LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

ORDER FOR DIVISION OF MILNROW DISTRICT INTO WARDS.

WHEREAS the Local Government Act, 1858, has been duly adopted by the district of Milnrow, in the county of Lancaster, the boundaries of which district were settled by Order of the Secretary of State for the Home Department, bearing date the 30th day of July, 1869, and a memorial has been presented to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from owners and ratepayers assembled at a public meeting duly convened, in pursuance of the 24th section of the said Local Government Act, praying for a division of the said district into wards, and that I may declare the proportion of the eighteen members constituting that Board to be elected by and for each of such wards:

Now therefore I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, do hereby order and direct:

1. That the District of Milnrow, in the county of Lancaster, shall, from and after the date of this Order be divided for the purpose of election of the Local Board for such district into three wards, and that the boundaries of the said several wards be as are hereinafter described and shewn upon the plan accompanying this Order, and numbered respectively 1, 2, and 3, viz.:—

No. 1, or Belfield Ward.

The boundary of Belfield Ward commences at Knot Booth, at a point there marked A; thence, in a northerly direction, along the boundary between the townships of Castleton and Butterworth to a point B at the Rochdale Canal, on the boundary line between the parliamentary borough of Rochdale and the township of Butterworth; thence northerly, and following such last-named boundary line, to the point C, at the River Beal; thence, south-easterly, along the boundary line dividing the hamlet of Clegg from the hamlet of Belfield, to the point D, where the boundaries of the hamlets of Clegg, Belfield, Wildhouse, and Lowhouse respectively meet; thence, south-easterly and northerly, following the boundary line which separates the hamlet of Wildhouse from the hamlet of Lowhouse, to the point E; thence along the south-westerly boundary fence of Lower Crow Nest Wood, and along the southerly side of the lane leading to Crow Nest Farm to the point F; thence around and including the farmhouse and messuage at Crow Nest, and along the easterly side of the lane leading from such farmhouse to the trough near Flash House to the point G; thence, north-easterly, along and including the lane leading to Higher Crow Nest Farm to the point H, where the boundary line separating the hamlet of Low House from Bleaked Gate-cum-Roughbank respectively meet at Higher Crow Nest; thence, southerly, along the line separating Bleaked Gate-cum-Rough-

bank from the hamlet of Lowhouse to the point I, at the junction of the hamlets of Bleaked Gate-cum-Roughbank, Lowhouse, and Butterworth Hall respectively, at or near the rise of Butterworth Hall Brook; thence, westerly, along the ancient boundary line separating the hamlet of Lowhouse from the hamlet of Butterworth Hall to the point marked J, at or near Cross Gates; thence along the road leading from Cross Gates to Milnrow to a point marked K, at or near to and including the Stump Inn, Milnrow; thence, in a westerly direction, along and including the highway from Milnrow to Rochdale, but excluding the Fleece Inn, with its appurtenances, to a point marked L; thence in a south-easterly and easterly direction along the southerly side of the road leading to and through Lady House to Lady House Bridge, to a point marked M; thence in a southerly direction along, but excluding the River Beal, to the Oldham Parliamentary Borough Boundary, to a point marked N, where the River Beal first forms the Oldham Parliamentary Borough Boundary; thence westerly along such last-named Parliamentary Borough boundary line to the starting point at A, so completing the boundary of the Ward of Belfield.

No. 2, or Milnrow Ward.

SCHOOL OF NAVAL ARCHITECTURE, &c.

THE Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby give notice, that the arrangements for the admission of persons, not already in the Government service, to the Royal School of Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering, as Admiralty Pupils, will, for the present year, be as follows:—

Candidates must not be less than 18 or more than 21 years of age, and must have served at least two years in private shipbuilding or engineering establishments, or must give satisfactory proof that they have in some way been so connected with shipbuilding or engineering operations as to become well-grounded in the elementary principles and practice thereof.

The pupils will be selected by competitive examination, the subjects for which, and numbers of marks assigned for each, are as follows:—

No candidate will be admitted who does not obtain at least two-thirds of the full number of marks in the two first-named subjects, and three-fifths of the full number, either for practical shipbuilding or marine engineering.

The last four subjects, although counting in the competition, will not be considered obligatory.

The candidates who may be selected will be treated, while attached to the school, in all respects as the Admiralty pupils; they will receive wages the same as dockyard apprentices, commencing at 1s. 6d. per day for six days per week for first year, and increasing yearly 3d. per day till it reaches 2s. per day; and in addition a subsistence allowance of 3s. per day for seven days per week while away from their homes, either at the school or in the dockyards.

Seven months of each year—viz., from October till May—will be devoted to study at the school, and the remaining five months to actual work and the acquirement of practical knowledge in the dockyards.

It is to be understood that the Admiralty make no engagements to employ these pupils after the completion of their course of study; and they must rely on their own worth, as educated naval architects, for obtaining employment in their subsequent career.

The number of such pupils to be selected this year is one shipwright and one engineer.

Persons desirous of competing must forward their names, with a certificate of birth, and on the grounds on which they consider themselves practically qualified, enclosing proper certificates to that effect to the Secretary of the Admiralty, not later than the 11th July.

The candidates should also state whether they wish to be examined as engineers or shipwrights.
