"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Burstow, of the parish of Nutfield, of the parish of Horley, of the parish of Blechingley, and of the parish of Horne, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parishes of Burstow, Nutfield, Horley, Blechingley, and Horne, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Outwood as aforesaid.

"And whereas the Reverend Thomas Marsden, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Burstow, is entitled, as such rector, to nominate and appoint a minister to serve the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Outwood as aforesaid.

Winchester, and with the consent of the Right Honourable William Page, Baron Hatherley, Lord High Chancellor of England, the patron on behalf of the Crown of the rectory of the said parish of Burstow (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation); with the consent of the Principal, Fellows, and Scholars of Jesus College, in the University of Oxford, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Nutfield (in testimony whereof they the said Principal, Fellows, and Scholars, have affixed their common or collegiate seal to this representation); with the consent of the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of London, governors of the possessions, revenues, and goods of the Hospitals of Edward, late King of England, the Sixth, of Christ, Bridewell, and Saint Thomas the Apostle, as Governors of Christ's Hospital, the said Governors being the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Horley (in testimony of which consent they, the said Governors, have affixed their common or corporate seal to this representation); with the consent of Robert Few, of Henrietta-street, Covent Garden, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Blechingley, and with the consent of Mary Frances Western, of Montague-square, in the said county of Middlesex, Spinster, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Horne, and with the consent of the said Thomas Marsden, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Burstow (in testimony whereof they, the said last named consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient, that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes of Burstow, Nutfield, Horley, Blechingley, and Horne, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Outwood as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Outwood;' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the same consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

Sutton Grange, Saint Helen's, Glass Manufacturer, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Helen's; and with the consent of the said Gilbert Greenall, of the said Edward Greenall, of James Creswell Pigot, of Southport, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire; of the Reverend Thomas Greenall, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Grappenhall, in the said diocese of Chester; and of the Reverend John Tayleur Pigot, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Fremington, in the diocese of Exeter, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Eccleston (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Helen's, and of the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Eccleston, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Ravenhead, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Ravenhead,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the same consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the Reverend Edward Carr, Doctor of Laws, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Helen's, and by his successors, vicars or incumbents of the same vicarage for ever.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Ravenhead, being:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Saint Helen's, and of the particular district of Saint Thomas, Eccleston, both in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Helen's from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Parr Mount, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point where Peasley Cross-lane is crossed by the line of the Saint Helen's branch of the London and North-Western Railway; and extending thence, north-westward, for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said branch line of railway to a point in the centre of the bridge which carries the same branch line of railway over the Saint Helen's Canal; and extending thence, first south-westward and then north-westward, for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said canal to a point in the centre of Tavern Bridge; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the said bridge to the boundary on the northern bank of the same canal which divides the said parish of Saint Helen's from the particular district of Saint Thomas, Eccleston aforesaid; and extending thence, north-westward, along the last-described boundary to a point in the centre of Kitt's Bridge which carries Liverpool-road over

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Bartholomew, situate at Ruswarp, in the parish or parochial chapelry of Whitby, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Bartholomew, situate at Ruswarp as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that all that part of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Whitby, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Bartholomew, situate at Ruswarp as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ruswarp.'

