A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to the twenty-eighth day of October instant: We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare, that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Thursday, the twenty-third day of December next.

Given at our Court at *Balmoral*, this seventh day of *October*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in the thirty-third year of Our reign.

IT is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York be prorogued from the day to which the same now stand prorogued to Friday, the twenty-fourth day of December next; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain is to cause Writs to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Convocations accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, dated the fifteenth of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following, viz. :—

“Whereas by the twelfth section of an Act passed in the thirty-second year of your Majesty's reign, chapter forty-four, intituled ‘An Act to make better provision respecting Greenwich Hospital, and the application of the Revenues thereof,’ it is enacted that the Admiralty shall, from time to time, pay to the Board of Trade a sum or sums not exceeding in the whole, in any year, the sum of four thousand pounds, which sum or sums the Board of Trade shall apply in payment of pensions to some of such masters and seamen of the Mercantile Marine as contributed out of their wages, the sum of sixpence a month towards the support of Greenwich Hospital :

And whereas by the same section of the said Act it is further provided that it shall be lawful for your Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, made on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make regulations respecting the qualifications for and amount of such pensions :

We beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, to sanction the following Regulations for the award of the Pensions in question :

I. Only such masters and seamen of the Mercantile Marine as can prove, to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade, at least five years service previous to first of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty five; and who contributed sixpence a month to the funds of Greenwich Hospital during that period; to be considered as eligible for the said pensions.

II. Only such Masters and seamen of the Mercantile Marine as have been disabled, or incapacitated from age; and who are not less than 55 years of age; to be considered as eligible for the said pensions.

III. The amount of the said pensions to be limited to the sum of £3 8s. Od. a year each.

IV. If the master or seamen is already in receipt of a pension amounting to that sum from the Merchant Seamen's Fund, no additional pension will be awarded from the funds of Greenwich Hospital; but if the Master or Seamen is in receipt of a pension of less amount from the Merchant Seamen's Fund, he will be allowed, from the funds of Greenwich Hospital, such additional pension as will, with his other pension, make up a sum not exceeding £3 8s. Od. a year.

V. The said pensions will, in the first instance, be granted to those masters and seamen who can prove the greatest length of service prior to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and who in other respects come under the foregoing conditions; provided the sum of £4,000 in any one year be not exceeded.

VI. Vacancies on the pension list will be filled up half yearly."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, section sixty-six, it is enacted as follows, viz.:-

Whereas by a Convention concluded between the United Kingdom and France on the 26th day of January, 1826, it was amongst other matters agreed that sea fishing boats of either country, when forced by stress of weather to seek shelter in the ports or on the coasts of the other country, should on certain conditions be exempted from all dues to which they would otherwise be liable, and doubts have arisen whether that part of the said Convention has ever been confirmed by the authority of Parliament, and it is expedient to remove such doubts and to enable Her Majesty to provide for the due execution of the said Convention, and of any other like Convention or Treaty which may be made by Her Majesty: be it enacted, that where any such Convention or Treaty as mentioned in this section has been or may hereafter be concluded with any foreign country, Her Majesty may by Order in Council direct that every sea fishing boat belonging to such foreign country, when forced by stress of weather to seek shelter in any port or place in the British Islands, shall, if it does not discharge or receive on board any cargo, and complies with the other conditions, if any, specified in such Order, be exempt from all dues, tolls, rates, taxes, duties, imposts, and other charges to which it would otherwise be liable in such port or place, and every such boat shall be exempt accordingly.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that from the date of this Order,

every French sea fishing boat, when forced by stress of weather to seek shelter in any port or place in the British Islands shall, if it does not discharge or receive on board any cargo, be exempt from all dues, tolls, rates, taxes, duties, imposts, and other charges to which it would otherwise be liable in such port or place.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate in that part of the hamlet of Donisthorpe, which is in the county of Derby, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas in those extremities of the parish or parochial chapelry of Church-Gresley, in the county of Derby, and diocese of Lichfield aforesaid, of the parish or parochial chapelry of Measham, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Seal, in the county of Leicester, and diocese of Peterborough, which are comprised within the said hamlet of Donisthorpe, and also at certain other extremities of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Church-Gresley, and at certain extremities of the parish of Stretton-en-le-field, in the said county of Derby, and in the said diocese of Lichfield, and of the parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough aforesaid, all which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes or parochial chapelries respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Church-Gresley, of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Measham, of the said parish of Seal, of the said parish of Stretton-en-le-Field, and of the said parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John, situate in the hamlet of Donisthorpe as aforesaid.

