THE following Addresses have been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Grand Jury at the General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace, holden for the Borough of *Derizes* in the County of *Wilts.* in the *Guildhall* of the said Borough, the *Twentieth* of *July*, 1688. in the Fourth Year of Your Majesties Reign.

Great SIR!

WE, still enjoying the good Effects of Your Majesties Declaration for Liberty of Conscience, do continue our Thanks to God, for inclining Your Royal Heart to do that, by which the Fears of many are vanished, and more than was expected is enjoyed.

And since it hath pleased Almighty God to bless Your Majesty with a Son, and us with a Prince, which we hope is an ineffable Blessing to this Nation; we can do no less, and by this we do humbly congratulate Your Majesty, and Your Royal Consort, on this Occasion. Now that Heaven may so preserve and protect this Prince, that when Your Majesty (whose Life God long preserve,) shall sleep with Your Royal Ancestors, he may sway the Scepter of these Realms and Dominions, with such Wisdom, Justice, and Piety, that his Name may be eternal, shall be the Prayers of Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects.

We the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses, of the aforesaid Borough, in Common Council assembled, having seen the aforesaid Address, do concur therewith; and in Testimony thereof have set our Common Seal of the Corporation in the *Guildhall* aforesaid, this *Eight and Twentieth* day of *July*, Anno Dom. 1688.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of Your Majesties Ancient and Loyal City of *Hereford*.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

WE beseech Your Majesty to suffer us, (amongst the rest of Your Loyal Subjects,) thus humbly and publicly to express our grateful Sense of that happy Addition, which it has pleased God to make to the Royal Family, by giving Your Majesties and Your Kingdoms the desirable Blessing of a Prince to inherit Your Royal Virtues and Dominions.

And most heartily pray, that Your Royal Issue may grow more and more numerous, to succeed to Your Imperial Crown in all future Generations.

We likewise crave Your Majesties Leave (once more) thankfully to acknowledge those invaluable Blessings we enjoy under Your Majesties most Gracious Government.

And do most humbly assure Your Sacred Majesty, that as this Place has been heretofore plundered and ransack'd again and again, for their unalterable Fidelity to the Crown; so we will for ever continue our Dutiful and Loyal Obedience to Your Majesty, Your Heirs, and Lawful Successors.

In Testimony whereof we have hereunto put our Common Seal, at the *Guildhall* of Your said City.

Florence, August 17. The 12th Instant the Great Duke acquainted the Senate with the Conclusion of the Marriage of the Prince of *Tuscany*, his Son, with the Princess *Toland Beatrix*, Sister of the Elector of *Bavaria*: Whereupon they resolved to go the next day in a

Body to Complement his Highness and the Prince, which was accordingly performed with much Ceremony; And the same day there were publick Rejoycings throughout the whole City, and the Cannon of the Two Fortresses were several times discharged. We have Advice that the Great Duke's Gallies have, in their way to the *Levant*, (whither they are gone to join the Venetian Fleet) taken a great Bark belonging to *Tripoli*, in which were 68 Moors.

Rome, August 10. Several Expresses are arriv'd herethis Week about the Election of *Cologne*, upon which the Pope has not yet finally declared himself. On *Tuesday* last by Lord *Thomas Howard*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had his first Audience of his Holiness; and his Lordship is now buied in making his Visits. It is said a Marriage is treating between the Prince of *Parma*, and a Princess of *Neubourg* Daughter of the Elector Palatin.

