the option of leaving, on the first October next, with the grant of such additional pensions as are authorized by the fifth section of the aforesaid Act; we beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the terms of the following offer, which we propose to make to the present in-pensioners of Greenwich Hospital:

"1st. Any in-pensioner permanently admitted on or before the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, who may elect to leave the Hospital on the first October next, may receive such special pension out of Greenwich Hospital funds as, together with his naval pension (if any), and his Greenwich pension of five pence or nine pence a-day (if any), will amount in the aggregate to a sum not exceeding thirty-six pounds ten shillings a-year; the amount of such special pension to be according to the circumstances of each case, both as to age and state of health.

"2nd. Any in-pensioner permanently admitted after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, who may elect to leave the Hospital on the first of October next, may receive such special pension out of Greenwich Hospital funds, as, together with his naval pension (if any), and his Greenwich pension of five pence or nine pence a-day (if any), will amount in the aggregate to a sum not exceeding twenty-seven pounds ten shillings a-year; the amount of such special pension to be according to the circumstances of each case, both as to age and state of health.

"3. Any pensioner permanently admitted before the said date may be permanently transferred to a naval hospital or infirmary to be maintained at the cost of Greenwich Hospital; and any pensioner who may have been admitted temporarily for treatment before the said date may be transferred to a naval hospital for treatment there at the expense of Greenwich Hospital."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"We, therefore, most humbly submit that your Majesty will be graciously pleased by your Order in Council to authorize us to make this free grant

of land accordingly."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

W HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the third of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following;

"Whereas by 'The Dockyards' Port Regulation Act, 1865,' it is enacted (among other things), that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, from time to time by Order in Council, to make regulations for all or any of the purposes therein particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of your Majesty's Vessels, Dockyards, or Property, or to the requirements of your Majesty's Naval Service; We humbly beg leave to submit that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to authorize Us to appoint from time to time, as We may think proper, at any Dockyard Port a fit person or fit persons to assist the Queen's Harbour Master for the Port in superintending the execution of the Act in question, and in otherwise protecting the Port, each such person to be called Assistant Queen's Harbour Master for the Port, and to have all such powers, authorities, and discretions as by virtue of any Order in Council made under the Act before the making of this Order belong to the Queen's Harbour Master to whom he is Assistant, but to act in all things under the direction of the Queen's Harbour Master.

"And We further humbly submit that this Order should take effect on the expiration of

thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette, and that the terms used in this Order should have the same meaning as in the Act."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by "The Thames Conservancy Act, 1857," it is enacted that the Conservators of the River Thames shall have power and authority, from time to time, to make bye-laws for the regulation, management, and improvement of the River Thames, and the navigation thereof, in the manner thereby provided, and to impose penalties, not exceeding five pounds, for the breach or non-performance of such bye-laws:

And whereas by the forty-seventh section of the said Act, it is enacted that no such bye-laws shall be in force until the same have been sent to the Lord Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench, the Lord Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, and the Lord Chief Baron of the Court of Exchequer, and shall have been approved

by one of them:

And whereas by the thirty-first section of "The Thames Conservancy Act, 1864," it is enacted that from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, section forty-seven of "The Thames Conservancy Act, 1857," shall be repealed, and that bye-laws, made after the commencement of such repeal, under the authority of either of the said recited Acts, shall not have any force unless and until they are allowed by Order of Her Majesty in Council:

And whereas the said Conservators have, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the said recited Act, made and submitted for the allowance of Her Majesty in Council, certain bye laws for the regulation of the navigation of the River Thames (a copy whereof is set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed):

And whereas the said bye-laws have been duly published in accordance with the last recited Act, and it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said bye-laws, so set forth as aforesaid,

are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said last-recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to allow the said bye-laws.

#### Schedule referred to in the above Order.

BYE LAWS made by the Conservators of the River Thames, the thirty-first day of May, 1869.

1. Every steam dredger moored in the River Thames shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit three bright lights from globular lanterns of not

less than eight inches in diameter, the said three lights to be placed in a triangular form, and to be of sufficient power to be distinctly visible with a clear atmosphere, on a dark night, at a distance of at least one mile, and to be placed not less than six feet apart on the highest part of the framework athwart ships.

2. Any person committing any breach, or in any way infringing this bye law, or the bye laws passed under the corporate seal of the Conservators of the River Thames the 18th day of April, 1864, shall be liable to a penalty of and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding £5, which said penalty shall be recovered, enforced, and applied according to the provisions of the said "Thames Conservancy Acts."