"And whereas the major part in number of the patrons of the respective parishes or parochial

chapelries, out of which such consolidated chapelry is proposed to be formed as aforesaid, by virtue of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts concur as to the formation of such consolidated chapelry, and as to the person to whom the right of patronage of the church of such consolidated chapelry shall belong.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend George Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and of the Right Reverend William Connor, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (in testimony whereof they the said Bishops have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of Charles Frederick Abney Hastings, of Donnington Park, in the said county of Derby, Esquire, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Measham, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, with the consent of Sir Mylles Cave-Browne Cave, of Stretton-en-le-field, Baronet, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Stretton-en-le-field, and with the consent of the Reverend George Lloyd, of Church Gresley, Clerk, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Church-Gresley, being the major part in number of the patrons of the respective parishes or parochial chapelries aforesaid (in testimony of which consent they the said lastly mentioned consenting parties have also respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes or parochial chapelries of Church-Gresley, and of Measham, and of the said parishes of Seal, of Stretton-en-le-field, and of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, which said portions are described in the schedule hereunder written, and together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John, situate in the hamlet of Donisthorpe as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Donisthorpe,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Lichfield.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Donisthorpe, being,

"All those several portions of the parish or parochial chapelry of Church-Gresley, in the county of Derby, and in the diocese of Lichfield, of the parish or parochial chapelry of Measham, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Seal, in the county of Leicester, and diocese of Peterborough, which together constitute the hamlet of Donisthorpe, and also all those several portions of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Church-Gresley, and of the parish of Stretton-en-le-field, in the said county of Derby, and in the diocese of Lichfield aforesaid, which together form part of the hamlet of Oakthorpe, and also all that portion of the parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the said county of Leicester, and in the diocese

of Peterborough aforesaid, all which said hamlets of Donisthorpe, said part of the hamlet of Oakthorpe, and said portion of the parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch are contiguous, and are comprised within, and are bounded by, an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the township of Nether and Over Seal, in the said parish of Seal, from the hamlet of Donisthorpe aforesaid, at a point in the centre of Acresford Bridge, which carries the turnpike road leading from Over Seal to Measham, over the brook flowing from Barratt Pool into the River Mease; and extending thence south-westward along the course of the said brook (thereby following the boundary which divides the said township of Nether and Over Seal from the hamlet of Donisthorpe aforesaid) to the junction of the same brook with the River Mease aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward for the most part along the course of the same river (thereby following the boundary which divides the said hamlet of Donisthorpe from the township or chapelry of Chilcote, in the parish of Clifton Campville, in the said county of Derby, and in the diocese of Lichfield aforesaid, and from the said parish of Stretton-en-le-field) to the point where the said river is joined by the Oakthorpe Brook; and extending thence north-eastward up the course of the last-described stream (thereby following the boundary which divides the said hamlet of Oakthorpe from the hamlet of Donisthorpe aforesaid) to a point in the centre of Saltersford Bridge, which carries the turnpike road leading from Over Seal to Measham as aforesaid over the last-named brook; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the same turnpike road, for a distance of five and a-half furlongs or thereabouts, to a point upon the boundary dividing the said hamlet of Oakthorpe from the township of Measham, in the parish or parochial chapelry of Measham aforesaid, at the south-western end of a certain cross road connecting the same turnpike road with the turnpike road leading from Hartshorn to Measham; and extending thence north-eastward along the last-described boundary, thereby following the course of the said cross road to a point in the middle of the turnpike road leading from Hartshorn to Measham as aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward for a distance of nearly three furlongs along the middle of the last-mentioned turnpike road to a point in the centre of the bridge, known as Canal Bridge No. 70, which carries the same turnpike road over the Ashby-de-la-Zouch Canal; and extending thence first north-eastward to and along the middle of the said canal, and then northward along the middle of the same canal for a distance of rather more than half-a-mile to the point where the boundary dividing the hamlet of Oakthorpe from the hamlet of Donisthorpe as aforesaid crosses the said canal; and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of two chains or thereabouts, along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said hamlet of Donisthorpe from the parish or parochial chapelry of Willesley, in the said county of Derby, and in the diocese of Lichfield aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward, along the last-described boundary, to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch from the parish or parochial chapelry of Willesley aforesaid; and extending thence, generally north-eastward, along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Ashby-de-

la-Zouch from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the said county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough aforesaid; and extending thence, north-westward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch from the chapelry of Blackfordby, in the said county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough aforesaid; and extending thence, first north-westward and then south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary, to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch from the consolidated chapelry of Woodville, in the said counties of Leicester and Derby, and in the diocese of Peterborough aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-westward and then north-westward along the last-described boundary, to its junction at the north-western end of Barratt Pool with the boundary dividing the said parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch from the township of Nether and Over Seal aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then southward along the last-mentioned boundary, to its junction with the boundary dividing the hamlet of Donisthorpe from the township of Nether and Over Seal as aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the last-described boundary to the first-described point in the centre of Acresford Bridge aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the several Registrars of the said dioceses of Lichfield and of Peterborough respectively.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of another Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight; and of another Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Ma-

esty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the bishopric of London, and now vested in us.

