**W**E Your Majesty's Dutiful Subjects, crave leave of Your Majesty, and Your Royal Consort, that we may join with Your Majesties, in offering our most humble and hearty Thanks to God Almighty, for sending Your Majesty a Son, and us a Prince. And further we beg of Your Majesty, to accept our cordial Thanks, for Your Majesty's late Favour to the Body of this Corporation; as also for Your Princely Condescension and Affection, by both Your Gracious Declarations, not only extending to the Church of England, but to all other Your Peaceable and Loyal Subjects; assuring us by Your Royal Word, that You will stand by us, whereby we are not only comforted, but resolved, when Your Majesty shall think fit to call a Parliament, we will endeavour to elect such Members as shall make Your Majesty happy, and Your Subjects easie. And shall ever pray for Your Majesty's long Life and peaceable Reign over us. May it please Your Majesty,

**N**O sooner did the Happy News of the Prince's Birth reach our Ears, but we of this place thought it our Duty, in a more especial manner, to be early in the return of our Praises to the Almighty, for so great a Blessing upon us and Your Three Kingdoms, and in Congratulating Your Majesty and Your Royal Consort, of being the joyful Parents of so goodly a Son; a Gift which the whole Nation ought to esteem as the Reward of Heaven, upon that continued Series of Goodness and Indulgence, which Your Majesty hath ever since the beginning of Your most auspicious Reign extended to Your Subjects, particularly that of Your compassionate Declaration for Liberty of Conscience; whereby as You are pleased to suspend the execution of all Penal Laws in Matters of Religion, and the requiring of any Oaths or Tests from any; so do we, upon our Allegiance to You our Sovereign, promise and engage, That whenever Your Majesty shall think fit to call a Parliament, such of us, as shall have a Power of Electing, will chuse none to serve therein, but who shall give us a full Assurance, that they will endeavour the total Abrogation of them.

And that Your Majesty may have the ready Concurrence of both Your Houses in these Gracious Intentions; and enjoy the Comfort and Satisfaction of seeing the Fruits and Consequences thereof, by a long and prosperous Reign in Peace and Plenty, (having survived the Murmurs and Discontents of a Malevolent Party) the Prince Your Son arrived to maturity of Years and Understanding; and a numerous Offspring from Your Royal Loyns, which may perpetuate Your Name and Memory, and even battle Mortality it self, shall be the constant Prayer of, Dread Sovereign,

Your Majesties ever Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

*Venice, July 30.* We have Advice by Letters from the *Moravia*, that the Doge, upon the News he had received, that the Garrison in *Candia* had mutinied for want of their Pay, and had cut off their Bassa, and several of their Officers, sailed the 12th of the last month from *Porto Porto*, with the Venetian and Maltese Gallies (which later had joined the Fleet four days before,) towards that Island: And that at the moment of their departure, the Convoy commanded by Signior *Mocenigo* arrived there. By a Vessel from *Zant* we hear, that a Bark that came from *Biedon* had brought thither the News of the Surrender of *Napoli di Malvasia*; But this needs a Confirmation.

*Genova, July 27.* The 25th instant, the Feast of St. James, Mr. *Thomas Radcliff*, who has been for several years settled in this City, made a very splendid Entertainment on the occasion of the Birth of the Prince of *Wales*. The Bishop of *Albenga* celebrated Mass Pontifically in the Church of *Santa Maria delle Vigne*, which was very magnificently adorned, and afterwards *Te Deum* was sung with choice Musick. At night there was a Noble Firework before his House, which was illuminated with white Wax Torches. The Nobility and other Persons of Quality that came thither were entertained with all sorts of Refreshments in great abundance, and a large distribution of Alms was made among the Poor.

