The humble Address of the Lord Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenants, and Justices of the Peace, of the North-Riding of the County of York, at the General Sessions of the Peace holden at Thirke the 24th day of April, Anno Dom. 1688.

Great SIR!

WE think it a Duty incumbent upon us, to render Your Majesty our most humble and unfeigned Thanks, for the numberless Benefits that we, and all Your Subjects, do enjoy under Your wise and prudent Government, where equal Justice is administered to all, and every individual Person is allowed Liberty and Property: And in particular, we cannot but acknowledge the great Consolation You have given to those of tender Consciences, by Your Gracious Declaration of Indulgence, which gives them hopes, that when Your Majesty shall think fit to call a Parliament, You will find a full Concurrence for removing the Penalties for not Conforming to the Laws concerning Religion, so far as is consistent with the Legal Establishment of the Church of England; for such as are Dissenters only for Conscience-sake, with Submission, we humbly conceive ought rather to be treated with Compassion than Severity. And as we cannot doubt but the Blessings of Heaven will attend Your Gracious Design in this, so we cannot but note the prospect and hope we have of the continuance of Succession in Your own Line: For which we have, and actually pray, and shall constantly perform that Duty in the best of our Offerings to Almighty God, that His Blessings and Holy Spirit may ever attend Your Undertakings, to the Satisfaction of Your Majesty, and Comfort of all Your Good Subjects. And we in particular do humbly pray, that Your Majesty may live long to Reign over us,

Your most Humble, Dutiful and Obedient Subjects.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of Your Majesty's Loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and all other the Members of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation of the City of Dartmouth, in Your County of Devon.

Dear Sovereign!

WE presume (full of Transports of Joy) to congratulate you on the happy do Your Royal Feet, heartily to congratulate the happy

Birth of the Prince; the greatest Blessing that God's Subjects could desire, or Heaven could grant: And (as the best Obligation of Loyal Hearts,) we tenderly offer up our Prayers and Wishes, That He may enjoy a long and happy Life; That Your Sacred Majesty, as well for His Sake, as for the invaluable Good and Benefit of these Kingdoms; may live to the utmost Period of Human Life, to instruct Him, by Your Great Example, in Piety, Prudence, Courage, and all the Royal Qualifications of a King, of which Your Sacred Majesty is the most perfect Pattern: And when You shall exchange this Crown for an immortal one, may be then, with these Your Dominions, inherit also all Your Royal and Princely Virtues.

And we presume also, at this time, to repeat our fixed and Loyal Resolutions of serving Your Sacred Majesty on all Occasions with our Lives and Fortunes. And we tenderly offer You our hearty Thanks for Your late Declaration of Liberty of Conscience. And whenever Your Majesty shall summon a Parliament, we will chuse such Members as shall entirely, and without Conditions, answer Your Royal Expectation, in repealing the Penal Laws and Testes; not thinking it consistent with the Duty of Subjects to make Conditions with their King, with so Gracious a King! But as Your Majesty's Mercy and Indulgence is free, and unlimited, so shall our Obedience be. May Your Sacred Majesty live long and happily: May all Your Enemies either heartily repent and implore Your Mercy, or suffer by Your Justice: And may Your Throne be established in Peace!

So heartily pray Your Majesty's Loyal Subjects of this Your ancient Borough. In Testimony whereof we have affixed our Common Seal the 23d day of June, in the Fourth Year of Your Majesty's Reign, Anno Dom. 1688.

Legborne, June 9. The Gallies of our Great Duke will sail the next week for the Levant to join the Venetian Fleet, with two Merchant Ships that have been hired to carry the Land Soldiers. We have Advice from Constantinople, that the Disorders still continued in that Empire, which was the reason that their Preparations for the War went on very slowly.

Venice, June 14. The 8th of this month arrived here a Vessel from Corou, by which we had Advice, that the Doge Morosini was gone from Porto Poro with 14 Gallies and several Gallioths, to raise Contributions: And by another Vessel, that's since arrived from Corfu, we are informed, that he had taken his Course towards Salumique, whither he had sent to demand 200000 Piasters, threatening to bombard the Town in case of their refusal. And that at the same time Signior Zen was cruising with a Squadron of Ships off of Negrepoint, to hinder the sending of any Succors or Provisions thither. The Convoy commanded by Signior Pisanu will part from hence for the Levant in three or four days. We hear from the Coast of Barbary, that the Tripolins have four Men of War at Sea.