"Whereas on the vacancy of the said bishopric which occurred on or about the thirtieth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, by the translation of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell the then Bishop of London to the Archiepiscopal See of Canterbury all the lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments then belonging to the said bishopric (except rights of patronage and the episcopal houses of residence, situate at Fulham and in Saint James's-square, in the county of Middlesex) became absolutely vested in us, for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments aforesaid consist, to a considerable extent, of reversions expectant upon grants and leases for lives and years, and produce during the subsistence of such grants and leases only small annual revenues, and on that account, and in some instances on account of the character or situation of the property, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be assigned as an endowment for the said bishopric, or to be held or applied for the other purposes, for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts, by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by the last-mentioned Act power is given to lessees holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions, or for the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas it is expedient that such of the aforesaid lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments lately belonging to the see of London (either with or without other property vested in us, as the case may require), as in the judgment of our Estates Committee, and subject to the approbation of the Bishop for the time being, shall be deemed convenient to be held as an endowment for the said see, and as will secure a net annual income of ten thousand pounds, being the income named for the Bishop of London and his successors by the Order made by your Majesty in Council on the twenty-fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, which Order was duly published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of September following, should be assigned as the endowment of the said see, and that for that purpose, as well as with a view to the more advantageous appropriation of the remainder of the said lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, and in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the respective holders (if any), to be testified by their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said lands, tithes, hereditaments, and endowments heretofore belonging to the said bishopric of London, and

So vested in us by the vacation of the said bishopric, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds thereof from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be assigned as the endowment for the said See, or to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property now vested in us, in the parish of Eccleshall, in the county of Stafford.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture made under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the fourteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and published in the London Gazette of the fifteenth day of the same month, the said indenture bearing date the nineteenth day

of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty eight, and being made between the Right Reverend Father in God George Augustus Lord Bishop of Lichfield of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, the episcopal residence at Eccleshall, in the county of Stafford, with its appurtenances and all the estate, right, title, and interest therein of the said Lord Bishop became and are now vested in us, in fee simple, for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the said house with its appurtenances is now in our possession, but the same is, on account of its character and situation, unsuitable and inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said house and its appurtenances, or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the same should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly, that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in the same in such manner, as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time, to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, the said house so vested in us as aforesaid with its appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts, by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the benefice (being a rectory) of Benington, situate in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln, for the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Nocton, also situate in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual patronage of the said benefice and rectory of Benington, and the church thereof, is vested in the Right Honourable George Frederick Samuel, Earl de Grey and Ripon, for an estate of inheritance in fee simple in possession.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual patronage of the said benefice and vicarage of Nocton, and the church thereof, is vested in your Majesty, in right of the crown, and is exercised by the Lord High Chancellor of England, for the time being, in virtue of his office.

"And whereas the said George Frederick Samuel, Earl de Grey and Ripon, and the Right Honourable William Page, Baron Hatherley, now Lord High Chancellor of England, have respectively signified to us their desire, that the patronage of the said two several benefices of Benington and Nocton, the particulars of which said benefices are set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, may be exchanged, as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange, and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the said schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William Page, Baron Hatherley, acting as such Lord High Chancellor of England as aforesaid (in testimony of which consent he has set his hand and seal to this scheme), and with the consent of the said George Frederick Samuel, Earl de Grey and Ripon (in testimony of which consent he also has set his hand and seal to this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the advowson or perpetual patronage of, and right of nomination to, the benefice hereinbefore and in the said schedule firstly mentioned (that is to say), the benefice and rectory of Benington shall be transferred from the said George Frederick Samuel, Earl de Grey and Ripon, and from his heirs and assigns, and shall become and be absolutely vested in your Majesty, your heirs and successors, in right of the crown, and shall and may from time to time be exercised on behalf of your Majesty, your heirs and successors, in such right as aforesaid, by the said William Page, Baron Hatherley, as such Lord High Chancellor of England, or by other the Lord High Chancellor of England for the time being, and that in exchange for the same, the advowson or perpetual patronage of, and right of nomination to, the benefice hereinbefore and in the said schedule secondly mentioned (that is to say), the benefice and vicarage of Nocton, shall upon and from the said lastly-mentioned day be transferred from your Majesty, your heirs and successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Frederick Samuel, Earl de Grey and Ripon, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections three, five, and seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty, the following scheme relating to the endowment of the see of Peterborough.

