Light Vessel off the Great Basses Rocks.

THE Trinity House, London, has given notice, that from about the 15th day of March, 1870, during the time of building the lighthouse on the Great Basses Rocks, off the South-east Coast of Ceylon; a light vessel will be placed in 12 fathoms water, about one mile N.N.E. from the rocks; and in order to distinguish the light exhibited from this vessel from that of the Little Basses, 20 miles distant (which shows a white flash every one and a half minutes), it will be a *red revolving* light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every *forty-five seconds*.

Aberdare Local Board Water.

(Powers for the Local Board of Health for the District of Aberdare to supply water—Limits of Supply—Construction of Waterworks—Purchase of Lands—Rates, Rents, and Charges—Power to Borrow—Purchase of Existing Waterworks of the Aberdare Waterworks Company—Confirmation of Agreement—Repeal and Amendment of Acts, and other Purposes).

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session for an Act to authorize the Local Board of Health for the District of Aberdare, in the county of Glamorgan, hereinafter referred to as "The Local Board," to supply water for domestic, trade, sanitary, and other purposes within the limits to be defined in the intended Act, and which will comprise all or some part or parts of the following districts or places, that is to say:—The District of the Local Board, and such part of the town or village, known as Hirwain, as is situate in the parish of Penderin, in the county of Brecon, and to confer upon the Local Board all rights, powers, authorities, and privileges of breaking up roads, streets, railways, bridges, and public places, laying pipes, constructing works, and otherwise, usually conferred on Local Boards, or other Public Bodies, for supplying water within their respective limits, and also such other rights, powers, authorities, and privileges as may be necessary, proper, or convenient for enabling the Local Board fully and effectually to carry into effect the objects and purposes of the intended Act.

And it is proposed by the intended Act to authorize the Local Board to make and maintain all, or some of the following works, or some part or parts thereof, respectively, that is to say:—

1. A reservoir, with all necessary approaches, embankments, waste weirs, diversions of streams, and roads, conduits, discharge tunnels, pipes, sluices, outlets, and other works, and conveniences connected therewith, to be situated at or near Blaen Nant Hir, on a certain stream there, known as Nant Hir, the embankment of which reservoir, where it crosses the said stream, will be placed 718 yards, or thereabouts, measured in a straight line in a northerly direction from the north-west corner of the farm house called Hendre Bailey, at which embankment the reservoir will commence, and thence extend up such stream in a northerly direction, for a distance of 466 yards, or thereabouts, and there terminate, which reservoir will be situated partly in the hamlet of Llwydcoed, in the parish of Aberdare, in the county of Glamorgan, and partly in the parish of Penderin, in the county of Brecon.

2. An aqueduct conduit or line of pipes, with all necessary sluices, outlets, embankments, filter-beds, residuum lodges, and other works and conveniences connected therewith to commence in the intended reservoir herein lastly described, near the intended embankment of such reservoir, in the bed of the said stream, at a point 80 yards or thereabouts, measured in a direct line north of the point where the said embankment crosses the said stream, and to terminate in a junction with the existing pipes of the Aberdare Water Works Company, at a point in the public road leading from Aberdare to Hirwain, 45 yards, or thereabouts, east of the porch of the south eastern lodge of the Aberdare public park, which aqueduct conduit or line of pipes will pass through or into the parish of Penderin, in the county of Brecon, and the hamlets of Llwydcoed and

Cwmndare, in the parish of Aberdare, in the county of Glamorgan.

3. A road to commence in the hamlet of Llwydcoed, in the parish of Aberdare, and county of Glamorgan, at or in the turnpike road from Neath to Methyr Tydfil, at a point in the said road where an existing road joins the said turnpike road, 622 yards, or thereabouts, measured in a northerly direction along the course of the said turnpike road, from a point where the road from the farm house, called Hendre Bailey, joins the said turnpike road, and to terminate in an existing farm road, at a point 6 yards, or thereabouts, west of the south-west corner of the farm house known as Blaen Nant Hir, in the parish of Penderin, in the county of Brecon, all which works and the lands to be taken for the purpose thereof will be situated in the parish of Penderin, in the county of Brecon, and in the parish of Aberdare, and county of Glamorgan, or one of them.

And it is proposed by the intended Act to empower the local board in the construction of the said several works, to deviate from the lines and levels delineated on the plans and sections to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, to the extent to be defined in the said plans and sections, or to be specified in the intended Act, and to stop up, alter, and divert, whether temporarily or permanently within the several parishes, hamlets, or other places as aforesaid, all such turnpike or other roads, streets, highways, canals, streams, sewers, gas and water pipes, aqueducts, railways, telegraphs, or other works, as may be necessary for constructing, or using the said intended works, and to purchase by compulsion lands, buildings, and other hereditaments in the hamlets and parishes aforesaid, and easements, rights, and privileges, in, through, over, or upon lands, buildings, and hereditaments, or streams and springs of water, and to purchase lands, and buildings, easements, rights, and privileges, as aforesaid, by agreement.

And it is proposed by the intended Act to authorize the Local Board to intercept, collect, divert, impound and use the water of the stream, or brook, called Nant Hir, and of all streams, brooks, and springs, and surface or other water, flowing directly or derivatively into the said brook, and which water now flows directly or derivatively into the River Cynon, the Aberdare Canal Navigation, the Glamorganshire Canal Navigation, and the River Taff, or some or one of them, or some or one of the branches thereof.

And it is proposed by the intended Act to authorize the Local Board to apply for all or any of the purposes thereof, the general district rates, water rates, rents, duties, and also any rates, which they can or may raise, or be authorized to raise under the powers of any existing Acts, relating to Public Health, or Local Government, or to Water Supply, or of any Supplemental Acts, and to levy other rates, rents, and charges, within the whole or any part or parts of their limits for water supply, without any restriction as to amount or otherwise imposed by any Public Act applicable to the Local Board or otherwise, and to alter existing rates, rents, charges, and exemptions, and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from payment of rates, rents, and charges, and to borrow or raise moneys upon mortgage, debentures, or annuity, and to charge the same on all or any of the waterworks, undertakings, property, rates, rents, charges, and revenues, from whatever source derived of the Local Board, and to make provisions for the liquidation or repayment of the moneys so borrowed or raised.

And it is proposed by the intended Act to authorize the Local Board to purchase by agreement or otherwise under the terms of the intended Act, all, or any of the waterworks, pipes, plant, apparatus, property, and undertaking of the existing Company, supplying water within the parish of Aberdare, called the Aberdare Waterworks Company, or of any Company, or private person or persons, supplying water within any part of the limits of the intended Act, and to empower the Local Board, and all, or any such persons, or Company or Companies, as last aforesaid, to enter into agreements with respect to the sale or transfer to the Local Board of any such waterworks, pipes, plant, apparatus, property, and undertakings as aforesaid, or with respect to the supply by the Local Board of any district or place, within the limits of the intended Act, with water in bulk or otherwise, or with respect to any other purposes, and to authorize and provide for the carrying of such agreements into effect, and to confirm all, or any such agreements, as may have been entered into prior to the passing of the intended Act, and make provision for dissolving and winding up the business of the Aberdare Waterworks Company.

And it is proposed by the intended Act to vary or extinguish all existing rights and privileges connected with any lands, buildings, streams, or waters, to be purchased, taken, used, or interfered with under any of the powers, or for any of the purposes of the intended Act, or which might in any way prevent or interfere with the carrying into effect of any purposes of such intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

To incorporate all or some of the provisions of "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869," "The Water Works Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863," "The Commissioners Clauses Act, 1847," and also such parts of "The Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," relating to roads and the temporary occupation of lands, and to other matters as may be deemed expedient; and any other General, or Consolidation, or Clauses Act.

To alter, amend, extend, enlarge, repeal, or re-enact all or some of the powers and provisions of "The Aberdare Water Works Act, 1858," "The Public Health Act, 1848," "The Local Government Act, 1858," and any other Acts amending the same, or any of them, or any other Acts which would interfere with the purposes of the intended Act.

(Amendment of Acts; Change of Name; Extension of Charity; Qualification of Guardians; Power to Lease; Investment of Funds).

"THE President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Guardians of the Asylum for the reception of Orphan Girls, the settlements of whose parents cannot be found," incorporated by "The Local and Personal Act, 39 and 40 Geo. III, chapter 60, and hereinafter referred to as "the Corporation," intend to apply to Parliament in the next session thereof for leave to introduce a Bill for the following, or some of the following, among other purposes:—

1. To change the name and style of the corporation to that of the Female Orphan Asylum, or to such other name as the Bill may prescribe.

2. To enable the Corporation from time to time to alter the qualification of the guardians or other members thereof, and to regulate the method of convening and holding meetings of the said guardians, and the proceedings at and relating to such meetings, and generally to regulate the proceedings and powers of the Corporation, and to extend the objects of the charity to all female fatherless children, whether the settlement of their parents is or is not known, and to sanction the extension of the charity heretofore to such objects. Or the Bill will itself contain such provisions.

3. To enable the Corporation to sell, exchange, and dispose of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments now held or hereafter to be acquired by them, and to grant building or other leases thereof, and to lay out the same for the purposes of building, and generally to define and enlarge the powers heretofore granted to the Corporation, whether by statute or otherwise, with respect to the acquiring, holding, or dealing with lands or other real estate, or any interest therein, and to enable any persons without license in mortmain or other authority to devise any lands or other real property to the Corporation for the furtherance of its charitable objects.

4. To enable the Corporation to invest moneys belonging to them on mortgage of real estate, or in other securities, to be defined in the Bill.

5. For the purposes aforesaid and for other purposes to amend and enlarge the powers of the said Act 39 and 40, Geo. (New Streets and Improvements and Alterations of Streets.—Alterations of London and North-Western Railway.—Reconstruction of Broughton Bridge.—Taking of lands for those and other purposes.—Re-arrangement and increase of wards in Salford district.—Further powers with respect to the River Irwell for preventing floods, &c.—Provisions in relation to the Water Supply of the Borough.—Additional Improvement and Sanitary Powers, and other Powers for the better Regulation of the Borough.—Rating Powers and power to raise further Moneys.—Additional Payment to Clerk to Justices for Borough business, and other Provisions respecting that Business.—Provisions respecting the distribution of Charities and Purchase of Freehold of Dispensary and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the ensuing session, by the mayor, aldermen, and burgesses of the borough of Salford (hereinafter called "the Corporation"), for leave to bring in a Bill, hereinafter referred to as "the proposed Act," to authorize the Corporation to effect the objects or some of the objects hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

1. To execute the works and acquire the lands, and exercise the powers within the borough of Salford, and the townships of Salford and Broughton respectively, in the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, hereinafter mentioned, or some of them, that is to say:

- (1)—Blackfriars-street extension and works, and other things in connection therewith.

