THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Notice issued by the Bank of France, relating to the delay authorized by law in meeting bills of exchange, of which the following is a translation:—

Bills discounted by the Bank will issue from its office at the time of expiration indicated upon each of them, and will be presented to the acceptors. If these last, wishing to profit by the time of prorogation granted by law, do not pay, the Bank will not return the bills to the presenters for repayment, who will learn on the morrow, at the Receipt Office, before noon, what bills have been paid or unpaid, and withdraw such of those last as it may be convenient to them to pay.

Bills unpaid by the acceptors, and not withdrawn by the presenters, will be deposited in a separate department. When the time of prorogation shall have expired, the Bank will present afresh the bills to the acceptors, after having added to the total of each bill the amount of interest due.

In case of non-payment, it will protest or return it, conformably to usage, to the drawers, for repayment.

With respect to cash bills, that is to say, simply sent to the Bank for deposit, they will only be presented once, on the day of expiry indicated by these bills. And for those which shall not be paid, it will return them to the depositors, after which all intervention on the part of the Bank will have ceased. It will then remain for the depositors to present them again to the debtors at the expiration of the prorogation, and to take all necessary proceedings.

Credit will henceforth only be given for the cash bills, until the third day after the deposit has

been made. This measure is inevitable, in consequence of the excessive work imposed on the employés and the receipt clerks, for the regulation of accounts.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following translation of an Edict of the Spanish Government, admitting, free of duty, into the Island of Puerto Rico, agricultural machinery and implements and all mechanical applications tending to economise human labour:—

“Without prejudice to that which was laid down in Article 7 of the Decree of the 24th of June last, which establishes the bases for the reform of the Customs Dues in that island (Puerto Rico), H.H. the Regent of the Kingdom has been pleased to order that machinery and every sort of mechanical apparatus, as well as instruments for agricultural purposes, for carrying crops on properties, and every kind of application, the object of which is to economise manual labour, or to make the “exploitation” of landed property less expensive, whether that property is actually in cultivation, or is intended to be so in the future, may at once be imported through the Custom Houses free from all import duty, wherever may be the place from whence they came, or under whatever flag they may have been shipped.”

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General in Siam, reporting a reduction in the export duties on sugar in that country. These duties, formerly two salungs per picul for white, and one salung for red sugar, or, in other words one shilling and three pence for 133 pounds of the former, and half that amount for the same quantity of the latter, are now reduced by one-half. The Siamese Government, however, reserve to themselves the right of reverting to the late rates at the expiration of five years, if they think it desirable to do so.

“No other than Ottoman subjects can own, wholly or in part, any vessel carrying the Ottoman flag. Nevertheless any vessel belonging to an Ottoman subject may be sold in its entirety to a foreigner, upon condition that the ‘Berat’ and other papers proving that the vessel is Ottoman be duly withdrawn.”

THE following Notice has been received by the Board of Trade from Her Majesty's Consul-General in Egypt, through the Foreign Office:—

NOTICE TO THE MARITIME TRADE.

THE Egyptian Government having lately established at Rosette, Brulos, Damiette, and Port-Said, lighthouses intended, in conjunction with the one which has for many years existed at Alexandria, to light up the Mediterranean shore, and being about also to erect lighthouses at Souakim and Ras-Garib, on the coast of the Red Sea, where are already established the lighthouses at Zapharan, Aboukizân, and Achrafi, Egyptian and foreign commerce is hereby informed that the light dues to be paid in the ports of Egypt are fixed as follows:—

ARTICLE 1.

Every merchant vessel, sailing or steam, entering into one or more Egyptian ports of the Mediterranean Sea, shall pay, on entering each of the first two ports only, thirty paras, Egyptian Tariff, per Turkish ton, and fifteen paras for every ton exceeding 800 Turkish tons.

ARTICLE 2.

Every merchant vessel, sailing or steam, entering into one or more Egyptian ports of the Red Sea, shall pay, at the entrance into each port, a duty of two Egyptian piastres per Turkish ton, and of one Egyptian piastre for every ton exceeding 800 Turkish tons.

ARTICLE 3.

Every merchant vessel, sailing or steam, going from the Mediterranean Sea into the Red Sea, or from the Red Sea into the Mediterranean Sea, is bound to discharge, in the former case, on entering into Port-Said, and in the latter case, on entering into the Port of Suez, the light dues fixed in Article 2 concerning the Red Sea.

However, every merchant vessel, sailing or steam, which arriving by the Maritime Canal, stops at Suez and without going beyond, returns into the Mediterranean Sea shall only pay the dues fixed in Article 1 concerning that sea.

ARTICLE 4.

Every merchant vessel, sailing or steam, entering into an Egyptian port is bound after having obtained a clean bill of health to discharge the light dues at the office of the Capitainerie at the port at the same time when she reports her arrival, and a receipt thereof shall be delivered.

ARTICLE 5.

Every new entry into the same port of a merchant vessel involves the payment of the same dues.

ARTICLE 6.

