Viewes June 24. The overflowing of the Rivers does hinder the march of our Troops; Those that are on this side the Grave, not being able to pass that River to joyn the Forces at Hicke; which at the same time are, as it were, that up there, by the Country's lying for several miles round under water. The Humanians, who conducted the Carrison of Alba Regions of Hocke, are returned to Ribb; they report, That there is a Garrison of Soo men in that Forters: And constitute the reserve we had tarely from Scievania, that the Ottoman Troops comwe had lately from Sciavonia, that the Ottoman Troops commanded by the Vijer of Belgrane were, in pursuance of the Orders he had received from the Port, on their march towards Orders he had received from the Port, on their march towards to reduce Teghen Baffa, who periafted in his Revolt. They write from Upper Hungary; that General Garaffa arrived the task inflant at Capranza; but that his Troops were already advanced within 4 or 5 miles of Lippa, with a defign to street the place, in order to the making themselves entirely matters of the River Marofch. The same advices inform us, that the Marquis de Nigrelli, who commands in Upper Hungary, had drawn together the Hungartan Militia with which he would joyn two Imperial Regiments, to block up Great Waradin. The Letters from Buda tell us, that the Auxiliary Troops of Bavaria in 10 Regiments, 6 of Foot and 4 of Horigmarched from thence the 19th towards Effecke, under the command of the Count de Serini, Lieutenaut-General of His Kledoral Highnesse Forces. The Report continues, that the Pences and States of Moldavia and Valachia have resolved to fole ces and States of Moldavia and Valachia have resolved to follow the example of Transstrama, in putting themselves under the Emperours protection; which is a certain fign, that they look upon the Affairs of the Trans (whereof they cannot but be very well informed) to be in a very ill condition. These were lately about Carelfist, on the Borders of Criatia, 800 very brave Trans. who made incursions and committed award. were lately about Careltar, on the Borders of Cranta, 300 very brave Turks, who made incursions, and committed great Spoyl in that Country, till all of them, after many rencounters, were cut off (as its faid) to a man. The Emperour has given orders for the defraying the Duke of Mantua, and receiving him with all respect in the places through which he shall pass within the Imperial Territories in his way to Hungary, where he intends to make the Campagni. There are Letters from Palady which give an account that Colonel Dimidski, being land, which give an account, that Colonel Dimideski being commanded with 2000 Horse to attack a Convoy that was going to Caminiec, he had been surprised in his Quarters by severul thousand Turks and Tarcars, and that of the whole Party there escaped but 60, the rest being killed or taken Prisoners.