(a). A new street commencing by a junction with a street named Broughton-road at the point of junction with that street of a street named Alfred-street, and terminating by a junction with a street named Chapel-street at a point opposite the junction with that street of a street named Blackfriars-street, and the alteration of the levels of Chapel-street for a distance of 140 yards or thereabouts at and near the point of junction of the proposed new street, and the alteration of the levels of Blackfriars-street for a distance of 66 yards or thereabouts from the junction of that street with Chapel-street, and the alteration of the levels of any other streets the levels of which may be interfered with and which it may be necessary to alter for the purposes of making and executing the aforesaid new street and works.

(b). Taking down the existing arch carrying the London and North-Western Railway over Back Thompson-street, in the township of Salford, and the adjoining arch or arches, and reconstructing so much of that railway in such manner as may be necessary for the for the purposes of the intended street.

(c). Taking down the bridge over the river Irwell, in the township of Broughton, called Broughton-bridge, and the erection of a new bridge upon and adjoining the site of the present bridge with all necessary works and conveniences in connection therewith.

(d). Altering the levels of the streets forming the approaches on each side of the existing bridge, and the widening of the approach to such bridge, on the northerly side of the river Irwell.

(e). Widening Broughton-road on its

northerly side from and including number 140 in that road to Sandford-street, and from Sandford-street to Brougham-street, and from Stanley-street to Back Davies-street.

(f). Rounding off the respective corners of Blackfriars-street at its junction with Chapel-street.

(g). Acquiring so much land on each side of the proposed new street, and on each side of so much of Blackfriars-street and Chapel-street, the levels of which are proposed to be altered, as will be shown on the plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned.

- (2). Ford-lane. Widening that lane on its southerly side from the Sun Brewery to Number 19 in that lane.

- (3). Chapel-street.

(a). Widening on its southerly side from Islington-street to Sidney-street.

(b). Filling up the cellar area and removing the steps on the northerly side of that street, opposite and adjoining number 190.

(c). Widening on its southerly side for a distance of twelve yards, or thereabouts, from the north-easterly corner of New Bailey-street, measuring in an easterly direction.

(d). Widening on its northerly side, adjoining the Dog Inn, including the widening of Union-street on its north-easterly side from Chapel-street to Cross-street, and the widening of Bury-street on its southerly side from Cross-street to the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway.

(e). Widening on its northerly side, adjoining numbers 54, 52, 44, 42, and 40 respectively, and on its southerly side from Middleton's-court to Hatton's-court.

- (4)—Bury-street: Widening on its southerly side from Posey-street to Garden-lane.

- (5)—Frederick-street: Widening on its easterly side at its junction with Bury-street.

- (6) New Bailey-street and railway pillars:

(a). Widening on its westerly side from Stanley-street to Chapel-street.

(b). Removing the pillars which support the viaduct carrying the London and North-Western Railway over that street, and, if need be, taking down and reconstructing that portion of the said viaduct which crosses such street.

- (7)—Bloom-street:—Widening on its south-westerly side from the premises occupied by Messrs. Leigh to Sackville-street, and on its north-easterly side from Wright's-court to Lamb-lane.

- (8)—Broughton-street North: Continuing from its northerly extremity into Sackville-street.

- (9)—Lamb-lane: Widening on its south-westerly side from William-street to Jones-street, and from Jones-street to St. Stephen's School, and on its north-easterly side from Williamson's-buildings to Back Frederick-street, and from Newton-street to St. Stephen-street, and rounding off the corner there.

- (10)—Back Smith-street: Continuing from its north-easterly extremity into Eveson-street.

- (11)—Ordsal-lane and new streets in connection therewith:

(a). Widening Ordsal-lane, on its westerly side, from Regent-road to Regent-street, and from and including number 116 to and including number 110 in that lane.

(b). A new street, commencing at a point in Ordsal-lane, nearly opposite Wellmeadow-buildings, and terminating at the junction of Trafalgar-place with Wilburn-street,

(c). Widening Ordsal-lane on its westerly side in a northerly direction, from the northerly side of the Manchester, Bolton, and Bury Canal, for a distance of 40 yards or thereabouts.

(d). A new street, commencing at the junction of Islington-street with Islington-square, and terminating by a junction with Ordsal-lane, at or near the south-easterly corner of Rodney-street.

(e). Widening Ordsal-lane from Irwell-street to Bolton-street.

(f). Rounding off the north-easterly corner of Bolton-street at its junction with Chapel-street.

(12)—Oldfield-road: Widening on its easterly side, from and including number 39 to James's-street.

(13)—Cow-lane: Removing the buildings, being number 32 in Oldfield-road, which stand in that lane at its junction with that road.

(14)—Peel-street: Widening on its northerly side, from number 25 to Encombe-place.

(15)—Rosamond-street: Continuing from its northerly end into Wellington-square.

(16)—Gravel-lane:

(a). Widening on its westerly side, at its junction with the southerly side of King-street.

(b). Filling up the cellar areas and removing the steps on the easterly side of that lane between Duke-street and Norton-street.

(17)—Greengate:

(a). Widening on its southerly side at the corner of Gravel-lane.

(b). Widening on its south-westerly side from Cross-court to Bull-street.

(c). Widening on its north-easterly side from New Bridge-street to Mallett's-court.

(18)—Miller-street: Continuing from its westerly extremity into Cross-street.

2. To purchase, by compulsion or agreement, lands, houses, and buildings for the purposes of the said intended works and other the purposes of the proposed Act; and also to purchase and take by compulsion or by agreement easements and other rights and privileges in, over, or upon all or any of the lands authorized to be acquired under the provisions of the proposed Act, or any lands adjoining thereto respectively.

3. To stop up, alter, or interfere, either temporarily or permanently, with all such streets, roads, ways, railways, sewers, drains, water pipes and gas pipes, and telegraph pipes, tubes, and wires as may be requisite for the purposes of the proposed Act.

4. To vest in the corporation the sites of all streets, courts, ways, and passages comprised within the limits of the lands to be acquired under the proposed Act.

5. To vary or extinguish all existing rights and privileges in any way connected with the lands houses, and property proposed to be purchased which would in any manner impede or interfere with the objects of the proposed Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

6. To repeal section 23 of the Salford Improvement Act, 1862 (hereinafter called "the Act of 1862"), so far as regards the Salford district, and to provide that the Salford district shall be divided into eight wards, to be called respectively Cross Lane Ward, Crescent Ward, Saint Stephen's Ward, Saint Matthias's Ward, Greengate Ward, Trinity Ward, Islington Ward, and Regent Ward; the boundaries of which shall be as follows, namely:—

(a). Cross Lane Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From a point on the township boundary between Salford and Pendlebury, where the same is intersected by the centre of Eccles New Road, thence along the township boundary between Salford and Pendleton to the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, thence along the west side of that railway to the point where it abuts on Albion-street, thence along the centre of that street to its junction with Liverpool-street, thence along the centre of Liverpool-street to its junction with Egerton-street, thence along the centre of Egerton-street to its junction with Regent-road, thence across that road in a straight line to the northerly end of Craven-street, thence along the centre of Craven-street to the centre of Tatton-street, thence along the centre of Tatton-street to the centre of a new street to be called Cross-lane, thence along the centre of that new street to the junction of Regent-road and Eccles New-road, and thence along the centre of Eccles New-road to the point of commencement.

(b). Crescent Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From the centre of Windsor-bridge, along the centre of the Crescent and Crescent-parade, to the northerly end of Oldfield-road, thence along the centre of Oldfield-road to its junction with Regent-road, thence along the centre of Oldfield-road south to its junction with Tatton-street, thence along the centre of Tatton-street to the centre of Craven-street, and thence along the boundary of Cross-lane-ward, as hereinbefore described, to the point of commencement.

(c). Saint Stephen's Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From the point on the township boundary between Salford and Pendleton where the same abuts upon the west side of the Lancashire and Yorkshire railway, thence along that boundary to the centre of the river Irwell, thence along the township boundary between Salford and Broughton, to a point on that boundary where the same is intersected by an imaginary straight line drawn from the end of Peru-street, and running in part along the centre of the boundary wall on the northerly end of the Crescent Bleachworks, thence along such imaginary line to the centre of Adelphi-street opposite the westerly end of Peru-street, thence along the centre of Peru-street, Arlington-street, Brewery-street, and Bury-street, to the junction of the last-named street with Chapel-street, thence along the centre of Chapel-street, Whitecross Bank, Bank-parade, Crescent-parade, the Crescent, to Windsor-bridge, and thence along the westerly side of the Lancashire and Yorkshire railway to the point of commencement.

(d). Saint Matthias's Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From a point on the township boundary between Salford and Broughton where the same is intersected by the imaginary line hereinbefore described, along that boundary to a point where it intersects the river, thence along the centre of the river to Broughton-bridge, thence along the centre of Broughton-road to its junction with Pleasant-street, thence along the centre of Pleasant-street to Richmond-street, thence along the centre of Saint Stephen-street to

its junction with King-street, thence along the centre of King-street to the centre of Garden-lane, thence along the centre of Garden-lane to its junction with Bury-street, and thence along the boundary of Saint Stephen's Ward hereinbefore described, to the point of commencement.

(e). Greengate Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From the centre of the River Irwell at Broughton Bridge, along the centre of that river to Salford-bridge, thence along the centre of Chapel-street to its junction with Greengate, and thence along the centre of Greengate and Broughton-road to the centre of the River Irwell, at the point of commencement.

(f). Trinity Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From a point in St. Stephen's-street opposite King-street, along the centre of Saint Stephen-street to Richmond-street, thence along the centre of Pleasant-street to Broughton-road, thence along the boundary of Greengate Ward, hereinbefore described, to the centre of the river Irwell at Salford-bridge, thence along the centre of that river to Albert-bridge, thence along the centre of New Bailey-street to its junction with Chapel-street, thence along the centre of Chapel-street to its junction with Bury-street, thence along the centre of Bury-street to its junction with Garden-lane, and thence along the boundary of St. Matthias's Ward, hereinbefore described, to the point of commencement.

