WHEREAS the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have represented to Her Majesty that, in order to carry out the terms of a postal convention with France, it is expedient that secondary standards of the weight of one-third of an ounce avoirdupois, and of two-thirds of an ounce avoirdupois, should be legalized, in pursuance of the provisions contained in sections six and eight of the Standards of Weights, Measures, and Coinage Act, 1866; and that new imperial weights of such denominations have been constructed, and have been duly verified and authenticated in the Standards Department of the Board of Trade, their weight in relation to the imperial standard pound having been accurately determined:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and by virtue of the said recited Act of Parliament, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby declared, that the said standard weights of one-third of an ounce avoirdupois and of two-thirds of an ounce avoirdupois respectively, shall be legal secondary standards of weight, from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act.

WHEREAS it is expedient to continue, with certain amendments, the existing provision for testing, according to fixed rules, the qualifications of persons who may, from time to time, be proposed to be appointed, either permanently or temporarily, to any situation or employment in any of Her Majesty's Civil Establishments, except as hereinafter mentioned:—

I. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth

order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Right Honourable Sir Edward Ryan, now First Commissioner under Her Majesty's Orders in Council of the 21st May, 1855, and the 26th April, 1862, and George Webbe Dasent, Esquire, Doctor of Civil Law, or such other persons as Her Majesty may from time to time approve in the stead of them, or either of them, shall be Her Majesty's Civil Service Commissioners for testing the qualifications of the persons so proposed to be appointed to any situation or employment in the Civil Establishments as aforesaid, and shall hold their offices during the pleasure of Her Majesty; the said Sir Edward Ryan continuing to be the First Commissioner, and the said George Webbe Dasent being the Second Commissioner; and shall have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time such Assistant Examiners and others as may be required to assist them in the performance of the duties hereinafter assigned to them.

II. And it is hereby ordered that (except as may be excepted under Clause VII. of this Order, and in the Schedule marked B annexed hereto) the qualifications of all such persons as may be proposed to be appointed, either permanently or temporarily, to any situation or employment in any Department of the Civil Service shall, before they are employed, be tested by or under the directions of the said Commissioners; and no person (except as aforesaid) shall be employed in any Department of the Civil Service until he shall have been reported by the said Commissioners to be qualified to be admitted on probation to such situation or employment.

III. No person shall be appointed to any office or employment in any of Her Majesty's Civil Establishments until he shall be reported by the said Commissioners to have satisfied them—

- 1st. That he is within the limits of age prescribed for the situation or employment to which he desires to be admitted;
- 2nd. That he is free from any physical defect or disease which would be likely to interfere with the proper discharge of his duties;
- 3rd. That his character is such as to qualify him for such situation or employment; and,
- 4th. That he possesses the requisite knowledge and ability to enter on the discharge of his official duties.

IV. The rules applicable to each Department, under each of the above heads, shall be settled,

subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by the said Civil Service Commissioners and the chief Authorities of the Department.

V. Except as hereinafter is excepted, all appointments which it may be necessary to make, after the 31st day of August next, to any of the situations included, or to be included, in Schedule A to this Order annexed, shall be made by means of competitive examinations, according to regulations to be from time to time framed by the said Civil Service Commissioners, and approved by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, open to all persons (of the requisite age, health, character, and other qualifications prescribed in the said regulations) who may be desirous of attending the same, subject to the payment of such fees as the said Civil Service Commissioners, with the consent of the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, may from time to time require; such examinations to be held at such periods, and for such situations, or groups of situations, in the same or different Departments, as the said Civil Service Commissioners, with the approval of the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time determine, and to have reference either to the vacancies existing at the time of the examinations respectively, or to the number which may be estimated to occur within any period, not exceeding six months after the commencement of the examinations, as the said Civil Service Commissioners, after consultation with the chief authorities of the various Departments, and with the approval of the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, may deem expedient.

VI. After the candidate, reported as aforesaid by the Commissioners, has been appointed to an office or employment, he shall enter on a period of probation, during which his conduct and capacity in the transaction of business shall be subjected to such tests as may be determined by the chief of the Department to which he is attached, and he shall not remain in the Public Service after six months from the date of his appointment; unless satisfactory proofs of his fitness shall have been furnished to the chief of such Department, and a certificate of his qualification shall have been issued by the Civil Service Commissioners. A formal record of the particulars and of the result of such probation, signed by the chief of the Department, shall be furnished to the Civil Service Commissioners, and filed in their office, and they shall thereupon, and not sooner, if such record should be satisfactory, issue their certificate of the candidate's qualification for employment. The candidate after, no less than before, the issue of such certificate, shall hold his office at the pleasure of the chief of his Department.

