REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOM AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no

presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Saviour, situate at Ravensthorpe as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Mirfield, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Saviour, situate at Ravensthorpe as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Ravensthorpe.'

"And with the like consent of the said Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that 'nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Ravensthorpe, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Mirfield, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present Incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north by the Chapelry District of Robert Town, sometime part of the parish of Birstal, in the county and diocese aforesaid, on the north-east partly by the new parish of Saint John, Dewsbury Moor, and partly by the new parish of Saint Matthew, West Town, Dewsbury, both in the said county and diocese, on the south-east by the new parish of Thornhill Lees, in the same county and diocese, and on the remaining sides, that is to say, on the south and on the west, by an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the parish of Mirfield aforesaid, in the middle of the River Calder at or near Greenwood Bridge; and extending thence in a direction generally westward, for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the same river to a point opposite to the south-western end of that portion of the Dewsbury and Elland Trust road, which is called or known as

Mirfield-lane; and extending thence northward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the said Trust road; and extending thence generally westward for a distance of seventeen and a-half chains along the middle of the same Trust road to a point in the centre of Church Lane Bridge, which carries such Trust road over the line of the Cleckheaton Branch of the West Riding Union Railway; and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward for a distance of rather more than one mile and a quarter along the middle of the said branch line of railway to the boundary in the middle of the stream called or known as Flushing Dike, which divides the said parish of Mirfield from the Chapelry District of Robert Town aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint James West Hartlepool, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Christ Church, West Hartlepool, in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham, which is bounded on the east by Hartlepool Bay, on the south-east by the parish of Stranton, in the said county and diocese, and on the remaining sides, that is to say, on the west and on the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Stranton from the new parish of Christ Church, West Hartlepool aforesaid, at the point where Stranton-lane is joined by Tower-street; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the said street, to its junction with Surtees-street; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, to the point where it is intersected by Lynn-street; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the last-named street,

to its junction with Church-street; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with the roadway leading across the West Hartlepool branch line of the North-Eastern Railway towards Dock-street; and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of five and a-half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-described roadway, to the gate on the eastern side of the said branch line of railway; and extending thence, generally northward, for a distance of four chains and four yards, or thereabouts, along the fence forming the eastern boundary of the same branch line of railway, to a point opposite to the north-western angle of the house called or known as Carter's House; and extending thence, due eastward, and in a direct line, across the several lines of railway which connect the Coal Dock with the North-Eastern Railway aforesaid, to the eastern boundary of the said new parish of Christ Church, West Hartlepool, on the shore of Hartlepool Bay aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas by an Order in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, it was directed that burials should, with certain exceptions therein specified, be discontinued in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Order, which time has, by subsequent Orders in Council, been postponed; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing

burials in the said churchyard be further postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows; viz. :—

In Prittlewell Churchyard, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," and to "amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them, with the following modifications, viz. :—

BRADFORD, YORKSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the Wesleyan Chapel, Bradford Moor, in the county of York, and in the burial-ground of the said chapel within twenty feet of the chapel; and in the rest of the burial-ground, except in graves which are free from water, —no coffin to be placed within a foot of any other coffin, or less than four feet beneath the soil, except it be buried in a vault and be entombed in an airtight manner.

ST. MARY'S, WARWICK.—Forthwith wholly in the churchyard of St. Paul's, Warwick, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented; and except in now existing family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-third day of May next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-third day of May.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage, according to the weight thereof and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient to reduce the rates of postage now chargeable upon certain letters transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament respectively, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order, declare, and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Prince Edward Island, or posted in Prince Edward Island addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island by British packet-boat or by private ship, and without passing through a foreign country, there

shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of three pence.

2. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies, or in any foreign country, addressed to Prince Edward Island, or posted in Prince Edward Island addressed to any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, and transmitted by the post between any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country and Prince Edward Island, through the United Kingdom, the said letter being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island by British packet-boat or by private ship, and without passing through a foreign country, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for such transmission thereof respectively between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island an uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of two pence.

3. On every such letter so transmitted as hereinbefore mentioned between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island, exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding one half of an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage.

And on every such letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding one ounce and the half of another ounce in weight, three rates of postage.

And on every such letter exceeding one ounce and the half of another ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any such letter, above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

4. On every letter transmitted by the post between any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country and Prince Edward Island, through the United Kingdom, the said letter being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island by British packet boat or by private ship and without passing through a foreign country, there shall be charged, taken, and paid over and above the uniform rates of postage payable thereupon under the provisions of this Warrant hereinbefore contained for the transmission thereof between the United Kingdom and Prince Edward Island, such further or additional rates of postage for the conveyance of every such letter between the British Colony or Foreign country from or to which the same shall be forwarded and the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival or departure of the packet-boat or private ship conveying the same between such colony or foreign country and the United Kingdom as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters posted in, or addressed to, such colony or foreign country and transmitted to or from such port of arrival or departure in the United Kingdom.

5. The postage of every letter posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Prince Edward Island, or posted in Prince Edward Island, addressed to the United Kingdom, shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, but if any such letter shall be posted for transmission by the post under the authority of this Warrant, without any postage having been paid thereon or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the rate or rates of postage to which the same would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, every such letter shall be charged with the deficient postage, together with a further and additional rate of postage of three pence.

6. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any letters posted in, or addressed to, France, or to any letters transmitted through France otherwise than in closed mails, nor in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions or privileges granted by or under the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, or by or under any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Post Office, or to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges to which seamen, soldiers, and others employed in Her Majesty's service are by law entitled of sending and receiving letters by the post, subject to the regulations and restrictions made and in force for the time being in respect of the same.

7. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-six.

8. The rates of postage fixed by this present Warrant on the letters transmitted as herein respectively mentioned shall be in lieu of those now chargeable by law thereon.

9. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, or conditions in lieu thereof.

10. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.
