**IN THE MATTER OF THE FACTORY ACTS  
 EXTENSION ACT, 1867.**

WHEREAS due proof has been made to the satisfaction of me, the undersigned, Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the customs of the Trades carried on in the Factories specified in the Schedule hereto, require that the male young persons, of at least sixteen years of age, working in such Factories should be employed between the hours hereinafter mentioned: Now I, the said Henry Austin Bruce, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the 11th Article of the Schedule annexed to the Factory Acts Extension Act, 1867, do, by this my Order, give permission to the occupiers of the said Factories to employ the male young persons, of at least sixteen years of age,

working in such Factories between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and nine o'clock in the evening, or between seven o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening, or between the hours of eight o'clock in the morning and eleven o'clock in the evening, subject to the conditions in the said Act contained.

##### *Alteration in Tarifa Light.*

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 69, dated 9th September, 1869, respecting an intended alteration in Tarifa Light.

Information has been received that the alteration described in that Notice has been made, and the colour of the light has been changed from white to red.

#### MEDITERRANEAN—ADRIATIC.

##### *Light Vessel in Trieste Road.*

The Austrian Government has given notice, that a light vessel has been placed off the extremity of the mole in course of construction at Trieste.

The vessel exhibits two *fixed red* lights, one above the other, elevated respectively 15 and 21 feet above the sea.

By day a skeleton ball is hoisted at the mast-head.

Vessels should pass to the southward of the light vessel.

#### GREECE—TALANTA CHANNEL.

##### *Revolving Light on Strongilo Island.*

The Greek Government has given notice, that from the 20th day of June, 1870, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently constructed on Strongilo Island, the southernmost of the Lithada Islands.

The light is a *revolving white* light, attaining its greatest brilliancy *every three minutes*, elevated 134 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 16 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order.

The tower is 30 feet high, built of stone, white, and surmounts the keeper's dwelling.
