In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 19th of February, 1870, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas We are of opinion that it will greatly tend towards the efficiency of your Majesty's Service were We empowered to introduce certain alterations into the existing system of promotion and retirement of Officers in your Majesty's Royal Marine Forces. We would, therefore, venture to submit to your Majesty the following propositions :—

That the system of compulsory retirement be extended to all the higher grades, so as to cause a more even and constant flow of promotion ;

That a scheme of retirement be established on a scale more liberal than that now existing, and more duly proportioned to the length of the service of Officers.

Should your Majesty be pleased to approve of these our propositions, we would humbly submit

that the same should take effect from the 1st April, 1870.

As relates to Officers of the Royal Marines.

1. There shall be a fixed establishment of twelve General Officers of Royal Marines, to be appointed as follows :—

2. Every vacancy on the fixed list of General Officers in each branch to be filled, as the case may be, by the Senior Lieutenant-General or Major-General of that branch, or by the Senior Colonel of that branch on the reserved list, or by the Senior Colonel on the serving strength of that branch of the corps, unless there shall be a Supernumerary Officer, in which case the Supernumerary to fill the vacancy.

3. The appointment of Colonel of Division to be abolished.

4. Compulsory retirement to be extended to all ranks.

5. All Officers to be retired irrespective of age, at Our discretion, if physically unfit to serve.

6. Power to be reserved to Us, to suspend at any time, and with respect to any rank, the provisions of the order under which an Officer may at his option retire, at an age less than that fixed for compulsory retirement in each rank.

7. Officers retired at an age earlier than that fixed for optional retirement, to receive such rates of retired pay as We may deem proper in each case, not being less in amount than the sum fixed as the maximum for the next lower grade.

8. An Officer placed upon the retired list in no case to be replaced on the active list.

9. An Officer placed on the retired list may receive a step of honorary rank at his own request, and with Our consent.

10. General Officers to be retired on the full pay of a Colonel Commandant.

11. Reserved Colonels Commandant to be retired on 600*l*. a year.

12. All other officers retired to receive Retired Pay according to the following scale, subject to the provisions contained in Clause 14 :—

13. A deduction to be made of 10*l.* for each year wanting to complete the periods of service specified in the above scale, except in the case of officers placed on half-pay in order to effect the reduction of the lists. These officers to be allowed to count such time on half-pay as full service for retirement.

15. Good service pensions to be six in number, and to be distributed amongst General Officers, whether on the active or retired list. These pensions to be of the value of 200*l.* a-year each, and to be held for life. The emoluments of the officers at present holding the appointment of Colonels of Divisions to be deemed to include Good Service Pensions.

16. A General Officer to receive the pay of Colonel Commandant.

17. A Colonel Commandant, either on attaining 60 years of age, or at the expiration of his command, to be placed on a reserved list with the pay of 600*l.* per annum ; and, while on that list, to be eligible for promotion to the fixed list of General Officers in his turn. If he attains the age of 65 without being so promoted, to be removed to the retired list.

18. An officer retired may, at his own request, and with our consent, compound his retired pay under the rules laid down by the Lords Commissioners of your Majesty's Treasury for Administering Act 32 and 33 Vict., cap. 32.

19. No pension, except a pension for wounds, can be compounded.

20. General Officers now on the List to be retired at 70 on retired pay, equal in amount to

their present emoluments, but not to receive a Good Service Pension in addition to their emoluments as Colonel of a Division.

21. Colonels Commandant now on the List whose command dates from on or before 27th July, 1867, to receive, when placed on the reserved list, the amount of their present pay.

22. Captains now on the List of 25 years' service not to be compulsorily retired until the age of 50 ; and Paymasters and Barrack-masters now holding such appointments not to be compulsorily retired until the age of 60.

All present rules and regulations, except in so far as they are altered or limited by these general or temporary provisions, shall be deemed to remain in force.

We beg leave to represent to your Majesty that the Lords Commissioners of your Majesty's Treasury have sanctioned the expenditure which may be incurred."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 19th of February, 1870, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas We have had under our consideration the Active Lists of Chief Warrant Officers, Warrant Officers, and Engineers of your Majesty's Fleet. We would humbly submit to your Majesty the following propositions, by means of which We should be enabled to carry out the measures We consider essential to the efficiency of your Majesty's Service, and in which We have duly respected the existing privileges of Officers.

We propose to your Majesty :

- a reduction of these Lists, and the establishment of fixed numbers for the future ;
- the abolition of the distinction between the Second and Third classes of Warrant Officers ;
- an extension of the system of compulsory retirement ;
- greater facilities for optional retirement ;
- an augmentation of the scale of retiring pensions ;
- an improvement of some of the existing rates of pay ; and the alteration of certain rules relating to service.

We beg leave further to recommend to your Majesty that, in consideration of the peculiar circumstances of their case, We be empowered to

grant pensions to Widows of Warrant Officers who died between July 19, 1830, and January 1, 1860, should such Widows be otherwise qualified under existing Regulations.

Should your Majesty be pleased to sanction these Our proposals, We would most humbly suggest that We be empowered to carry them into effect from the 1st of April, 1870.

As relates to Chief Gunners, Chief Boatswains, Chief Carpenters, and Warrant Officers.

1. The numbers of the above officers not to exceed :—

2. Warrant officers in future to be divided into two classes only.

3. Warrant officers now in the 3rd class to be at once promoted to the 2nd class, and paid according to the new scale.

4. Chief Gunners, Chief Boatswains, and Chief Carpenters to receive as pay 9s. per diem ; Warrant Officers of the 1st class 7s. 6d. per diem ; of the 2nd class, 5s. 6d. per diem.

