

leading from Ormskirk to Southport aforesaid, over the same brook; and extending thence, north-westward for a distance of five chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said high-road to its junction with Common-lane, usually called Jackson's-common-lane; and extending thence, first north-westward, and then south-westward for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with an Occupation-road and footpath, which lead past the house called or known as Ormishaws towards Halsall-lane; and extending thence, first north-westward, and then westward for a distance of forty-four chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the said Occupation-road and footpath to the boundary, which divides the said parish of Ormskirk from the parish of Halsall aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Barnabas, situate within the limits of the new parish of Saint Paul, Oxford, in the county of Oxford, and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Barnabas, situate within the limits of the new parish of Saint Paul, Oxford, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (testified by his having signed and sealed

this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Oxford, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Barnabas, situate within such new parish, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Barnabas, Oxford.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Barnabas, Oxford, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Paul, Oxford (situate partly within the original limits of the parish of Saint Giles, Oxford, and partly within the original limits of the parish of Saint Thomas, Oxford), in the county of Oxford, and in the diocese of Oxford, which is bounded on the west by the present limits of the parish of Saint Thomas, Oxford aforesaid, and on all other sides, that is to say, on the south, on the northeast, and on the northwest, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last named parish from the new parish of Saint Paul, Oxford aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the Oxford Canal, opposite to the western end of the wall or fence, which forms the northern boundary of the inclosure which is called or known as Worcester College Grounds, and extending thence generally eastward for a distance of two hundred and eighty-six yards or thereabouts to and along the middle of the said wall or fence (thereby passing in rear of the houses and gardens situate on the southern side of Nelson-street) to the eastern end of the same wall or fence at its junction with the wall or fence forming the north-eastern boundary of the house and garden situate on the southern side of Nelson-street aforesaid, and called or known as Number 1 Gardener's Cottages, and extending thence north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of sixty-two yards, or thereabouts (thereby passing along the south-eastern side of a certain ancient inclosure belonging to the President and Fellows of Saint John's College), to a boundary stone inscribed 'O. St. B. D. C. 1869, No. 1,' and placed on the southern side of the street or road called or known as Worcester-terrace, at a point opposite to the