(g). Islington Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From the centre of Bank-parade opposite its junction with Oldfield-road, along the centre of Bank-parade and Chapel-street to the junction of that street with New Bailey-street, thence along the centre of that street to the centre of the River Irwell at Albert-bridge, thence along the centre of the river to Regent-road-bridge, thence along the centre of Regent-road to its junction with Oldfield-road, and thence along the centre of Oldfield-road, to the point of commencement.

(h). Regent Ward to be comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—From the centre of the river Irwell at the township boundary between Salford and Pendlebury, thence along that boundary to the centre of Eccles New-road, thence along the centre of that road to its junction with a new street to be called Cross-lane, thence along the centre of that new street to its junction with Tatton-street, thence along the centre of that street to the centre of Oldfield-road South, thence along the centre of that road to its junction with Regent-road, thence along the centre of that road to the river Irwell at Regent-road-bridge, and thence along the centre of that river to the point of commencement.

7. To provide that the aldermen and councillors representing the existing wards in the Salford district, and the persons, if any, elected in their stead, shall be assigned to and deemed to represent the wards as proposed to be constituted in the manner provided by the proposed Act, and so that there shall be one alderman and three councillors to each ward as proposed to be constituted, instead of two aldermen and six councillors to each of the existing wards; and to make such provisions as may be necessary with refer-

ence to the future preparation and revision of the burgess list, having regard to the alterations proposed to be effected in the Salford district as aforesaid; and to provide that the Booths Charity Act shall be read and construed as if the Crescent Ward as proposed to be constituted had been so constituted at the time of the passing of that Act, and as if the word "senior" in conjunction with the word "alderman" in relation to the Crescent Ward had been omitted from such Act; and to make all such other arrangements as may be necessary to give effect to the proposed alterations in the Salford district as aforesaid.

8. To repeal wholly or partially, or to amend, the 220th, 221st, and 223rd sections of the Act of 1862, and to authorize the Corporation to build or rebuild retaining or fence walls on or adjoining the river Irwell, and restore and keep the banks and walls thereof to—and in a state which will—prevent the flooding of the adjoining lands and buildings and the falling of soil, refuse, and other matter into the river, and if need be to order the owners, lessees, and occupiers of lands, buildings, and other property adjoining or abutting upon the sides of the river to do all such things as are mentioned in this paragraph, and in case of their default to enable the corporation to do all such things, and to recover all costs, charges, and expenses which may be incurred by them from such owners, lessees, and occupiers respectively, with interest thereon, either in proportion to the extent of the frontage to the river of the lands and buildings of such owners, lessees, and occupiers respectively, or in such proportion as may be determined in the manner to be provided by the proposed Act.

9. To authorize the Corporation, if need be, to alter the plan referred to in the 224th section of the Act of 1862 prepared under the provisions of that section, and to authorize the Corporation to prepare another plan in such manner as is provided for in respect of the preparation of the plan authorized by that section and to extend the provisions of the 225th section of that act to the altered line of the river.

10. To amend and extend the provisions of section 197 of the Act of 1862, and of section 33 of the Salford Improvement Act, 1867 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act of 1867"), and to make further and more effectual provision for compelling owners of land abutting upon any river, open watercourse, or drain, wholly or partially within the borough, to fence off the same from such river, watercourse, or drain, and generally to provide for the prevention of accidents arising from want of proper precautions on the part of such owners.

11. To amend and partially repeal section 412 of the Act of 1862, and to provide that the residue, fifthly therein referred to, of the moneys arising from the water-rates or rents payable to the Corporation, shall be paid and applied when the same shall accrue in like manner as the proportion of the profits of the Salford district from the gas works is by section 414 of that Act directed to be paid and applied.

12. To provide that no person supplied by the Corporation with water for domestic purposes shall use the same for the purpose of affording power, or in connection with any machinery or apparatus, and to impose a penalty for so doing, and to provide that no person shall be entitled to a supply of water to a dwelling-house, otherwise than by meter or by special agreement, where any part thereof is used for trade or business purposes, and to empower the Corporation to require owners of all houses not provided with internal fittings for the supply of water to

provide such fittings, and to enable the Corporation to order the removal of stand pipes.

13. To repeal or alter the interpretation of the word "drover," in the 4th section of the Act of 1862, and to make that word include any person who shall lead or drive any cattle along any street as defined by that Act, and also any person leading, driving, drawing, holding up, or marking cattle or sheep, or working in any market of the Corporation, or in any fair held within the borough, and to prescribe and direct the course and the mode of transit or conveyance of cattle, sheep, or swine through any part of the borough, and to enable the Corporation to make bye-laws for preventing cries and noises in the streets or in the markets of the Corporation.

14. To provide that section 218 of the Act of 1862 shall be read and construed as giving jurisdiction to the justices acting in and for the borough, to adjudicate upon questions arising under that section.

15. To prevent the erection of buildings which shall diminish the superficial area of any yard or open space belonging to or around buildings in existence before the passing of any bye-law for the time being of the Corporation to a less space or area than that required by such bye-law in reference to buildings thereafter to be erected.

16. To extend the powers of the Corporation to make bye-laws with respect to the laying out, and the level, width, and construction of new streets, courts, and passages, and with respect to the erection, construction, or rebuilding of any building, and matters connected therewith.

17. To prescribe a different mode of publishing the present and future bye-laws made by the Corporation.

18. To authorize the Corporation to publish in any public place the name of any person who shall have been guilty of any offence against any provisions of the Acts of 1862 and 1867, and the proposed Act, or any bye-law made under such Acts, or any of them.

19. To authorize the Corporation to exercise additional powers in relation to the sanitary improvement and better regulation and government of the borough.

20. To authorize the Corporation, if need be to levy such additional tolls, borough rates, district rates, and other rates, rents, and remunerations, as may be necessary for the purposes of the Acts of 1862 and 1867, and of the proposed Act or any of them, and to charge existing tolls, borough rates, district rates, and other rates, rents, and remunerations with the expenses of carrying the proposed Act into effect, and to alter the existing tolls, borough rates, district rates, and other rates, rents, and remunerations, and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from the payment of tolls, borough rates, district rates, and other rates, rents, and remunerations, and other rights and privileges.

21. To authorize the Corporation to borrow further moneys, on the security of their gasworks and of the borough-rate, for the purposes of the gasworks, and for any purposes authorized by the Acts of 1862 and 1867, or by the proposed Act, as to which special provision is not in either of those Acts or the proposed Act otherwise made; and also to borrow further moneys, on the security of the rates and assessments authorized to be made in the Salford district and other the property of the Salford district, for the purpose of executing the works and things hereinbefore described or referred to so far as they relate to the Salford district, and for the purposes defined in the 383rd section of the Act of 1862. And also to borrow further moneys, on the security of the

rates and assessments authorized to be made in the Broughton district and other the property of the Broughton district, for the purpose of executing the said works and things so far as they relate to the Broughton district, and for the purposes defined in the 387th section of the Act of 1862.

22. To authorize the Corporation to apply the moneys which they have raised or received, or are authorized to raise or receive, by borrowing or by means of rates, or from any other source, and also the borough fund of the borough to all or any of the purposes of the proposed Act.

23. To empower the Corporation from time to time to direct the treasurer of the borough for the time being to pay to the clerk to the justices for borough business, acting under "The Manchester Division Stipendiary Justice Act, 1854," out of the borough fund of the borough such further sums as, including the yearly sum now authorized to be paid out of the said borough fund to the said clerk, shall not exceed in any one year the sum of £700, and to authorize the stipendiary magistrate acting under the provisions of that Act to reside beyond the limits of the city of Manchester, the borough of Salford, and the division of Manchester.

24. To repeal section 237 of the Act of 1862, and to transfer the duties of the boroughreeve and constables, or of the constables only, in relation to the distribution of Buerdsall's, Broster's and Cuthbertson's charities, to the persons or Corporation who may for the time being be the distributors of the charities commonly called Booth's Charities.

25. To authorize the Chancellor and Council of Her Majesty's Duchy of Lancaster to sell to the trustees, treasurers, or committee for the time being of the Salford and Pendleton Royal Hospital and Dispensary the fee simple of the land and buildings in the township of Salford described in and demised by a lease bearing date the 23rd day of June, 1864, and made between the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty of the one part, and Sir Benjamin Heywood, Baronet, and others of the other part, and to enable the parties aforesaid to purchase such premises.

26. To incorporate with the proposed Act the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts 1845, 1860, and 1869, and also the Salford Improvement Acts, 1862 and 1867, or parts thereof respectively.

27. To alter, amend, extend, and if need be partially to repeal the following Acts relating to the borough:—20 and 21 Vict. cap. 182; 25 and 26 Vict., cap. 205; 30 Vict., cap. 58; and any other Acts relating to that borough. Also the following Acts relating to the Company of proprietors of the Mersey and Irwell Navigation: 7 Geo. 1., cap. 15; and 34 Geo. 3, cap. 37; and any other Acts relating to that Company. Also the following Acts relating to the trustees of the late Duke of Bridgewater: 32 Geo. II., cap. 2; 33 Geo. II., cap. 2; 2 Geo. III., cap. 2; 35 Geo. III., cap. 44; 45 Geo. III., cap. 81; 3 and 4 Vict., cap. 35; 5 and 6 Vict., cap. 30; 8 and 9 Vict., cap. 29; 11 and 12 Vict., cap. 12; 10 and 11 Vict., cap. 2; 14 and 15 Vict., cap. 12; 20 and 21 Vict., cap. 4; 27 and 28 Vict., cap. 308; 28 and 29 Vict., cap. 1; and any other Acts relating to those trustees. (1st.) A reservoir to be wholly situate in the township of Thornhill, in the parish of Thornhill, in a certain field at Fox Royd, adjoining Back-lane, belonging to the Rectory of Thornhill, and in the occupation of James Peace.

