THE following Address was presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously,

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council of Your Majesties Loyal City of *Durham*, July 24. 1688.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WHAT Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Obedient Subjects of the *County of Durham*, having in the first place most humbly offered up our publick Praises and Thanksgivings to Almighty God, for the Happy Birth of His Majesty's most Excellent and most Gracious Prince, who the greatest of Blessings that could possibly descend upon these Your Kingdoms; Do now hold ourselves Obliged also to present our most humble Congratulations, to Your Sacred Majesty, with the Royal Consort the Queen, upon this Joyfull Occasion; that shall always Pray, that Your Majesties may be Blessed with more Children, and more Sons, that there never may be wanting One of Your Royal Stock and Race, to wear the Imperial Crowns, and to Sway the Scepters of these Your Dominions.

Vienna, July 1. You had in our last, an account of the taking of *Lippa*, of which we can now tell you the following particulars. The 18th of the last month, General *Caraffa* arrived before *Lippa* with 10000 Men. And immediately Summoned the Place, but received for answer, That the Garrison was resolv'd to defend it; Whereupon he caus'd two Batteries to be rais'd, one of five pieces of Cannon and two Mortars, and the other of three pieces, and one Mortar, which were finish'd about six in the Evening, and were employ'd with that success, that by Ten o'Clock the next Morning they had made a large Breach in the Wall, and had set the Town on Fire in several places. The 19th, about three in the afternoon, General *Caraffa* order'd an Assault to be made by 2000 Men, and the Command of Count *Guido de Staremberg*, who were at first repuls'd, but at the second onset, they enter'd the place, with the loss of about 60 Men on their side, and 500 of the Enemy, who were killed in the first heat, the rest of the

Garrison saving themselves by their retreat into the Castle, against which the General caus'd two Batteries to be rais'd, one of 5, and the other of 4 pieces of Cannon and 3 Mortars, they began to Fire that very Evening, and had that terrible effect, that the Infidels being under a great confusion, hung out a white Flag the next Morning, but coming to a Parley, they were told, That they must surrender upon no other Condition, than to be made Prisoners of War, which they refusing to consent to, the Batteries began to play again, and the Trenches were carry'd on to the Foot of the Rampart. The 21 in the Morning, the Enemy once more desired a Parley, which being granted, the Capitulation was quickly after concluded, and the place Surrendred upon condition that the Garrison should be made Prisoners of War, and that the Women and Children should be conducted to *Temeswaer*. The same day another Castle on the other side of the River *Marosch*, in which were 40 Men, likewise Surrendred at Discretion. There were in *Lippa* 2000 Soldiers, with a good Train of Artillery, and all sorts of Provisions, and the Inhabitants with the Countrey People that were fled thither, were to the number of about 6000. This Conquest is of very great importance, opening a free Communication between *Transilvania* and *Upper Hungary*, and cutting off all relief from *Great Waradin*, so that that place must fall of Course. But there was something of good Fortune, as well as Conduct in this Affair; for General *Caraffa* had design'd to have march'd directly to *Esbeck*, but the great Floods of the *Thierse* would not suffer him to pass, which made him resolve to attack this place, tho' without Orders from hence; and being thus, when it was known here that he had some thoughts of undertaking that Siege, an Express was sent, with directions not to attempt it, but he came to late. The 23d past, General *Caraffa*, having put a good Garrison into *Lippa*, continued his march to join the Imperial Army at *Esbeck*. There is a Report, That *Deckeley* was with 3000 Men in the Neighborhood of *Lippa*, when it was taken, but that he dur'd not attempt their Relief; he retired in great disorder towards *Temeswaer*. They write from *Esbeck*, That General *Caraffa* was on his march to attack *Illoek*; and that at the same time the Militia of *Croatia*, with whom had join'd 2000 Germans, and 6000 Hungarians would besiege *Grudiska*. The Duke of *Lorraine* continuing in a condition that gives little hopes of his being able to go into the Field this Summer, the Elector of *Bavaria* has a Second time offer'd his Service to Command the Imperial Army in Chief; And the Chanceller *Stratmann* is sent to *Munich*, to confer thereupon with his Electoral Highness.

Brussels, July 16. The 13th Instant Sir *Richard Bulstrode*, Envoy from His Majesty of Great Britain, celebrated here the Birth of the PRINCE. In the Morning, after a solemn Mass, *Te Deum* was sung in the Church of the *Carmelites*, at which our Governour-General, with all the Nobility, General Officers, and Foreign Ministers, assisted. About Five in the Afternoon his Excellency went to the House of the Duke of *Havre* (which Sir *Richard* had chosen as most commodious for so great a Solemnity) where were likewise all the Persons of the chiefest Quality in Town of both Sexes. The Entertainment began with a very fine Concert of Musick. Three Fountains ran with Wine from Six a Clock in the Evening till Midnight, which drew thither a great concourse of People. When it was dark, the Bonfires were lighted, and the Fireworks began to play, which succeeded very well. About Eleven there was serv'd up a very splendid Collation on a long Table, at which sat his Excellency, with the Ladies, in all about 60; The Nobility, and other Persons of Quality, placing themselves behind the Ladies to serve them, and they that had a mind to eat, going to little Tables that were prepar'd in each corner of the Rooms. At the Drinking the Healths of the KING, QUEEN, and PRINCE, the Cannon were thrice discharged round the Town, with the Noise of Trumpets and Kettle-Drums; And in a word, the whole was perform'd with great Splendor and Order, and to the great Satisfaction of his Excellency and all the Company.

Hague, July 16. The Preliminary Treaty between the Crown of Denmark and this State, is Signed. The Dutch Squadron is still at *Schomweldt*.

