We have received fome farther particulars of the defeat of the Convoy, which thetarfars endeavoured lately to put into Caminiec: It confilted in aboue 80 Wagons, ladea with all forts of frovifions and Ammunition; 50 whereof were: advaneed very near to the place, when the Cownilgeneral; upon the News of it, marched with great diligence to thercept them 5 He met in his math a Detachement of the Garifon of Caminiuc, and charged them with that vigor, that above too of the Enemy were billd or taken Prifoners, and the seft pur to flight; and afterwards attack'd the Troops that guarded the 50 Wagons, which he likewife atefated ; Upon which the Tartars, that were behind wift the reft of the Wagons, retired in great Diforder. It's faid that a Party of Poles have fance made an Inciufion to the very Gates of Caminiec; and that they deffroyed all the Corn in the Neighborhood. The Count de Dhbopa, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburtb, is returped towards.Berling, after having rentewed the Ancient Treaties with this Crown ; And the King jo fending ethe Prince de Lumomirski to that Court with the fapue Character. It's reported, that the Army of this Crowii will march towards Moidavia.
Vicnan, Auguif 22. The laft Letters from the Imperiat Camp before Belgrade, which were brought hither yefterday by Conut Femgier, are of the 12 th inftant; wtrich confitm the Account we gave in our laft of the Paflage of the save, of the Armies marching towards Betgrade, of fi's Airtval befor that Place, and of the Enemies precipitated Retreat to Sicidido via; ; And withal, add feveral Patticulass, which for wam of time were omitted in the firlt Relations. That the Paflage of the Save was look'd upon as fo hazandous an Efterpize; that divers of the General Officess advifed agaimt ite: That 300 Men only pafs'd it at firt, under the Corminnad or the Conint de Herberftein, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Refiment" of Soinibes, and the Sieur Pimi, Sergeant-Major of that of Lorrain at a place, where, beides its being very broad, "the Rapid,

The wth the Prince of Baiden adyanced to the River, and pretended to pafs it rexar Debitza; Whereupon the Enemy drew their Forces thither to hinder them, which: Prince Louis having Notice of, he marched-with great diligetice towards Caftantovituat and, with the help of the Boats:lie brought with bin'upon Wheels, paffed the River about a League on this tideratfinwovita, , He had got over 7000 Men , when the Enemy capue on with great Fury to dillodge them: The Fight was very blocdy and olftintrate for above 3 hours, but at lait the Infidels were forced to yield to the Couraige and Conduct of the ChriItians, and to abandon the place of Battel, and the City Caftatotiod, which was afterwards taken by Affault: It's faid, that in this"Actionf 4000 Turks, and 800 Chrittians, were kill'd, and that the Phrice of Baden had his Horfe fhot inder him. They writ foum UTper Fungary', that the Count de Corb'lli had adyanced othe 6th inftant: in the Night with 600 Heydukes and Hyllars and 500 Germans, to the Gates of Great Weradoh, where he buyt 3 Mills, and feverak Houles, that were filld with Coin and Forage, after having defeated a Pany of 60 Turks' that fallied out of the place : And that on the sth he hadibunt 2 Milld more, and feveral Houfes, on the other fide of the fiown: The Prifoners that were taken reported, that th? Turks were in 'a great Coniternation. The Emperor has appointed a publick Fift, which will beteld here to morrow, to implore the continuance of the Piwine Benedidtion upon het Chintian Arms.