"Whereas by the said Act it is enacted that on the avoidance from time to time of any see, after the assignment of an endowment for the same, our Estates Committee may, if they shall think fit, revise the arrangement in force in relation to such endowment, and for that purpose enquire into the state and productiveness of such endowment, and if such endowment, in the judgment of the Committee, will secure a net annual income exceeding that named for the archbishop or bishop as aforesaid, or will not secure the full amount of such annual income, such Committee may report thereon to us, and that we shall, if we think fit, make an arrangement, by vesting part of the lands and hereditaments constituting such endowment in us, or by assigning lands and hereditaments by way of addition to such endowment, or by means of annual or other payments to or by us, as the case may require, which may secure, in the judgment of the said Committee, to the archbishop or bishop who may succeed upon that avoidance, the net annual income named for the archbishop or bishop of such see, by any Act of Parliament or Order in Council then in force, or as near thereto as circumstances will allow; provided always, that if a difference of opinion as to the value or sufficiency of the estates which such Committee may propose to leave or to assign to any see shall arise between the archbishop or bishop thereof and the said Committee, such difference shall be settled by arbitration, before such arrangement as is last mentioned shall be made.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, made under the provisions of the said Act, bearing date the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and duly published in the London Gazette, on the fourth day of the same month, certain lands and hereditaments were assigned as the endowment of the see of Peterborough.

"And whereas the Right Reverend William Connor, the present Bishop of Peterborough, succeeded to the said see on an avoidance thereof, which occurred on or about the twentieth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.

"And whereas at the date of such avoidance the endowment of the said see consisted of the lands, stock, and hereditaments set forth in the schedule marked A, annexed to this scheme.

"And whereas our Estates Committee have upon such avoidance revised the arrangement in force in relation to the endowment thereof, and for that purpose have enquired into the state and productiveness of such endowment, and have reported to us, that such endowment will in their judgment secure a net annual income exceeding that named for the bishop of the said see by the hereinbefore recited Order of your Majesty in Council, being the Order now in force in relation to such income videlicet four thousand and five hundred pounds per annum, and that the arrangement embodied in the recommendations hereinafter contained will secure in their judgment to the said bishop a net annual income of four thousand and five hundred pounds, or as near thereto, as circumstances will allow.

"And whereas the land, particularly described in the schedule marked B annexed to this scheme, is vested in us for an estate of fee simple in possession.

"And whereas no difference of opinion has arisen between the said bishop and the said committee as to the fact, that the estates, which the said committee propose should be left and assigned respectively to the said see, are sufficient (after a certain expenditure shall have been made in improving the same as is hereinafter mentioned) to produce the net average annual income of four thousand and five hundred pounds, and no more."

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Connor, Bishop of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, with a view to securing to the said bishop the said net annual income of four thousand and five hundred pounds, that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands, stock, and hereditaments particularly described in the second part of the schedule marked A annexed to this scheme, estimated to produce the net average annual income of two hundred and eleven pounds, or thereabouts, with their appurtenances, and all the right, title, estate, and interest therein of the said Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors, shall be and become transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the same, as from the hereinbefore mentioned date of avoidance of the said see.

"And we also recommend and propose, with a view to the securing of such net annual income as aforesaid, that upon such publication as aforesaid of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any further conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the land particularly described in the schedule marked B annexed to this scheme, estimated to produce the net average annual income of two pounds, with its appurtenances, and all our right, title, and interest therein shall be and become vested in the said Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors, and that the said bishop shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the hereinbefore mentioned date of avoidance of the said see.

"And we further recommend and propose that we shall forthwith provide a sum of one thousand three hundred and ten pounds to be expended to our satisfaction by the Bishop of Peterborough, in the erection of cottages and farm buildings, or in the improvement of the same on the lands, which

by this scheme are proposed and recommended to be the endowment of the said see, such expenditure being necessary in order to render the same lands suitable for producing permanently a net average annual income of four thousand and five hundred pounds as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-six, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme or representation bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme or representation as to the assignment of a separate district for spiritual purposes to the consecrated church or chapel of Saint Leonard, situate within the town and reputed parish of Saint Leonard, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas it is provided by the said Act that a separate district for spiritual purposes shall be assigned to the said church or chapel of Saint Leonard, situate within the town and reputed parish of Saint Leonard as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose and represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that territory which is described in the said Act as the area coloured pink on the plan referred to in the same Act, all which territory, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon also coloured pink, should be assigned as a separate district for spiritual purposes to the said church or chapel of Saint Leonard, situate within the town and reputed parish of Saint Leonard aforesaid, and that the same should be named or styled 'The parish of Saint Leonard's-on-Sea.'

"All which we humbly recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council, and pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law from and after the date of the occurrence of the contingency or contingencies in that behalf specified in the said Act, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and registered by the registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the "Ecclesiastical Commission Act, 1868," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of 'The Ecclesiastical Commission Act, 1868,' sections three and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity in Ely.

"Whereas the said chapter now consists of a dean and six canons, two canons having been suspended under the provisions of an Act passed in the session held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues.'