Warsaw, August 6. The King parted from hence the first Instant for *Russia*, to put himself at the Head of his Army, which is by this time assembled; The Queen will stay here 8 or 9 days longer, and then will follow the King; Who hastned his departure, upon the Advice he received of the great Ravages, which have been made by the *Tatars* in their late Incursions on our Frontiers, where they have burnt above 50 Villages, and made a very great number of Slaves. We have received some farther particulars of the defeat of the Convoy, which the *Tatars* endeavoured lately to put into *Caminnic*: It consisted in above 80 Wagons, laden with all sorts of Provisions and Ammunition; 50 whereof were advanced very near to the place, when the *Crown-Generall*, upon the News of it, marched with great diligence to intercept them; He met in his march a Detachment of the Garrison of *Caminnic*, and charged them with that vigor, that above 100 of the Enemy were kill'd or taken Prisoners, and the rest put to flight; and afterwards attack'd the Troops that guarded the 50 Wagons, which he likewise defeated; Upon which the *Tatars*, that were behind with the rest of the Wagons, retired in great Disorder. It is said that a Party of *Poles* have since made an Incursion to the very Gates of *Caminnic*, and that they destroyed all the Corn in the Neighborhood. The Count *de Dohna*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, is returned towards *Berlin*, after having renewed the Ancient Treaties with this Crown; And the King is sending the Prince *de Lumonski* to that Court with the same Character. It's reported, that the Army of this Crown will march towards *Moldavia*.

Vienna, August 22. The last Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Belgrade*, which were brought hither yesterday by Count *Fuggier*, are of the 12th Instant; which confirm the Account we gave in our last of the Passage of the *Sava*, of the Armies marching towards *Belgrade*, of its Arrival before that Place, and of the Enemies precipitated Retreat to *Sendrovia*; And withal, add several Particulars, which for want of time were omitted in the first Relations. That the Passage of the *Sava* was look'd upon as so hazardous an Enterprize; that divers of the General Officers advis'd against it: That 300 Men only pass'd it at first, under the Command of the Count *de Herberstein*, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of *Souchez*, and the *Sieur Pini*, Sergeant-Major of that of *Lorrain*; at a place, where, besides its being very broad, the Rapid-

in of the Stream, with its Whirlpools, and several Divisions into Sands and Islands, rendered the Passage very difficult. It was about one a Clock in the Morning when they came to the other side, where they found the Turks at Work, in casting up a Bank behind their descent. (for it seems *Tekkeley*, who was posted at the Islands *Zingari*, had the Evening before had Notice by a Deserter of the Intention of the Imperialists to pass the River there,) who, upon the approach of the Boats, and the first firing of our Men, ran away, leaving their Shovels and Pickaxes, with a great many Palisades, behind them, which were of great use to the Germans, who immediately fell to work to lodge themselves; After which the rest of the Troops made all the haste they could to pass over. The Enemy made no attempt to disturb them about Eight, when Eight thousand Janissaries and Spahis attack'd them with great Fury; But by this time they had lodged themselves in very good and advantageous Intrenchments, so that the Turks, though the several Assaults they made lasted above 2 hours, were repulsed, with little loss on our side. *Tekkeley* thereupon left his Islands, and retired to *Belgrade*, which put the Ottoman Army into that Confusion, that though their Camp was very well fortified, yet they immediately abandoned it, and retired in the greatest disorder that can be imagined; And so great was their haste to be gone, that many Boats full crowded went down the River without Oars. The 12th the Imperial Troops began to take their Posts in order to attack the Castle, which is situated upon a Hill of difficult access; But the Garrison being in great Consternation, they hoped to be quickly Masters of it. The Hussars had made Incursions 7 or 8 Leagues from the Camp, without meeting any Enemy Provisions were so plentiful in the Imperial Army, that a fat Ox might be bought for a Ducat. We have Advice from *Sissef* and *Petrowina*, of the taking of *Cassanowitza*, by the Imperialists, which needs however a Confirmation, for there is as yet no Express arrived with this important News from Prince *Dionis of Baden*, who commands those Forces. The account we have is, That the Prince of *Baden*, having passed the *Sava* at *Offitz* the 4th instant, was joined there the next day by 9000 Croats. That the 7th they began their march towards the *Unna*, their Bridge passing at the same time down the *Sava*. The 8th the Prince of *Savoy* joined them with a Reinforcement of 4000 Germans, The 9th they continued their march, and arrived the 10th within a quarter of a League of the River *Unna*. Several Detachements were sent out to observe the Enemy, who brought back an account, that the *Bassa of Bosnia* was posted with 12 or 14500 Men on the other side of the River, with a Resolution to dispute the Passage of it. The 11th the Prince of *Baden* advanced to the River, and pretended to pass it near *Debitza*; Whereupon the Enemy drew their Forces thither to hinder them, which Prince *Louis* having Notice of, he marched with great diligence towards *Cassanowitza*, and with the help of the Boats he brought with him upon Wheels, passed the River about a League on this side *Cassanowitza*; He had got over 7000 Men, when the Enemy came on with great Fury to dislodge them; The Fight was very bloody and obstinate for above 3 hours, but at last the Infidels were forced to yield to the Courage and Conduct of the Christians, and to abandon the place of *Bartel*, and the City *Cassanowitza*, which was afterwards taken by Assault: It is said, that in this Action 4000 Turks, and 800 Christians, were kill'd, and that the Prince of *Baden* had his Horse shot under him. They write from *Upper Hungary*, that the Count *de Corbelli* had advanced the 6th instant in the Night with 600 *Heydukes* and Hussars, and 300 Germans, to the Gates of *Great Wyraditz*, where he burnt 2 Mills, and several Houses, that were fill'd with Corn and Forage, after having defeated a Party of 60 Turks that sallied out of the Place: And that on the 9th he had burnt 2 Mills more, and several Houses, on the other side of the Town: The Prisoners that were taken reported, that the Turks were in a great Consternation. The Emperor has appointed a publick Fast, which will be held here to morrow, to implore the continuance of the Divine Benediction upon the Christian Arms.

