**W**HEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, Her Majesty,

in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Her by the twelfth section of an Act passed in the thirty-second year of Her reign, chapter forty-four, intituled "An Act to make better provision respecting Greenwich Hospital, and the application of the revenues thereof," was pleased, on the joint recommendation of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, to sanction the following regulations (therein contained) for the award of pensions, not exceeding in the whole in any one year the sum of £4000, to be paid to some of such masters and seamen of the Mercantile Marine as contributed out of their wages the sum of 6d. per month towards the support of Greenwich Hospital, that is to say:—

I. Only such masters and seamen of the mercantile marine as can prove to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade at least five years service previous to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and who contributed 6d. a month to the funds of Greenwich Hospital during that period, to be considered as eligible for the said pensions.

II. Only such masters and seamen of the mercantile marine as have been disabled or incapacitated from age, and who are not less than 55 years of age, to be considered as eligible for the said pensions.

III. The amount of the said pensions to be limited to the sum of £3 8s. a-year each.

IV. If the master or seamen is already in receipt of a pension amounting to that sum from the Merchant Seamen's Fund, no additional pension will be awarded from the funds of Greenwich Hospital; but if the master or seamen is in receipt of a pension of less amount from the Merchant Seamen's Fund, he will be allowed, from the funds of Greenwich Hospital, such additional pension as will, with his other pension, make up a sum not exceeding £3 8s. 0d. a-year.

V. The said pensions will, in the first instance, be granted to those masters and seamen who can prove the greatest length of service prior to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and who, in other respects, come under the foregoing conditions; provided the sum of £4000 in any one year be not exceeded.

VI. Vacancies on the pension list will be filled up half yearly."

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order should be so modified as to enable the Board of

Trade to take into consideration other circumstances besides length of service :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken into consideration the said recommendation is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the said pensions of £3 8s. 0d. a year each, to be granted to such masters and seamen as aforesaid, shall not of necessity be granted, in the first instance, to masters and seamen who can prove the greatest length of service prior to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, if it appears to the Board of Trade that there are others, fulfilling the required conditions, whose length of service is less, but whose necessities are greater :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," and "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Acts respectively shall apply to all or any Courts or Court of Record in England and Wales, and that within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette, such provisions shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and by the Acts secondly and thirdly mentioned, it is further provided that in and by such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said three Acts respectively, shall and may be exercised with respect to such Court or Courts, and may make any order or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied ; and whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the provisions hereinafter mentioned of the said Acts should be extended and applied to the Courts of Record of the city and borough of Chester, called "The Court of Pentice" and "The Court of Portmote" :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order and direct, and it is hereby ordered and directed, that within one month after this Order shall have been published in the London Gazette, the provisions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," contained in the sections of the said Act, numbered respectively 2 to 8 (both inclusive), 11, 13, 15, 16, 17, 20, 25 to 40 (both inclusive), 41, except so much thereof as relates to causes of action in different counties, 42 to 81 (both inclusive), 83 to 96 (both inclusive), 117, 118, 119, 123, 126, 128, 129, 130, 131, so far as and inclusive of the words "or to the like effect," in that section, 133 to 138 (both inclusive), 139, except the words "two terms," which shall be read as if they were "three months," 140, 141,

142, 143, except so much thereof as relates to a motion in arrest of judgment, pursuant to 1 William IV, cap. 7, 144, 145, 168 to 177 (both inclusive), 178, except so much thereof as relates to the Sheriff being directed to summon a jury, 179, 180, 181, 183, 187 to 201 (both inclusive), 203 to 207 (both inclusive), 209 to 214 (both inclusive), and 218 to 222 (both inclusive) ; and also that the provisions of "the Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," contained in the sections of the said Act, numbered respectively 1, 18 to 31 (both inclusive), 83 to 86 (both inclusive), and 96 ; and also that the provisions of "the Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," contained in the sections of the said Act numbered respectively 19, 20, and 21, shall apply and be extended to the said Courts of Record called the "Court of Pentice" and the "Court of Portmote." And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to order and direct that all the powers and duties incident to the above mentioned provisions, hereby applied and extended to the said Courts of Pentice and Portmote, and exercisable under any of the said provisions by the Court or a Judge, shall and may, with respect to matters in the said Courts of Pentice and Portmote, be exercised by the Recorder for the time being of the said city and borough of Chester, or by his duly appointed Deputy ; and that the powers and duties incident to the above mentioned provisions, and exercisable under any of the said provisions by a Master, shall and may, with respect to matters in the said Courts of Pentice and Portmote, be exercised by the Registrar for the time being of the said Courts, or by his duly appointed Deputy.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial ground or places of burial should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications men-

tioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them, with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eighteenth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz. —

**LYE.**—Forthwith in the church of Lye, Old Swinford; and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins to the depth of five feet, for the burial of persons above twelve years of age, and of four feet, for the burial of children below that age.

**CHESTER-LE-STREET.**—Forthwith; wholly, in the church of Chester-le-Street, Durham; and in the old churchyard, except in now completed vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by brickwork, or stonework properly cemented; and except in earthen graves for the burial only of those whose husbands or wives have been buried in the churchyard.

