By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby revoke their Order, bearing date the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, defining the part of the Port of Sunderland, in the county of Durham, within which foreign cattle might be landed for slaughter: Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order before the date of this revocation, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the part of the Port of Sunderland, in the county of Durham, within which foreign cattle may be landed for slaughter, as follows:—

All that space in the port and borough of Sunderland, being a part of the South Dock property of the River Wear Commissioners, lying between the German Ocean and a line commencing on the sea at the north-eastern end of the South Pier, at the mouth of the River Wear, and running in a direction generally towards the south-west, along the southern side of the River Wear to the Tide Gauge at the north-eastern point of the entrance to the Tidal Basin, thence in a southerly direction

along the eastern side of the waters of the Tidal Basin, and of the North Half Tidal Basin, thence in an easterly direction passing the Locomotive Shed and the Lifeboat House to the sea; which space is coloured green on the plan of part of the Port of Sunderland, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Sunderland;

And do hereby prescribe as follows:—

1. Foreign cattle landed within the said landing-place may, under such regulations as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs from time to time prescribe, be re-shipped therefrom and conveyed by vessel direct to the Port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, North Shields, Hartlepool, or Middlesbrough.

2. Provided that all cattle so re-shipped shall continue to be deemed foreign cattle.