"And whereas the said dean and chapter have agreed with us that a scheme should be laid before your Majesty in Council for carrying into effect a transfer to us of part of the property belonging to them, for the considerations and upon the terms hereinafter set forth, which terms are in our opinion fair and reasonable, and the said dean and chapter have further agreed with us that such scheme should also comprise the incidental provisions hereinafter set forth, such provisions being necessary for carrying into effect the said transfer.

"And whereas the lands and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A, are vested in us in fee simple in possession, and the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and sums of stock particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked B, are part of the property of the said dean and chapter.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity in Ely, and of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of Ely, as visitor of the said dean and chapter (testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals), we humbly recommend and propose that all the property which now belongs to the said dean and chapter (excepting any ecclesiastical, educational, or other like patronage, the cathedral church and the residences, buildings, gardens, and enclosures, forming the cathedral precincts and otherwise known as the parish of Ely College, and also excepting the lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and sums of stock particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed marked B, and the property held by the said dean and chapter for the benefit of the lay clerks of the cathedral church, or in trust for special or charitable purposes), shall, together with the benefit of the perpetual land-tax charged thereupon, which has been redeemed, upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, be transferred to us in the manner contemplated by the said first-mentioned Act, and that we shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the property so to be transferred to us as from the twenty-fifth day of March, one

thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and that in consideration of and for such transfer, the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments particularly set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed marked A, together with the benefit of the perpetual land-tax charged thereon, which has been redeemed, shall upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, be transferred to the said dean and chapter in manner contemplated by the said first-mentioned Act, and that they the said dean and chapter shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof as from the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and that in further consideration of and for such transfer to us as aforesaid, we shall surrender all right, and be excluded from all participation in respect of the said suspended canonries to and in the estates and property to be retained by the said dean and chapter, or to be by any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, or by any other Order made under the said first-mentioned Act transferred to them as part of their permanent endowment and in the rents and profits thereof, and in the money payments hereinafter mentioned, and that in further consideration of and for such transfer to us as aforesaid, there shall be paid by us by equal half-yearly payments on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year to the said dean and chapter, the annual sum of five thousand and two hundred pounds, and that the payment of such annual sum shall continue until the said dean and chapter shall have been under the authority provided by the said first-mentioned Act, put into possession in fee-simple of real estates (of which not more than one-half part shall consist of tithe rent charges), sufficient to secure to the said dean and chapter, in addition to the income which the said dean and chapter will derive from the property proposed by this scheme to be transferred to and to be retained by them, a clear annual income therefrom, after deducting rates, taxes, the cost of agency and other outgoings, amounting to the said annual sum of five thousand and two hundred pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall also be paid by us by equal half-yearly payments to the said dean and chapter on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year, until they shall have been put into possession of such real estates, as aforesaid, a sum of one hundred pounds (such last-mentioned sum to be by them appropriated and paid to their chapter clerk in respect of the profits which would have accrued to him on account of the management of the estates hereby proposed to be transferred to us), and that the first half-yearly payment in respect of each of the hereinbefore-mentioned annual sums of five-thousand and two hundred pounds and one hundred pounds shall be made on the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

"And we further recommend and propose that as the consideration for the loss which the said dean and chapter have incurred by having abstained from renewing certain leases of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, hereby proposed to be transferred to us which became renewable prior to the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, there shall be paid by us to the said dean and chapter, immediately upon the publication as aforesaid of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, a sum of six thousand pounds, and that the receipt or receipts

of the treasurer for the time being of the said dean and chapter shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of this scheme when ratified as aforesaid.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the new parish of Ugthorpe, in the county and diocese of York.

“Whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, is in

right of his see, the patron both of the vicarage of Lythe, in the said county and diocese, and of the vicarage of Ugthorpe aforesaid.

And whereas the said vicarage of Ugthorpe is at present ill endowed, and the said vicarage of Lythe is or will be competently endowed independently of the lands and hereditaments hereinafter particularly mentioned, and it has been represented to us, and we are of opinion, that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish of Ugthorpe by means of the apportionment of the endowment of the said vicarage of Lythe, which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas part of the endowment of the said vicarage of Lythe consists of a certain messuage, lands, buildings, and hereditaments, situate at Ugthorpe aforesaid, which said messuage and premises are more particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, the same having been secured as such endowment by and under the provisions of a deed poll, bearing date the twenty-third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, which conveyed the premises to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation and maintenance of the Poor Clergy, for the benefit of the vicarage of Lythe aforesaid.