HEREAS by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted, that upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by this Act are paid and collected:

And whereas the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses are erecting and are about to light a new lighthouse on Scurdyness at the entrance of the Harbour of Montrose, Forfarshire;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that upon the lighting of the said light, there shall be paid in respect thereof the following tolls, namely;

 For every vessel, whether British or foreign, which may pass or derive benefit from the said light, but not enter the harbour of Montrose, the toll of eight sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage, and one sixteenth of a penny per ton of the burden of such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage.

2 For every vessel, whether British or foreign, which, if on an oversea or a coasting voyage, may enter or depart from the harbour of Montrose, in addition to the tolls hereinbefore mentioned, the additional toll of sixpence in respect of every fifty tons or part of fifty tons of the burden of such vessel, for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said light.

A vessel shall be considered to have entered or departed from the harbour of Montrose when she shall have crossed an imaginary straight line drawn from the Scurdy Stone to the outer extremity of Annat Sand.

The said Tolls shall be levied by the Commis-

sioners of Northern Lighthouses, subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the new Consolidated Table of Light Dues sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the first day of November, 1864, and to the gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. mentioned in an Order in Council, dated the 29th day of February, 1868.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, situate in the parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester, and as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate in the new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, and of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, and also of the parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the first schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes and new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, and of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, and of the said parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mark, situate in the parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, aforesaid.

"And whereas at certain other extremities of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, of the said parish of the Holy, Trinity, Coventry, and of the said parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, which said lastly-mentioned extremities also lie contiguous one to another and are described in the second schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which likewise is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish and parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such lastly-mentioned portions of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, and of the said parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate in the new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, as such bishop, and with the consent of the Right Honourable William Page, Baron Hatherley, Lord High Chancellor of England, acting on behalf of your Majesty as the patron in right of the Crown of the vicarage of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, and with the consent of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone, the First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the patron in right of the Crown, of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, and with the consent of the Reverend Alfred William Wilson, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventy, and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry (in testimony whereof they, the said several consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient, that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, and of the said parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, which are described in the first schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and Numbered 1, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Mark, situtate in the parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mark, Coventry.'

"And with the like consents of the same sevéral consenting parties (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those other contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Coventry, and of the said parish of Saint Michael, Coventry, which are described in the second schedule hereunder written, all which last-mentioned portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered 2, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, situate in the new parish of Saint Peter, Coventry, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Coventry.'

"And with the like consents of the same several consenting parties aforesaid, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, also represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient, that the right of presentation and appointment to each of the churches of the said Consolidated Chapelries of Saint Mark, Coventry, and All Saints, Coventry aforesaid should belong to, and be exercised by, the said Henry, bishop of the said diocese of

Worcester, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

The First SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in the said Samuel, now Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Whereas by the eighth section of the abovementioned Act, after reciting that certain portions of Lambeth Palace, namely, the Lollards' Tower, and Cardinal Morton's Tower are not necessary or useful for the enjoyment by the Archbishops of Canterbury, of the Palace as a place of residence, whilst it is expedient that they should be preserved as monuments of historical and antiquarian interest, it is enacted that the costs of the preservation as aforesaid, of such portions of Lambeth Palace shall by the authority of a scheme passed by us, and of an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, be defrayed out of the rents and profits of the estates of the see of Canterbury in our hands, and that the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being, his executors, administrators, estate, and effects, shall be discharged from all liability for or in respect of dilapidations on the aforesaid portions of Lambeth Palace.

"And whereas the Most Reverend Charles Thomas Longley, Doctor in Divinity, the late Archbishop of the said see received from the executors of his predecessor therein, in respect of the dilapidations of the said portions of the said Palace, the sum of one thousand nine hundred and eighty three pounds fifteen shillings and five pence, and expended the sum of eighty-two pounds five shillings and sixpence in certain repairs of the same portions of the said Palace, and the sum of one thousand nine hundred and one pounds nine shillings and eleven pence, being the difference between the above mentioned amounts, has been paid over to us to be applied in and towards defraying the cost of the works which may be requisite to be done in order to carry into effect the said recited provisions of the said Act.

thereof has been theretofore defrayed out of the
gross revenues arising from the estates of the See
of Canterbury, and that such estates had as aforesaid become transferred to us, it was enacted that
the cost of the maintenance of such Library, and
of the custody of the books therein, might, if we
should think fit, by the authority of a scheme
passed by us, and of an Order of your Majesty in
Council ratifying the same, be defrayed out of
the rents and profits of such estates.