(2nd.) A conduit or line of pipes, to commence at a point in the Brighouse and Elland turnpike-road where Clifton Beck passes under that road, in the township of Clifton, and to terminate at or in the said intended reservoir, and which intended conduit or line of pipes will pass from, in, through, or into the several townships of Hartishead-cum-Clifton, in the parish of Dewsbury, the townships or hamlets of Mirfield and Hopton, in the parish of Mirfield, and the township of Thornhill, in the parish of Thornhill.

(3rd.) A conduit or line of pipes, to commence in the said intended reservoir at Fox Royd aforesaid, and to terminate in the Dewsbury and Leeds turnpike-road, at a point about 160 yards to the north-east of the point where the boundary line between the township of Dewsbury and the township of Soot-hill crosses that road; which conduit or line of pipes

will pass from, through, or into the several townships of Thornhill, in the said parish of Thornhill, and the townships of Dewsbury and Soot-hill, in the said parish of Dewsbury.

The whole of which said intended new works will pass in, through, or into, or be situate in the townships of Hartishead-cum-Clifton, Soot-hill, and Dewsbury, in the said parish of Dewsbury, the townships or hamlets of Mirfield and Hopton, in the parish of Mirfield, and the township of Thornhill, in the parish of Thornhill, all in the West Riding of the county of York.

3. To deviate from the lines and levels of the proposed works to the extent shown on the plans and sections hereinafter mentioned or to be defined by the proposed Act.

4. To purchase, by compulsion or otherwise, lands and houses, and to take on lease and take grants of easements in, over, or upon lands for the purpose of the proposed Act, and to vary or extinguish all rights, easements, and privileges connected with such lands and houses.

5. To stop up, alter, or divert, whether temporarily or permanently, all turnpike and other public and private roads, bridges, streets, streams, sewers, watercourses, pipes, aqueducts, or railways, as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing or of repairing, maintaining, or using the intended works or any of them.

6. To lay down and maintain mains, pipes, conduits, and other works in, over, under, and along any turnpike road, public highway, street, lane, bridge, railway, canal, river, and other public place and passage in connection with such water supply.

7. To incorporate with the proposed Act, and for the purposes thereof, all or some of the powers and provisions of "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act, 1860," "The Waterworks Clauses Act, 1847 and 1863."

8. To authorise the Corporation and the said Henry Savile and the trustees within the meaning of "The Savile Estate (Extension of Powers) Act, 1868," or either of them, and all local authorities, local boards, public bodies, companies, trustees, or persons, to enter into and carry into effect agreements or engagements for the sale of the whole or any portion of the water to be supplied by the Corporation to the said Henry Savile, and for the sale, purchase, or use of any mains, pipes, meters, and works in connection with such water supply, upon such terms and conditions as they shall respectively think fit.

9. To authorise the Corporation to raise or borrow any sum or sums of money which they may require to borrow for the construction and maintenance of the works, to be authorized by the proposed Act upon the credit or security of their waterworks undertaking, and of the borough rate or borough fund of the said borough.

10. To enable the Corporation to erect and maintain new gasworks, with all necessary buildings, retorts, machinery, approaches, and conveniences thereto, for the manufacture and storage of gas, and to hold the same as part of the gasworks undertaking of the Corporation upon the land hereinafter mentioned, or some part or parts thereof, that is to say:—

All those pieces of land, with the buildings erected on part thereof, situate at Salter-hebble, and immediately adjoining each other, partly within the township of Skircoat, and partly within the township of Southwram, both in the parish of Halifax aforesaid, and in the respective occupations of Adam Bird,

Shaw Slater, Joseph Shaw, and John Shaw, as the same pieces of land are bounded on or towards the west by the towing path of the Calder and Hebble Navigation, on or towards the north and east by the Halifax and Huddersfield Turnpike-road, and on or towards the south by the Salterhebble, Stainland, and Sowerby Bridge Turnpike-road. All which several pieces of land and buildings have recently been purchased or agreed to be purchased by the Corporation.

11. To empower the Corporation to manufacture gas from coal and other materials, and also to manufacture all other matters and things producible from the residual products arising from the manufacture of gas, and to sell and dispose of gas, coal, lime, tar, chemicals, and residual products, and to acquire and hold patent rights or licenses for the manufacture and distribution of gas and the realization and utilization of residual products from gas.

12. To authorize the Corporation by agreement to make and maintain openings into, and alterations of and junctions with, the rails of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, leading from North Dean to Halifax, at a point in the township of Skircoat, and parish of Halifax, about 20 yards north of a certain railway bridge over the Salterhebble, Stainland, and Sowerby-bridge turnpike road, belonging to the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company, and do such other acts, works, matters, and things as may be necessary in order to effect communications between the said railway and the intended new gasworks of the Corporation, for the purposes of their said gasworks undertaking.

13. To authorize the Corporation and any Local Authority, Board of Health, or other lawfully constituted authorities and persons whomsoever, within the limits of the gas supply of the Corporation, to make and carry into effect contracts and agreements for the supply of gas upon such terms as they shall respectively think fit, and for such purposes to confer upon such authorities, boards, bodies, and persons all such powers as to the raising of money, levying of rates and otherwise within the districts under their respective control, as may be requisite or necessary for the purposes of enabling them respectively to carry into execution any such contracts or agreements.

14. To incorporate or extend to and make applicable to the objects and purposes of the proposed Act all or some of the existing powers and authorities now vested in the Corporation under "The Halifax Corporation Waterworks Improvements Act, 1868," and the Acts incorporated therewith, and the several special Acts set forth in the first schedule thereto, and to incorporate the provisions of the intended Act with the provisions of the said special Acts necessary for effecting the several objects comprised in this notice, or in the intended Act, and if necessary to repeal, alter, and consolidate the said Acts or any of them, and alter, amend, and repeal those Acts or some of them, and so far as may be necessary or expedient, to repeal, vary, or extinguish, all or any existing rights, privileges, and exemptions which can in any way interfere with any of the objects and purposes aforesaid and to confer, vary, and extinguish other rights, privileges, and exemptions.

16. To repeal, alter and amend the several Acts following, or some of them, that is to say;— 9. Geo. IV., cap. 71; 9. Geo. IV., cap. 17; and 4. William IV., cap. 12, relating to the Company of Proprietors of the Calder and Hebble Navigation, and all other Acts and parts of Acts affecting the said navigation and the "Savile Estate (Extension of Powers) Act, 1868," so far as may be necessary for carrying any of the aforesaid objects or any other objects of the intended Act into effect, to repeal, vary and extinguish all existing rights, privileges, and exemptions which may in any way interfere therewith, or with any of the objects and purposes aforesaid, and to confer, vary, and extinguish other rights and privileges and exemptions.

And notice is hereby given, that duplicate plans and sections describing the line and situation of the said intended works, and of the lands in or through which the same will be made or which may be taken for the purposes of the proposed works, with a book of reference to such plans, containing the names of the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees and occupiers of the lands, houses, and other property, which may be taken under the powers of the proposed Act, and a copy of this notice, as published in the London Gazette, will on or before the 30th day of November instant, be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the West Riding of the county of York, at his office in Wakefield, in the said West Riding, and on or before the said 30th day of November, a copy of so much of the said plans, sections, and book of reference as relate to each of the said parishes, in or through which the said intended works will be made, or in which any lands, houses, or other property intended to be taken are situate, together with a copy of this notice, as published in the London Gazette, will be deposited with the parish clerk of each such parish, at his residence; and in the case of an extra parochial place, with the parish clerk of an adjoining parish, at his residence.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Leeds (who are hereinafter referred to as the Corporation) for leave to bring in a Bill for the following, or some of the following, among other objects, powers, and purposes, that is to say:—

1. To authorize the Corporation to supply gas for public and private purposes, and to light with gas the parish and borough of Leeds, and the township of Roundhay, in the parish of Barwick-in-Elmet, all in the West Riding of the county of York, or some parts or portions of both, or either.

2. To authorize the Corporation to purchase by

compulsion, or by agreement, and to hold for the purposes of the Bill, the lands, houses, tenements, premises, and hereditaments, and premises following, or any of them, that is to say:—The lands, houses, tenements, and hereditaments in the township of Hunslet, in the parish and borough of Leeds, in the West Riding of the county of York, situated and lying between and in an area bounded as follows, that is to say, by a line commencing at a point on the south side of Goodman-street, where that street joins the towing path of the Aire and Calder Navigation, thence proceeding westerly along the south side of Goodman-street for a distance of 337 yards, or thereabouts, to the junction of that street with Forster-street, thence in a south-westerly direction, for a distance of 15 yards, or thereabouts, along the south-east side of Forster-street to the centre of Calder-street, thence in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Calder-street for a distance of 42 yards, or thereabouts, to a point opposite the north-east boundary wall of tenements belonging to Mark Bateson, thence in a south-westerly direction across part of Calder-street, for 5 yards, or thereabouts, to the south-east corner of said tenements, thence in a straight line from the last-mentioned point in a southerly direction for a distance of 222 yards, or thereabouts, to the north corner of the maltkiln belonging to John Varley and Samuel Varley, and in the occupation of Richard Dobson, thence along the north-eastern side of that maltkiln, and wall adjoining thereto, for a distance of 56 yards, or thereabouts, to property of Ellen Newsome, thence along the north-west boundary of her property for two feet, or thereabouts, thence in an easterly direction for a distance of 60 yards, or thereabouts, along the north boundary of garden ground belonging to John Hudson to the north-west corner of a property belonging to the representatives of the late Joshua Bower, thence along the northern boundary of said property for a distance of 27 yards, or thereabouts, to the western boundary of land belonging to Benjamin Johnson, thence along said western boundary and the northern boundary of the said land for a distance of 116 yards, or thereabouts, to the north-eastern corner of the same land, thence in a straight line from said north-eastern corner in an easterly direction for 107 yards or thereabouts to the western side of a public footpath leading from Old Mill-lane to the towing-path of the Aire and Calder Navigation at a point on that footpath 22 yards or thereabouts north-west of the north corner of the modern portion of the Hunslet Old Mills belonging to the undertakers of the Aire and Calder Navigation, and in the occupation of John Lister and Thomas Lister, and used as a spinning-mill, and thence in a northerly direction for 104 yards, or thereabouts, along the west side of the said footpath till that footpath joins the said towing-path, and thence in a northerly direction along the western side of the said towing path, for 271 yards or thereabouts to the said first-mentioned point on the south side of Goodman-street, where that street joins the towing-path of the said Aire and Calder Navigation from which it commenced.