“And whereas we have agreed, so soon as the said apportionment of endowment shall have been effected, as hereinafter recommended, to secure to the said vicarage of Lythe, out of our common fund in the said firstly-mentioned Act named, an equivalent yearly sum or stipend, in lieu of the said messuage, lands, buildings, and hereditaments, with their appurtenances.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, and also with the consent of the Reverend Henry Richard Storr Pearson, Clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Lythe, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that, upon and from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, the said messuage, lands, buildings, and here-

ditaments, with their appurtenances, which are described in the said schedule hereunto annexed as aforesaid, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage of Ugthorpe.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

SCHEDULE.

"All that messuage, tenement, or dwelling-house, commonly called Ewe House, with the outbuildings, garth, and orchard thereto adjoining, containing together by admeasurement three roods and twenty-three perches, be the same more or less.

"And also all those several closes, pieces, or parcels of land, lying contiguous to the said messuage, tenement, or dwelling-house, commonly called respectively by the several names, and containing by admeasurement the several quantities following, be the same or any or either of them more or less, that is to say, Back Garth containing one rood and three perches, High Field containing four acres three roods and thirty-one perches, Hay Pike Field containing two acres two roods and thirty-four perches, Little Field, containing one acre three roods and four perches, Horse Pasture, containing one acre one rood and eight perches, High House Field, containing three acres one rood and twenty-eight perches, Stone Stoup Bank, containing three acres and one rood, High House Garth, with the building thereon, containing two roods and twenty-three perches, Jackson's High Field, containing one acre three roods and seven perches, Jackson's Bank, containing three acres two roods and thirty-two perches, Low Calf Close, containing four acres two roods and twenty-six perches, Lays, containing two acres one rood and six perches, Lec Close House Field, containing three acres three roods and sixteen perches, Woodfield, containing one acre three roods and twenty perches, High Calf Close, containing three acres one rood and thirty-one perches, Holdfield, containing two acres two roods and thirty-five perches, Long Field, containing two acres two roods and thirty-six perches, and the Far Field, containing three acres three roods and thirty-two perches, or by whatsoever names or name the said several fields or either of them are, or have been commonly called, known, or described, all which said messuage, tenement, or dwelling-house, outbuildings, garth, and orchard, closes, pieces, or parcels of land, and hereditaments with their appurtenances hereinbefore described, are situate at Ugthorpe, within the parish of Lythe, in the North Riding, of the county of York."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following, that is to say;

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Rothwell, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Rothwell, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and set forth.

"And whereas Joseph Crompton Oddie, of Woodlesford, in the said parish of Rothwell, Esquire, has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England, the sum of three thousand pounds sterling in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the maintenance of the incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed with the said Joseph Crompton Oddie, and have undertaken to provide, and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May, and the first day of November, in each and every year, to such incumbent as aforesaid, when duly licensed, in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and to his successors the yearly sum of one hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid by the said Joseph Crompton Oddie as aforesaid, upon the understanding and condition, that we should recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council, that the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we have also determined to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act, to the incumbent for the time being of the said District hereinafter recommended to be constituted when duly licensed as aforesaid, the yearly sum of fifty pounds the payment whereof will be secured by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Rothwell, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of All Saints, Woodlesford.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district, so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be vested in the Reverend John Bell, now vicar, or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Rothwell, for and during his life, and that after the death of the said John Bell the said right of patronage and nomination shall be assigned to, and be vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by, the said Joseph Crompton Oddie, Sir Charles Hugh Lowther, of Swillington House, in the said county of York, Baronet, Henry Bentley, of Eshald House, Woodlesford aforesaid, Esquire, John Towlerton Leather, of Leaventhorpe Hall, in the said county of York, Esquire, and Richard Harrison, of Woodlesford aforesaid, Esquire, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of All Saints, Woodlesford, being :—

"All that part of the parish of Rothwell, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-east by the parish of Swillington, on the north partly by the parish of Whitkirk, and partly by the new parish of Saint Saviour, Leeds, on the north-west by the new parish of Saint Mary, Hunslet (all which parishes and new parishes are in the county and diocese aforesaid), and on the remaining sides, that is to say, on the south-west and on the south partly by the chapelry district of Middleton, some time part of the said parish of Rothwell, and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said chapelry district of Middleton from the parish of Rothwell aforesaid, at the point on the south-western side of the Barnsdale and Leeds trust road, near the third mile stone from Leeds, at which point the same road passes over a certain tramway which leads from Rothwell Haigh Colliery to the Aire and Calder Canal; and extending thence, first north-eastward, to, and then south-eastward, for, a distance of one

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-six, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a

separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish of Saint Ann, Lydgate, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Manchester, and out of the new parish of Christ Church, Friezland, partly in the said county of York, and partly in the county of Chester, and wholly in the said diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas the said new parish of Saint Ann, Lydgate, was some time part of the original parish of Rochdale, and that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church, Friezland, which is within the county of York as aforesaid, was also some time part of the original parish of Rochdale aforesaid.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular portions of the said new parishes of Saint Ann, Lydgate, and of Christ Church, Friezland, which are hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their respective limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship) should be constituted into a separate district, in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain glebe lands, messuages, tenements, and hereditaments, sometime belonging to the vicarage of the said parish of Rochdale, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the fourthly herein-before mentioned Act.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, all those portions of the said new parish of Saint Ann, Lydgate, and of the said new parish of Christ Church, Friezland, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint John the Baptist, Roughtown.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act or Acts of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint John the Baptist, Roughtown, being :—