"And whereas after due consideration we are of opinion that provision should be made by us for the maintenance of the said Library, and of the custody of the books therein in the manner herein-

after set forth.

"And whereas the Most Reverend Charles Thomas Longley, Doctor in Divinity, the late Archbishop of the said See, received from the executors of his predecessor therein, in respect of the dilapidations of the said Library, the sum of two hundred and fourteen pounds five shillings and ten pence, and there has been paid over to us, in diminution and relief of the costs and charges which will be incurred by us in respect of the repair and maintenance of the said Library, the sum of one hundred and ninety-four pounds fourteen shillings and two pence, being the balance of the above-mentioned sum after deducting the outlay made by the said Archbishop in repairs of the said Library, and the said sum of one hundred and ninety-four pounds fourteen shillings and two pence has been accordingly placed by us to the credit of our common fund.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we be authorised to execute forthwith and from time to time, with the approval and concurrence of the Archbishop of Canterbury, for the time being, such repairs of the Fabric of the said Library as we may consider necessary or

desirable.

"And we further recommend and propose that the books and manuscripts in the said Library shall be forthwith, or as soon as conveniently may be, placed in a proper state of repair at our expense and under our direction, subject, nevertheless, to the like approval and concurrence of the

said Archbishop.

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us to the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being by equal halfyearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year, the annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and that a sum equivalent to two such half-yearly payments shall be made immediately on the gazetting of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme in respect of the two half years which have elapsed since the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight: Provided always, that no payment to be made by us for or in respect of any one half-year as aforesaid shall exceed in amount the sum which shall have been proved by certificate from the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being or otherwise to our satisfaction to have been actually expended by the said Archbishop for the time being in respect of the same half-year in providing for the custody of the Books and Manuscripts contained in such Library, in maintaining the same when repaired as aforesaid in a fitting condition, and in rendering the same accessible to the public at such times, and subject to such restrictions as we shall have previously approved: Provided also, that subject to such restrictions access to the said Library shall be secured to the public during a period of nine months in every year, on three days (at the least) in every week for not less than three hours on each day, and that all the payments aforesaid be made out of the rents and profits of the estates formerly belonging to the see of Canterbury which have been transferred to us.

Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William Connor, Bishop of Peterborough, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that the said bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend, under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts, the sum of one thousand two hundred pounds, and as a security for the same that the said Bishop do mortgage all or any part of the endowments now belonging or which hereafter may belong to his said see to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty five years, or until the said sum of one thousand two hundred pounds, with the interest for the same, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say, from and after the expiration of the first year of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage in which year no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, the said Bishop, or his successors, shall yearly and every year pay to the said Governors, their successors, or assigns, one thirtieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall at the end of the first and each succeeding year pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum, or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid, and if and when it shall happen that the principal and interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid, for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same, and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale, in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale; and that such mortgage deed shall be in a form to be approved by us, and shall bind as well the said William Connor, Bishop of Peterborough, as every succeeding bishop of the said see, until the principal money and interest, costs, and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the said sum of one thousand two hundred pounds shall be paid to us, and that the receipt of our joint treasurers, for the time being, endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum of one thousand two hundred pounds the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said works of improvement in the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the herein named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Peterborough.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Peterborough, being:-

"All that portion of the new parish of Saint Mark, Peterborough, in the county of Northampton, and in the diocese of Peterborough, and also all that contiguous portion of the parish of Saint John the Baptist, Peterborough, in the same county and diocese (consisting of a part of the

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Strood and of the said parish of Frindsbury, which are hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within the limits of the same any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted into one separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the Reverend John Griffith, canon of the cathedral church of Rochester,

Doctor in Divinity, has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England, the sum of three thousand pounds sterling, in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the maintenance of the incumbent thereof for the time being, and, we have, in respect of such sum, agreed with the said John Griffith, and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year to such incumbent as aforesaid, when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and to his successors, the yearly sum of one hundred pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, for the first one turn only be assigned to and be exercised by the said John Griffith and Mary Elizabeth, his present wife, jointly or by the survivor of them, and that from and after the exercise of the said first one turn of patronage or the decease of the said survivor, whichever event shall first happen, then that the whole or remaining right of patronage and nomination aforesaid, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese for ever.