*From the Imperial Camp commanded by General Caprara, near Peter Waraden, July 21.* The 10th instant we Encamped at *Butschin*, not far from *Illocke*, from whence several Parties were sent out toward the *Save*, to learn in what posture the Enemy were on that side. The 11th Prince *Louis of Baden* began his March to joyn the Militia of *Croatia*, and to advance afterwards towards *Grattiska*. The 12th and 13th the Army stretched it self somewhat farther, and our Parties returned, but without any News. The 14th we marched to *Nistin*; the 15th to *Zereuzza*, (where we continued the 16.) the 17th, to *Lacuzza*, and the 18th arrived here, finding *Peter Waradin* (as we had *Illocke*) quite burnt down. The 19th 500 Hussars and 100 Croats, who had been detached towards the *Save*, came back with some Prisoners, 300 Horses, 200 Oxen, and 600 Sheep. The 20th the General ordered a Bridge to be laid here over the *Danube*, and the Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of *Souches* was posted on the other side of the River, with 1000 Men, to cover it: 6000 Men were likewise commanded to repair the Fortifications of this place, which is of so advantageous a Situation, that it absolutely commands the *Danube*: A good Garrison will be put into it, and 'twill be made the chief Magazine for the Army. This day seven Turkish Saiques came along the *Dnnube*, close by the Camp, and kill'd Four of our Foragers, and made the rest retire. The Auxiliary Troops of *Bavaria*, and the Circles, as well as those of General *Caraffa*, are advancing towards us, and will have joined us in a day or two; after which we shall only stay for the Arrival of the Elector of *Bavaria*, and then undertake the Siege of *Belgrade*.

*Vienna, August 1.* The Letters from the Imperial Camp, of the 25th past, inform us, That the Troops of *Bavaria*, with those from *Transylvania*, and the Circles of *Franconia* and *Suabia*, had join'd the Army near *Peter Waradin*: That General *Caprara* intended to decamp the 27th or 28th, and to advance towards the *Save*: That the Turks had intrench'd themselves on the other side of that River, and seem'd resolv'd to dispute the passage of it: They are said to be about 25000 strong, under the Command of *Hassan Bassa*, *Yeghen Bassa* still refusing to joyn with him, or to obey his Orders: Which Misunderstanding between them is like to be of great Advantage to the Imperialists, who might otherwise find it a difficult thing to pass the *Save*. A Party of Hussars that was sent out by General *Caprara*, to observe the Enemies Motions, advanced as far as *Semlyn*, about a German Mile from *Belgrade*, on this side the *Save*, which they plundered, (the Inhabitants having, upon their approach, abandoned the place,) and brought away 40 Horses, 300 Cows and Oxen, and 400 Sheep, with

with other Booty. The Count de Corbelli has made another Incursion to the very Gates of *Great Waradin*, and spoiled all the Country round, without the least Opposition from that Garrison. The Count de Budiani has likewise made another ravage about *Causa*; He decamp'd the 19th Instant from *Recre*, with the Troops under his Command, and advanced to *St. Micles*; from whence, on the 22th, he sent a Detachment to burn the Suburbs of *Causa*, where, as he understood from a Rascian, the Turks had laid up all the Forage and Corn they had taken from the Country People of that Neighborhood; which they executed the next morning about break of day: The Turks made at the same time a vigorous Sally, and kill'd 16 of our Men, but were beaten back with a much greater loss on their side, and several were taken Prisoners, with 4 small pieces of Cannon. The Bishop of *Nicopolis* is returned to *Valachia*, to demand farther Instructions, as well as a more ample Power, of the Prince and States of that Country, for the finishing the Treaty with this Court: In the mean time the two other Deputies of *Valachia* remain here, and continue their Conferences with the Imperial Commissioners.

*Cologne, August 10.* The Cardinal of *Furstenberg* parted from *Bonne* on Friday last for *Liege*; where the Election is to be on the 17th Instant. They write from *Munich*, that Prince *Clement* of *Bavaria* intends to come hither very suddenly; but the time is not yet fixed.

*Hamburg, July 31.* Sir *Peter Wyche*, His Majesty's Resident here, having, on the 19th of *June*, received the Happy News of the Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of *Wales*, bespoke, the same Night, a Collation, as good as could be provided, to be sent to the Town-Wine-Cellar, (where, on Extraordinary Occasions, those of the Chiefest Quality in this Neighborhood usually do come,) whither he invited all the English Merchants to drink their Majesties and the Prince's Healths. They were all entertain'd to their Satisfaction, at a very splendid Ambigu, and admir'd such Provisions could so suddenly be prepared. The 5th of *July* the Resident (having first assist'd at *Te Deum* at the French Envoy's Chapel, which was performed with the best Voices and Instruments of the place,) entertain'd his Highness the Duke of *Holftein Gottorp*, the French Envoy, and several other publick Ministers, the Chief of this Senate, and many others of Quality; where the Table was furnish'd suitable to the great Occasion, with two large Services; which were followed by a great Banquet of Sweet-Meats, and all sort of Fruit of the Season. A most excellent Firework was design'd and prepared, but, at the earnest desire of the Magistrates, (who urg'd it might be dangerous, and was not usual in their City,) it was put off. On the 12th of *July* a Third Entertainment, no less Magnificent, was made for the Danish and other publick Ministers: And most of the Mediators to this Treaty being then out of Town, a Fourth is design'd when they return.

