By the KING, A PROCLAMATION.

JAMES R.

E have received undoubted Advice, That a great and sudden Invasion from Holland, with an Armed Force of Fereigners and Strangers, will speedily be made in a Hostile manner upon this Our Kingdom:

And although some false Pretences relating to Liberty, Property, and Religion, contrived or worded with Are and Subtilty, may be given out (as shall be thought use ful upon such an Attempt) it is manifest however. (considering the great Preparations that are making) that no less Matter by this Invasion, is proposed and purposed, than an absolute Conquest of these. Our Kingdoms, and the utter Subduing and Subjecting Us and all Our People, to a Foreign Pawer, which is promoted (as We understand,) although it may seem almost incre-dible) by some of Our Subjects, being Persons of wicked and restless Spirits, implacable Malice, and desperate Designs, who having no sense of former Intestine Di stractions, the Memory and Misery whereof should en-dear and put a Value upon that Peace and Happiness which buth long been enjoyed; nor being moved by Our resterated Alls of Grace and Mercy, wherein We have studied and delighted to abound towards all Our Subjects, and even towards those who were once Our avowed and open Enemies, do again endeavour to imbroil this Kingdom in Boud and Ruine, to gratifie their own Ambition and Malice, propoling to themselves a Prey and Booty in such a publick Consussion.

We cannot omit to make it known, That although We had Notice some time since, that a Foreign Force was preparing against Us, yet me have always declined any Foreign Succors, but rather have chosen (next under God) to rely upon the true and ancient Courage, Fasth and Allegiance of Our own People, with whom We have often ventured Our Life, for the Honour of this Nation, and in whose Defence, against all Enemics, We are firmly refolved to live and die: And therefore We folemnly Conjure Our Subjects to lay afide all manner of Am-mofities, Fealousies and Prejudices, and heartily and chearfully to umte together in the Defence of T's and their Native Country, which thing alone will (under God) defeat and frustrate the principal Hope and Defign of Our Enemis, who expect to find Our People divided, and by publishing perhaps some plausible Reisons of their coming buther, as the specious, though faile Pretences of maintaining the Protestant Religion, or afferting the Liberties and Properties of Our People, do h pe thereby to Conquer this G. eat and Renowned Kingdom: But albeit the Design hath been carried on with all ima. ginable Secricy and Endeavours to surprize and decrive Us, We have not been manting on Our Part, to make fuch Provision as did become Us, and by God's B'essing. We make no doubt of being found in so good a posture, that O'r Enemies may have cause to repent such their rash and unjul accompr.

We did intend (as We lately declared) to have mes Our Par'sament in November next, and the Writs are issued forth accordingly, proposing to Our selves, amongst other things, that We might be able to quiet the minds of all Our Prople in matters of Religion, pursuant to the several Declarations We have published to that effect, but in regard of this strange and unreasonable Attempt, from Our Neighboring Country (without any manner of provocation) deligned to divert Orr said Gracious purposes, We find it necessary to recall Our said Writs, which We do hereby recall accordingly, Commanding and requiring Our Loving Subjects to take Notice thereof, and to surcease all further proceedings thereon; And forasmuch as the approaching danger which now is at hand, will require a great and vigorous Defence, We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Loving Sub-jects, both by Sea and Land (whose ready Concurrence, Valour and Courage, as true English-men, We no way doubt in so just a Cause) to be prepared to defend their Country; And We do hereby Command and Require all Country; And We do hereby Command and Require all Lords Lieutenants, and Deputy Lieutenants, to use that be stand utmost Endeavours to Resist, Repel and Suppress Our Enemies who come with such Confidence and great Preparations to Invade and Conquer these Our Kingdoms. And lastly We do most express and writtly enjoyn and probabit all and every Our Subjects of what Degree or Condition soever, from giving any manner of Aid, As stance, Countenance or Succour, or combaving or holding any Correspondence with these Our Enemies, or any of their Complices, upon pain of Lieb Treason, and being prosecuted and proceeded against High Treason, and being prosecuted and proceeded grainst with the utmost severity.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the 28th day of September, 1688. In the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

Legherne, Sept. 18. We have Advice from the Venetian Army before Negrepont, that they had raised 6 Batteries against the Place, and that their Attacks were fo far advanced, that they were preparing for a general Affault. From Dalmatia we hear, that the Garison of Clin had offered to surrender, if they were not relieved in 8 days; But that General Cornaro would not allow them more than 24 hours, fo that we fud-denly expect to hear of the furrender of that Place, which will free the Territories of Zara and Sebenico from the Enemies Incursions. The Master of a Vessel come from Alexandria reports, that there were three Turkish Gallies, and ten Ships, that had on Board them Goods and Money to the Value of a Million and an half, bound for Constantmople; And that the Captain-General Venier, upon Notice of it, had fent out 20 Ships, in three Squadrons, to look after them. Ship from Smirna coi fi ms the great Ruin happened to that City, by the late Earthquake and Fire, and adds that most of the Merchants were removed from thence to Scio. The Marriage of the Prince of Tiscany with the Princess of Bavaria has been published here with great Solemnity.

