Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

That the time for the discontinuance of burials in that part of the churchyard of the parish of Cheadle, Cheshire, which is not to the south of the church be postponed, till after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one; after which time burials shall be discontinued in that said part of the churchyard, except in now existing family graves or vaults for the burial only of the members of the families interred therein; and except in other graves not yet buried in,—no graves to be re-opened unless to bury another member of the family interred therein, or used, unless for the burial of parishioners of Cheadle. Every coffin buried in a vault or walled grave to be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and no coffin buried in an earthen grave to be less than five feet below the surface. No previously buried coffin to be exposed or buried remains to be disturbed.

NORTHAMPTON.—In the churchyard of St. Giles and St. Sepulchre, and in St. Catherine's new churchyard, except in graves or vaults which can be opened without the exposure of coffins, or the disturbance of remains, and that all coffins buried in vaults or walled graves be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed; and that, on and after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, burials in the above-mentioned churchyards be limited to the widowers, widows, unmarried children, brothers, and sisters of those previously buried therein.

NORTHAMPTON.—In the churchyard of St. Edmund, except in graves or vaults which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains, and that all coffins buried in vaults or walled graves be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed; burials to be limited to the interment of those who have been residents within the parish of St. Edmund.

BLACKPOOL.—Forthwith wholly in the church, and in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, except in now existing family vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork, properly cemented, and except in other family graves not less than five feet deep, and which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

NAPTON-ON-THE-HILL, WARWICKSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the old part of the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, each coffin buried in which shall be separately entombed, that is, enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

JARROW-ON-TYNE.—Forthwith wholly in the church, and in the churchyard of the parish, after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, except in the new ground recently added thereto, to be used for burial in vaults and walled graves only, and except in now existing family vaults and walled graves in the old part of the churchyard, and except in other family graves, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of bones, to be used only for the burial of the widowers, widows, and unmarried children of those already buried therein.

LEAMINGTON PRIORS.—Forthwith in the original paths of the Old Cemetery, or additional churchyard, of Leamington, and within three yards of the public road; and that in the rest of the burial ground the regulations for burial grounds, provided under the Burial Acts, be observed.

PRESTBURY.—Forthwith wholly in the Friends' Burial-ground, **MAGGLESFIELD**, in the parish of Prestbury.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twelfth day of January next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twelfth day of January.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to confer the decoration of the "Albert Medal of the Second Class" on :—

CAPTAIN EDWARD GILES, Indian Navy,
Master Attendant at Kurrachee.

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the decoration has been conferred :—

The barque "Alicia," of Greenock, was driven upon the bar of Kurrachee Harbour, at 4.20 P.M. of the 20th June, 1868, in very heavy weather, and at the height of a south-west monsoon, when the bar is covered with a continuous line of heavy breakers at all times of tide. The sea at once made a complete breach over the vessel, washing boats and everything else from her decks, and obliging the crew to take to the mizen rigging.

CAPTAIN GILES, the Master Attendant, and Mr. Robert Henry Mason, Senior Pilot at

Kurrachee, made attempts to reach the stranded vessel in two boats twenty-five feet long, fitted as life boats, and manned by natives.

CAPTAIN GILES' boat on entering the breakers was swept back half filled, but was carried into comparatively smooth water.

By great exertion however, he brought her within 50 feet of the vessel, the confused mass of surging wreck threatening instant destruction if he had approached nearer.

The shipwrecked crew were at first too frightened to attempt to leave their vessel, but eventually, upon a light line being successfully flung on board of her, two seamen and the pilot hauled themselves by means of it through the water, and were got into the boat. The boat up to this time had been kept clear by bailing, but now, being half filled by a heavy sea which struck her, was compelled at once to return, and the three men were transferred to another boat waiting in smooth water.

A little before sunset CAPTAIN GILES was again by the wreck, passing through the midst of broken spars and all kinds of wreckage. Having rescued six more men, he was taking them ashore when a wave rolled over the boat and filled her, breaking her rudder and six oars, and sweeping three of her crew overboard. The following roller fortunately carried these men into smooth water, where they were picked up by the waiting boats.

Both of the station life boats were now disabled; but as some of the crew still remained on board the "Alicia," CAPTAIN GILES determined upon a further attempt in the boat of the tug "Dagmar." This boat was fitted with cork floats, but was heavy. After great exertion the wreck was reached, and the remaining men, with the exception of the master, were got into the boat, when she was carried away half filled.

The master of the "Alicia," who had jumped overboard with a plank, was carried in the direction of the waiting boats, and ultimately picked up.

The Commissioner of Scinde, in bringing the case to the notice of the Governor of Bombay, bears testimony to the "conspicuous bravery" of CAPTAIN GILES, in thus rescuing fourteen persons during a strong gale of wind and very high sea, a service which occupied three hours, at any moment of which the boats in the surf ran risk of being swamped.