5. An allowance of 6d. per diem to be given to each of the above officers when in charge of stores in a sea-going ship in commission. This allowance to be exclusive of the tool-money allowed to Carpenters.

6. Harbour-pay and the distinction between harbour and sea-service to be abolished.

7. All officers of these grades to be pensioned on attaining 55 years of age ; and at any age if found physically unfit for service at sea. They may be pensioned at their own request on attaining 50 years of age.

8. Power to be reserved to Us to suspend at any time, and with respect to any rank, the foregoing provision under which an Officer may at his option retire, at an age less than that fixed for compulsory retirement in each rank.

10. Warrant Officers holding appointments in Your Majesty's Yards, if not entitled to civil superannuation, to count such service as Warrant officers' time towards pension, on the above scale.

11. Officers guilty of misconduct to receive such lower rates of pay and pension as We may determine.

12. In the case of Gunners, Boatswains, and Carpenters, warranted subsequently to 30th June, 1830, and who died prior to the 1st January, 1860, their widows, if otherwise qualified under existing regulations, to be entitled to receive the pension of 25l. a-year under the conditions laid down in your Majesty's Order in Council of 23rd January, 1860.

13. Present Warrant Officers of the 2nd class to continue to receive as pay 6s. a-day.

14. All Warrant Officers to be allowed at their request, and with Our consent, to compound their pensions, except Greenwich Hospital Pensions, under the rules laid down by the Lords

Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury for administering Act 32 and 33 Vict., cap. 32.

All present rules and regulations, except in so far as they are altered or limited by these provisions, shall be deemed to remain in force.

As relates to Engineers and Assistant Engineers.

1. The Active List of Engineers and Assistant Engineers not to exceed 800.

2. The rates of full-pay to be as at present, with the exception that an Engineer who has served five years in that rank shall receive 10s. a-day.

3. The term "Harbour-service" to be abolished. Harbour-pay in future to be termed half-pay, and the rates thereof to be the same as those of harbour-pay at present.

4. No officer to be in future appointed Engineer for special charge.

5. Engineers qualified for promotion to Chief Engineer to be pensioned at 50 years of age. "Engineers for special charge," Engineers not

qualified for promotion to Chief Engineer, and Assistant Engineers, to be pensioned at 45 years of age; and at any age if they have either not served in one of Your Majesty's ships at sea during

the last six years, or if found physically unfit to serve.

6. The following to be the scale of Pensions to Engineer officers :—

7. An Assistant Engineer of less than five years' standing to receive in lieu of Pension a Gratuity of 10*l.* for each complete year's service.

8. Engineer officers who entered Your Majesty's service prior to the 12th October, 1863, to receive, when pensioned, not less than 100*l.* if Engineer for special charge or Engineer; 80*l.* if Assistant Engineer 1st Class; or 65*l.* if Assistant Engineer 2nd class, provided in each case that they are retired at 45 years of age.

9. The existing powers vested in Us, of granting lower rates of half-pay in cases of misconduct, to be extended to pensions.

10. All Engineer officers to be allowed, at their request, and with Our consent, to compound their pensions, except Greenwich Hospital Pensions, under the rules laid down by the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury for administering Act 32 and 33 Vict., cap. 32.

Temporary Provisions.

1. Until the list of Engineer officers shall have been reduced to the proposed numbers, officers of any age may, with their consent, and at Our discretion, be pensioned on the scale they have earned by service.

2. Power to be reserved to Us to suspend at any time, and with respect to these ranks, the above provision under which an Officer may at his option, retire at an age earlier than that fixed for compulsory retirement in each rank.

3. "Engineers for special charge," and Engineers now on the Active List, not to be compelled to retire until they have attained the age of 50, unless they have either not served at sea for six years, or are physically unfit for service.

All present rules and regulations, except in so far as they are hereby expressly altered or limited, shall be deemed to remain in force.

We would represent to your Majesty that though some additional immediate expenditure may be entailed in order to carry out these propositions, considerable economy will be the ultimate result of their working; and that the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have concurred in these arrangements."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 19th of February, 1870, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Orders in Council of 5th February, 1834, 29th June, 1842, 30th January, 1856, 1st August, 1860, and 4th February, 1861, your Majesty has been graciously pleased to make provision empowering us to confer promotion to the Active and Retired List of your Majesty's Navy, on certain Officers who may be annually recommended to us for the good and faithful discharge of their duties in the Coast Guard Service, or in Revenue Cruisers, as well as to grant advantages as regards retired pay upon some of these Officers.

2. Whereas by Orders in Council of 7th February, 1857, and 1st August, 1860, your Majesty has been pleased also to confer power on us to select annually for promotion either to the Active or Retired List one of the Lieutenants employed as Admiralty Agents on board contract mail steam vessels.

3. And whereas the position of these branches of your Majesty's Service has been materially altered, the prospects of Officers serving in them as regards advancement and retirement have been greatly improved, and the number of Officers employed considerably diminished, we are of opinion that such promotions are no longer needed, the more especially as by our proposals, the Active Lists generally of your Majesty's Navy will be reduced.

4. We would therefore most humbly submit to your Majesty, that in future no special annual promotions be made, either to the Active or Retired Lists for service in the Coast Guard, Revenue Cruisers, or contract mail steam vessels, and that the provisions of your Majesty's several Orders in Council authorising such promotions be repealed."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