3. To authorize the Corporation, on such lands before described, or any part or parts thereof, to erect and maintain gasworks, gasometers, retorts, machinery apparatus, buildings, approaches, works, and conveniences; and to manufacture gas and the several matters producible from the residual products arising or resulting from the manufacture of gas, and generally to carry on the operations and works which are carried on by Corporations and Companies who manufacture and supply gas for public and private lighting.

4. To authorize the Corporation to supply gas for lighting the public and other streets, thoroughfares, passages, and places in the parish and borough of Leeds, and in the township of Roundhay, in the parish of Barwick-in-Elmet, all in the West Riding of the county of York, and to supply and sell gas to the inhabitants and occupiers of property in the said parish and borough of Leeds and township of Roundhay, and for lighting public and private buildings, shops, and warehouses, manufactories, railways, railway stations, docks, quays, wharves, bridges, and works, and for any other purposes, and to break up and interfere with streets, roads, lanes, bridges, and other passages and places, and sewers, drains, pipes, and telegraph apparatus therein; and to lay down, place, and maintain gas mains, gas pipes, lamps, pillars, and posts; and to manufacture, supply, hire, sell, and let gas meters, fittings, and gas apparatus, and to hold and acquire patent rights or licences to use patent rights in relation to the manufacture and distribution of gas, and the utilization of residual products; and generally within the said parish and borough of Leeds and township of Roundhay to exercise all such powers and authorities as may be given to the Corporation by the intended Bill.

5. To authorize the compulsory purchase of lands, houses, tenements, hereditaments, and premises, and the taking of lands, houses, and other hereditaments, by agreement, for the purposes aforesaid.

6. To authorize the Corporation to levy, collect, and recover rates, rents, and charges for the supply of gas, and for the sale and use of meters, fittings, and all other matters and things supplied or sold by them; and to grant exemptions from the payment of such rates, rents, and charges.

7. To authorize the Corporation to borrow, and from time to time to re-borrow, money for the purposes aforesaid, on mortgage, bond, annuity, or otherwise, and to charge moneys borrowed on the property to be purchased under the powers of the Bill, and the revenues, rates, rents and charges to arise or be levied and made under the Bill; and to apply the rents, rates, and profits of the gasworks to the purposes of the Corporation, and, if expedient, to fund the said debt so to be created.

8. To authorize the Corporation to purchase by agreement lands, houses, tenements, hereditaments, and premises, and to erect or construct thereon, or on some part or parts thereof, and to maintain and regulate new and suitable slaughter-houses and other buildings, sheds, accesses, and appurtenances, and conveniences connected with the said slaughter-houses for slaughtering and dressing of animals of what kind soever, and buildings and places for the deposit and manufacture of offal, blood, tallow, garbage, and other products, &c.

9. To authorize the Corporation to purchase by agreement any slaughter-houses now existing within the borough of Leeds (hereinafter called the borough) and to make compensation for damage or injury occasioned by the exercise of the powers to be conferred by the said Bill. To provide for the licensing by the Corporation of slaughter-houses and knackers' yards, the prohibition or restriction of private slaughter-houses and knackers' yards within the limits of the borough, and the revoking or suspending of existing or future licences, and the prevention of the slaughtering of animals, or the scalding or dressing of any carcase, or the cleaning of entrails or offal of any slaughtered cattle or

other animals, or any other similar process within the limits and boundaries of the borough elsewhere than in the slaughter-houses and knackers' yards from time to time provided or licensed by the Corporation.

10. To regulate the mode of, or prohibit the driving, or leading, or conveyance of horses, cattle, sheep, and other animals in, or through any part of the borough, and to prohibit the keeping of cattle (other than horses), sheep, and swine within the borough, except in duly licensed places, and to authorize the Corporation to licence such places.

11. To authorize the Corporation to fix, levy, and collect tolls, stallages, rents, rates, and duties in respect of and for the use of the slaughter-houses and other buildings and conveniences connected therewith; to alter existing tolls, stallages, rents, rates, and duties, and to confer exemptions from payment of tolls, stallages, rates, or duties, and to levy, confer, vary, or extinguish other tolls, stallages, rates, duties, rights, privileges, and exemptions.

12. To make provision for the improving or removal, or for the structural alteration of houses or buildings within the borough, abutting on or contiguous to the entrance of courts and alleys, and other confined places, which from deficient ventilation or defective construction or arrangement may be considered to be injurious to health, or which are in a dilapidated or ruinous condition, and to require the owners of, or other persons interested in such houses or buildings, to improve or pull down and remove the same, or to empower the Corporation to repair, pull down, and remove the same, to provide for the expenses thereof, and for compensation connected therewith, and to sell the materials of any buildings so removed or pulled down, and to apply the proceeds thereof.

13. To authorize the Corporation to purchase by agreement, and to vest in the Corporation, houses, tenements, and hereditaments, which they may think necessary for the improvement of the borough; and to sell and dispose of all or any of the houses and buildings, or the lands to be purchased, taken, or acquired by them, and to re-arrange and lay out any land so cleared, and to authorize the Corporation to erect houses and buildings on the lands to be purchased, taken, or acquired as aforesaid, or any part thereof, and to let, lease, sell, or dispose of the houses and buildings to be erected at such rent or for such price or consideration as they may think proper, or to sell and dispose in such lot or lots as they may think proper of such sites, and the lands or property to be purchased or acquired as aforesaid, or any part or parts thereof, either by way of absolute sale, lease, or ground rent, subject to such stipulations and conditions as they may think fit as to the character and uses of the buildings to be erected thereon, and otherwise.

14. To authorize the Corporation to make all necessary and proper provisions with reference to the construction of houses and other buildings within the said borough, and the conveniences and accommodations connected therewith, and to prohibit the occupation of houses under the annual value of £20, unless certified by the Corporation to be fit for habitation: and to make provisions with respect to the width and regulation of streets, courts, alleys, and passages within the said borough.

15. To apply all or some of the foregoing provisions and regulations as to houses, buildings, courts, alleys, and closes, to houses, buildings, courts, alleys, and closes, whether made or erected before or after the passing of the Bill.

16. To repeal, alter, or amend the 36th section of "The Leeds Improvement Act, 1869," and to enact and make applicable instead thereof, to all rates and assessments leviable or to be levied by the Corporation within the borough, sections 3 and 4 of the Act (public and general) 32nd and 33rd Vic., cap. 41, intituled "An Act for Amending the Law with respect to the rating of occupiers for short terms, and the making and collecting of the poor's rate," so far as respects houses, the rateable value of which does not exceed £8, and to make other provisions with reference thereto.

17. To repeal, or alter, or amend sections 6 and 7 of "The Leeds Improvement Amendment Act, 1848," and to make other provisions instead thereof. And to authorize the Corporation either to amalgamate into one or more, or to form into separate drainage districts, the several townships of Leeds, Hunslet, and Holbeck, and the several other townships within the borough, or any part or portion of such townships.

18. To incorporate and make applicable to the recovery of all rates and assessments within the borough section 12 of the Act (public and general) 32nd and 33rd Vic., cap. 41, intituled "An Act for Amending the Law with respect to the rating of occupiers for short terms, and the making and collecting of the poor's rate," and section 16 of "The Leeds Overseer's Act, 1860."

19. To apply and make applicable to all rates to be made within the borough, all or some of the provisions contained in the 14th section of "The Leeds Overseers' Act, 1860," or to make other provisions for amending rates to be hereafter made within the said borough.

20. To empower the Corporation to make and alter bye-laws and regulations for all or any of the purposes of the proposed Bill, and to enforce or authorize the imposition of penalties for breach or non-observance thereof, and to provide for the recovery and application of such penalties.

21. To authorize the Corporation, from time to time, either to charge the expenses incurred in carrying out the objects of, or in putting the proposed Bill into force, or otherwise connected therewith (except in so far as relates to the provisions for the supply of gas) and preparatory to and of obtaining the Act upon the improvement rate leviable within the township in the borough where the property dealt with may be situate, or upon the general rate leviable over the borough under the Acts hereinafter mentioned, or one or more of them, or partly upon the special and partly upon the general rates, or from time to time to levy and recover separate rates and assessments upon and from the owners and occupiers of property within the several townships, or within the borough, for the purposes of the proposed Bill (except as aforesaid), and to grant exemptions from the payment of such rates and assessments, and to apply such part of their corporate funds as they may from time to time think fit, for the purposes of the proposed Bill, except those relating to the supply of gas.

22. To authorize the Corporation to borrow, and from time to time to re-borrow money for the purposes of the Bill (except for the supply of gas, or the works connected therewith) on mortgage, bond, annuity, or otherwise, and to charge moneys borrowed on lands, properties, or hereditaments to be acquired under the powers and provisions of the Bill (except those acquired for the purposes of the manufacture or supply of gas) and on the improvement rate or general rate leviable within the borough or any township therein, borough fund, borough rate, or revenues, and on any special rates, tolls, rents,

or charges, duties, stallages, fees, or other payments now leviable by the Corporation, or to be authorized or levied under the Bill (except those for the supply of gas, and connected therewith), and if expedient to fund the debt so to be created.

23. To extend the time limited by "The Leeds Improvement of Becks Act, 1866," for the completion of the works thereby authorized, and the works and conveniences connected therewith.

24. To incorporate with, and extend and apply to the purposes of the Bill, all or some of the provisions of "The Gasworks Clauses Act, 1847," "The Commissioners Clauses Act, 1847," "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act, 1860," "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1869," "The Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," "The Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847," and the various Public and General Acts relating to the Public Health and Local Government, or wholly or partially to exempt the Corporation from any of the provisions of those Acts, or either of them, or to modify or alter the same, with reference to all or any of the objects of the Bill, and to vary or extinguish any rights or privileges thereunder, or under any other Act or Acts, Letters Patent, Charters, or otherwise.

25. Colne Fishery.

(Incorporation of Colne Fishery Company; Demise of Fishery to them by Corporation; Repeal or Amendment of Acts).