"And, with the like consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be

published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ruswarp, being:—

"All that part of the parish or parochial chapelry of Whitby, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, consisting for the most part of the southern portion of the township of Ruswarp, all which said part is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the River Esk, a little to the east of Sleights Bridge, at which said point the boundary, which divides the township and chapelry of Uggelbarnby, in the parish or parochial chapelry of Whitby aforesaid, from the said township of Ruswarp, meets the boundary dividing the last named township from the parish of Aislaby, and extending thence generally northward along the last described boundary to the point on the southern side of the road, which leads from Aislaby by Cross Butts, and past Sneaton Castle to Whitby, at which point the same parish boundary is joined by the boundary dividing the said township of Ruswarp from the township of Newholm-cum-Dunsley, in the parish or parochial chapelry of Whitby aforesaid; and extending thence first north-eastward, and then northward, for a distance of seventy three chains or thereabouts along the last described township boundary, thereby following in part the course of the said road, to a point at or near to a boundary stone inscribed, 'R. chapter one hundred and thirteen; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for augmenting the income of the Archdeaconry of Huntingdon, in the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas the Right Reverend and Venerable Francis Thomas McDougall, lately Bishop of Labuan, near the Island of Borneo, but now Vicar of Godmanchester, in the county of Huntingdon, is the present archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Huntingdon, and was collated as such on the sixteenth day of March last.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the average net income accruing to the Archdeacon of Huntingdon for the three years now last past is thirty-two pounds per annum, or thereabouts, and no more.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Ely, in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that out of the common fund in the said Act mentioned we shall be authorised to pay to the said Francis Thomas McDougall, as such Archdeacon of Huntingdon as aforesaid, and to his successors in the same archdeaconry the annual sum of one hundred and sixty-eight pounds, such annual sum to commence and accrue as from the sixteenth day of March in this present year (being as aforesaid the day on which the said Francis Thomas McDougall was collated to the said Archdeaconry of Huntingdon), and to be payable to the present and to every future Archdeacon on the first day of January in each and every year, every such yearly payment being apportionable between any archdeacon resigning or otherwise avoiding the said Archdeaconry on any day of the year other than the first day of January, or (as the case may be) the representatives of the same archdeaconry, and the archdeacon who shall next thereafter be appointed to the same archdeaconry; and every such yearly payment shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the archdeacon applying for it has complied with the conditions as to residence, which are specified in the said Act.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing relating to the matters aforesaid, in accordance with the said Act, or with any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ely.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes, out of the united parishes of Widley and Wymering, out of the parish of Farlington, and out of the district chapelry of Purbrook, all in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular portions of the said parishes of Widley, Wymering, and Farlington, and of the said district chapelry of Purbrook, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted a separate district, in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas by a deed bearing date on or about the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, made or expressed to be made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856,' or some of them, and being under the hand and seal of John Deverell, of Purbrook Park, in the said county of Southampton, Esquire, and being also under the Common Seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners (which deed is intended to be enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery, at Westminster), the said John Deverell did give, grant, and confirm unto us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and our successors, for the permanent endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, a perpetual clear yearly rent-charge or annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, to be issuing and payable out of and charged upon the capital and other messuages, or tenements, farms, closes, pieces, or parcels of land situate, lying, and being in the said parishes of Farlington and Wymering, which are particularly described in the schedule to the said deed, and are also delineated upon a plan drawn upon and forming part of such deed.

"And whereas the said rent-charge or annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds has been so given, granted, and confirmed as aforesaid, upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient), the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those portions of the said

parishes of Widley, of Wymering, and of Farlington, and of the said district chapelry of Purbrook, which are described in the schedule hereunto annexed, and which are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Christ Church, Portsdown.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, or (as the case may be), of the incumbent of the new parish, which such district will or may hereafter become, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said John Deverell, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein-contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Christ Church, Portsdown, being :—

"All those several contiguous portions of the united parishes of Widley and Wymering, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, of the parish of Farlington, in the same county and diocese, and of the district chapelry of Purbrook, some time part of the last-named parish, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing at a point on the south eastern side of Fort Purbrook, where the road which has been recently made by the War Department of Her Majesty's Government, and which leads from Southwick, along the Portsdown Heights to Havant, is joined by Crookhorn-lane, as the same lane has been recently diverted and extended by the said War Department, and extending thence generally northward, along the middle of the said lane as last described, to its junction near Moorland Cottage with Stakes-road, and continuing thence still northward, for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named road, thereby passing to the east of the Purbrook Industrial Schools, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'P. And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Acts of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Acts of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district or new parish for ecclesiastical purposes out of the parish of Sefton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, and for effecting certain arrangements as to the endowment and the patronage of the said district or new parish, and of the church thereof.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that all that part of the said parish of Sefton, which is hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district or new parish for ecclesiastical purposes in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is within the limits of the district or new parish so hereinafter recommended and proposed to be constituted as aforesaid, a consecrated church in use for the purposes of divine worship, being the church of Saint Thomas, situate at Seaforth, in the said parish of Sefton, which church was in or about the year one thousand eight hundred and fifteen erected at the sole cost and charge of Sir John Gladstone, of Fasque, in the county of Kincardine, Baronet, deceased.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the permanent annual endowment of the minister or incumbent of the same church does not exceed one hundred pounds per annum, and that the annual income of the same minister or incumbent from all sources does not, on a calculation made in conformity with the directions in that behalf, contained in the sixteenth section of the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty pounds per annum.

"And whereas the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone, M.P., of No. 11, Carlton House-terrace, in the city of Westminster, son of the before-mentioned founder of the said church of Saint Thomas, has transferred into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, a sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds Three Pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, and has also transferred into our name in the books of the Metropolitan District Railway Company a sum of two thousand and sixty-one pounds Six Pounds per centum Debenture Stock of such last-mentioned Company, to be held in trust by us as and for a

permanent endowment for the incumbent for the time being of the said church and of the said district or new parish, when so created as hereinafter recommended and proposed, and upon the understanding that the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of each of the said sums of stock shall be receivable by the said incumbent for the time being, subject always and nevertheless to the due confirmation or ratification by Order of your Majesty in Council of the recommendation and proposal hereinafter made and contained with respect to the patronage of the same church and district or new parish.

