PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Thomas Edward John Jones-Parry, a minor of the age of fourteen years and upwards, only son and heir of Robert Lloyd Jones-Parry, late of Aberdunant, in the county of Carnarvon, Esquire, and of Lincoln's Inn, Barrister-at-Law, Master of Arts of the University of Oxford, in the Commission of the Peace and a Deputy Lieutenant for the said county of Carnarvon, and High Sheriff for the county of Anglesey in 1862, who was the eldest son of Thomas Parry Jones-Parry, late of Llwyn Onn, in the county of Denbigh, Esquire, a Commander in the Royal Navy, and of Margaret Hooper, his wife, only child of Robert Lloyd, late of Tregayan, in the county of Anglesey, Esquire, a Vice-Admiral in the Royal Navy, all deceased, Her Royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of the said Robert Lloyd, assume and take the surname of Lloyd only, in lieu and instead of those of Jones-Parry, and bear the arms of Lloyd; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's said College of Arms.
