THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received a Notification from the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador that the Monetary Treaty of 24th January, 1857, between Austria and the German States having been cancelled so far as relates to Austria and Hungary by the Monetary Treaty of the 13th June, 1867, the Imperial and Royal Government has now, in order to prepare the way for the introduction of a Gold Standard, resolved to substitute for the coin called the "Golden Crown," stipulated in the Treaty of 1857, coins of gold of 20 francs or 8 florins, and of 10 francs or 4 florins, to be struck in full conformity with the regulations of the Monetary Convention of 23rd December, 1865, between France, Belgium, Italy, and Switzerland. These 20 franc or 8 florin pieces are of 21 millimetres diameter, of 6.45161 grammes full legal weight, and of nine-tenths fineness; and the 10 franc or 4 florin pieces are of 19 millimetres diameter, of 3.22580 grammes full legal weight, and of nine-tenths fineness.

The remedies of weight and fineness are two parts in a thousand either in excess or deficiency. The new gold coins bear on their obverse the effigy of the Emperor and King. Those that are minted in Austria bear the legend Franciscus I., D.G., Imperator et Rex, and those that are minted in Hungary, Ferencz Josêf I.K. acs, es M.H.S.D.O., Ap. Kir.

The reverse of the Austrian pieces has an Imperial Eagle with the inscription *Imperium Austriacum*, the mark of 20 francs (or 10 francs) being on the left hand, and that of 8 florins (or 4 florins) on the right hand of the eagle, with the date underneath. The Hungarian pieces bear on the reverse the arms of that Kingdom and of the adjacent countries with the inscription *Magyar Királyság*.

The same marks of value being on the right and left of the arms and the date underneath them.

The rim of the Austrian gold coins is plain with the words *viribus unitis* engraved thereon.

The Hungarian gold coins have a milled edge.

The gold pieces of 20 francs are payable in silver at the Imperial and Royal Exchequer at the rate of eight florins, ten kreuzers, Austrian currency; those of 10 francs at four florins, five kreuzers.

The value of the gold pieces circulating in Austria and Hungary is Conventional.

The despatch from the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador points out that inasmuch as these regulations, adopted by the Legislatures of his country, agree, in every respect, with the stipulations of the Monetary Convention of 23rd December, 1865, between France, Belgium, Italy, and Switzerland, so far as relates to the gold coins of 20 francs and 10 francs, the Imperial and Royal Government avails itself of the right of securing to the said gold coins, struck upon identical conditions and with its own mark, the same guarantees as if that Government had formally acceded to the said Convention so far as it has relation to gold coinage.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Minister at Lisbon, a translation of a Decree of the Portuguese Government

respecting exhibitions of Portuguese wines in foreign markets.

The following are the Articles of the Decree :—

ART. 1. Official exhibitions of Portuguese wines are to be held in foreign markets, to which all wine growers and merchants that shall comply with the rules laid down in this Decree shall be admitted.

ART. 2. The Government, by means of the Consuls, or of other proper agents, shall establish wine depôts in the markets which may be selected for that purpose.

§ These depôts shall be placed in appropriate buildings, in order that they may be accessible to the public, and they shall be open on fixed days and hours.

ART. 3. In the depôts there shall be general lists of the wines kept there, giving all the details relative to their origin and price, which lists may be examined by the public.

ART. 4. The sale and tasting of the samples of the wines in the depôts shall be regulated by special instructions to be given to the agents of those depôts.

ART. 5. The agents of the depôts shall keep a regular account of the entrance and clearance of wines, and at the end of every quarter they shall forward to the Government an account of the operations effected in the depôts, and, at the end of each year, a full report shall be made of the results obtained from the establishments under their charge.

ART. 6. The proceeds of the samples of wines shall be applied to the payment of the expenses of the said depôts; and the managers thereof shall receive 7 per cent. upon the value of the wine sold through their intervention.

ART. 7. The samples of wines that shall not have been withdrawn at the expiration of two years from the date of their entrance into the depôts, shall be sold by public auction, and the proceeds shall be applied to the payment of the expenses of the said depôts.

ART. 8. The Government shall cause two stations to be established, one at Lisbon and the other at Oporto, where the samples of wines which the wine growers and merchants wish to send to the foreign depôts shall be received.