*Tervere in Zealand, August 5.* Yesterday was celebrated here the Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of *Wales*, by Sir *James Kennedy* Conservator of the Scottish Priviledges in the *Netherlands*, who, together with those of that Nation, entertain'd in the *Concergie House* of the Scottish *Staple Court*, the English and Irish Factors, Merchants, and Masters of Ships from *Middleburg*; which was followed with Fireworks, Bonfires, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy.

*Brussels, Aug. 13.* The States of this Province are now assembled to consent to the extraordinary Subsidies for the Year ensuing. The Cardinal of *Furstenberg* arriv'd the 8th instant at *Liege*, being accompanied, besides his own Train, by divers Persons of Quality that went from thence to meet him, and Saluted at his Entrance into the City by the Cannon from the Citadel. There are Letters from *Venice* of the 30th past, which give an account, That the Doge *Moresini* had taken *Ganea* and *Candia*, and that it was agreed the Garrisons should be transported to *Asia*; but the ordinary Advices from thence of the same Date not making any mention of this important News, (though they tell us indeed that the Venetian Fleet was gone towards *Candia*) we must suspend our giving credit to it, till we hear farther.

*Hague, Aug. 13.* The Marquis d'Alberville, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Great Britain*, having His Majesty's

Leave to return to *England* for some short time, will Embark on Monday or Tuesday next on the Yacht that brought the *Seur de Zuyflein* from thence. The discourse continues of an Encampment of the Troops of this State towards the latter end of this Month. The Treaty of Commerce, lately concluded between the King of *Denmark* and the States General, is ratified, and the Ratifications are exchanged. The Heer *Van Benting* is returned from *Germany*.

*Paris, Aug. 14.* The King returned the 9th instant from the Castle of *Mailly* to *Versailles*, having the day before taken a Review of the Troops of his Household in the Plain of *Acheres*, who are since gone back to their Quarters. Five of our Men of War that were before *Angiers* are it's said order'd towards the *Levant*, to look after the *Algerines* who are cruizing there.

*London, Aug. 8.* The News which the *East-India Company* have received from their President and Council of *Fort St. George*, by Letters which came by the French Ships, Dated the 21st of *January* last, is, That the Companies Agent and all their Servants in *Bengall* are certainly restor'd in their own Factories; and fully and absolutely restor'd, not only to all their ancient Priviledges, but to some better Terms than ever they enjoyed or pretended to before the late War with the *Mogull*. And the President and Council of the Fort had then sent down 92500 Pounds in Money to *Bengall*, which, with a greater Sum the Agent and Council of the Bay had by them, will make a very great Investment of that Country Commodities, which may be expected home early next Spring. And the Company have not the least doubt (notwithstanding the false Rumours which have been industriously spread abroad) but that they have an Universal and Honourable Peace with the *Mogul* and his Subjects in all parts of *India*.

As the Companies last advices gave an account of the removal of the Governour of *Saratte*, for his abusing the English, these Letters say, the Great *Mogul* had removed the Nabob of *Bengal* (who was his own Uncle) from that Government, but it is not said for what cause, though there is no better in *India* to prefer him to.

*Whitehall, Aug. 6.* We have received an account of the Rejoycings made at *Ratisbonne* by Sir *George Etherege*, Residing there from His Majesty, on the Occasion of the Happy Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of *Wales*, which being too long to be here insert'd, will be published in a Paper by it self.

*Richmond August 7.* On the 3d Instant Their Majesties came hither from *Windzor*, upon the Occasion of his Royal Highness the Prince of *Wales* being taken ill; whose weak condition being considered, His Majesty was pleas'd to Order, that the Breast should be given him, which hath (God be thanked,) succeeded very well, to the great Joy of Their Majesties, and consequently of the whole Kingdom, which hath an equal Concern in the Life of this Royal Infant, (whom God long preserve.) Their Majesties intend to return to *Windzor* on *Thursday* next; and the Prince is to be carried thither also on the *Saturday* following.
