

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme has reference.

"The district of Saint Benet, Stepney, being:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the new parish of Trinity, Mile-end Old Town, of the parish of Saint Dunstan, Stepney, and of the new parish of Saint Peter, Stepney, all in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing at a point upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Trinity, Mile-end Old Town, from the new parish of Saint Simon Zelotes, Bethnal Green, in the said county and diocese, where such boundary crosses the Regent's-canal, near to the bridge which carries the Great Eastern Railway, over such canal, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said canal (thereby crossing the said railway bridge and also crossing Mile-end-bridge, which carries the Mile-end-road over the same canal), as far as a point upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Trinity, Mile-end Old Town, from the parish of Saint Dunstan, Stepney, aforesaid, in the middle of the Stepney footpath, otherwise Gunmakers' Arms-bridge, which carries Bridge-street over the same canal, and extending thence south-westward along such lastly-mentioned boundary, thereby following the middle of Bridge-street aforesaid, to a point opposite to the northern end of the street or road passing in front of the houses called or known as Portland-place, and extending thence southward to and along such street or road to its junction with Skidmore-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street, and along the middle of John-street (thereby crossing Johnson-street and Duckett-street), to the south-western extremity of John-street aforesaid, at its junction with the street or road called White Horse-lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane, to its junction with the Mile-end-road aforesaid, and continuing thence still north-westward to the boundary in the middle of such road which divides the said parish of Saint Dunstan, Stepney, from the new parish of Saint Peter, Stepney, aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward along such lastly-mentioned boundary, thereby following the middle of the said Mile-end-road as far as the point where such road is joined by Grafton-street, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such street and in the same direction across Devonshire-street East, to a point in the middle of the line of the Great Eastern Railway aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, Stepney, from a certain portion of the parish of Saint Dunstan, Stepney, aforesaid, lying to the north of the said line of railway, and extending thence south-westward along such lastly-mentioned boundary, thereby following the middle of the said line of railway, as far as a point at or near Prospect-place, opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of Morpeth-street, and extending thence north-eastward and in a straight line to the boundary at or near to the southern end of the last-named street which divides the last-mentioned portion of the parish

of Saint Dunstan, Stepney, from the new parish of Saint Simon Zelotes, Bethnal-green, aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Trinity, Mile-end Old Town aforesaid, and continuing thence still north-eastward along such lastly-mentioned boundary, and then south-eastward, and then again north-eastward along the same boundary (thereby following from the southern end of Morpeth-street aforesaid the ancient boundary of the hamlet of Mile-end Old Town), to the point where the boundary dividing the last-named new parishes crosses the Regent's-canal near to the bridge which carries the line of the Great Eastern Railway aforesaid over the same canal, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore firstly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron, and to the incumbents of the cures, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chaptersixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the
