In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to

The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

And whereas on such representation and consideration it appears to me that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fairs should be abolished:

And whereas Sir George Howland Beaumont, of Colcorton Hall, in the county of Leicester, Bart., as lord or owner of the said Fairs and the tolls thereof, has consented in writing that the said Fairs should be abolished:

Now therefore, I, as the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Fairs Act, 1871," do hereby order that the Fairs which have been annually held on the 12th and 13th days of May, and on the 10th day of October, in the town of Haverhill, in the Wickhambrook Division of Risbridge, in the county of Suffolk, shall be abolished as from the date of this order.

#### IN THE MATTER OF THE FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1871.

WHEREAS due proof has been made to the satisfaction of me, the undersigned, Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the nature of the business of the Trades carried on in Factories and Workshops, specified in the Schedule hereto, depends upon the weather and the seasons of the year, and requires that male young persons of at least fourteen years of age and upwards, and women working in such Factories and Workshops, should be employed in the manner hereinafter mentioned: Now I, the said Henry Austin Bruce, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the 1st and 2nd Articles of the Schedule annexed to the Factory and Workshop Act, 1871, do, by this my Order, give permission to occupiers of the said Factories and Workshops to employ male young persons of at least fourteen years of age, and women, working in such Factories and Workshops, for a period not exceeding fourteen hours in any one day:

Provided that:—

- 1st. They shall not be so employed except between the hours of six in the morning and eight in the evening:
- 2nd. In addition to the time allowed for meals, they shall be allowed half-an-hour for a meal after the hour of five in the evening:
- 3rd. They shall not be so employed except between the 31st day of March and the 31st day of October following, nor for more than three days in any one week:
- 4th. They shall not be so employed at any time unless a Notice containing these conditions, signed by the Inspector of Factories for the district, be hung up in or about in the Factory or Workshop, so that it may be read by the workers.

#### Variation of the Compass, 1872.

THE following information respecting the Variation of the Compass in the British Islands and adjacent seas is published in order—1st. To apprise mariners of the decrease of the Variation, which in the last 15 years has amounted to about one quarter of a point, and at present averages 9 to 10 minutes annually. 2ndly. To enable mariners, chart makers, and agents for the sale of charts, to correct the numerous charts and sailing directions now in use, which have the Variation incorrectly marked.

From Shetland, the Orkneys, and Hebrides, to the Northern coasts of France between Calais and Ushant, the present general direction of the lines of equal variation is S.S.W. and N.N.E. (true) ranging in amount from 18° to 26° westerly.

**NOTICE TO MARINERS.**

(No. 28.)—NORTH AND BALTIC SEAS.

*Variation of the Compass, 1872.*

THE following information respecting the Variation of the Compass in the North and Baltic Seas is made public, in order to apprise mariners of the decrease in the Variation, which in the North Sea at present averages 9 minutes annually, and in the Baltic Sea about 10 minutes; as also to enable mariners and agents for the sale of charts to correct the numerous sailing directions and charts now in use, in which the Variation is erroneously noted.

From the Eastern coast of the British Isles to the Kattegat, the present general direction of the lines of equal variation is N. by E. and S. by W. (true), ranging in amount from 22° to 13°;—and from the Kattegat to the Gulf of Finland, the lines of equal variation are nearly North and South (true), ranging from 13° to 2° Westerly.
