

scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Heston, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Hounslow Heath.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereof, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may, from time to time, be exercised by the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Paul, Hounslow Heath, being :—

"All that part of the parish of Heston, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-west by the parish of Cranford, on the south-west by the parish of East Bedfont, both such lastly-named parishes being situate in the county and diocese aforesaid; on the south-east, and on the greater part of the east, by the new parish of Hounslow, in the same county and diocese; and on all the other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the east and on the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the parish of Heston aforesaid, at a point in the middle of Workhouse-lane, distant seventy-three yards, or thereabouts, from and to the north of the middle of the Bath-road; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the said lane to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'H. H., St. P. D., 1871, No. 1,' and placed on the western side of the same lane, at a distance of two hundred and twenty yards to the north-east of the middle of the Bath-road aforesaid, such lastly-mentioned point being opposite to the house called or known as 'Park Lodge'; and extending thence, north-westward, to such boundary stone; and continuing thence, still north-westward, for a distance of one mile and a half, or thereabouts, in a course parallel to, and distant two hundred and twenty yards from, the middle of the Bath-road as aforesaid (thereby crossing Vicarage Farm-lane and Spirit-lane), to a boundary stone inscribed 'H. H., St. P. D., 1871, No. 2,' and placed at a point on the western side of the private road leading from the said Bath-road to the house called or known as

'The Firs,' such point being on the boundary which divides the said parish of Heston from the parish of Cranford aforesaid, and being also distant two hundred and twenty yards from the middle of the Bath-road as above mentioned."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and each patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Matthias, situate within the limits of the new parish of Saint Philip, Earl's Court, Kensington, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Matthias, situate within the limits of the new parish of Saint Philip, Earl's Court, Kensington, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Philip, Earl's Court, Kensington, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part,