"All that portion of the new parish of Saint Ann, Lydgate, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Manchester (sometime part of the original parish of Rochdale), which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing near to the boundary stone numbered 150, and placed

And also of such new parish of Christ Church, Friezland, all that portion situate within the county of York, and within the original limits of the parish of Rochdale as last mentioned, which is bounded on the west by the above-described portion of the new parish of Saint Ann, Lydgate, on the east and south by the said county of Chester, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing at the above-described point upon the boundary, which divides the said new parishes of Saint Ann, Lydgate, and Christ Church, Friezland, where the footpath leading from Midge Hill to Quick Mill crosses the middle of the line of the London and North-western Railway as aforesaid; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the same footpath to the boundary which divides the said county of York, from the county of Chester aforesaid, at the ford across the River Tame, near Quick Mill aforesaid."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two new parishes out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas one calendar month has elapsed since drafts of the said scheme were so transmitted as aforesaid.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said

scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the ecclesiastical district of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields, Liverpool, within the original limits of the parish of Liverpool, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of the said ecclesiastical district of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields, Liverpool, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and set forth.

"And whereas the Reverend Charles Parnell, of Liverpool, Clerk, has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England the sum of three thousand pounds sterling, in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the maintenance of the incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum, agreed with the said Charles Parnell, and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to such incumbent as aforesaid, when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act and to his successors the yearly sum of one hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid, upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have also determined to make and pay out of the common fund created by

the firstly herein-mentioned Act, to the incumbent for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when and so soon as a church shall have been provided within and for such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of the same district (which will then and thereby have become a new parish), a grant of such amount, not exceeding two hundred pounds per annum, as will be sufficient to raise to three hundred pounds per annum the total income from endowment of such new parish; and such lastly-mentioned grant will be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said ecclesiastical district of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields, Liverpool, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint James the Less, Liverpool.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of such new parish, when the said district shall have become such, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, and for the first twenty nominations which shall accrue within forty years from the date of such publication as aforesaid, if so many shall so accrue, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by, Bramley Radford, of Marsh-lane, Liverpool, Gentleman, by Edward Bromehead, of Litherland, Liverpool, Gentleman, by Henry Duckworth, of Liverpool, Gentleman, by Rodolph Zwilchenbart, of the city of Chester, Gentleman, and by John Parnell, of Upper Clapton, in the county of Middlesex, Gentleman, and their successors, as hereinafter is mentioned; upon trust, nevertheless, that they, the said Bramley Radford, Edward Bromehead, Henry Duckworth, Rodolph Zwilchenbart, and John Parnell, and their successors, shall, upon the first and each successive legal vacancy in or avoidance of the ministry of the said district or new parish, up to and inclusive of the twentieth such vacancy which shall occur within the said period of forty years, exercise such right of patronage and nomination, by nominating to the same ministry some one fit and proper person, being in holy orders of the Church of England, to be approved of for the purpose by them the trustees for the time being of the said right of patronage and nomination, or by a majority of them; provided always, and we hereby further recommend and propose, that when and so often as, during the said space of forty years, the said Bramley Radford, Edward Bromehead, Henry Duckworth, Rodolph Zwilchenbart, and John Parnell, or any future trustees or trustee, shall die, resign, or become incapable of acting in

the execution of the trust hereby recommended and proposed to be created, or shall desire to retire from the said trust, then, and in every such case, a new trustee or new trustees of the said right of patronage and nomination shall be appointed for the remaining term of the said space of forty years, in the manner and subject to the several provisions set forth in and provided by the tenth section of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, with respect to new trustees to be appointed under the provisions of such last-mentioned statute: Provided always, and we further recommend and propose, that it shall not be lawful for the said Bramley Radford, Edward Bromehead, Henry Duckworth, Rodolph Zwilchenbart, and John Parnell, nor for any of them, nor for any future trustees or trustee (whether appointed as hereinbefore is provided, or howsoever otherwise) acting in execution of the trust hereby recommended to be created, or having the right of patronage or nomination as aforesaid, at any time to sell or otherwise depart with or dispose of, for any valuable consideration, the said right of patronage or nomination, but that the same right shall at all times hereafter be held and exercised according to the tenor of this scheme, and not otherwise.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon and after the expiration or other sooner determination of the assignment of such right of patronage and nomination as aforesaid, the whole right or remaining right of such patronage and nomination shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the then bishop of the said diocese of Chester, and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint James the Less, Liverpool, being:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes, out of the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, sometime part of the parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of the said district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises, situate within the said parish of Saint

Leonard, Shoreditch, have become vested in us, under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts, or of some of them, and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act, to the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein-mentioned Act, and to his successors, a grant of two hundred pounds per annum, and also a further grant of one hundred pounds per annum, as soon as a church shall have been erected within and for such district, and shall have been approved by us, and shall have been consecrated as the church of such district.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Peter, Hoxton.’