Warsaw, June 5. The Crown-Mareschal is gone to the general Rendezvous, to give the necessary Orders for the Security of our Frontiers, which are again threatned with an Invasion of the Tartars, who are drawing together under the Command of Sultan Naradin; and while they are employed in giving our Forces this Diversion, another Body of Turks and Tartars (as our Advices from Jassi inform us) will conduct a great Convoy of Provisions to Cambric.

etc. The Pope's Nuncio at this Court does very much press, that the Army of the Crown may, pursuant to the Treaty concluded with the Moscovites, march towards *Budnick*; promising in that case to furnish all necessaries for their Subsistence, and to pay besides 3000 Horses, without reckoning the 30000 Crowns he hath already advanced, by his Holiness's Order towards the Preparations for the Campaign. The King has, it's said, resolved to comply with these Instances. And the Nuncio has thereupon sent a Commissary to make the necessary provisions, which may, as the Army moves, pass down the *Niester*.

Vienna, June 24. The Duke of *Lorraine* is much better, so that we have great hopes he will be yet able to go into the Field this Summer. The Auxiliary Forces of *Bavaria, Sussia, Franconia* and the *Upper Rhine*, are marching with all the diligence they can towards *Esbeck*; from whence we have advice that the overflowing of the *Saue*, occasioned by the great Rains did hinder the Imperial Troops from passing that River. There are Letters from General *Caraffa* of the 12th Instant, which give an account, that he was arrived, with the Troops under his command in the neighborhood of *Lipp*. The Count de *Caunitz* will, it's said, be sent to *Calme*; the Baron de *Egnach* to *Liege*, and the Baron of *Godens* to *Munster* and *Waldseem*, to take care of the Imperial Interests at the Elections that are going to be made for the filling those vacant Sees.

Hamburgh, June 25. The King of *Sueden* is expected in *Sehonen* the 28th of this month. The Polish Envoy at *Berlin* has obtained of the Elector of *Brandenburgh* an Assistance of 1300 Men against the *Turks*; which are to be commanded by Count *Charles de Sconberg*. There is a report that the *Tatars* have defeated 1500 *Poles*.

Hamburgh, July 2. The King of *Denmark* parted the 30th of the last month from *Gluckstadt*; was yesterday at *Iezeboe*, where he took a review of several Regiments, and is expected this Evening at *Gottorp*; from whence, it's believed, his Majesty will return in few days to *Copenhagen*.

Paris, July 3. The 28th past Mr. *Skelton*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, had Audience of the King at *Versailles*; and afterwards of the Dauphin, Dauphiness, &c. to Notify the Birth of the Prince. Whereupon the Count de *Grammont* is sent for *England* to make the Compliment of Congratulation to Their Majesties. The News of the Revolt of the Garisons of *Candia* and *Canea* is confirmed by the way of *Marseilles*: From whence we have likewise Advice, that the French Fleet, commanded by the Marechal d'*Estree*, was arrived before *Argiers*. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, That the Marriage of Prince *James*, that King's Eldest Son, with the Princess *Rdzville*, Widow of Prince *John of Brandenburgh*, is concluded.

Westminster-hall, June 21. *John Dykes* being, upon an Information, at the Prosecution of the Patentees, appointed by His Majesty for Binding and Registring Servants to the Foreign Plantations, Convicted of Kidnapping, or Enticing away, His Majesty's Subjects, to go Servants into the Foreign Plantations, he this day received Judgment at the King's Bench Bar, To pay Four Nobles for a Fine to His Majesty, to stand in the Pillory on the 26th Instant, the space of one hour, before the Royal Exchange; *London*, and to be thence whipp'd to *Tower Hill*, and afterwards to give Security for his good Behaviour for one Year.

Whitehall, June 29. This day His Majesty was pleased to Confer the Honour of Knighthood upon *Thomas Jefford* Esq; Mayor of *Exeter*, in Consideration of his Faithful Services.

St. James's, June 29. This day the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor, and Court of Aldermen, together

with the Sheriffs, with all their Officers in their Formalities (by Leave of His Majesty,) attended the Prince, and had the Honour to kiss His Royal Highness's Hand, He being then in the Arms of the Lady Governess, the Right Honourable the Lady Marchioness of *Down*; After which Mr. *Chamberlain* of the City, by Command of the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, presented to her a Purse of Gold, to be distributed as heretofore hath been accustomed.

Whitehall, July 1. The 28th past the *Sieur de Zulstein*, who is sent from her Royal Highness the Princess, and his Highness the Prince of *Orange*, to Congratulate upon the Birth of the Prince, had Audience of the Queen; the 30th of the Queen-Dowager; and this day of the Prince, being conducted by Sir *Charles Corbet* Master of the Ceremonies.
