THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Havre, reporting that clean bills of health, attested by a French Consular Officer, will be demanded at Dieppe from all vessels coming from any foreign port.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Consul at Taganrog, reporting that the cessation of cholera at that port has been officially announced, and that clean bills of health are delivered by the Local Authorities to ships leaving for abroad.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Bucharest, reporting that a quarantine of ten days has been established at Sulina on all vessels arriving with foul bills of health from Constantinople and from Russian ports on the Black Sea.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Tunis, reporting that all vessels arriving from the Baltic and continental ports, with the excep-

tion of those with clean bills of health from Norway and Sweden, are subjected to a quarantine of twenty-one days; and arrivals from Constantinople to a quarantine of eleven days.

WITH reference to the Notice which appeared in the London Gazette of the 3rd July last, to the effect that the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade had received quarantine regulations applicable to ships passing through the Straits of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus, their Lordships hereby give notice that they have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Supplementary Article to the said Regulations, and that this Article may be inspected upon application at the Beard of Trade (Commercial Department), Whitehall Gardens.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Consul at Canea, reporting that all vessels arriving in the Island of Crete from Constantinople, or other places where cholera has appeared, will be placed in quarantine for ten days, and that if any case of cholera has occurred on board during the voyage the quarantine will be prolonged to fifteen days.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Consul at Rosario, reporting that a Law has been recently passed, declaring all agricultural colonies established in the province of Rosario, between the Guardia de la Esquina and Melincue, and from San Geronimo to the Cañada de Gomez, Totoras and Saladas, and from the Capital to the Sance, and from the Prusianas to the frontier, and from San José to the colony of Helvecia, exempt from all direct taxation for three years from the date of their existence; and colonies established beyond the above limits exempt from direct taxation or taxation on their produce for the term of five years.
