In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstance should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

Commutation of Tithe.

IN pursuance of the 17th section of the "London (City) Tithes Act, 1864," notice is hereby given, that on the 6th day of December, 1870, the Reverend John Bathurst Deane, M.A., Clerk, Rector of the parish of Saint Martin Outwich, in the city of London, wrote and sent to the Churchwardens of the same parish a letter, as follows: "Sirs,—With the concurrence of the patrons of Saint Martin Outwich, I hereby authorize and request you to propose to the Vestry the commutation of the rectorial tithes on the terms and under the provisions of the Act entitled 'The City of London Tithes Act, 1864,' the annual amount at which I am willing to commute my tithes is £2,250.—I am, &c., J.