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Saint Peter, Hoxton, being:—

“All that part of the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, sometime part of the parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, wherein the present incumbent of such district parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the east by the said parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, on the south by the new parish of Saint Michael, Shoreditch, on the west partly by the new parish of Saint Mark, Old-street, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, and on all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the west and on the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton aforesaid, at the point where Pitfield-street is intersected by Queen-street; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts, along the middle of Pitfield-street aforesaid, to a point near the southern side of the church of Saint John the Baptist, Hoxton, where the said Pitfield-street is joined on the west by Critchill-place, and on the east by a certain passage or footway called Pimlico-walk, which leads into Hoxton-street; and extending thence, eastward, along the middle of the said passage or footway, to the boundary in

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Shanklin, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth

on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Saviour, situate within the limits of the same parish as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Shanklin.'

"And with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Shanklin, being:—

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, all or any of the said glebe lands and premises formerly belonging to the said rectory and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds thereof from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

WILLESDEN.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish; and also in the old churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented; and except in family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains or of foul soil;—to be used only for the burial of the members of the families of those already interred therein.

BINGLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Bingley, Yorkshire; and also, after the thirty-first of July, one thousand eight hundred

SCALBY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Scalby, Yorkshire; and also in the old part of the churchyard, except in graves in which the coffins have been and shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork, and except in other graves for the burial of the widows or widowers of those already buried in the old part of the churchyard, and except for the burial of infants not more than a year old.

BEVERLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish burial-ground or additional churchyard of Saint Mary's, Beverley, in the county of York, except in now existing family vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows, viz. :—

That the time for the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard of All Saints, Chorlton, in the parish of Manchester, be postponed till the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one; and, in the meantime, that interments be limited to those in the now existing family vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or of remains, for the burial only of widowers or widows of those already interred, on condition that the Sanitary Inspector for the borough of Manchester be informed the day preceding of the time fixed for any intended funeral.

That the operation of the Order in Council of the eighteenth of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, affecting burials in the churchyard of the parish of St. Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, be postponed until the end of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one; and, in the meantime, that no earthen grave be re-opened for burial, except such as are free from coffins or entire bones, to the depth of five feet; and that all coffins buried in vaults or walled graves be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed by being enclosed by stonework properly cemented.

ALL SAINTS, NORWOOD.—Forthwith wholly in the church of All Saints, Norwood, in the parish of Croydon, and also in the churchyard, except for the burial of the families of those who owned family vaults or graves on the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and that before burial such ownership be established to the satisfaction of the churchwardens; also that interments be conducted according to the Regulations directed in the Order of first March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and that twenty-four hours' notice of any intended burial be given by the sexton to the Sanitary Inspector of Croydon.

OUTWELL.—Forthwith wholly in Outwell churchyard on the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, except in walled graves existing on the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and except in other graves for the burial of the widowers or widows of those already buried in the churchyard.

LOUGHOR, LLANELLY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Loughor, and also in the churchyard, except in graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such represen-

tation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-second day of November next:

1. The description and drawings of inventions, for which a patent shall have been granted by the Ministry of Commerce, are to be published monthly;

and for this purpose a new series of the *Bulletino Industriale* is established.

2. The drawings which accompany the request for the issue of a patent must be either simply traced in Indian Ink, lithographed, or engraved, and must be as much reduced as possible, so as never to exceed the following dimensions:—

Either 15 centimetres by 20,
Or 20 „ by 30;

or, in cases of drawings of large machinery, 30 centimetres by 40.

3. Drawings larger than is strictly necessary for clearness will be returned by the Ministry of Commerce to the person asking for the patent; and he must then make fresh drawings not larger than the prescribed size. Until the fresh drawings have been duly presented no steps can be taken for granting the patent.

Lower Light.—A *fixed red* light, also visible through an arc of 15 degrees in the same direction as the upper light, elevated 17 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 9 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

The tower lies N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 536 yards from the upper light tower, is 23 feet high, built of stone, square, and painted white.

Note.—The light on *l'île D'Aix* in a line with the Upper light (red) on the north bank will lead $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles northward of the *Rocher d'Antioche* and will be useful in navigating the *Pertuis* to and from the *Rade l'île D'Aix*.