ART. 9. The growers or merchants wishing to avail themselves of the advantages offered by this Decree must submit to the following conditions :—

1. A sample of wine to be sent to the foreign depôt shall consist of 12 bottles of half a canada each (0·7 litre), eight of which shall be forwarded to the said markets and four shall be reserved for the purpose stated hereinafter.

2. The bottles to be well corked and sealed, and to have a label mentioning—

(a.) The name of the grower or merchant, and his place of residence;

(b.) The estate (quinta) or place where the wine was produced, and the year of the vintage;

(c.) The price of the wine;

(d.) The quantity for sale;

(e.) Up to what time can he engage to execute an order.

3. The bottles shall be marked with an official stamp when received at the stations, and a proper receipt shall be handed over to the owners.

4. Should any doubts be raised with regard to the identity of the wine supplied by any grower or merchant in the execution of any order, the purchaser shall have the right of rejecting the same, in case the wine should be found to be,

after examination by experts, either defective or inferior in quality to the sample; and, in this case, should the owner of the wine not dispose of the same within a fixed period, the manager of the depôt shall cause the same to be sold by public auction for the account of the owner, deducting the commission, and three per cent. more for the expenses of the depôt.

5. The transmission of wine to the foreign depôts shall be made at stated periods, after due notice shall have been given in the official journal.

ART. 10. The Government shall publish at the end of every quarter an account of the operations carried on at the Lisbon and Oporto stations, with full details and particulars thereof.

ART. 11. The four bottles of wine over and above the other eight to be sent to the foreign depôts, shall be forwarded to the "General Agricultural Institution."

§ 1. One of these bottles shall be used for the purpose of examining and analysing the wine contained therein, the others shall be kept for the purpose of forming a collection of national wines.

§ 2. The results of this examination and analysis shall be published officially, and a few copies of this publication shall be forwarded to the foreign depôts.

ART. 12. The Government does not take upon itself any responsibility for the transactions which may be made for the purchase or sale of the wines through the intervention of the managers of the depôts, and all the parties interested shall remain subject to the legal enactments in force respecting commercial acts, whether internal or international.

ART. 13. The necessary expenses incurred for the purpose of carrying out the exhibitions of Portuguese wines referred to in this Decree shall be defrayed, after the sanction of the Cortes shall have been obtained, out of the surplus revenue derived from the fees recovered in the Consulates of the 1st class.

ART. 14. The Government shall draw up the regulations and adopt the necessary measures in order to secure and develop the advantages and benefits which ought to accrue to commerce and agriculture from the said exhibitions.

The Minister and Secretary of State for the Department of Public Works, Commerce, and Industry, and, ad interim, for Foreign Affairs, shall cause the same to be carried into execution accordingly.

SEWAGE UTILIZATION ACTS 1865 AND 1867.

ORDER SETTLING BOUNDARIES OF THE SPECIAL DRAINAGE DISTRICT OF IVYBRIDGE, IN THE COUNTY OF DEVON.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the Sewage Utilization Act, 1867 (30 and 31 Vict., cap. 113), that any inhabited place not having a known or defined boundary, may petition one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in manner provided in the sixteenth section of the Local Government Act, 1858, to settle its boundaries for the purposes of the Sewage Utilization Acts, 1865 and 1867, and the Secretary of State may, by Order made in manner provided by the said section settle the same accordingly, and from and after the date of such Order the place shall be

deemed to have been constituted a Special Drainage District for the purposes of the said Sewage Utilization Acts, 1865 and 1867; and whereas, in pursuance of such provisions, a memorial has been presented to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from owners and ratepayers of the District of Ivybridge, in the county of Devon, which District has been lately defined and settled by Order, dated the 9th day of January, 1871, and published in the London Gazette, praying that the same District may be constituted a Special Drainage District, under the 8th section of the Sewage Utilization Act, 1867.

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, having taken the said petition into consideration, do hereby, under the authority conferred upon me by the said Acts, order and direct, that—

1. From and after the date of this present Order, the boundaries hereinafter described shall form and constitute the Special Drainage District of Ivybridge; that is to say:—
