THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of an Official Notification published in the St. Petersburg Journal, relative to the increase of certain Harbour Dues at Cronstadt, a translation of which is subjoined.

St. Petersburg, 11 June, 1871.

A DECISION of the Council of the Empire, sanctioned by H. M. the Emperor, on the 21st May last, increases in the following proportions, certain dues levied at Cronstadt, for the benefit of that city.

1. Foreign vessels arriving at Cronstadt, or leaving that port, will pay a due of 1 rouble per last of ballast discharged or taken in by them, by means of the vessels specially constructed by the city for that service.

2. Persons to whom the municipality has conceded the right of transporting merchandize from the shore on board vessels in the ports of Cronstadt, will pay to the city a due of 4 silver copecks for every ton of measurement of the craft employed by them for this service; and will receive from the owners of the merchandize and the captains of the vessels to whom the craft are lent for the transport 1 rouble a day for each vessel.

The owners of merchandize, who desire to transport the same in their own craft, will pay to the town a due of 7 roubles for each vessel, for the term of the trip. Captains of merchant vessels effecting these transports by means of their boats will be exempt from this due.

Persons who transport passengers from the shore on board vessels, or *vice versa*, by means of craft belonging to themselves, will pay, if they own two vessels, 5 silver roubles for the second one for each trip.

Each passenger is bound to pay 5 copecks for going from the landing-place to a vessel at anchor in the commercial harbour, and the same *vice versa*; from the landing-place to the outer part of the port 7 copecks; from the landing-place to the central entrance of the port in the small roadstead 25 copecks; from the landing-place to beyond this entrance in the small roadstead 50 copecks; from the landing-place to the great roadstead 40 copecks; from the commercial harbour to the central one 20 copecks.

The transport of men from a merchant vessel to the municipal kitchen for the purpose of pre-

paring the food of the crew will be paid for to the contractor of transports at the rate of 3 roubles a month for each vessel employed for this purpose by the captain of the ship. Should this transport be continued for more than a month, the hire of the boat is to be reckoned by the day.

3. Merchant ships, whether Russian or foreign, will pay to the city a due of 9 copecks for every last of their measurement during each occasion on which they anchor at Cronstadt, for the right of preparing the food of the crew at the municipal kitchen. As regards coasting vessels, as well as cutters, barques, and decked lighters, they will continue to pay for the use of the kitchen according to the tariff fixed by a Decree of the Committee of Ministers, and confirmed by the Imperial sanction on the 17th June, 1841.

"THE FAIRS ACT, 1871."**CUCKFIELD FAIR, SUSSEX.**

2. On the 5th day of August, 1871, I shall take the aforesaid representation into consideration, and all persons are to intimate, before that time, any objection they may desire to offer to the abolition of the said fair.

THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, that the following Regulations for Examination, to be held in pursuance of Her Majesty's Order in Council of June 4th, 1870, have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury:—

REGULATIONS (framed in pursuance of Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 4th June, 1870) for an Open Competitive Examination for Clerkships, &c., in various Departments, as stated in the Schedule hereto annexed.

N.B.—*These Regulations apply only to the Competitive Examination to be held on the 22nd August, 1871. For any subsequent Examination fresh Regulations will be issued, which may be different from these.*

1. On Tuesday, the 22nd day of August, 1871, and following days, a competitive examination will be held, in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, of candidates for employment as Clerks and Supplementary Clerks, and in other similar capacities in various Departments as stated in the schedule hereto annexed. Ten such situations will be filled up by means of this competition, if so many candidates shall be found qualified according to the rules hereinafter prescribed.

2. This examination will, subject to the payment of the fees hereinafter mentioned, be open to all persons, being natural born subjects of Her Majesty, provided—

(a.) That their age, on the first day of the said examination, be not less than 16 nor more than 20;

(b.) That their health and character are such as to qualify them in these respects for the employment which they seek;

(c.) That they have already passed a preliminary examination under the Regulations of December 6th, 1870 (Scheme II.), or shall have passed the preliminary examination prescribed in the following Regulation (3.)

* * Candidates who have served as pupil teachers or schoolmasters in schools under inspection by the Committee of Council on Education, England, or by the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, will be reported specially to those departments; and such of them as have been trained in normal schools at the public expense, will not be qualified to receive appointments in the Civil Service until the consent of those

departments, and the concurrence of the Treasury therein, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

3. Preliminary examinations will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, on the 4th and 11th of August, in the following subjects:—

1. Handwriting;
2. Orthography;
3. Arithmetic (to Vulgar and Decimal Fractions);

and no candidate who fails to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his competence in each of these subjects will be admitted to the competitive examination above mentioned.

Application for permission to attend one of these preliminary examinations must be made in the writing of the candidate, so as to be received ten days at least before the day on which he wishes to attend.

A fee of 10s. will be required from each candidate attending the preliminary examination.