VII. In case the chief of a Department to which a situation belongs, and the Lords of the Treasury, shall consider that the qualifications in respect of knowledge and ability deemed requisite for such situation are wholly or in part professional or otherwise peculiar and not ordinarily to be acquired in the Civil Service, and the said chief of the Department shall propose to appoint thereto a person who has acquired such qualifications in other pursuits, or in case the said chief of the Department and the Lords of the Treasury shall consider that, either for the purpose of facilitating transfers from the Redundant List or for other reason, it would be for the public interest that examination should be wholly or partially dispensed with, the Civil Service Commissioners may dispense with exami-

nation, wholly or partially, and may grant their certificate of qualification upon evidence satisfactory to them that the said person possesses the requisite knowledge and ability, and is duly qualified in respect of age, health, and character.

VIII. And it is lastly hereby ordered, that the situations mentioned, or referred to, in the Schedule marked B, hereto annexed, shall be wholly excepted from the operation of this Order: Provided that the chief authorities of any Department, with the concurrence of the Lords of the Treasury, by notice in the London Gazette, may, from time to time, add situations to either of the said Schedules, or withdraw situations therefrom, or restore thereto situations which may have been withdrawn.

WHEREAS by the 333rd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, subject to the provisions contained in the fifth part of that Act, it shall be lawful for every pilotage authority by bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section :

And whereas the Pilotage Board of Cardiff, being the pilotage authority for the port of Cardiff, within the meaning of the said recited Act, have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty three new bye-laws, which are set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, viz. :—

No. 5. With respect to the qualifications of persons to be appointed pilots by the said Pilotage Board ;

No. 6a. Respecting the division of pilots into two classes ;

No. 8. Respecting the marking of pilot boats and the exhibition of a flag ;

the said new bye-laws numbered 5 and 8 being in lieu of the 5th and 8th of the bye-laws and regulations with respect to pilots and pilotage within the district and under the jurisdiction of the said pilotage board, which were approved by Order in Council, dated the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said new bye-laws are proper and reasonable :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify her consent to, the said three new bye-laws of the said Pilotage Board of the said port of Cardiff, viz. : No. 6a, and also Nos. 5 and 8, in lieu of the said existing bye-laws numbered 5 and 8.

Schedule referred to in the above Order.

No. 5. Except as provided by the 24th section of "The Bristol Channel Pilotage Act, 1861," and as hereafter mentioned, no person shall be appointed after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, to act as a pilot

unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship for five years to a pilot in the waters of the district aforesaid, and have been at least 2 years in the oversea trade, or shall have been engaged in the coasting trade of the channel and district aforesaid for not less than five years; and no person shall be deemed eligible if less than 25 years, or more than 45 years old. And in case the Pilotage Board shall at any time be of opinion that an increased number of pilots are required in the said district, and there shall not be a sufficient number of duly qualified apprentices to supply the deficiency, the Board shall be at liberty to dispense with all or any part of the said apprenticeship or other requirement, and after examination, to appoint any fit and proper person (having previously served five years as master or mate of a vessel) to act as pilot without having served such term of apprenticeship, or complied with such other requirement.

No. 6A. Pilots shall be divided into two divisions, the 1st division to comprise channel pilots, and the 2nd division port pilots, and each division shall be divided into 1st and 2nd class pilots. Channel pilots shall be entitled to conduct vessels within the Cardiff Pilotage District, but as to 2nd class channel pilots (when beyond the limits of the Port of Cardiff) vessels not exceeding 500 tons registered tonnage. Port pilots shall be entitled to conduct vessels only within the limits of the Port of Cardiff, but as to 2nd class port pilots vessels not exceeding 500 tons registered tonnage. The division and class for which a pilot shall be licensed shall, upon appointments to be made upon and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, be determined upon the report of the examining officers. And, subject to the provision contained in the 26th section of the Bristol Channel Pilotage Act, 1861, no pilot shall be entitled to a license in another division or class until after he shall have been in active service as a pilot within the district aforesaid for two years in his then present division or class, and shall have passed a satisfactory examination. Pilots licensed before the said first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, shall be deemed 1st class pilots in the respective divisions for which they shall have been licensed.

No. 8. Each pilot's skiff or boat shall have her number painted on each bow, and the name of the pilot or pilots, as well as her own name and the name of the port, painted in legible characters upon the stern, and shall have the letter C marked in black paint, of not less than four feet in length, on her mainsail, and shall by day carry at her mast-head a flag, of not less than six feet by four feet, in two colours, the upper horizontal half white and the lower part red; and at night each pilot's skiff or boat shall carry a white light only at the mast-head, and shall exhibit a flare-up light every fifteen minutes.