Any merchant vessel which having sailed from a port and without having touched any other port or transacted commercial operations should be obliged to return to anchor either by stress of weather, or by reason of damage sustained, which must be stated in a written deposition signed by the principal officers on board, shall be exempt from a new payment of the light dues.

ARTICLE 7.

The signatures of the deposition must be legalized at the Consulate of the nation of the vessel thus returned. The document must then be submitted to the Captain of the port.

ARTICLE 8.

Vessels of war will always be exempt from light dues; also all merchant vessels measuring ten tons Turkish, or less.

ARTICLE 9.

The amount of dues to be discharged by each vessel is calculated according to her legal and official measurement, converted into Turkish tons of 792 okka each.

ARTICLE 10.

A reduction of five per cent. upon the amount of light dues will be allowed to vessels engaged in a regular postal service. Independently of what is said in Article 8, coasting vessels shall pay once per month, fishing vessels once a-year, the light-house dues fixed for vessels of 100 tons.

ARTICLE 11.

In consideration of the space required in steam vessels for stores or coal rooms, 40 per cent. will be deducted from the tonnage.

It is, however, well understood that if such a deduction has already been effected in their documents of nationality, they shall not be entitled to any further deduction.

ARTICLE 12.

The present tariff shall be subject to be increased or lowered according to the state of the budget of lighthouses to be drawn up by Government every year.

WHEREAS a Petition, signed by upwards of twenty ratepayers in that part of the hamlet of Buersil, in the county of Lancaster, which is outside of the boundary of the corporate town and borough of Rochdale, has been duly presented to me as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1858, praying me to appoint some person to act as Summoning Officer, and to take such proceedings as may be necessary for convening a meeting of the ratepayers of the said district of the hamlet of Buersil, to decide as to the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, in that district; I do hereby, under the provisions of such Local Government Act, and as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, appoint Christopher Peverley, of Green Bank, in Buersil, Tanner, to be Summoning Officer, and to take forthwith all such steps as may be necessary for convening a meeting of the ratepayers to decide as to the adoption of the Local Government Act, within the said district of Buersil.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

ORDER ALTERING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT OF TONBRIDGE, IN THE COUNTY OF KENT (AS DESCRIBED IN THE GAZETTED ORDER OF 23RD DECEMBER, 1869), FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

WHEREAS on the Petition of ratepayers resident within the town district of Tonbridge, in the county of Kent, the boundaries of a district to be styled the "District of the Town of Tonbridge," in the county of Kent, were settled by my order dated 23rd December, 1869, inserted in the London Gazette of the 24th day of December, 1869:

And whereas the Local Government Act was duly adopted by the said district on the 12th day of April, 1870:

And whereas a Petition from owners and ratepayers against the boundaries of the said district, so settled by my order as aforesaid, has been duly presented to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and praying for the exclusion of certain properties from the said district:

And whereas inquiry has been duly made into the subject matter of the said appeal by Arnold Taylor, Esq., the Inspector appointed by me for such purpose, and he has reported to me thereon:

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, having taken the said petition and report into consideration, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Local Government Act, 1858, make order as follows:

1. That from and after the date of this present order, the boundaries of the district of the town of Tonbridge, shall be those hereinafter set forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to and accompanying the said Inspector's Report to me, dated the 20th day of August, 1870.

The aforesaid boundaries commence at the point A, on the map accompanying the Inspector's Report, dated August 20th, 1870, and on the easterly side of the turnpike-road leading from Tonbridge to Shipbourne; thence it passes in a southerly direction, along and including such turnpike road, to the point B; thence in an easterly direction, along and including the cart-road and shooting-road in the plantation numbered 969 on the Ordnance map of Tonbridge, and southerly along the occupation-road leading to Cage Farm, to the point C; thence south-easterly, around and including the homestead and premises of Cage Farm, and along and including the approach-road to Cage Farm, from the Hadlow turnpike-road to the point D, on the boundary line separating the parishes of Tonbridge and Hadlow; thence easterly and southerly, following such parish boundary, to the point E; thence in a southerly direction, along and including the Back Mill stream and mill pool, to the point F, on the easterly side of a private-road known as the Postern-road; thence southerly along and including such road, to the point G, at Cannon-bridge; thence southerly, across Cannon-bridge, to the south bank of the River Medway; thence westerly, along and including such river, to the point H; thence southerly, along the easterly boundary fence of the property belonging to John Remington Mills, Esq., and numbered 1262 on the Ordnance map of Tonbridge, to the point I, on the northern bank of a cut or watercourse communicating with the River Medway, and shown on such Ordnance map; thence easterly, along and including such cut or watercourse, to the point K; thence easterly and southerly, including the properties numbered 157, 163, and 165 on such Ordnance map, to the point L, on the north side of the South-Eastern Railway; thence crossing such railway in a southerly direction, and along and including Lodge Oak-lane and the cottage and garden numbered 362A on such Ordnance map, to the point M, on the south side of Tudeley-lane; thence westerly, along and including such lane, to the point N; thence southerly, along and including the Hastings turnpike-road to the point O; thence crossing such road, westerly, and along the southerly and westerly boundary of the property known as High Bank to the point P; thence, westerly, along the northerly boundary fences of the property belonging to Julian Goldsmid, Esq., and numbered 382 and 407 on such Ordnance map, and southerly, along the westerly boundary fence of such last-named property to the point Q; thence, westerly,