4. At the competitive examination exercises will be set in the following subjects, and the candidates' performances will be valued in marks according to their relative merit; the maximum of marks for each subject being fixed as follows, viz.:—

Handwriting	400
Orthography	400
Arithmetic	400
Copying MS. (to test accuracy)	200
Indexing or Docketing	200
Digesting Returns into Summaries	200
English Composition	200
Geography	200
English History	200
Book-keeping	200

Candidates will be at liberty to offer themselves for examination in any or all of these subjects. No subjects are obligatory.

A fee of one pound will be required from each candidate attending this examination.

5. The marks obtained by each candidate will be added up, and the ten candidates who shall have obtained a greater aggregate number of such marks than any of the remaining candidates will be deemed to be selected candidates, and will be entitled to be employed on probation, each in one of the ten situations, specified or referred to in the annexed schedule, which are now vacant or which may next become vacant; provided that he be duly qualified according to the special rules prescribed, under clause IV of Her Majesty's Order in Council of 4th June, 1870, for the particular situation to which he may be appropriated as arranged in the following Regulation (6).

6. Subject to the last-mentioned condition, the particular departments and situations to which the selected candidates may be respectively appointed will be determined by their own choice, exercised, while an alternative remains, by each in the order of his position on the list. Vacancies, as they occur, will be announced by the chiefs of the various Departments to the Civil Service Commissioners, who will communicate with the qualified candidates next in order of choice, and report the result to the Departments concerned. In case of a vacancy occurring in a Department for which no one on the list of selected candidates is in all respects qualified, the Civil Service Commissioners may offer it to the candidate highest at the time on the list of selected candidates, subject to his passing a qualifying examination within such period as they may determine; or may reserve it to be filled by means of a subsequent open com-

petition, or otherwise, as they may see fit, in accordance with the Order in Council of 4th June, 1870.

7. Every selected candidate, after being assigned to a department, will enter on a period of probation, and he will not remain in the public service after six months from the date of his appointment, unless satisfactory proofs of his fitness shall have been furnished to the chief of such department, and a certificate of his qualification shall have been issued by the Civil Service Commissioners.

(No. 44).—SUEZ CANAL.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners No. 104, dated 10th December, 1869, respecting the Suez Canal and directions for its pilotage:—

The following additional information, chiefly from Captain Nares of H.M. Surveying Ship Newport, is issued for the guidance of mariners using the Canal:—

Port Said.—No material change affecting navigation has taken place in the approach since the survey in 1870, with the exception that the detached bank lying $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the eastward of the entrance has almost disappeared, the depth over it having increased from 12 and 14 to 20 feet, the buoy marking it has in consequence been removed.

At Port Ibrahim, the main entrance of the docks and a considerable portion of the north basin has been dredged to 24 feet.

Suez Canal.—By the regulations of the Canal Company all vessels are required to have a head and stern anchor ready for letting go, also hawsers for warps; and all vessels measuring over 100 tons are bound to take a pilot.

The deepest water is, in all cases, in the centre of the canal; is passing through, it is therefore more a question of careful steerage to keep the ship exactly in the centre, than of pilotage, and it is probable that the commander will be better acquainted with the behaviour of his own vessel

than the pilot who is a stranger to her. In the broad portions, particularly in the south part of the Bitter Lake, where the shallow water bears a large proportion to the deeper channel, great care is required in the navigation.

Between Port Said and Kantara the depth of water that can be relied on at present is 23 and 24 feet, and patches of the same depth are found in other parts of the Canal, but wherever these patches occur a dredge is always at work in the vicinity. The Channel through Lake Timsah is completed to 27 and 28 feet, and the dredging of the anchorage space on the lake will shortly be commenced.

Mooring bollards at a cable apart are fixed in the banks; they will bear sufficient strain to cant the largest ship. In the event of getting hard aground, the best shore anchor is found to be a spar buried horizontally on the inner side of the bank with perpendicular planks in front, the hawser being led through a cutting.

The iron beacons on the several lakes are placed 136 feet on either side of the centre of the deep water in the channel.

In passing round a curve in the canal, the bow of the vessel should be kept as near the inner, or convex, side as possible, and previous to rounding the engines of steam vessels should be stopped, that she may pass it at the lowest speed.

The only serious damage which vessels are liable to sustain in passing through the canal is from the propeller coming in contact with bank, it is necessary therefore, in any class of vessel, to proceed at slow speed, and large ships may find it advantageous to avail themselves of the services of the Company's tugs in preference to using their own screws.

When the wind blows across the canal care must be taken to prevent the ship drifting to leeward, and all unavailable top gear that will hold wind should be sent down. It would be preferable to stop and secure to the bollards rather than to risk damaging the screw by using it near the lee bank.

Suez.—At the mouth of Suez Creek allowance should be made for the strong tidal current which sets across the canal, and frequently in the contrary direction of the current in the canal.

The tidal stream between Suez and Chalouf turns to the northward two hours before high water at Suez, and runs for seven hours. It commences to run south one hour before low water at Suez, and continues $5\frac{1}{2}$ hours. At full the change of moon the tidal stream runs north from 9h 30m. to 4h. 30m., and south from 4h. 30m. to 10h. 0m. It has been recommended that this portion of the canal should be navigated with the opposing tide.