A PPLICATION is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session thereof for leave to bring in a Bill for the following or some of the following among other purposes:—

1. To incorporate the Colne Fishery Company, and to enable the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Colchester, (who are hereinafter called "the Corporation") to demise to the Company so incorporated for a term of

years and upon conditions to be stated in the Bill the Oyster and other Fishery in the River Colne between the North Bridge, in the borough of Colchester, and Westnesse, otherwise St. Osyth Point, in Essex, and in the Creeks and branches of the said river, within the same extent, and to enable the Company to accept such demise with Covenants for the payment of rent; for the management, preservation, and improvement of the Fishery; and for re-entry by the Corporation in case of breach of Covenant; or the Bill will itself contain provisions to this effect.

2. To define the existing Members of the Company, and the conditions for future admission to it, and the rights or necessity of apprenticeship for the purposes of such admission; and to vest in the Members of the Company the exclusive right to fish in the River Colne; subject, nevertheless, to the Covenants in the said lease and to the provisions in the Bill; and to enable the Company to borrow money upon the credit of the yearly income to be derived by them from the Fishery, or upon the individual credit of the Members of the said Company, so that the moneys borrowed may be deemed the common debt of the Company, and may be recovered by the Company, or by the holder of any bonds or other security of the Company, from the individual members thereof, in such proportions as the Bill shall define.

3. To authorise and require the Corporation and the Company to appoint a joint Committee for the management, conduct, and control of the said Fishery, and the making and enforcing bye-laws, orders, rules, and regulations (either with or without the concurrence of the Corporation as the Bill may define) with respect to the members of the Company and their apprentices and assistants, and to the conduct and management of the Fishery, and especially with respect to the times at which oysters may be dredged—the quantity or stint of oysters which may be taken—the size of the oysters which may be dredged—the size of the boats which may be employed—the parts of the river which may be dredged—the places where refuse may be deposited—the times, mode, and place of deposit and sale of oysters—and the duties of the water bailiff and his assistants, and the enforcing of such bye-laws, orders, rules, and regulations by such penalties and forfeitures as the Bill shall define.

A collecting pipe or aqueduct commencing at the covered tank hereinbefore mentioned, numbered 3, and running thence in an eastwardly direction into the watercourse which forms part of the western fence or boundary of a field in the said parish of Marshfield, numbered 1041 on the tithe map of that parish, and thence running onwards to a pond in the said field, numbered 1041, and thence onwards, still eastwardly, to a pond in an adjoining field, numbered on the same tithe map 1042, and collecting in its course the water of the springs running into the said ponds, subject to and after the supply therefrom of the waterworks of John Taylor, Esquire, situate in a field in the same parish, numbered on the said map 1039, and which fields so numbered 1041 and 1042 belong to the said John Taylor, and are in the occupation of Robert Black, and which works will be made wholly in the said parish of Marshfield.

2. The lessees interest in about seven acres of land, held with the same mill, and also situate in the parish of Cold Ashton aforesaid, and now in the occupation of the said Henry Bishop.
3. A grist mill, situate in the said parish of Marshfield, known as "Beak's Mill," and about three acres of land, held therewith, and now in the occupation of Richard Hayward Tilley.
4. A paper mill, situate partly in the chapelry of St. Catherine aforesaid, and partly in the parish of Cold Ashton aforesaid, and about one acre of land and six cottages thereon, held with the same mill, and also situate in

the same chapelry, and now in the occupation of Joseph Hall, and his tenants.

5. A grist mill, situate in the parish of Marshfield aforesaid, known as "Ryford Mill," and about three acres of land held therewith, and now in the occupation of Andrew Cambourne.
 6. A grist mill, situate in the said chapelry of St. Catherine, known as "St. Catherine Mill," with one and a quarter acres of land, held therewith, and now in the occupation of John Tucker Couch.
 7. The site of a silk mill, in the aforesaid parish of Batheaston, which formerly stood about 150 yards east of the parish church of Batheaston, but has been taken down and cleared away.
- And all waters and water rights connected with such several mills, which waters now flow directly or derivatively into the River Avon, in the county of Somerset, and thence into the Bristol Channel.

V. To enable the Corporation to take, use, and appropriate, by compulsion or agreement, for the purposes of the proposed new works, as well as of the existing and future undertakings of the Corporation, the waters of the several springs aforesaid, including the several springs known as Monkswood Spring, Bull's Hill Spring, Little Monkswood Spring, Whiteway Spring, Eyford Spring, Charnydown Spring, Holt's Down Springs, and Oakford Springs. Also to take, use, and appropriate for the purposes of the Corporation, and of the said Bill, by compulsion or agreement, all such springs and streams as may be found in, upon, or under any lands to be acquired or be held by the Corporation, under the powers of the said Bill, or as may be found in the course of the said proposed works, and all springs and streams shown on the plan to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, all which springs and streams flow through the parishes or places aforesaid, directly or derivatively, into the said River Avon, and thence into the Bristol Channel.

VIII. To enable the Corporation to acquire, by compulsion or agreement, the waterworks following (that is to say) :—

1. The waterworks of his Grace the Duke of Cleveland, situate in the parish of Barthwick, in the borough of Bath, and the rental thereof and all springs and streams, and other sources from which the same works are now supplied with water, and also all other streams, springs and sources of water arising, flowing, or being in, upon, or over the lands and hereditaments of the said Duke, situate within the said borough, with the right of collecting and storing the water therefrom.
2. Those parts of the waterworks belonging to "The Charlcombe Waterworks Company, Limited," which are situate within the parish of Walcot, in the borough of Bath aforesaid, and the rental thereof.

IX. To enable the Corporation to purchase, by compulsion or agreement the sites for the aforesaid proposed works, the aforesaid several mills, waterworks, lands, and hereditaments, and all other lands, buildings, streams, springs, waters and heredita-

ments, for the purposes of the said Bill, or any right or easement of, in, through, or over the same, and to pay compensation for the same either by a sum in gross, or by an annual rent and with power to withdraw from any notice which may have been given for purchasing the same, or any part thereof, and free from any obligation to resell the same, or any part thereof, as superfluous lands, and to hold and demise the same, and subject to the purposes aforesaid, to regulate the purposes for which all hereditaments acquired under or by virtue of the said Bill shall be used; and to apply the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, in aid of the Borough Fund of the said borough.

X. XIV. To authorise the Corporation to raise such sum or sums of money as shall be required for the purposes of the said Bill by borrowing or otherwise.

(Extension to Pembroke Dockyard.)

(New Line to Pembroke Dockyard; Separate Undertaking; Arrangements with the Admiralty; Powers to run over the Carmarthen and Cardigan Railway; Amendment of Acts.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session by the Pembroke and Tenby Railway Company (hereinafter called "the Company") for an Act to enable them to make and maintain the railway hereinafter described, with all proper stations, sidings, approaches, works, and conveniences connected therewith (that is to say),

To vary and extinguish all rights and privileges inconsistent with the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

The said intended Act will incorporate all or some of the provisions of the "Companies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845;" the "Companies Clauses Acts, 1863 and 1869;" the "Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869;" the "Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845;" and the "Railways Clauses Act, 1863."

(Improvement of Streets, Compulsory Purchase of Lands, Purchase by Corporation of Common Rights over Monks' Leys Common, Power to Corporation to Borrow on Borough Fund and on West Common, Sale of Commons, Power to Lease Commons and Common Rights, Improvement of West and South Commons, Establishment of Public Park, Maintenance thereof out of Borough Fund, Application of Purchase Moneys for and of Rents of Commons, Annuities to Freeman, Bye-laws, Regulation of Common Rights, Exchange of Lands, Incorporation and Amendment of Acts, and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session, by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Lincoln (hereinafter called the Corporation), and the Freeman of the said City of Lincoln (hereinafter called the Freeman), for leave to bring in a Bill (hereinafter referred to as the Bill) for all or some of the following purposes, that is to say:—

1. To empower the Corporation to widen and improve the following streets or roads within the said city, with all necessary works and conveniences, that is to say,

To widen and improve Lindum-Terrace on the south side thereof throughout its whole length, and Lindum-road on the south east side for a length of two chains or thereabouts, measured south-west from the angle at the junction thereof with the north side of Lindum-terrace.

To widen and improve Monks'-road or lane on the north side thereof throughout the whole length of the south frontage of the said Monks' Leys Common, or throughout so much of the said south frontage of the said common which abuts upon the said road or lane, as may be deemed expedient, and which said widenings and improvements will be made and maintained from, in, through, or into the several parishes and extra-parochial and other places of St. Margaret, Monks' Leys Common, the Liberty of the Monks, and St. Swithin, all within the said city and county of the same city.

2. To empower the Corporation to take by compulsion or agreement, lands, houses, and property for the purposes of the said widenings and improvements of streets and roads, and to vary and extinguish existing rights and privileges connected with such lands, houses, and property.

3. To empower the Corporation, in the construction and for the purposes of the works for the said widenings and improvements, to deviate laterally from the lines delineated in the plans, to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned to the extent to be defined on the said plans, and to deviate vertically to any extent from the level of those works as shewn on the sections, to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, and to cross, divert, alter, or stop up temporarily, or permanently, roads, ways, pipes, drains, sewers, streams, and watercourses.

4. To empower the Corporation, who are lords of the manor of the city of Lincoln, and are as such lords the owners of the soil and freehold of the several commons hereinafter referred to, to purchase all common rights, and other rights and interests of the commoners, freemen, and others, in or over a common or extra parochial place called Monks' Leys Common, parcel of the said manor, and situate within the city of Lincoln and county of the same city, and containing 16 acres and 24 perches or thereabouts, in consideration

of a redeemable annuity of £200, in manner to be provided by the Bill, and to hold the same in fee simple in possession free from all such rights of common and other rights and interests, and from all lien of the vendors or owners of the said rights for, or in respect of the said consideration for the same: and to provide for the extinguishment of all rights and privileges in the said premises: and to provide for the vesting of the said Monks' Leys Common in the Corporation accordingly, either by the Bill or by some other mode to be prescribed by the Bill; and to provide for charging, or empowering the Corporation to charge, the said consideration, so long as it shall continue in the form of an annual sum upon and pay the same from time to time out of the borough fund of the said city; and to empower the Corporation to redeem the said annual sum or consideration at any time by payment of such a sum of money, or of £3 per cent. Consolidated Bank Annuities or other Government stocks or funds as shall be sufficient to produce an annual income equal to the said annual sum or consideration, or by such other mode of redemption as shall be provided by the Bill.

