Flashing Light on Raschgoun Island.

THE French Government has given Notice, that from the 1st day of April, 1870, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Raschgoun Island.

The light is a *flashing* light, flashing *red and white* alternately *every ten seconds*; elevated 267 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 22 miles.