"And whereas the cash value of the said stocks being four thousand five hundred pounds or thereabouts, the gift thereof is in our judgment equivalent to a permanent endowment of the church of the said district or new parish with a clear yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and we have conditionally accepted the trust of the same stocks as aforesaid, as and for a permanent endowment of the said church of Saint Thomas, and of the said district or new parish, when and if so created as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas at the time when the said church of Saint Thomas, at Seaforth was, as aforesaid, erected by the said Sir John Gladstone, there was no general law or public Act of Parliament whereby or whereunder the patronage of a church so erected could be permanently vested in the founder of such a church; but the patronage of the same church was nevertheless by a deed of grant made by the Reverend Richard Rainshaw Rothwell, Clerk, the then Patron, and also the then rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Sefton, and of its parish church, with the consent of the then bishop of the diocese, purported to be vested in the said Sir John Gladstone and his heirs and assigns for a term of forty years from the date of the consecration of the same church, and the right of patronage of, and nomination of the minister of the same church is now by effluxion of time vested in the Reverend Roger Dawson Dawson-Duffield, Clerk, the present rector or incumbent of the same rectory, as such rector or incumbent.

"And whereas the patronage of the rectory of the said parish of Sefton is now vested in Richard Rainshaw Rothwell, of Sharples Hall, near Bolton, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, commonly called the Marquis de Rothwell.

"And whereas we, having considered the circumstances of the case and having herein the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, have determined to recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council such assignment as is hereinafter mentioned of the patronage of the said district or new parish hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the church thereof, in consideration of the said permanent endowment now so provided for the same district or new parish and church by him the said William Ewart Gladstone, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William, Bishop of Chester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Sefton, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for

spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named (when such district shall have become, as it will by operation of law at once become a new parish) 'The New Parish of Saint Thomas, Seaforth.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Seaforth aforesaid, being a consecrated church in use for the purposes of divine worship, and situate within the limits of the district and new parish hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be constituted, shall, as from the day last-mentioned, be, and for that purpose we hereby specify the same church as the parish church of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Seaforth.

"And we further recommend and propose, with such consent and so testified as aforesaid, that the advowson and perpetual right of patronage of the district and new parish hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be constituted, that is to say, of the new parish of Saint Thomas, Seaforth, and of the church of the same new parish, being the aforesaid church of Saint Thomas, Seaforth, and the whole right of nomination of the incumbent of the same new parish and of the church thereof shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and as from the day aforesaid, being the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, be assigned to, and become and be absolutely vested in, the said William Ewart Gladstone, his heirs and assigns for ever, but subject always and without prejudice to the rights now belonging to the Reverend William Rawson, Clerk, as incumbent of the same church of Saint Thomas, Seaforth.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the said Acts or any of them, or any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The New Parish of Saint Thomas, Seaforth, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Sefton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the south by the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, in the said county and diocese, on the south-west by the estuary of the River Mersey; on the north-west, partly by the particular district of Christ Church, Litherland, sometime part of the parish of Sefton aforesaid; and on all other sides; that is to say, on the remaining part of the north-west and on the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Sefton from the particular district of Christ Church, Litherland aforesaid, at the point near Potter's Barn where Crosby-road is joined by Cambridge-road; and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of seventeen chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Sandy-lane on the south-western side of the line of the Liverpool, Crosby, and Southport Railway; and continuing thence, still north-eastward, and in a direct line across the said line of railway, to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. T. 1870, No. 1,' and placed on the north-eastern side of the same line of railway at the south-western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 336 upon

the Tithe Commutation Map of the township of Litherland, in the said parish of Sefton, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 338 upon the same maps; and continuing thence, still north-eastward, along the middle of the said fence, across Rimrose-beck, to and along the middle of the fence dividing the close numbered 334 upon the said maps from the close numbered 337 upon the same maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. T. 1870, No. 2,' and placed at the north-eastern end of the last-described fence on the western side of the towing path on the western bank of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal; and continuing thence, still north-eastward and in a direct line, across the said towing path, to a point in the middle of the said canal; and extending thence, south-eastward for a distance of one mile and a quarter, or thereabouts, along the middle of the same canal to the boundary which divides the said parish of Sefton from the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill aforesaid."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts, or of some of them, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish out of which it is intended that the district or new parish therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and certain objections have been made to the said scheme by the patron of such parish:

And whereas more than one calendar month has elapsed since the draft of the said scheme was transmitted to the incumbent of the same parish, as aforesaid:

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such last-mentioned objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.