5. To provide for the appointment from time to time by the owners of the said rights of common, or some other body of electors, being freemen, of five or some other number of persons being freemen, to be trustees or a committee, with power to them, or a prescribed quorum of them, to receive and to apply, as hereinafter mentioned, the said annual sum or consideration until redemption thereof, and the consideration for such redemption, and to invest the redemption money, and from time to time vary the investments thereof; and to receive, and to apply as hereinafter mentioned, the annual dividends and interest of such investment; and to give valid discharges for all moneys to be received by them; and to provide all necessary and sufficient remedies by action or suit, or by distress and entry upon the property and effects of the Corporation, for recovery of the said annual sum or consideration if and when the same shall remain unpaid; and to make other provisions with respect to all or any of the matters in this paragraph mentioned; and to enable the Corporation to borrow, and from time to time to reborrow on the security of the borough fund of the said city, the money necessary or sufficient for redeeming the said annual sum or consideration; and for all or any of the purposes aforesaid to levy new or increased borough rates, and to compel payment of such rates, and to provide for the payment of the moneys borrowed by instalments, or by a sinking fund or otherwise.

6. To authorize and require, or to authorize or require the Corporation from time to time, or at any one time and together, or in parcels, and by public or private sale, to sell such portion not exceeding 3 acres, as they may think fit of the said Monks' Leys Common, and the several other commons, and portions of common next mentioned, which are also parcel of the said manor, and situate in the said city of Lincoln and county of the same city, and to convey the same to the purchasers thereof, and to extinguish all rights of common and other rights and privileges therein; and by their treasurer, or otherwise, to receive and give effectual discharge for the purchase moneys (that is to say),

First, the whole of a common or extra-parochial place called the Holmes Common.

Secondly, a portion containing 1 acre and 30 perches, or thereabouts, of a common or extra-parochial place called the South or Canwick Common, and being that portion of the same common which is situate between the Sincil Dyke, and

that portion of the Lincoln and Washingborough turnpike road, running through the said South or Canwick Common, 2 chains, or thereabouts, south of Bargate Bridge.

And thirdly, a detached portion, containing 4 acres and 34 perches, or thereabouts, of a common, called the West Common, and being that portion of the same common which is known as the Diglands, and is situate between the Haling Path of the Foss Dike Navigation, and lands now or late belonging to George Goodwin, Thomas Winn, William Singleton, and Richard Ellison, Esquires.

7. To empower the Corporation to let, demise, and lease to any person or persons from time to time, in consideration of an annual or other rent, and upon such other terms as they may think proper, or as may be prescribed by the Bill. (First) An exclusive or other right of stocking or depasturing with sheep, with or without stint, between each 15th day of October and 25th day of March, or such other portion of the year as may be prescribed by the Bill, the whole or any part or parts of the said West Common, and (secondly) for the purposes of an Ozier Holt or any other purpose any portion not exceeding 12 or some other limited number of acres of the southern part of the West Common, between the Gainsborough and Lincoln turnpike road and the haling path aforesaid, and to vary and extinguish, or during every such demise to suspend all rights of common and other rights in the secondly mentioned subject of demise, and to insert in every such demise all or any powers and provisions usual in demises of a like nature, and to provide for receipt of the rents reserved upon such demises by the Corporation, or their treasurer or other officer, and for making their or his receipt sufficient.

8. To provide for the better draining, fencing, levelling, altering, planting, ornamenting, and otherwise improving, by the Corporation, of the West Common, and South or Canwick Common, or either of them; and for the removal, by the Corporation, of the gates at the east and west ends of so much of the Gainsborough and Lincoln turnpike-road as passes through the West Common; and for the fencing off, by the Corporation, of the same turnpike-road on both sides or either side thereof from the said common, and for passing such fencing either to the north or the south of the grand stand on the same common; and for the erecting and maintaining, by the Corporation, on some part of that common, of a lodge or dwelling for the Commons' Warden or other officer having, for the time being, the charge and superintendence of the commons.

9. To empower or require the Corporation to appropriate and maintain as a public park or pleasure ground (hereinafter referred to as the park), all that part of Monks' Leys Common which shall not be sold, and to lay out, fence, drain, level, plant, and improve the same, and to make rides, drives, walks, gardens, shrubberies, lakes, ponds, and other ornamental works, and all appropriate buildings and conveniences therein; and to do all things necessary for the proper forming, maintaining, and improving the park, and to stop up and discontinue all or any roads and ways over the same, and to permit the user thereof, by the public, free of charge generally, but with power to the Corporation to fix the hours of opening and closing the park, and on particular occasions (as they see fit) to require and receive payment for entrance thereto, and to prohibit the user thereof for political and other meetings or like objects, and to empower the Corporation to manage the park, and to appoint and pay all requisite officers, keepers, and ser-

vants thereof, and to make and alter bye-laws and regulations for regulating the conduct of persons frequenting it, and the removal of persons therefrom, and for the imposition and recovery of penalties for offences against such bye-laws and regulations, and to provide for exempting the park and the buildings therein, and the Corporation, and all persons from all municipal, parochial, and other local rates and assessments in respect of the same, and to provide for the maintenance of the park out of the borough fund of the said city, so far as any other funds herein proposed to be provided shall be insufficient for the purpose, or in the interim until they are realized, and to make other provisions with respect to the park.

10. To provide for the application of the moneys to arise from the sales and demises aforesaid to the respective purposes following, viz.: As to the moneys to arise from the sale of the 3 acres of Monks' Leys Common. (1st) In payment of the expenses of sale. (2ndly) In or towards the said widenings and improvements of streets and roads, and (3rdly) in or towards the expenses of carrying into effect the other provisions of the Bill with respect to the park; and as to the moneys to arise from the sale of the Holmes Common. (1st) In payment of the expenses of sale. (2ndly) In or towards payment of the costs, charges, and expenses of obtaining the proposed Act, and of any proceedings in Chancery or otherwise, under and in order to give effect to it. (3rdly) As to the residue to be invested in the names of the aforesaid trustees or committee for the time being, upon Government, or real, or other securities upon trust, to apply the income as hereinafter mentioned; and as to the moneys to arise from the sale of the said portion of the South or Canwick Common. (1st) In payment of expenses of sale. (2ndly) At the discretion of the Corporation in defraying the expenses of carrying into effect the other provisions of the Bill with respect to the West Common and the South or Canwick Common, or either of them; and as to the money to arise from the sale of Diglands and from the demises aforesaid. (1st) In payment of the expenses of such sales and demises. (2ndly) In or towards carrying into effect the provisions of the Bill with respect to the West Common, or paying the interest and instalments of principal of money borrowed under the provisions hereinafter referred to, of the Bill upon the security of the West Common, or forming the sinking fund hereinafter referred to; and as to the income of the investments of the residue of the money arising from the sale of the Holmes Common, and as to the annual sum or consideration for the purchase of the common rights and other rights in Monks' Leys Common, and (after the redemption thereof) the income arising from the investment of the redemption money for the same, in payment of life annuities of £5 each, or such other amount as shall be settled by the Court of Chancery, to freemen and widows of freemen of the said city, resident and inhabiting therein, and who have been so resident and inhabiting for five successive years immediately preceding the allocation of the respective annuities to them, and who being freemen, are not recipients of the Senior Freemen's Fund, or who being freemen or widows of freemen are not recipients of any annuity under the Canwick Common scheme, and who being widows of freemen have not married again; and such annuities to continue until the annuitants respectively die or cease to reside and inhabit within the said city, or being widows of freemen marry again; and such annuitants to be respectively chosen according to seniority of age, or to be applied according to such other or modified

scheme, as may be prescribed by the Bill or by the Court of Chancery.

11. To empower the Court of Chancery upon summary application, or otherwise, and either at one time, or from time to time, to settle, and also from time to time, on a like application, to vary a scheme or schemes for carrying into effect the provisions of the Bill with respect to the application of the funds lastly hereinbefore treated of, and to make all necessary provisions, and give all necessary directions with respect thereto.

12. To empower the Corporation, from time to time, to borrow and re-borrow any money required for carrying into effect the provisions of the Bill with respect to the West Common, on mortgage of the lands for the time being, forming part of the West Common, and to repay the moneys so borrowed by instalments, or by means of a sinking fund, or otherwise, and for that purpose, from time to time, while any moneys remain owing on the security of the West Common, to demand and receive fees, tolls, or charges, to be prescribed by the Bill for the depasturing or stocking the said West Common, and to provide for the recovery of such fees and charges, and the application thereof to the purposes of the sinking fund.

13. To provide that every freeman of the said city, resident and inhabiting therein, and every widow of a deceased freeman of the said city, while remaining sole and resident, and inhabiting within the said city, shall retain the right to stock either the West Common or the South Common with two head of cattle, and that every person resident and inhabiting in any part of the said city, and entitled to stock either of the same commons, may stock either one of them indiscriminately at his option, without regard to the situation of his residence. And that each person entitled to stock either of the same commons may let his or her right to any other person resident and inhabiting within the same city. But that (except the Corporation in respect of their present and future rights of depasturing with sheep, and their lessees of such rights) no person not resident and inhabiting within the said city shall be entitled to stock either of the same commons, nor to hire or take the rights of any other person, and that no person shall be entitled to stock either of the same commons between the 1st of April and the 13th of May in any year, both days inclusive.

14. To provide, either directly by the Bill, or by taking power in the Bill, for the Corporation to make bye-laws from time to time, for the purposes following, viz., for the appointment by the Corporation of a commons' warden, and the keeping by the commons' warden of a register wherein he shall enter all stock depastured on either the West or the South Common, and the names and addresses of the owners thereof, and whether they are commoners exercising their own rights, or persons resident and inhabiting within the said city, exercising rights hired from commoners, and for compelling immediate notification to the commons' warden of every hiring by any person of the common right of any other person, and immediate entry by such warden of such hiring in such register, and for access at all reasonable times by all commoners to such register, and for compelling every person stocking either common with any stock to notify the particulars thereof forthwith to, and register the same with the commons' warden, and to make and deliver to him a declaration conformably to the statute for the abolition of extra judicial oaths, verifying his *bond fide* ownership of such stock, and the fact that he is entitled

in his own right, and whether as resident freeman or resident householder, or that he is a resident in the said city and entitled as having hired the right of a resident freeman, or householder, and verifying the name and address of the person from whom he has hired the same, and also for the branding or marking of all stock by the commons' warden, for identification, and for entering the brands or marks in the register, and for payment by each person stocking either common of fixed fees or sums for his stock, upon the registration thereof, not exceeding amounts to be settled by the Bill, and for preventing the stocking of either common by any person without payment of such fees or sums, and for the entry by the commons' warden of all such fees or sums in a book on receipt thereof, and for access to such book at all times by all persons entitled to stock either common, and for the imposing penalties on and recovering them from persons stocking either common illegally or in excess of their rights, or without having registered the same or paid the fees or sums aforesaid on registration, or to make other regulations relative to the stocking of the said commons respectively.