**HEMINGBOROUGH.**—Forthwith, wholly, in the church of Hemingborough, Yorkshire.

**WHEREAS** by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows; viz. :—

In the churchyard of Radcliffe-on-Trent, to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

In the churchyard of Bourton, Dorsetshire, to the thirty-first of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

And whereas by an Order in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, it was amongst other things ordered that burials should be discontinued in the churchyard of Prittlewell, Essex, with certain exceptions, after the thirty-first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, which time has by Orders in Council bearing date respectively the eleventh of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, the fifth of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the eighth April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, been postponed:

And whereas it seems fit that the said Orders be varied:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that a further exception be made to the operation of the said Orders, so as to permit the interment in the said churchyard of non-parishioners, being inhabitants of Southend, until the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

**PORTLAND.**—Forthwith wholly in the Wesleyan Chapel at Portland, in the county of Dorset; and in the burial-ground of the said chapel, except in graves not less than four feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

**MARTOCK.**—Forthwith wholly in the church of Martock, Somersetshire, and all coffins buried in the vaults and walled graves in the churchyard, to be separately entombed.

**WIDCOMBE.**—Forthwith in the churchyard and old burial-ground of Widcombe, Bath, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

**BATHWICK.**—Forthwith in the churchyard and old burial-ground of Bathwick, Bath, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventeenth day of August next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation, one month before the said seventeenth day of August.

#### PORTLAND HARBOUR.

##### REMOVAL OF SHINGLE PROHIBITED.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the 54 Geo. III., cap. 159, that "in order to prevent damage "being done to the shores or banks of the ports, "harbours, or havens in this kingdom, no person "or persons shall take any ballast or shingle from "the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores "or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this "kingdom, from which the Commissioners for "executing the office of Lord High Admiral of "the United Kingdom for the time being shall "find it necessary, for the protection of such port, "harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by "Order under their hands, or the hands of any "three of them, or the hands of his or their "Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, "shall prohibit the taking or removing of such "shingle or ballast, upon pain of forfeiting for "every such offence the sum of ten pounds:"

And whereas it is further enacted by "The Harbours Transfer Act, 1862" (25 and 26 Victoria, cap. 69), "that from and after the "31st day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, sections fourteen and sixteen "of the Act of the fifty-fourth year of King "George the Third (chapter one hundred and fifty-nine), 'for the better regulation of the several "ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, "bays, and navigable rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's docks, dockyards, "arsenals, wharfs, moorings, and stores thereon, "and for repealing several Acts passed for that "purpose,' and all provisions in the said Act "contained relative thereto, shall be read and "construed as if the Board of Trade were named "in the said sections instead of the Admiralty:"

And whereas the Board of Trade have found it necessary, for the protection of Portland Harbour, in the county of Dorset, to prohibit the taking or removing of any shingle or ballast from the shore or bank hereinafter specified:

Now the Board of Trade do hereby, by this Order, under the hand of their Secretary, prohibit all persons from taking or removing any description of shingle or ballast from the shore or banks, or from any portion of the shore or banks of Portland Harbour, between Sandown Castle and the Ferry Bridge.

#### SCHOOL OF NAVAL ARCHITECTURE, &c

*Admiralty, June 20, 1870.*

THE Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby give notice, that the arrangements for the admission of persons, not already in the Government service, to the Royal School of Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering, as Admiralty Pupils, will, for the present year, be as follows:—

Candidates must not be less than 18 or more than 21 years of age, and must have served at least two years in private shipbuilding or engineering establishments, or must give satisfactory proof that they have in some way been so connected with shipbuilding or engineering operations as to become well-grounded in the elementary principles and practice thereof.

The pupils will be selected by competitive



examination, the subjects for which, and numbers of marks assigned for each, are as follows:—

Pure mathematics, including arithmetic, mensuration, geometry (plane and descriptive), plane trigonometry, and the elements of the differential and integral calculus ... ..	2,500

No candidate will be admitted who does not obtain at least two-thirds of the full number of marks in the two first-named subjects, and three-fifths of the full number, either for practical shipbuilding or marine engineering.

The last four subjects, although counting in the competition, will not be considered obligatory.

The candidates who may be selected will be treated, while attached to the school, in all respects as the Admiralty pupils; they will receive wages the same as dockyard apprentices, commencing at 1s. 6d. per day for six days per week for first year, and increasing yearly 3d. per day till it reaches 2s. per day; and in addition a subsistence allowance of 3s. per day for seven days per week while away from their homes, either at the school or in the dockyards.

Seven months of each year—viz., from October till May—will be devoted to study at the school, and the remaining five months to actual work and the acquirement of practical knowledge in the dockyards.

It is to be understood that the Admiralty make no engagements to employ these pupils after the completion of their course of study; and they must rely on their own worth, as educated naval architects, for obtaining employment in their subsequent career.

The number of such pupils to be selected this year is one shipwright and one engineer.

Persons desirous of competing must forward their names, with a certificate of birth, and on the grounds on which they consider themselves practically qualified, enclosing proper certificates to that effect to the Secretary of the Admiralty, not later than the 11th July.

The candidates should also state whether they wish to be examined as engineers or shipwrights.

The examination will take place on the 18th July and three following days.

(No. 70.)—UNITED STATES—MARYLAND.

*Light Vessel at entrance of Choptank River.*
