THE Queen has been pleased to direct Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal granting the dignity of a Marquess of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto the Right Honourable George Frederick Samuel, Earl de Grey and Earl of Ripon, K.G., and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Marquess of Ripon, in the county of York.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Richard Roney, Esquire, Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army and Fort Major and Adjutant at Jersey, and to Rose Ann Roney, his wife, second but eldest surviving daughter of John Dougal, late of Ratho, in the county of Edinburgh, Esquire, deceased, Her Royal licence and authority that they may, in compliance with a declaration contained in a deed of entail made and executed by the said John Dougal, assume, take, and use the surname of Dougal in addition to and after that of Roney, and the designation of Dougal, of Ratho, that he the said Richard Roney may bear the arms of Dougal, and that such surnames and arms may in like manner be taken, borne, and used by the issue of their marriage; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's said College of Arms.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of quarantine regulations issued at the port of Savannah, providing that after the 1st instant all vessels arriving from, or having touched at, Key West, Florida, the West India or Bahama Islands, South America, or Mexico; vessels from foreign ports without clean bills of health, or from ports where contagious or infectious disease is known or supposed to exist, or having had sickness on board during the voyage; also vessels from ports in North America, with sickness on board, shall anchor at quarantine ground until visited and inspected by the Health Officer.