15. To provide for the indemnity and reimbursement of all trustees to be appointed under the Bill, and for the filling up of vacancies in the number of such trustees from time to time.

16. To confer upon the Corporation all other powers and authorities necessary for effecting the objects of the Bill, and to repeal, vary, or extinguish rights, privileges, and exemptions, and confer other rights, privileges, and exemptions in or with respect to all or some of the several commons aforesaid.

17. To empower the Corporation, either in their discretion, or with consents of commoners, or meetings of commoners, to be prescribed by the Bill, from time to time, to make exchanges of all or any parts of the said South or Canwick Common and West Common, or either of them, for any other lands, and to make and carry into effect other arrangements with reference to such commons, or either of them.

18. For the saving of all rights of common and all other rights, except as the same will be varied or extinguished by the Bill.

19. To incorporate in the Bill, or extend and made applicable to the purposes thereof, all or some of the existing powers, indemnities, and authorities of the Corporation, and all or some of the existing provisions of the following general Acts, viz.:—The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845; The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts Amendment Act, 1860; The Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845; and The Commissioners Clauses Consolidation Act, 1847; and all other Acts amending or extending all or any of the Acts herein specified.

20. To repeal, alter, or amend all or some of the provisions of a certain Act of Parliament made and passed in the 4th and 5th years of her present Majesty, cap. 108, intituled "An Act for more effectually repairing, maintaining, and improving certain roads leading to and from the City of Lincoln," and sections 15 to 20 of the 17th and 18th Victoria, cap. 97, and all or some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, with respect to application of compensation.

On or before the 30th day of November, 1869, plans and sections in duplicate, describing the widening and improvement of streets and roads to be authorized by the Bill, and the lines and situations of the whole thereof respectively, and the lands and houses intended to be taken com-

pulsorily for all or any of the purposes of the Bill, and in or through which the same works will be made, maintained, varied, extended, or enlarged, or through which every communication to or from the works shall be made, together with a book of reference to such plans, containing the names of the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees, and occupiers of all lands and houses so intended to be taken, and in the lines of the proposed works or within the limits of deviation as defined upon the said plans, and describing such lands and houses respectively, and a copy of this notice, as published in the London Gazette, will be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the City of Lincoln and county of the same city, at his office in St. Benedict's-square, in the City of Lincoln, and with the Clerk of the Peace for the parts of Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln, at his office at Spilsby, in the county of Lincoln, and on or before the said 30th day of November, a copy of so much of the said plans, sections, and book of reference as relates to each parish or extra parochial place in or through which the widening and improvements of the said streets and roads will be made, or in which any lands, houses, or other property intended to be taken as aforesaid are situate, together with a copy of this notice, as published in the London Gazette, will be deposited for public inspection with the parish clerk of each such parish, at his residence, and in the case of each extra parochial place with the parish clerk of some parish immediately adjoining thereto, at his residence.

On or before the 23rd day of December next, printed copies of the Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons.

Corporation of London.

Extension of the Limits of the County of the City of London to the Limits of the Metropolis, the area within such extended limits to be called the County of London, or by some other name; Alteration and Consolidation of the Institutions within the Metropolis, Enlargement and alteration of the powers of the Corporation of London, Exclusion of the borough of Southwark from the Corporation of London, and repeal, alteration, and extinguishment of certain powers, rights, and privileges within the borough of Southwark; Incorporation of a Governing Body for the Metropolis, Dissolution or alteration of the constitution and name of existing Public Bodies; Regulation of duties and appointment, superannuation, and displacement of Officers; Powers with reference to the appointment of Justices and the administration of the Law within the Metropolis; Rating powers, Bye-laws, Amendment of Acts, and other purposes.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session, for leave to bring in a Bill, and to pass an Act, for the following objects and purposes, or some of them, that is to say:—

To extend the limits of the county of the city

of London to the limits of the metropolis, as defined by an Act passed in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 120, for the better local management of the metropolis (hereinafter called The Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855), and to declare that the area within such extended limits shall constitute a county of itself, and shall bear the name of the County of London, or such other name as shall be determined by Parliament, and to alter the limits of the counties forming any part of the metropolis by excluding from such counties respectively such portions as are within the metropolis.

To repeal and annul all powers, authorities, jurisdictions, rights, and privileges which the Corporation of the city of London, or the mayor, or any of the courts or officers of the same, have or has by virtue of any law or statute, or of the charters or customs of the city of London at any time exercised, or claimed to have exercised over or within the borough of Southwark, or any part of the same, or the Ward of Bridge Without, and to authorize the sale of any lands, offices, and other real and personal property belonging to the Corporation of London within the borough of Southwark, or any part or parts thereof respectively, and to repeal or alter any existing charters, customs, grants, rights, or privileges relating to the borough of Southwark or to the Ward of Bridge Without, or to any of its courts or officers.

To authorize the erection of a town-hall for the borough of Southwark, and to authorize the application of corporate funds and other public moneys for the purpose thereof, and if need be, to levy rates, duties, and charges for such last-mentioned purpose.

To extinguish and annul all rights, powers, jurisdictions, laws, usages and customs now or heretofore used, exercised, or enjoyed or in force within such extended limit, or any part of the metropolis and the city of London at the time of the passing of the intended Act or Acts, so far as the same shall at all obstruct or interfere with the object and purposes of the said intended Act.

To constitute a public body for the good government and management of the district comprised within the metropolis, and to incorporate such public body by the name of "the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of London" (hereinafter called the corporation), or by such other name or style as shall be determined by Parliament, and to provide for the election of the members of the corporation, and to define their functions and powers, and to enable the corporation to sue and be sued, and to hold, receive, and take duties, tolls, revenues, real and personal estate, and without license in mortmain, to take, purchase, and hold lands, and to exercise other rights and privileges.

To vest in the Corporation all duties, tolls, revenues, real and personal estate, charters and customs of the city of London, and all rights, gifts, grants, liberties, and privileges, franchises, usages, constitutions, prescriptions, immunities, acts, bye laws, and standing orders, which at the commencement of the intended Act shall be vested in the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty, or the manor, commonalty, and citizens of the city of London, hereinafter referred to as the Corporation of London, or in the Common Council of the city of London, or in the Court of Aldermen of the city of London, or any committees, trustees, or persons acting under the direction of or in connection with the said mayor, aldermen, and commons, and to constitute a council, committee, or other separate body for any special purpose to be mentioned in the intended Act.

To transfer to and vest in the Corporation all or some of the functions, powers, authorities, duties, revenues, and real and personal estates whatsoever, which at the commencement of the intended Act shall be vested in the Metropolitan Board of Works, vestries, district boards, and other public bodies, and to enable the Corporation to use, exercise, and enjoy, and be liable for the duties, revenues, real and personal estates, debts, and obligations of the said Metropolitan Board of Works, vestries, district boards, and other public bodies, and to levy tolls, rates, duties, and charges, and to repeal, alter, or extinguish tolls, rates, duties, and charges.

To define the rights, duties, and privileges of the members of the Corporation of London and of the Metropolitan Board of Works, and of their officers and servants respectively, and to confer on them new rights, duties, and privileges, and to alter and extinguish any existing rights, duties, and privileges, and to alter the style or title of the officers of the Corporation of London and the salaries of such officers respectively, and to enable the Corporation to remove officers and pay them compensation by way of annuity or otherwise, and to appoint other officers and servants.

To appoint justices of the peace, salaried police magistrates, and other public officers, and to define their duties, rights, powers, and privileges, and to authorise the erection of police courts, town halls, and other public buildings, with all necessary conveniences.

And the said Bill will incorporate with itself all or some, or some parts, of the provisions of the Acts following, that is to say: The Acts of the 5th and 6th years of the reign of his late Majesty King William the 4th, cap. 76, to provide for the regulation of municipal corporations in England and Wales, and of all Acts amending the same, and of all other Acts or parts of Acts in force for the regulation of municipal corporations in England and Wales, or in relation thereto; The Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855, and all Acts amending the same; the Act of the 10th year of the reign of his late Majesty King Geo. the 4th, cap. 41, for improving the police in and near the metropolis, and all Acts amending the same, and all other Acts and parts of Acts in force for the regulation of the metropolitan police, or metropolitan police courts, or in relation thereto respectively; The Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847, The Towns Police Clauses Act, 1847, The Local Government Act, 1858, and all Acts amending the same respectively; The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, and The Lands Clauses Acts Amendment Act, 1860, and the provisions of any other Act which it may be necessary or convenient to incorporate for carrying into complete effect the objects and purposes of the intended Act.

So far as may be necessary for all or any of the objects and purposes of the intended Act, it is proposed to repeal, alter, amend, extend, and enlarge the powers and provisions of all Acts, charters, grants, licenses, powers, and usages within the metropolis, or the limits of the several boundaries proposed to be established under the powers of the intended Act.

And notice is hereby further given, that in the event of the proposed Bill being introduced on petition, printed copies of the said Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons on or before the 23rd day of December next.

To authorize the Company and any corporations, local boards of health, companies, trustees, or other public bodies or persons within or adjoining the said townships or places comprised within the proposed district to be supplied with gas by the Company, to enter into and carry into effect contracts and agreements for lighting and for supplying all necessary articles and things, and for performing all acts and services incidental to lighting any public streets, highways, buildings, districts, or places, or for the sale, purchase, hire, or supply of any gas, mains, pipes, lamp-posts, and other works of the Company, or of any such bodies or persons within any part of the said district as defined and authorized by the said Act.