Venice, Sept. 24. The Letters from Zam, of the 23d paft, tell us, they had received Advice by the way of Corinel, that the Venetians had taken all the Out-works of Negrepone, with the loss of 1600 Tucks, and doubted not but they should in few days be Maiters of the Town. On Sunday last arrived here a Felucca, with the News of the taking of the important Fortiefs of Cm, by the Forces of this State, under the Command of the Proveditor General Corparo; They encamped before the Place the 28th of

month, and with great diligence raised their Batteries against it; which having made a Breach in the Wall, they gave an Assault, and mounted the Breach with that Vigor and Bravery, that the Enemy, after having made all the Desence they were able, retired into the Cattle, where they hung out a White Flag, and afterwards surrendred at discretion; And about 1000, with the Governor, and 5 Aga's, remained Prisoners. There were found in the Place 10 pieces of Brass Cannon, and 150 Slaves were released. The farther Particulars in our next.

Vienna, Sept. 23. The Imperial Army decamped from Belgrade, or rather separated, on the 13th instant. Several Regiments were ordered to march towards Bofnia, to reinforce Prince Louis of Baden; A Detachement was likewise sent to join with General Veterans on the Frontiers of Valachia; And another towards Temesmaer; And the rest of the Imperial Forces will be put into Winter-Quarters in Servia, Transploania, and Opper Hungary; Those of Bavaria, with the other Auxiliary Troops, will return home. The Rascians being 10000 strong design to march towards Sophia, and to nossess themselves of that Place. And Yeghen and to possess themselves of that Place. Osman is retired from Nissa, whether for fear of their approach, or upon any other delign, is uncertain. The Turkish Ambassadors are expected here in three or four days, being under the Care of General Caraffa; It's faid they do offer, as Conditions of Peace, to yield to the Emperor Great Waradin, Giula, Jeno and Temeswaer; But these Places, as well as Sigeth and Canifa, are reduced to those Necessities, that they must quickly fall into the hands of the Imperialists. The Duke of Lorrain is arrived at Graz; But we do not yet know, whither he will come hither, or go directly to Inspruck The Elector of Bavaria will part from hence the beginning of the next Week for Munick.

Bruffels, Octob. 5. We have Advice, that the French Forces, which affembled between the Sambre and the Meuse, under the Command of the Mareschal d'Humiare marched towards Charlemont to pass the Mense there; It's said they are about 12000 strong, having been drawn out of the French Garifons in Haynault and Flanders; Those that were detach'd from Luxembourg and Lorrain are marched towards the Electorate of Cologne, and the Palatinate. The City of Cologn is very much press'd by the French to embrace a Neutrality; And those Magistrates have, as we are told, let the Imperial Minister know, that they shall be forced to accept of it, unless the Consederate Troops do oblige those of France to retire out of their Territories. They write from Strasbourg, That the City of Spire has received a French Garison; That the Brench are likewise in Neustadt in the Palatinate; And that Philipsbourg and Keyferlauter are invested; There's in the first of these Places a Garison of 2400 Men, who, by a vigorous defence, may give time for their Relief.
The Letters from Rome of the 18th past, say, That the Pope had, pursuant to the Report of the Confiftorial Congregation, confirmed the Election of Prince Clement of Bavaria to the Archbishoprick of Cologne.

Hague, Octob. 6. Yesterday in the Asternoon the Marquis d'Albyeille, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had a Conference with eight Deputies of the States General, to whom he delivered the following Memorial; Which will be read this Morning in the Assembly of the States-General.

THE underwitten Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great Britain, has received Order to represent to your Lordships, That although Hu Majely had believed, that what He had already declared to your Ambassador in England, and the Orders He had given to His said Envoy Extraordinary up in the same Subject, might have satisfied your Lordships, that there is no other Treaty between His Majesty and the Most Christian King, than those that are publish and in Print; Yet since a great deal of Artifice and Industry has been made use of to make the Word believe, that the King his Master is entred in or other Treaties and Alliances with the Most Christian

King, His Majesty, to skew the great regard He has to the Friendship and Alliances; which are between Him and your Lordships, and His desire to continue the same, has Commanded the said Envoy Extraordinary, in His Name, to assure your Lordships, that there is no other Freaty between His Majesty and the most Christian King, than those that are publick and in Print; And farther, that as His Majesty extreamly desires the Preservation of the Peace, and Repose of Christendom, so He will be also glad to take such measures with your Lordships, as may be most convenient for maintaining the Peace of Nimeguesh, and the Trace of 20 Years concluded in 1584. Given at the Hague the 5th of October, 1688.
