

other person offending against this Order, shall, by virtue of said Acts, for every such offence, forfeit and be liable to a penalty of Twenty Pounds sterling; and if in any case the number of Bulls, Oxen, Cows, Heifers, Calves, Sheep, Rams, Lambs, Goats, Swine, or other Ruminant Animals, imported contrary to this Order be more than Four, a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds sterling for each such Animal imported may be

imposed instead of the said penalty of Twenty Pounds sterling.

(or We) make this solemn Declaration conscientiously believing the same to be true; and by virtue of the provisions of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session held in the 5th and 6th years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William IV. (5th and 6th William IV., cap. 62), intituled "An Act to repeal an Act of the present Session of Parliament, intituled An Act for the more effectual Abolition of Oaths and Affirmations taken and made in the various Departments of the State, and to substitute Declarations in lieu thereof; and for the more entire suppression of Voluntary and Extra-Judicial Oaths and Affidavits, and to make other provisions for the abolition of unnecessary Oaths.