Paris, July 17. The King is gone again to *Marli* for a few days. The Troops of the Household will begin to encamp the 20th Instant in the Plain of *Acheres*, where they will continue till towards the middle of the next Month. We have Advice by an Express from *Munick*; That the Treaty of Marriage between the Prince of *Tuscany* and the Princess of *Bavaria*, is Signed. The Letters from *Berlin* give an account of the death of *Madam de Schomberg*.

Dublin-Castle, July 2. Yesterday being appointed for giving Publick and Solemn Thanks to Almighty God, (within this City and the Liberties thereof) for the inestimable Blessing it has pleased Him to bestow upon Their Majesties and these Kingdoms, by the happy Birth of His Royal Highness the Prince; His Excellency went to the Royal Hospital about 9 of the Clock in the Morning, having ordered the Nobility, Judges and Gentry to meet him there at that time: And being attended there by a great Number of them with their Coaches and Six Horses, He proceeded through the Town to the Castle, preceded by all the Troops in Town, the Kettle-Drums, Trumpets and Officers attending the State, as also the Steward and Officers of his Excellencies Family, the Regiment of Guards all newly clad being drawn up on both sides the Way. His Excellency being come to the Castle, heard High Mass in the Chapel-Royal, sung by the most Reverend Father in God the Lord Archbishop of *Dublin* in his Pontifical Habits, and performed with extraordinary Music of all sorts. The Service being ended, his Excellency returned back to *Chappel-Island*, where he entertained the Nobility, the Privy-Counsellors, Judges, and Officers of State with a Magnificent Dinner, and Stately Banquet. All along as his Excellency passed through the City, the Conduits ran with Wine, and the Steward of his Excellencies Household scattered Money largely amongst the People, who assembled in great Crowds on this Occasion. In the Evening his Excellency returned to Town again, and did the Lord Mayor the Honour to sup with him, who entertained his Excellency, and most of the Nobility and Persons of Quality about the Town, with divers sorts of Fireworks on the River, and a Ball which lasted till the Morning, the great Guns and the Regiment of Guards firing at Drinking of Their Majesties and the Prince's Healths; and the whole City in the mean time striving to express their part of the Publick Joy by Bonfires, ringing of Bells, and all other outwards Marks of inward Joy and Satisfaction.

Berwick, July 4. Sunday last, being the Day of Thanksgiving for the Birth of the Prince; Mr. Mayor, attended by his Brethren in all their Formalities, went to Church, and after Divine Service was done, returned to the Town-Hall, where he was met by Sir *Tho. Haggerston* our Lieutenant-Governor, all the Officers of the Garrison, and divers Gentlemen out of the Country; and there they Drank the Healths of Their Majesties, of the Prince, and the Royal Family. Then Sir *Tho. Haggerston* invited Mr. Mayor and his Brethren, with the Officers of the Garrison and Country Gentlemen to the Palace, where he gave them a very Noble Entertainment, the great Guns firing round the Town without intermission. In the mean time Major *Lacey* had drawn the Regiment upon the Walls, where they fired many Volleys, with Huzzas, which continued till Night, he bestowing upon the Soldiers Ale, Strong Beer, and Wine. Major *Thornhill*, the Town-Major invited all the Invalide Soldiers and Penitents to his Bonfire; and entertained them in the manner. At Night the Streets were filled with Bonfires, and nothing was omitted by the Inhabitants which might express their great Joy on this solemn Occasion. The next Day my Lady *Haggerston* entertained Mr. Mayor, the Justices, Common Council, and all their Wives, with all the Persons of Note in Town, at a very splendid Dinner, and afterwards with a Ball.

Kington upon Hull, July 2. Yesterday all things were performed in this Garrison that were proper to express the Extraordinary Joy, that all good Men have for the Happy Birth of the PRINCE; as Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, discharges of the Great and Small Shot, the Shouts and Acclamations of the People, with the hearty Wishes of all imaginable Happiness and Prosperity to the Royal Family.

Healdon, July 1. This day the Birth of His Royal Highness the PRINCE, was solemnized here with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and Fireworks, and all other Expressions of publick Joy, suitable to so great an Occasion.

Chester, July 2. Yesterday being the Thanksgiving for the Birth of the PRINCE; The Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Sheriffs Peers of this City in their Formalities, and the several Companies of the Citizens in their Gowns with their Bangers in a decent order, went in the Forenoon to *St. Werburghs Church*, and there joyed in the Prayers and Praises appointed for that Occasion. In the Afternoon they went to Church in the same manner, and thence to the Quire; from whence they all returned to the Pentice, where came to them the Governor and all the Officers of the Garrison with him. And at the High Cross they Drank all the KING's, the QUEEN's,

and the PRINCE's Healths, the Citizens ranged in their several Companies along the Streets doing the like, with Huzzas at each Health, the Conduits running Wine. In the close of the Evening the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs and Sheriffs Peers accompanied the Governor to the Castle, and whilst on the High Tower there, they, and all the Officers of the Garrison, Drank the aforesaid Healths, all the Cannon of the Garrison was thrice discharged, each of which Rounds of the Cannon was followed with Volleys of Small Shot and Huzzas from the Soldiery of the Garrison, and divers sort of Fireworks in the Lower Wards of the Castle, where the Governor having also caused a very great Bonfire to be made, and several Barrels of Ale to be set, the Soldiery also drank the aforesaid Healths with Huzzas; which being ended, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, &c. return'd into the City, where Bonfires and Ringing of Bells concluded the Solemnity.

Whitehal, July 10. The 8th Instant, the Count de *Grawmont*, Envoy Extraordinary from France, and the Chevalier de *Lefcouet*, who is sent from the Duke of Orleans, had Audience of the Queen Dowager; and this day of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cotrel* Master of the Ceremonies.

The Sieur *Gessorf* Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had likewise this day his first Audience of the Queen, conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.