Hamburg, August 27. They write from *Poland*, that the Forces of *Lithuania* had joined those of the Crown. The Letters from *Berlin* tell us, that the Electoral Prince was Christned the 22th instant by the Name of *Frederick-William*.
Brussels, August 23. The Great Master of the *Teutonic Order* parted from hence this day, to return by the way of *Malmes* and *Antwerp* to *Dusseldorp*, where he will meet his Brother Prince *Charles* with the Princess *Radzeville* his Wife. The Troops in the Service of these Countries are marching to reinforce the Frontier Garrisons. And Orders are, it is said, given for the raising of Recruits to complete the several Regiments; And for the buying of Horses to finish the re-mounting of the Cavalry and Dragoons. We hear that the French Troops are drawing together in the New Conquests, and that they are to encamp under the Command of the *Marschal d'Humieres*, towards the Country of *Liege*.

Paris, Sept. 4. The Commissions for the new Levies are given out; And the Officers are gone to raise their Men. The new Lieutenant-Generals are the *Sieur d'Elach*; the *Sieur de Pauban*; the *Sieur de Metz*; the *Comte de Broglie*; the *Marquis de Renty*; the *Chevalier de Villader*; the *Prince de Bickenfeldt*; the *Marquis de la Frezelere*; the *Sieur du Rubanetel*; the *Sieur de Gourmay*; the *Sieur Rofes*; the *Duke de Vendome*; the *Marquis de Revol*; the *Sieur de Carinas*; the *Marquis de Haxelles*; the *Sieur de Jonvelle*; the *Sieur d'Auger*; the *Marquis de Bullonde*; and the *Sieur de S. Ruth*. His Majesty has likewise made 38 *Marschals de Camp*, and 21 *Brigadiers of Foot*, 19 of Horse, and 2 of Dragoons. The *Sieur Valdor*, Resident of *Liege*, presented, the 30th inst, a Letter to the King from the new Bishop.

The *Marquis de Roure*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of *Genova*, had, the 25th instant, his Audiences of Leave of Their Majesties; The 26th of the Queen-Dowager; And the 28th of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; Being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottril* Master of the Ceremonies.

The Count *de Reventlau*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark*, had, the 26th, his first Audience of the Queen-Dowager; And the 28th of the Prince of Wales; Conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.

The *Prince de Bergues*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Governor of *Flanders*, had, the 26th, his Audiences of Leave of Their Majesties; And this day of the Queen Dowager; Being conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.
