THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received,

from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of an Imperial Decree, dated the 24th instant, prohibiting the export of certain articles from France during the war.

The following is a translation of the Articles of this Decree :—

ART. 1. The export, the re-exportation from bond, and the transit of articles designated in the Table annexed to the present Decree are prohibited.

Nevertheless, exceptions to this rule may be accorded by our Minister of Finance when the articles are bound for certain destinations.

With respect to exportations, re-exportations, and transit which shall be thus exceptionally authorized, the destination when they shall take place by sea, shall be guaranteed by *acquits-à-caution*, which must be discharged by the Consular Agents of France.

ART. 2. Our Ministers of Agriculture and of Commerce, and of Finance, are charged with the execution of the present Decree, which will have effect from the day when it shall be made public by the Prefects in the manner prescribed by the Ordinance of the 18th January, 1817.

TABLE of Articles of which the exportation, the re-exportation, and the transit are prohibited, subject to the exceptions which shall be authorised by the Minister of Finance :—

1. Arms of war of every kind.
2. Lead, sulphur, powder, saltpetre, nitrate of soda, fire stones, percussion caps, gun stocks, projectiles, and other munitions of war of every kind, articles of military clothing, camping equipment, and harness.
3. Horses.
4. Sailing and steam vessels, machines and parts of machines belonging to navigation, rigging and artillery of ships, and all other articles, raw or manufactured, of naval and military material.

*Buoys in Mayaguez Bay.*

THE Spanish Government has given notice, that the following buoys have been placed on the Les Manches and Allart banks, Mayaguez Bay, west end of Puerto Rico Island, to mark the channel:

## HONDURAS—TRUXILLO.

*Fixed Light on Cape Honduras.*

The Honduras Government has given notice, that a light is now exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Cape Honduras, or Point Castilla, Truxillo Bay.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 39 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.

The tower is 70 yards from the shore, position, lat.  $16^{\circ} 1'$ , long.  $86^{\circ} 3\frac{1}{4}'$  West from Greenwich.

(No. 74.)—RED SEA.

*Shoal off Mocha.*

INFORMATION has been received of the existence of a shoal patch, hitherto unknown, lying a league to the westward of the shoal ground off the town of Mocha, and near the fairway track of shipping bound up or down the Red Sea.

The shoal, which was sounded over by the Master of the steam-ship *Priam*, on her recent voyage from Suez to Singapore, is a bank of white sand, about half a cable long and 30 feet broad; it has  $18\frac{1}{2}$  feet on its central part, with 11 fathoms at either end.

From the shoal, the north end of Mocha bore E.N.E., and Zee hill S.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S.

These bearings place it about 7 miles from the land.
