MULLION.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Mullion, Cornwall; and also in the churchyard, except in graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of entire bones.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixteenth day of May next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said sixteenth day of May.
