## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is

to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at these Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the part of the Port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, in the borough and county of that name, within which foreign cattle may be landed for slaughter, as follows:—

All that space situate in Sandgate, within the borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, lying between the River Tyne and a line drawn due north from a point on the north bank of the River Tyne, at the eastern end of the Rotterdam Wharf, across the north shore to the wall forming the southern boundary of the property of the North-Eastern Railway Company, thence westward along the said boundary wall to the road called Wide Open, thence northward for a distance of twenty yards along the wall forming the western boundary of the said Railway Company's property, thence eastward for a distance of twenty-five yards along the northern boundary of the property of the said Railway Company, thence in a straight line in a northerly direction, passing the west end of the row of houses near the railway terminus, to the northern side of St. Ann's-street, thence westward along the northern side of St. Ann's-street to the passage called Bowey's Chare, thence southward along the eastern side of Bowey's Chare to the south side of the lane called Sandgate Middle-lane, thence westward along the southern side of Sandgate Middle-lane to the north-west corner of the Public Slaughter-houses, thence southward in a straight line along the western end of the Public Slaughter-houses to the public road called the North Shore, and by a continuation of the same straight line due south to the River Tyne, all which space is edged brown on the plan of part of the town of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs,

a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Guatemala, inclosing a translation of a Decree of the President of Salvador, dated 22nd February, 1870, which establishes the requirements to be complied with before Public Instruments issued in foreign countries can become valid in that Republic.

The following is the sole Article of this Decree:—

"In order that a Public Instrument proceeding from a foreign country may obtain validity, it must be corroborated by a Certificate of the Diplomatic Minister, Consul, or Vice-Consul of the Government of the Republic, or in default of such person, of the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Government of the country whence said instruments emanate, in which it must be certified that these instruments are granted by persons having authority in the country to grant them. The signature that confirms the said Certificate shall be testified to as authentic by the Salvador Minister; and if it should be written in a foreign language, it shall be converted into Spanish by two competent persons nominated and sworn by the Judge."

*Kensington Road Improvement.*

(Power to improve and divert part of Kensington-road and to appropriate part of Hyde Park for such purpose, and to abandon a part of the existing Road; Arrangements between Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings, the Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851, the Westminster District Board of Works, the Vestry of Kensington Parish, and others; Amendment of Acts).

NOTICE is hereby given, that application will be made to Parliament during the present Session for an Act to authorise the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings (hereinafter called the Commissioners) to improve and divert part of Kensington-road, situate in the parish of Saint Margaret, Westminster, and Saint Mary Abbot, Kensington, in the county of Middle-

sex, such improvement or diversion to commence at the junction of the said Kensington-road with the road called Prince Albert's-road, situate in the said parish of Saint Mary Abbot, Kensington, and opposite the Queen's Gate of Hyde Park, in the said parish of St. Margaret, Westminster, thence to proceed along a part of the existing road and over a part of Hyde Park, and to terminate at a point on the said road four hundred feet or thereabouts eastward of the centre of the Alexandra Gate of Hyde Park, situate in the said parish of Saint Margaret, Westminster:

Power will also be taken in the said Act to effect the following or some of the following purposes, that is to say:—

To abandon so much of the existing road as will be disused or become unnecessary by the formation of the proposed new road, and to vest the same in adjoining landholders, freed from existing rights of way and other rights over or affecting the same:

To maintain the proposed new road and to stop up or divert and appropriate, either temporarily or permanently, any streets, roads, footpaths, or ways which traverse that part of the road so to be diverted, and to construct, alter, and lay down sewers, drains, watercourses, pipes, and other structures, and to make new roads, footpaths, and ways in connection with the proposed new road:

To authorise the Commissioners to enter into arrangements with the Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851 and other landowners, the Westminster District Board of Works, the Vestry of Kensington Parish and all other bodies and persons affected by the said improvement and diversion, and to confirm agreements in relation thereto:

To authorise the appropriation of a portion of Hyde Park for the purposes aforesaid:

To amend some of the powers and provisions of "The Metropolis Management Act, 1855," "The Metropolis Management Amendment Act, 1856," and "The Metropolis Management Amendment Act, 1862," and any other Acts which relate to the objects of the said Bill:

To incorporate with the Bill all or some of the provisions of "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869," with such modifications as may be contained in the said Bill:

To vary or extinguish all rights and privileges which interfere with the objects of the said Bill, and to confer other rights, powers, and privileges:

Plans and sections describing the situation, lines, and levels of the proposed diversion, and the lands to be taken by compulsion or agreement under the powers of the said Bill, with a book of reference to those plans, containing the names of the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees and occupiers of the said lands, and a copy of this notice as published in the London Gazette, will forthwith be deposited with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Middlesex, at his office, at the Sessions House, Clerkenwell, and a copy of the said plans, sections, and books of reference, with a copy of this notice, will at the same time be deposited with the Clerk of the Westminster District Board of Works, such district including the parishes of St. Margaret and St. John the Evangelist, Westminster, at his office in Great Smith-street, Westminster, and with the Vestry Clerk of Kensington, at his office at Kensington.

3. Any person committing any breach of or in any way infringing this bye law shall be liable to a penalty of, and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding, five pounds, which said penalty shall be recovered, enforced, and applied according to the provisions of the said Thames Conservancy Acts. —Dated the 27th day of April, 1870.
