## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no

presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 28.)—WEST INDIES—CUBA.

*Fixed and Flashing Light on Cape Cruz.*

THE Spanish Government has given notice, that from the 5th March, 1871, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Cape Cruz, south side of Cuba.

The light is a *fixed and flashing* white light, showing a flash *every three minutes*, elevated 114 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 16 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the second order.

The tower is built of stone, and stands in front of the keeper's dwelling, which is painted yellow with white edges. Position, lat. 19° 50' N., long 77° 44½' West from Greenwich.

Also that the fixed temporary light would be discontinued from the same date.

#### BAHAMA ISLANDS.

*Exhibition of a Danger Light at Hog Island.*

The Colonial Government of the Bahama Islands has given notice, that the regulation is still in force which requires the exhibition, at night, of a *red* light at Hog Island whenever the state of the bar at the entrance of Nassau Harbour is such as to be considered impassable or dangerous to vessels entering. WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction of two hundred and fifty pounds sterling which has been paid to us in favour of the vicarage of Holland Fen, in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln, and in respect of which we have agreed to pay to the Incumbent of the same vicarage, and to his successors, a yearly sum of eight pounds six shillings and eight pence, do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, grant to the Incumbent of the said vicarage of Holland Fen, and to his successors, to meet such benefaction, one other yearly sum or stipend of eight pounds six shillings and eight pence, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the day of the publication of these presents in the London Gazette, and to be receivable in equal half-yearly portions, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year: Provided always, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient to produce the yearly sum or stipend, so payable out of our common fund, as lastly herein mentioned, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said vicarage, in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.