Every pilot shall, immediately on boarding any vessel and taking charge thereof, hoist a flag under the ensign or on some other conspicuous place, but not on the fore royal mast-head, and keep the same flying during the time he so remains in charge; the flag to be the regular pilot flag, red and white for first class pilots, with the colours horizontal, and second class pilots vertical (the white being next the flag-staff), and port pilots, in addition thereto, bearing in the centre of their respective flags the letter P. in black, of not less than two feet in length. In case of default in any of the above requirements, the pilot to be liable to a penalty of £20 for every breach thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that upon the lighting of the said new pile lighthouses in Carlingford Lough, there shall be paid in respect of each of the said lights, for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which, having entered Carlingford Lough, may pass or derive benefit therefrom, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an over-sea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage.

The said tolls in respect of the said new pile lighthouses shall be levied by the Commissioners of Irish Lights, subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the New Consolidated Tables of Light Dues sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and to the gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. mentioned in an Order in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and also to the reductions, variations, and exemptions specified in an Order in Council dated the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

The said tolls in respect of the said new lighthouse shall be levied by the Commissioners of Irish Lights, subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the New Consolidated Tables of Light Dues sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and to the gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. mentioned in an Order in Council, dated the twenty-ninth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and also to the reductions, variations, and exemptions specified in an Order in Council, dated the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, in the words and figures following ; that is to say :

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Heworth, in a detached portion of the parish of Saint Saviour, in the suburbs of the city of York, and in the diocese of York.

" Whereas, at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Saviour, of the parish of Saint Olave, Marygate, and of the united parishes of

Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls and All Saints, in Peasholme, all in the suburbs of the city of York, and in the diocese of York aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Saviour, of the said parish of Saint Olave, Marygate, and of the said united parishes of Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls, and All Saints, in Peasholme, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Heworth as aforesaid.

"And whereas by a certain deed or articles of agreement bearing date on or about the tenth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the hereinbefore-mentioned Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and deposited in the registry of the said diocese of York, it is provided, that the right of presentation and appointment to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Heworth as aforesaid, should, upon the consecration of such church, belong to and be exercised by the Reverend Charles Carus Wilson, Clerk, vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Rams-gate, in the county of Kent, Edward Shipphard Carus Wilson, of Truro, in the county of Cornwall, Banker, and the Reverend Anthony Wilson Thorold, Clerk, prebendary of the prebend of Holme, in the cathedral and metropolitan church of York, and their heirs and assigns in perpetuity.

"And whereas Emma Crofts, of the said city of York, Widow, James Lancelot Foster, of the same city, Esquire, and Abraham Horsfall, of Leeds, in the county of York, Esquire, are the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Saviour.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, is the patron in right of his see of the rectory of the united parishes of Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls, and All Saints, in Peasholme.

"And whereas under the will of the late Right Honourable Thomas Philip, Earl de Grey, deceased, the patronage of the vicarage of Saint Olave, Marygate, was devised either to both or to one of his two surviving daughters, to wit, the Right Honourable Anne Florence, Dowager Countess Cowper, and the Honorable Lady Mary Gertrude Vyner, to be held by them, as the case may be, either jointly as tenants in common, or by one of them as sole patron.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York, given both as such Archbishop and as such patron as aforesaid, with the consents of the said Emma Crofts, of the said James Lancelot Foster, and of the said Abraham Horsfall, as such other patrons as aforesaid, and with the consents of the said Anne Florence, Dowager Countess Cowper, and of the said Lady Mary Gertrude Vyner, as such other patrons or patron as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Saviour, of the said parish of Saint Olave, Marygate, and of the said united

parishes of Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls, and All Saints, in Peasholme, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Heworth as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Heworth'; and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the said Charles Carus Wilson, Edward Shipphard Carus Wilson, and Anthony Wilson Thorold, their heirs and assigns, for ever.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Heworth, being :—

"All those several contiguous portions of the parish of Saint Saviour, of the parish of Saint Olave, Marygate, and of the parish of Saint Cuthbert (such lastly-mentioned parish forming part of the united parishes of Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls and All Saints in Peasholme), all in the suburbs of the city of York, and in the diocese of York, which are comprised within and are co-extensive with the limits of the township of Heworth; and also all those several contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Saviour and of the said united parishes of Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls and All Saints in Peasholme (which are situate within the limits of the city and county of the city of York), and which are bounded on the north by the township of Heworth aforesaid, and upon all other sides, that is to say, on the west, on the south, and on the east, by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the northern side of Scarborough-road, near to the house called or known as Heworth Grange, where the southern boundary of the said township of Heworth is joined by the boundary which divides the united parishes of Trinity in Goodramgate with Saint John Delpike, and Saint Maurice without Monkbar, in the said city and county of the city of York, and in the diocese of York aforesaid, from a detached portion of the township of Saint Saviour, in the parish of Saint Saviour aforesaid (numbered 1, in red, upon the map hereunto annexed); and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of thirty-seven yards, or thereabouts, along the last-described boundary, to its junction with the boundary which divides the said united parishes of Trinity in Goodramgate with Saint John Delpike and Saint Maurice without Monkbar from that detached portion of the township of Saint Helen on the Walls, in the united parishes of Saint Cuthbert with Saint Helen on the Walls, and All Saints, in Peasholme aforesaid (numbered 3 in red upon the said map), wherein the houses called or known as Mustard Mill Houses are situate; and extending thence, first south-westward, then south-eastward, and then again south-westward, for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts, along the last mentioned boundary (thereby passing to the west of the houses called or known as Mustard Mill