along the southerly boundary fences of the properties belonging to Mr. George Punnett, and numbered 403, 400, and 373 on such Ordnance map, to the point R; thence northerly to the point S, which is taken to be due east of the point T, on the west side of the turnpike road leading to Tonbridge Wells; thence (after excluding the house and appurtenances forming the north entrance lodge to Mabledon Park) in a south-westerly direction along the boundary fence dividing the property numbered 272 from the properties numbered 293 and 271 on such Ordnance map, and along the northerly boundary fence of such last-named property to the point U; thence, in a north-westerly direction to the point V, on the south side of Brook-street-lane, and opposite the fence dividing the properties numbered 131 and 132 on such Ordnance map; thence, south-westerly along and including the road leading to Bidborough, to the point W; thence along the southerly and westerly boundary fence of the property numbered 244 on such Ordnance map, to the point X; thence, westerly, along an imaginary line which is taken to be throughout its length at a distance of one hundred yards south of the centre of the Haysden, or Brook-street-road to the point Y; thence westerly along the northerly and westerly boundary fences of No. 120, and the southerly boundary fence of No. 116 on such Ordnance map, to the point Z, on the westerly side of the occupation road leading to Manor Farm; thence northerly along and including such last-named road, and the properties numbered 111, 110, and 109 on such Ordnance map, to the point A 1, on the south side of the road leading to Bidborough; thence crossing such road and including it, and the occupation-road numbered 107 on such Ordnance map, to the point B 1, on the south side of such road; thence to the south side of the River Medway, and along, but excluding such river, to the point C 1; thence southerly along the easterly boundary fence of the property numbered 117, on such Ordnance map, to the point D 1, on the north side of Haysden or Brook-street-road; thence easterly along, and including such last-named road, to the point E 1, which is taken to be opposite point V; thence northerly along the westerly boundary fences of the properties numbered 132, 134, 136, 89, 68, 39, and 26, on such Ordnance map, to the River Medway, and crossing such river, to the point F 1, on the north side thereof; thence easterly along, and including the old course of such river to the point G 1; thence northerly along a water course, forming the westerly boundary of the properties numbered 1133, 1136, and 1137, on such Ordnance map, to the point H 1, at a footpath leading to Leigh; thence westerly along, and including such footpath, to the point I 1; thence northerly along the westerly boundaries of the property numbered 910, and the westerly side of the roads numbered 883 and 854 on such Ordnance map, to the point K 1; thence easterly and northerly along the south boundary of 855 and the easterly boundaries of the properties numbered 856 and 852 on such Ordnance map, to the point L 1; thence easterly and southerly along the northerly and easterly boundaries of the property numbered 976, and the northerly boundaries of the properties numbered 1016, 1020, and 1021, on such Ordnance map, to the point M 1, at the Hilden Brook; thence northerly along, and including such brook, to the point N 1; thence northerly along the westerly boundary of the property numbered 984, and the westerly and northerly boundaries of the property numbered 948 on such Ordnance map to the point O 1;

thence easterly crossing an occupation road, and around and including the property numbered 949 on such Ordnance map, and around and including the farm house and homestead of Little French Farm, to the starting point at A, so completing the boundary of the district of Tonbridge.

2. That the said Local Government Act shall from and after the 1st day of September, 1870, come into force within the district of the town of Tonbridge, as settled by this order.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction consisting of two roods and twenty-three perches (or thereabouts) of land, which have been permanently secured to the perpetual curacy of the Holy Trinity, Lyonsdown, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester, and of a further benefaction of eight hundred and fifty pounds sterling, which has been paid to us in favour of the same perpetual curacy, do hereby, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, sections five and eleven, grant to the Incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the Holy Trinity, Lyonsdown, and to his successors, Incumbents thereof, to meet such benefactions, one yearly sum or stipend of thirty-one pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the day of the publication of these presents in the London Gazette, and to be receivable in equal half-yearly portions, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year. And we do also in further consideration of the aforesaid benefactions, hereby grant and appropriate, out of our said common fund, to the said perpetual curacy of the Holy Trinity, Lyonsdown, one capital sum of five hundred and fifty pounds sterling, to be applicable towards defraying the cost of providing a parsonage or house of residence for the said perpetual curacy, according to plans and a specification to be approved by us, such capital sum, or the balance thereof unapplied to such purpose, to remain in the meantime in our hands at interest after the rate of three pounds per centum per annum, and such interest to be paid to the Incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of the Holy Trinity, Lyonsdown: Provided always, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient to produce the said yearly sum or stipend of thirty-one pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence hereinbefore mentioned, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said perpetual curacy, in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.