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that bans of matrimony should be

"The District Chapelry of Saint Tyfaelog, Pontlloftyn, being:—

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Broughton, and also all that contiguous territory which now forms a detached

portion of the original parish of Manchester, all which portions are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be severed and disannexed from such new parish and parish respectively, and shall be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of The Ascension, situate at Lower Broughton as aforesaid, and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes, and shall be named 'The District of Lower Broughton.'

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the dean and chapter of Lincoln, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under 'The Ecclesiastical Commission Act, 1868,' and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council made under the provisions of the said Act, bearing date the fifth day of February last past, and duly published in the London Gazette on the eighth day of the same month, all the property which then belonged to the said dean and chapter of Lincoln (excepting certain portions thereof in such Order particularly excepted, and excepting also any rights of ecclesiastical patronage), was transferred to and became absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the property aforesaid consists to a considerable extent of reversions expectant upon grants and leases for lives and years, and produces, during the subsistence of such grants and leases, only small annual revenues, and on that account, and in some instances on account of its character or situation is unsuitable or inconvenient to be assigned as an endowment for the said dean and chapter, or to be held or applied for the other purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, power is given to lessees holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions, or the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas, with a view to the appropriation of such portions of the aforesaid property lately belonging to the said dean and chapter of Lincoln (either with or without other property vested in us, as the case may require), as in the

judgment of our Estates Committee, and subject to the approbation of the said dean and chapter, shall be deemed convenient to be held as an endowment for the said dean and chapter, and as will secure a net annual income of nine thousand and two hundred pounds (being the income contemplated by the above-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council of the fifth day of February last), and for that purpose, as well as with a view to the more advantageous appropriation of the remainder of the said property, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said property, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly, that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments, in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time, to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the respective holders (if any) to be testified by their being made parties to such instruments, all or any part of the said property heretofore belonging to the said dean and chapter of Lincoln, and so transferred to and vested in us as aforesaid, with its appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sales from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be assigned as the endowment for the said dean and chapter, to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some government or parliamentary stock or other public securities in England."

is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appear to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Local Board of Health of any district established under the Public Health Act, that the district of such Local Board of Health is co-extensive with a district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground, and that no Burial Board has been appointed for such district, and that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds within the said district, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, in case Her Majesty see fit so to do, to order that such Local Board shall be a Burial Board for the district of such Local Board, and thereupon such Local Board shall be a Burial Board for such district accordingly, and the powers and provisions of the Acts therein before-mentioned (except the provisions relating to the constitution or appointment and resignation of members of Burial Boards), and the provisions therein contained shall extend to the district of such Board, and to such Board, and to any burial-ground and places for the reception of the bodies of the dead previously to interment which may be provided by such Board in like manner as to any parish or parishes, and the Burial Board thereof, and any burial-ground, and any such places as aforesaid provided by such last-mentioned Board, save that no approval, sanction, or authorization of any vestry shall be requisite: Provided always, that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in the district of such Local Board, one month, at least, before such petition is so considered:

And whereas the Local Board of Health for the district of Tipton, in the county of Stafford, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, stating, that the said district of Tipton is co-extensive with the district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground, and that no Burial Board has been appointed for such district, and that an Order in Council has been made for the discontinuance of burials, with certain exceptions, in the churchyard of Tipton, and praying that the said Local Board of Health may be the Burial Board for the said district of Tipton:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order the same to be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, has been duly published as required by the said Act.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Local Board of Health for the district of Tipton, in the county of Stafford, shall be a Burial Board for the district of such Local Board, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign.

"An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial ground or places of burial should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them, with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eighth day of April, last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows: viz. —

BRADFORD, YORKSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the Wesleyan Chapel, Bradford Moor, in the

county of York, and in the burial-ground of the said chapel within twenty feet of the chapel; and in the rest of the burial-ground, except in graves which are free from water, —no coffin to be placed within a foot of any other coffin, or less than four feet beneath the soil, except it be buried in a vault and be entombed in an airtight manner:

ST. MARY'S, WARWICK.—Forthwith wholly in the churchyard of St. Paul's, Warwick, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented; and except in now existing family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.
